Back to the drawing board... Debate Continues on City Employment Residency Requirement

news@bellefourchebeacon.com BELLE FOURCHE - By a 6-to-2 vote the Belle Fourche City Council decided to send the proposed changes to Section 5.19 of the city handbook back to the Legal & Finance committee for a second time in hopes of reaching a compromise on the changes.

Section 5.19 requires all city employee department heads to live within 3 miles of the Belle Fourche city limits. Other full-time employees must live within 25-minutes of the city.

The proposed change says that all city employees, regardless of status, need to live within an expanded 30-minute response time of the city. In other words, employees, including department heads, could live where they wanted to as long as they could report to work in 30 minutes or less. The 30-minute response time rule would encompass an area that would include Spearfish, Newell and most of Sturgis as well as areas west, north and east of the city.

The change was proposed as an effort to expand the talent pool for potential city employees, namely department heads. Those in opposition argue that department heads should live within or very close to the city in order to better serve the

Total City Subsidy Allocations Cut by \$42,000

Closing of ShopKo and loss of internet service sales tax seen as leading factors.

BELLE FOURCHE - A slowdown in sales tax revenue has resulted in a reduction of the 2020 city subsidy allocations to area organizations by a total of 21.4% over last year. All told the city will dole out \$153,900 next year as compared to \$195,900 that was allocated for 2019. 'We're facing a couple of different things unlike we've had in past years," said Mayor Gloria Landphere. "There's quite a bit of unknown out there but we've tried to be as positive as we could. I can't remember a year since 2008 that we've had this kind of challenge with sales tax." Sales tax revenue and 3rd penny sales tax (211 Fund) often referred to as the "bed and booze" tax, are two of the major income sources that allow the city to fund various civic organizations. The 3rd penny may be used for sports and

recreational organizations that promote the community.

This year, the city finance office knew there would have to be some belt tightening due primarily to two factors. The first is the June closing of Shop-Ko and the second is the end of internet service sales taxes.

Landphere said she and Breanna Schaefer, City Finance Officer, went through the budget, plugged in all the revenue and department expenditures and ended up with around \$586,000 in applied cash in th general fund. After considering expected sales tax cash flow she says they determined that \$100,000 would be available to fund \$170,700 in subsidy requests. Last year all entities were funded at 100% of their requests, totaling \$155,900. A packed chamber at City Hall then watched as the Belle Fourche City Council wrestled with some difficult decisions for more than 90 minutes. Councilman James Ager suggested that three major requests be dealt with first; Belle Fourche Development Corporation (\$75,000), The Chamber of Commerce (\$40,000) and the Center of the Nation Business Association, or CoNBA,

(\$10,000). All three subsidy requests were the same as they were last year when the three groups received \$125,000 in total.

"These groups are all basically promotion of the city, commerce, growth and the economy," Ager said. To get the ball rolling, he proposed beginning the conversation with funding these groups with equal amounts for 2020, starting at \$10,000 each. "It's just a talking point, we got to start somewhere." we have to cut the funds and the budget of the groups that replace the lost sales tax," Councilman Travis Martin said. "They're the ones who bring in the businesses. That's the struggle I'm faced with right now is that we're potentially going to cut the legs off the one thing that gets the businesses back in here to build us back up. So I really want to know what the bottom line that they can work at and still be productive for us."

Work to Begin on Winkler Road Bridge

BELLE FOURCHE - The Butte County Commissioners approved a \$69,399 quote from Forterra Pipe and Precast of Rapid City to supply materials for work on replacing the closed Winkler Road bridge. There was some discussion about contact that had been made with Commissioner Karrol Herman about the possibility of a different site, but after the commission discussed it, it was determined that the project would go forward as planned. The quote was for materials only, with the county highway department crew doing some of the labor on the Winkler site themselves. The bridge replacement could cost up to \$140,000.

"It will probably be October before the work will actually commence," said County Engineer Jason Hansen.

Getting the Winkler Road bridge open is seen as critical since the Horse Creek bridge over heavily-traveled Orman Road a mile to the south is due to be closed before it can be replaced. A Winkler Road detour would save several miles and up to a half-hour in travel time for emergency vehicles.

Also at the Sept. 3rd meeting the commission discussed a haul route agreement between Butte County and BPM of Colony, WY, on the 3V Road northwest of Belle Fourche. The company already had an agreement but asked for an addendum, to include mining through the road at a certain point, with BPM providing an alternative route for landowners.

"They'll (BPM) contact all of the landowners," said Highway Superintendent Dwayne Heidrich. "They will get it done, and then make a new road, which will take a curve out, make it straighter, and they'll reclaim the gravel." The work is expected to commence within two to three weeks, according to Herman. It should take approximately another three weeks to finish, barring weather issues.

Commissioner Frank Walton stated, "I hate to see that road torn up, but I guess we don't have a choice."

The commission also discussed the Wilson Cemetery Road issue, where county crews have been working to repair the damage done by haul trucks. The commission voted to install weight-limit signs at a previous meeting, but the company involved and the trucking companies hired, are working toward a haul agreement.

"Roth (trucking) won't haul till it's (agreement) in place," said Heidrich. "They don't want to get a ticket.

It was also noted that the wheel tax petition deadline was Friday, September 6, and that one petition had been taken out to be circulated. The petition on the mill levy increase proposed by the commission, fell short of valid signatures and the issue will not come to ballot.

Donald "Don" Hafner 101

Donald "Don" D. Hafner, 101, passed away with family at his side on August 30, 2019 at North Colorado Medical Center in Greeley, CO.

A lifelong resident of Newell, he spent his last few years with his daughter, Connie in Colorado. Don was a loving husband and devoted father. He married his life companion, Ruth M. Powers, on June 20, 1941. They shared 61 years together.

Don had a wonderful sense of humor and a gentle spirit. He was an unassuming man of integrity, strength,

and many talents. It seemed there was nothing he could not do or build.

After graduating from Newell High School in 1935, Don went to work at the Homestake Mine in Lead, then opened a plumbing and appliance store in Newell. Drafted in October, 1942, he served in the Army, first at the Climax Molybdenum Mine in Leadville, CO, and then in Korea in the 143rd Field Artillery Battalion during WWII.

After the war, Don returned to his Newell business. A man of diverse interests and abilities, he bought a drilling rig in 1951 and, into the mid '60s, drilled water and gas wells in South Dakota, North Dakota, and Wyoming. Don had completed a certified course in diesel mechanics and once had a pilot's license. He restored 2 antique automobiles and was a member of the Horseless Carriage Club of America. As a member of the Newell Boat and Ski Club, he was instrumental in building many facilities at Newell Lake, all of which are now sadly gone. An avid fisherman, he kept many area dams planted with bass.



Always a strong supporter of his community, Don served about 25 years in the Newell Volunteer Fire Department and served many years on the City Council in various capacities. He installed and maintained many of the town's water mains.

Most will probably remember Don as being in the wool business. Throughout his life, he worked at the Hafner Wool warehouse in Newell until it closed, later becoming the manager of North Central Wool Corp. in Belle Fourche from which he retired

in 1985. He designed and built the first hydraulic wool baler in 1958, and subsequently built a number of others, some of which were sold to mills and warehouses across the country.

Don was preceded in death by his wife, Ruth and a daughter, Dorothy.

He is survived by daughters, Donna Hafner of Grand Junction, CO and Connie (Dick) Williamson of Greeley, CO. Also surviving are granddaughter, Heidi (Scott) Krise and great-grandchildren, Kimberlyn, Courtney, Braden, and Jenna of Briggsdale, CO

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

The Belle boys came out playing tough against the Cavaliers, a team they haven't beaten in four seasons. Belle would get the early momentum as Jamie Gonzalez would have a nice assist to Barak Minor and he ripped the cords with 25 minutes left in the first half Belle's defense led by senior Cruz Kellem would hold the Cavaliers until Andrew Evans put a shot in with only a minute left in the first half making it 1-1 at the halftime break. The Belle Fourche Broncs girls Soccer team battled rival St Thomas More in a big matchup at the Roundup Soccer fields on Tuesday afternoon as part of a boys/girls double header. The Lady Broncs would battle the Cavaliers hard but came up just short as St Thomas More prevailed by a score of 3-2.

The first half was dominated by the Cavaliers and they scored right away with just over a minute played in the contest junior Jenna Jacobson found the net and St Thomas More led 1-0. BOX ELDER - The Belle Fourche Broncs picked up their first football win of the season last Friday night with a 28-12 win over the Douglas Patriots.

In the second quarter the Patriots nearly converted a Bronc fumble into points but Olson picked off Douglas quarterback Anthony Ramsey near the goal line. The Broncs took over and drove 99 yards for a score as Brextin Garza found the end zone off left tackle on a six-yard run. The extra point was no good and Belle took a 13-nothing lead into the break. The Broncs recovered a Patriot fumble on the second play of the half at the Douglas 34. Five plays later Nowowiejski dropped straight back with good protection and hit a wide open Tyndall on drag route coming across the middle. Tydall ducked upfield and ran it in to complete the 26-yard play. The two-point conversion was good and Belle Fourche was up 21-nothing. Later in the third Belle Fourche would convert a 3rd patriot turnover into points as Olson recovered a Patriot fumble at the Douglas 46. On the next play Nowowiejski hit Tyndall for their third connection. This one from 46 yard out and the Broncs were in control 28-nothing after three. The Patriots were finally able to take advantage of good field position in the fourth. They drove 40-yards for a score. Ramsey, rolling to his left, found Tyler Clark who dragged

a couple of Bronc defenders the final 5 yards into the end zone a 25-yard scoring play to make it 14-6.

The two connected for the Patriots final touchdown with 9:35 to play. Ramsey took a high snap in the shotgun and rolling right, found Clark who jumped straight up, snared the ball on the sideline at the 18, came down at a standstill while Kelby Olson in pursuit slid out of bounds behind him. Clark tiptoed down the sideline to complete the 38 yard play.

The Broncs bolted to a 28-0 lead after the third quarter and withstood two late Douglas touchdowns for the win.

Belle Fourche quarterback Colby Nowowiejski threw for 248 yards and three touchdowns while Brextin Garza tallied a 6-yard TD run to cap the scoring. All three touchdown passes were to all-conference receiver Jackson Tyndall who was shut out of the end zone in the season opener against Vermillion. Tyndall began the day last Friday with the flu but played through it finishing with more than 100 yards receiving.

The game was slowed with 31 penalties for a combined 182 yards. At one point in the second half penalties were called on five straight plays. The Patriots had a costly holding call when a 52-yard touchdown run was called back in the third.

As they did in the season opener Belle Fourche showed its big play capabilities. In the first quarter Nowowiejski hit Kelby Olson on a 71-yard pass that set up the Broncs first score. Nowowiejski hit Tyndall on 4th and goal from the 5 to That ended the scoring as the Bronc defense stiffened to make the final 28-13.

"We have been stressing finishing games and they played their hearts out to accomplish that," said Coach Scott Slotten. "We need to improve upfront and eliminate the penalties. Penalties kill drives. But this is a fun hardworking group that will continue to improve every week. We'll be a dangerous team at the end of the season."

The Broncs are 1-1 on the season as their road trip continues. Next up for the Broncs is another Douglas. This one at Douglas, Wyoming. The Bearcats lost their opener to Wyoming Class 2A defending state champion Buffalo 29-26 last Friday night. Going into the season, Douglas was the state of Wyoming's 4th-ranked Class 3A team.

citizens. The council's Legal & Finance Committee (LFC) who initially took up the issue in late July, is made up of council members Randy Schmidt, Vern Hintz, Annie Reich, and Troy Shockey. They made their recommendation for change to the full city council in early August on the consent agenda. At that meeting, Council President Monte Talkington removed it from the consent agenda for open debate and the city council eventually tabled the motion and sent it back to the committee for more debate and community input.

On August 26th the LFC voted unanimously not to make any changes to their original recommendation and sent it back to the council last week.

After 30 minutes of vigorous but civil debate on September 3rd, it appeared the council would be split on the motion

Schmidt, James Ager, Travis Martin, Talkington, Annie Reich and Bob Somervold. Those opposed were Troy Shockey and Vern Hinz.

"I don't want to see it again," said Shockey who voted against the new motion and is in favor of expanding 5.19 much as some other area Black Hills communities have.

" I hope that all of us get to the Legal-Finance Committee what we'd like to see and they can hash it out and get it back so we can put this behind us," said Ager who voted in favor of sending it back to committee.

"I don't know about any of you but when I saw the names on my petition (for council) none of those signatures came from 30 minutes outside of the city," said Talkington.

"I think if we can work something out with regard to the department heads issue, we can get an agreement," said Councilman Trevor Martin who is in favor of having department heads live within the 3-mile limit. Martin believes there's room for negotiation within the framework of the requirement as it stands now. "You can always negotiate with an applicant that is interested in those department head positions that can provide enough flexibility to allow us to keep the requirement as it is." of \$15,800 this year after receiving a requested \$3,500 last year. Executive Direction Laura Bennett made a brief statement to the council pointing out that in 15 years the number of seniors in the community will double and that this demographic is not being fully served. She said she hopes to transition the center into more than just a play place or activity center and put more emphasis on offering services such as respite care. In addition she cited the need to move toward a paid director's position. "I'm okay with just being a volunteer but if something should happen to me we need to be able to encourage someone to take my place," she said. "Not everybody's going to do this voluntarily. After a motion by Hintz and a second by Shockey the council voted 8-0 to fund the Center at \$10,000. Also funded were Teen Court (100%) at \$7,600 (8-0 vote), Prairie Hills Transit (77%) at \$5,000 (7-1 vote), A.B.C. (60%) at \$3,000 (7-1 vote) and the Cowboy Band (86%) at \$2,500 (8-0 vote), among others. Total allocations from the general fund were \$113,900. Two groups were funded from the 3rd penny which had \$48,000 available. The Black Hills Roundup was granted \$25,000. The BF Country Club requested \$25,000 to go toward property taxes and insurance. They were allocated \$15,000 for a total allocation from the 211 fund of \$40,000.

BELLE FOURCHE - For Hollie Stalder, Belle Fourche **Development Corporation** Executive Director, she's seen it before but this year seems to be a bit more challenging.

The corporation's city allocation was cut by 46% last week due largely to an expected slowdown in sales tax collections within the city. The BFDC had requested \$75,000 in funding, as it had received in 2019, but was allocated \$40,000. In 2018 it received no city funding.

'We anticipated a cut but did not think it would be that much," Stalder said. "It does have an effect and will make our work more challenging."

Perhaps the most difficult part is that with the full funding last year the BFDC was able to put in place more aggressive marketing programs and give a boost to other ongoing efforts such as enhancements to the Industrial Rail Park, Empower Belle Fourche and Leadership Belle Fourche.

"It is a setback." Stalder said. "What you want to do is move forward and we may have to

mission is to bring business to the community, broaden the tax base and bring jobs in. Over the past few years the city has welcomed Pipeline Plastics, Permian Tanks and the BLM regional office. Also Runnings has built a new store, tripled its workforce and quadrupled its footprint in the community. Between the four entities are 100 jobs. Stalder says these are people who shop here, buy gas here, eat in area restaurants, and engage health care here. Many, if not most of them, live in Belle Fourche. She says the economic impact in property taxes alone is \$180,000 per year.

Other positives from this year include RPMinerals. They are working on a manufacturing facility near the city airport to supply a bentonite product for drilling applications. Although it is in the county it is expected to positively impact the city economically.

Currently the BFDC is working to bring a new owner/ tenant to the ShopKo location on the north side. There has been interest and they have shown the building more than

tread water for a year on some things. We have a lot of great things going and we will need to get more creative."

Last year the BFDC received 15% of its funding from Butte County, 20% from membership dues and 64% from the city. Other funding sources include a contingency fund that the BFDC can draw from if absolutely needed.

What I would like to see more of is ways we (the city) can work more closely together on every level," said Ward 3 Councilman Travis Martin. "We need to know what we can do to help (BFDC) get businesses back in to fix these sales tax revenue numbers going forward."

"I think it might be good to work out an agreement with the city that would let us know more in advance if these kinds of cuts were coming," Stalder said. "Ultimately you find out in September whether you're funded and it can feel a bit like the rug has been pulled out from under you."

Stalder says the BFDC's

once in recent weeks.

"There are a lot of great things happening here," Stalder said. "We just want to continue to benefit the community and provide good jobs and make sure good things can happen.

"I love working for Belle Fourche and with our board. They do so much in donating their time and expertise," she said.

The BFDC is working on a few critical projects in the Industrial Rail Park on the city's west side, including a rail siding at the loading dock. Stalder says they will need to "sit down and see what would be compromised the least."

The BFDC is currently in the second year of the Empower Belle Fourche project, a grass roots effort, led by citizens, to build ways to improve the city economically and from a quality of life standpoint. The project is in partnership with Dakota Resources. Stalder was certain it would move forward but any additional resources needed for the program would have to be looked at.






"I made it to state all four years," said Nelson. "Our team was regional champions my freshman and junior years, (and) our team placed 6th at state this past year.

Special guests yesterday were Woodrow Hafner of the Hafner Wool Company of Belle Fourche and Newell and Bob Meyer and Harold Shelden of the Farmers Ranchers Cooperative. Bob O'Donnell of the firm of Walt and Bob O'Donnell was also scheduled to take part in the program, but was unable to attend. Hafner reported to the group that 75 per cent of the 1969 wool clip has been sold. However, not all of it has been shipped. He said this is the result of military cloth orders. The cost of synthetics and the foreign wool market are key factors in the sale of domestic wools, Hafner explained. He said he felt the wool incentive payment program should be continued. Meyer said the firm had handled two million pounds of wool, half of that thru the Nation's Center Wool Pool which Meyer described as the nation's top wool pool on the basis of volume and quality. Today it has 130 members - 42in Montana, 33 in Wyoming and 45 in South Dakota.
