## Good News for County Bridges

Butte County receives \$700k Federal grant to repair Orman Road bridge.

BEACON STAFF news@bellefourchebeacon.com BELLE FOURCHE - The U.S. Department of Transportation has awarded Butte County $\$ 700,000$ to go toward
replacement of the Horse Creek replacement of the Horse Creek
bridge on Orman Road west of bridge on Orman Road west of
Newell. The money was part of a $\$ 2.24$ million award that came from a joint application by Butte, Lawrence and Meade Counties that will replace a total of four bridges. The bridges are on county highways, serving as communities and vital to local and regional economies. Along with the Orman Road bridge the funds will replace Opal Road over Beaver Dam Creek in Meade County and St Onge Road over False Bottom Creek in Lawrence county. Th funds are part of the governments Competitive Highway
Bridge Program that gave out $\$ 25$ million for 20 projects in 18 states.
In addition Butte County has been awarded two PE (Preliminary Engineering) grants from he state's Bridge Improvement Grant (BIG) program for work Four Mile Creek bridge along Old Highway 85, 30 miles northeast of Belle Fourche was given $\$ 51,500$ for engineering work and the bridge over Horse Creek on Orman Road west of Newell was given $\$ 51,500$ as well.
The county will need to match he three grants. It's not of eactly what that figure will be yet but Jason Hanson with Brosz Engineering said it could be around $\$ 175,000$.
The Orman Road bridge was number one on Butte County' already has a 4 -ton weight lim The funds will finally set in motion a plan to replace the bridge and have the new one ready by he end of 2021, at the earliest, according to Hanson.

The PSAPs are funded by surcharges added to your monthly phone bill. In 2012 the state leg

ital upgrades to their systems. NG911, or "Next Generation 911 " will make better use of current technology, including taking full advantage of digital cell phones, and Internet-based broadband-enabled technology to coordinate emergency
