Ongoing Parade Route Debate

2021 4th of July parade route sparks discussion at City Council meeting before vote.

At the regular meeting of the Belle Fourche City Council, several promising community updates were given and public discussion was heard about the 2021 Black Hills Roundup Parade route before a vote was taken.

During the Mayor's Report, Mayor Gloria Landphere recognized September 25th, 2020, as Disabled Veterans Day in Belle Fourche in recognition of the 100 year anniversary of the DAV. There is a total of 9 DAV chapters in South Dakota.

Next, Landphere handed out multiple awards and certificates in recognition of City Employees years of service. The categories included one, five, ten, fifteen, and twenty five years. Recipients of the twenty five years of service awards were Public Works Directer Dirk Hoffman and BFACC Program Coordinator Tessa Anderson-Voyles.

In community reports, BFACC Director Nate Velander and Tri-State Museum and Visitor Center Director Kristi Thielen gave updates to the council.

Velander stated the new security cameras had been installed at the BFACC. He said, "That has been a blessing to feel more secure in our building."

The public was also encouraged to sign up in the coming weeks to help out with fall programs. In addition to the regular programs, new adult fitness classes are actively being added and a wider variety of concession items are now available.

Thielen was next to update the council on activities with the museum. Total visits for August tallied at 1,825 people from all 50 states. Although international travel has been down this year, Thielen did report visitors from France and well as the Virgin Islands. Numbers of visitors during the 80th Annual Sturgis Rally were much higher than previous years. Thielen said, "We've had

Canadian Cowboy Takes the Title in Inaugural Broncs in the Black Hills

BELLE FOURCHE - A good crowd was on hand for the first-ever Broncs in the Black Hills saddle bronc match ride on Saturday night as Kole Ashbacher took home the top prize. In all \$20,000 was paid out to the riders and another \$27,500 to the Calcutta winners.

Ashbacher, from Arrowwood, Alberta, rolled up 85 points on Powder River's NFR mare Rich N Fancy to eek out a narrow one point win.

"I just want to say thank you to all the folks out here in Belle Fourche who came out and supported this event," Ashbacher said. "Especially thanks to Powder River Rodeo and Clay (Crago) for having us out here. It's been a pretty slow year so these (events) are really appreciated." The Broncs in the Black Hills was the

The Broncs in the Black Hills was the brainchild of Powder River Rodeo's John Franzen and former Black Hills Roundup Chairman Clay Crago.

"John and I were visiting after they left the Roundup over the Fourth and he was just saying how everything's just about canceled," Crago said. "So we thought we'd give the cowboys a chance to win some money and Powder River a chance to have an event and bring some people to Belle Fourche at the same time."

Even though the event was born out of special circumstances during 2020 the hope is to make it an annual event at the Roundup Grounds. "I think for the first one it went good," Crago told the Beacon. "There are a few things we got to tweak on but right now we are tentatively scheduling one for next year."

Crago says a 2021 event would not be the same weekend as that would compete against the Pendleton Roundup next year. "To get the kind of caliber cowboys we had this year we kind of got to work around those PRCA rodeos next year."

The format for the evening featured 30 top bronc riders. Five world championships were represented in the field and the current number-one ranked rider in the country, Wyatt Casper was also on hand. The riders were grouped into six sections of five riders. The top performer in each section advanced to a final round where all six riders received a check, the winner taking home \$10,000. In all, \$20,000 was

more people for this Rally than any Rally in my memory."

The next item to be discussed by the Belle Fourche City Council was the approval of the 2021 City Budget. City Finance Officer Breanna Schaefer provided an overview of the budget to the council and a brief debate occurred about requests for funding.

With a largely split decision, Mayor Landphere stated, "You guys worked hard to work within the confines, and I wouldn't want to see extra requests coming during the year. We are to a point where we need to put the budget to rest for 2020."

The final notable discussion occurred over the 6th agenda item regarding approval of the Black Hills Roundup Committee's recommendation for the 4th of July Parade route.

Mayor Landphere offered Roundup Chairman Kieth Anderson to give the first update on what decision was made after a meeting with several downtown businesses on August 20th.

Anderson stated, "We did a little research, and looked into it, liability reasons, we're going to keep our original parade route." This parade route turns south at the Post Office and continues a second year of diverting away from the highway and not going down the entirety of State Street. This has raised concerns about loss of revenue from downtown businesses.

Anderson cited a document from Belle Fourche Area Engineer and DOT employee John Matthesen which agreed with the conclusion of the Black Hills Roundup Committee.

But directly after Anderson made his statements, local business owner Daphne Johnson offered information from a conversation with the Rapid City Regional Engineer and supervisor of Matthesen.

Johnson said, "He basically told me, and he's going to follow up with something in writing, that each route that the city wants for whatever closure is basically up to the local folks. Each potential parade route is a viable parade route."

Johnson also relayed from the conversation with the regional head of the DOT that proper

The meeting had been switched to Wednesday due to the grand jury meeting in the commission room on Tuesday. Lamphere had two spots open due to resignations in the sheriff's department and added a third on a grant the department had received. The new deputies are James Hahne, Michael DeBoer and Jason March. Hahne just started his job this week and got initiated at the Labor Day weekend activities in Newell. A profile article on March has already been in the pages of the Beacon and articles on the two new deputies are forthcoming. The sheriff also spoke to the commission about some physical changes in the department's offices in the basement of the courthouse, relating that he planned to move Deputy Tristan Clements to the main office along with a civil deputy and

leave the other four deputies in

the office near the outer door. "We want to finish off the back room to have an interview room there," he said. "I'll get some estimates on (what) to do and bring back to you. It will make the office more efficient." Lamphere also spoke about the Offender Watch Agreement which tracks those who have been convicted of sex offense crimes. HE said parents could get an app on their phone for \$10 per year that would allow them to identify offenders. Lamphere said the app would also identify offenders who traveled through the area. 



Pastor's Perspective "Lord God You Care About Me And Come to My Rescue"

"I patiently waited, LORD, for you to hear my prayer. You listened and pulled me from a lonely pit full of mud and mire. You let me stand on a rock with my feet firm." Psalm 40:1-2 [CEV]

I have to admit that this week's column is a hard one to write. The newspaper's due date is September 11th, and that carries a lot of baggage with it. According to the State's own website and the CDC, South Dakota (especially the Black Hills area) has graduated to "unchecked community spread" of the COVID-19 virus; and that carries a lot of baggage with it. I look are the racial inequalities of our country, and that carries a lot of baggage with it. I listen to the deep and painful political divides in our country, and that carries a lot of baggage with it. And I feel down. I feel sad for all the individuals who comprise this county, state, nation, and world. I say to myself, "Hey, Chuck. Have you ever felt this way before?" "Why, yes! Yes, I have." I remember reading for the first time the awful tragedies in the Scriptures when I was in college. Hunger so deep that good people resorted to cannibalismdespair so profound that children were sacrificed. I was horrified and actually hurt within. What to do? I remember Psalm 102, where indeed, the people



have but ashes to eat, and unrest is all around. I hear and can feel the pain of the speaker, yet it does not end there...God is present. All may not be well at the moment, but with God it will be in the end.

I remember Psalm 98, "Sing a new song to the LORD! [The Lord] has worked miracles." And I begin to hope again.

I remembered the appeal in Psalm 40. The speaker's life is "in a pit full of mud and mire." So is ours, Lord. Yet, the speaker reaches back to all his/her own memories, and the memories of past generations— God is yet faithful. God does not abandon us. God will walk through the 9-11s, the sicknesses, the hatreds, and the discords of society. The psalmist ends with the declarative, "I am poor and needy, but, LORD God, you care about me, and you come to my rescue." As I write this, it is a dark, overcast, and rainy day in Belle Fourche. news@bellefourchebeacon.com The Lady Broncs traveled to Spearfish on Tuesday evening to take on the Lady Spartans on an unseasonably cool evening at Black Hills Power Sports

Complex. The Broncs still battling injuries to key players had a hard time getting anything going against the Spearfish squad. Spartan freshman Brooke Peotter had a hat trick in the first half and teammate Hanna Bjorkman had two scores at the Spartans sprinted out to a 8-0 halftime advantage.

Spearfish added four goals in the second half to put the game on ice and won the contest 12-0 by the mercy rule at the 20 minute mark. The Broncs only had three shots on goal for the evening and goalkeeper Reese

McKenna had 15 stops in the box for Belle Fourche.

The Spartans go to 6-3 on the season while Belle falls to 0-9.

The Lady Broncs were looking for their first win of the season as they took on the St Thomas More Lady Cavaliers on Saturday afternoon at the Roundup Soccer Complex in Belle Fourche. More got their first win of the year a week ago against the Broncs in Rapid City.

St Thomas More bolted out to a 3-0 lead in the first 20 minutes of the game. However, Lady Bronc sophomore forward Tori Brill was able to find the back of the net at the 1844 mark and Belle cut the lead to 3-1. A few minutes later Brill had another break away only the shot just missed to the left of the goal. More was able hit another goal

and went to the lockers with a 4-1 cushion.

With 5 minutes gone in the second half the Lady Cavalier extended their lead with another counter. Brill would then add another goal with a nice loft shot over the More keeper's head with 2653 left in the contest and it was 5-2. The Cavaliers scored a loft shot of their own about four minutes later to give them a 6-2 lead which would be the final margin of victory.

"I think we showed some signs of progress in today's game", said Broncs head coach Rob Creed. "Getting those two goals by Tori was a good morale booster. We are a young team." The Broncs will hit the road next week to take on the Lady Scoopers in Sturgis on Thursday and then tangle with Rapid City Stevens on Saturday.

Bronc Boys Soccer Drop Contests

The Belle Fourche Broncs hit the road Tuesday night to take on the Spearfish Spartans in Spearfish. The Spartans 8-0 on the season and top seeded in the AA ranks proved to be a tough assignment for the Broncs. The Spartans, who are loaded with upperclassmen came out with a 7-0 triumph over the Broncs.

The Broncs started the game short-handed as Junior forward Ethan Jensen landed on the 14 day quarantine list. He was replaced by eighth grader Eli Sechser who played well in his place. The Spartans hit a shot at the 36 minute mark

and led 1-0. Spearfish was then awarded a penalty kick and barely knocked it in on a nice diving try by Broncs goalkeeper Hunter Cherveny and it was 2-0. Spearfish added another goal at the 26 minute mark and they led 3-0. At about the midway point of the half, junior forward Charles Alberts found a seam and was heading toward the Spartans goal when the Spearfish Goalkeeper came out of the box and collided with Alberts on a very controversial no call. Alberts was forced to leave with a game ending concussion and the Broncs were now down two starters. The Broncs defense spearheaded by Tristin Hendricks, Conrad Schreier, Anthony Staley, and Braydon Carbajal buckled down and stifled the Spartans for the remainder of the half.

The Broncs were down a third starter as junior Goalkeeper Cherveny did not return for the second half nursing a leg problem. The Broncs were forced to send in eighth grader Landen Harwood, who played well in his first varsity action. Spearfish was just too much for the depleted Broncs and scored four more second half counters to put Belle away by the final score of 7-0.


The Broncs hosted the St Thomas More Cavaliers on Saturday at the Roundup Soccer Complex. More was looking for revenge as Belle had defeated them 7-4 a week earlier in Rapid City. The Broncs however started the contest down three starters with Alberts and Jensen still sidelined along with freshman Aiden Voyles.

The Broncs drew first blood at the 3100 mark as Tristin Hendricks fired a free kick on the far sideline where Josiah Trimble promptly headed the ball in the net and the Broncs had the early lead 1-0. Both teams battled hard with Belle and More getting several chances to score but not being able to capitalize. The Cavaliers were able to tickle the cords with a score with 520 left in the half to tie the contest heading to the sidelines.

The Broncs again lost Goalkeeper Cherveny to start the second half, and Harwood was again called in for relief. Cherveny had 8 saves in the first half and Harwood had four stops also, but More was able to mount three goals in the second half to win the contest 4-1. The Cavaliers outshot the Broncs 13-11. "I thought we played pretty well considering we were down 3 starters in the game", commented Broncs head coach Anthony Carbajal. "I thought our young eight graders stepped up and did well."

With the win More moves to 4-4-1 on the year and the Broncs drop to 5-5. The Cavaliers bounced up to the number 2 seed where Belle dropped to the fifth seed. The Broncs have a very big game against Sturgis in Sturgis on Thursday evening, and then travel to play Rapid City Stevens on Saturday.

BELLE FOURCHE - The Belle Fourche varsity football team could not stop a stout ground game from the Douglas (Wy) Bobcats as the Broncs fell 47 to 7 last Friday night at Lou Graslie Field. The outcome leaves the Broncs in search of their first win of the season as they host Hot Springs this Friday.

After picking up one first down on their opening drive Belle Fourche punted to the Bobcats who engineered an 11-play 69 yard drive, all on the ground, capped off by a Koby

Case quarterback sneak. Keltan Ewing did most of the damage with several key runs to sustain the drive. It was 7-0 Douglas after the first. The Bobcats rolled up 338 rushing yards.

The Broncs looked posed to even the score as they drove the ball deep into Douglas territory on their next possession. But the drive stalled on the 22 and they turned it over on downs. From there Douglas drove downfield powered by a 23-yard Ewing run. Case then found Gabe Saint with a 3-yard pass and it was 14-0. That completed a 7 play 70-yard drive.

After the Broncs went four and out Douglas was set up at midfield. Moving mostly on the ground the Bobcats would score 12 plays later. It was 21-nothing at the half, in favor of the visiting Bobcats.

Fireworks ensued in the second half as Bronc fans momentarily may have thought, 'here we go again.' The Bobcats took the opening half kickoff back for an apparent touchdown (much as the Douglas Patriots did last week) only this time an illegal block called it back, setting up Douglas on the Belle Fourche 35. A few plays later QB Koby Case sent five receivers out, and rolling to his right he found Nate Dowling on a 12 yard touchdown pass. It

But just like that the Broncs responded. On their first play from scrimmage of the half Bronc quarterback Anthony Budmayr sent a receiver in motion, faked it to the up back before handing it to Brextin Garza who found a huge opening on the left side of the line and raced 65 yards for the score. It was his longest TD run and it narrowed the gap to 28-7. Garza finished with 126 yards rushing.

Belle Fourche used that moment to seize on their newfound momentum, successfully executing an onside kick. But they could not advance the ball and ended up punting it away.

However on the punt, the Douglas receiver muffed the catch and Aiden Giffin recovered for Belle Fourche on the 19. But just when it seemed things were turning around the Brones fumbled the ball back to the Bobcats two plays later.

Douglas would score 3 plays later when Ewing took the pitch and found a seam down the far sideline, racing 36 yards for the score. The extra point was no good and it was 34-7 Douglas midway through the third.

The Bobcats added another score in the third quarter and one in the fourth to make the final 47-7. Belle Fourche is 0-3 as they host Hot Springs this Friday.

Physical Therapy and Fall Prevention

A physical therapist can also teach you how to make easy changes around the house that can reduce your risk of falling. Some easy examples would include:

Using night lights to help your vision at night

Removing throw rugs, extension cords, or clutter that you could trip over

Installing grab bars near the toilet or bathtub

A PT can also work together with other professionals like your eye doctor if your vision is increasing your fall risk or with your doctor or pharmacist to review your medications to see if they could be making you feel dizzy, weak, or sleepy.

Falling is common in people over the age of 65, but that doesn't make it a normal part of the aging process. If you have fallen, your chance of falling again is doubled, but by working with your physical therapist and the rest of your healthcare team, you can reduce your fall risk and maintain your independence.







124 years ago Sept 19, 1896 Northwest Times An Illegal Body Decision Rendered in Regard to the Kansas

City Live Stock Exchange Topeka, Kan. Sept.11 – JudgeT. F. Garver of the Kansas court of appeal handed down an opinion yesterday in which he holds that the Kansas City Live Stock exhange is an illegal body and that each member committed a misdemeanor in joining the association. The firm of Greer, Mills, & Co., of Kansas City, Kan., belonged to the association and was convicted of accepting lower commissions than were recognized under the rules of the exchange. A fine of \$1,000 was imposed which the firm refused to pay and brought suit to prevent suspension. The case was tried in the Wyandotte county district court on an application for injunction and the decision was against Greer, Mills & Co. This decision is now affirmed by the court of appeals. The court holds that the association was organized in violation of the law, one of the results being to prevent competition among those engaged in the live stock commission business and to enable members to maintain uniform minimem prices for their services, expressly prohibited by chaper 259 of the laws of 1859. protocol was not adhered to when members of the BHR requested a statement from Matthesen and decisions should be referred to the regional office.

Another concern voiced by Johnson was that since approximately \$30,000 worth of funds are given to the BHR from the 3rd Penny Sales Tax (also known as the Bed and Booze tax), this should require the council to take other businesses into consideration when making their decision to approve the parade route.

"Because this third penny revenue, are funds of the people, I advocate that the council and the mayor have a fiduciary duty to make sure when these funds are spent in a way that benefits the community," Johnson said. "It should not be to the detriment to other parts of the community, and other parts of the

city. The parade route should go through State Street. I think to do otherwise would be, like I said, not to the benefit of all of the citizens."

After hearing from Johnson and others present, Anderson stated he would adhere to the recommendation of the route as it was given. "That's not true that the Roundup is trying to punish downtown businesses," he said. "At the end of the day, it is public safety.'

A brief discussion between the Mayor, Johnson, and several present that evening brushed topics like traditional parade routes, insurances clauses, and other concerns regarding the route change.

Councilman Vern Hintz joined the discussion stating, "What I see here is, I think, the city has a function to approve or disapprove as you [the Mayor] said. the highway department came via Lori Johnston, the Highway Administrative Assistant. County Superintendent Dwayne Heidrich was on his way with his Foreman Tony Smith to pick a new truck the department had purchased.

The department received preliminary engineering grants for the Gaber bridge and Old Highway 212 bridge. They will continue to pursue funding for the two bridges. She also said that the repairs on the Hoover/ Zeona bridge were wrapped up and that the department would be starting on the Twilight bridge next.

"Wood also said he would move his fence," said Johnston, referring to a previous meeting and the struggle to end things on a positive note on the Habeck Road.

Commissioner Karroll Herman brought up concerns about the Snoma Road bridge that has been blocked with concrete

to structural damage under the concrete culverts. The base has washed away and was deemed unsafe by engineers.

"(The) people owning the feedlot are wanting the county to do something for them," said Herman. "I was wondering if we could get a 404 permit, so that if something does happen to the bridge we can put a temporary low-water crossing in." Right now the bridge is limited to 12T on single axel, and 20T for double axel. Herman said there are truckers wanting to use the bridge to transport silage to the feedlot. However, a single axle truck, loaded, would run around 15T and a semi, loaded would be around 30T. The bridge would not handle loads of those types.

"That bridge is so needed due to all the traffic and the feedlot." A 404 permit is a low water crossing permit. Commission Chair Stan Harms asked of legal counsel, "Can we declare an emergency situation

But there's one more important, and brand-new, reason to love Barbados. You can now get a 12-month visa to work there remotely.

"Even as the pandemic continues to rage, the government of Barbados, a country in the eastern Caribbean, is sending a very different message: Come here, not just for a holiday, but for up to a year. Bring your laptop," said the Washington Post.'

Prime Minister Mia Amor Mottley introduced the 12-month Barbados Welcome Stamp "to allow visitors the option to work remotely from Barbados for a year at a time," according to Barbados Government Information Service. The program is designed to attract remote workers earning more than \$50,000 a year in an effort to boost the country's tourist-dependent economy.

The program has, unsurprisingly, sparked global interest. A tropical island is, after all, SLIGHTLY more inviting than your hastily-thrown-together home office, even to those who know little about Barbados.



September 15, 1910

There are quite a few on the sick list in the Dry Creek vicinity. No doubt from drinking water which has been standing in the creek nearly all summer.

The following shipments of stock were made last Saturday, the owners on nearly every case accompanying their shipment to Omaha: Lee Brooks 7 cars of cattle; W.H. Southerland 9 cars of sheep; T.J. Phillips 5 cars of cattle; George Mendehke 6 cars of cattle; Andrew Harman 3 cars of cattle; Otto Anderson 5 cars; E.A. Longpre 2 cars; Chas Milberg 4 cars and William Youngberg 2 cars. On Tuesday J. Ducharme shipped 6 cars cattle; H.C. Wilson 2 cars and George Maass 2 cars.

September 23, 1920

Surviving are 2 children; John Bohl, Calif and Florence Bohl, Deadwood in addition to sisters Pauline Staiger and Martha Brown of Sturgis, Mrs. M. A. Doody Newell and 3 brothers, Herman Schipke, Chadron, Neb, Henry Schipke Rapid city and August of Newell and 2 half brothers Wm and Paul Schmele of Newell. Burial will be in Mt. Moriah Cemetery beside the grave of her husband. She was a member of the Black Hills Pioneer Society.

Rambouillet range rams consigned held Tuesday and Wednesday sold at an average of \$170.98 in pens varying from 5 to 15 animals. Top lot of 5 range rams sold for \$225 and the lowest \$135 on a pen of 15. Warren attended the sale with Warren Johnson of Spearfish who purchased the top Columbia stud ram, a yearling for \$225. Highest selling stud ram was a Rambouillet yearling at \$500, consigned by Rodney F. Port of Sundance.

When Fred Winkler, popular Superintendent of the Belle Fourche Irrigation District, left the district office yesterday, he stepped lighter than he has for many years. He had completed 30 years of service for the United States Reclamation Service and became eligible for retirement. He will not actually retire until this time next year. Winkler began his work for the Bureau on the local project in 1920 on a cement mixer as a wheel borrow operator in Fruitdale. He then followed a series of jobs in successful advancement, from hauling cement to ditchrider, to water master until

1948, when he became Superintendent. Most fun he ever had he recalls was hauling gravel and each morning took his pick of about 30 head of horses with which to do the work.

September 22, 1960

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
