## City Council Passes \$18M 2020 Budget

BELLE FOURCHE - Upon second reading on Monday, Sept 16th, the Belle Fourche city council unanimously approved an \$18.1 million city budget for 2020. The budget figure represents a modest .006 % increase over the 2019 budget. At the same time, August saw the highest sales tax revenue figures in the city in at least the last five years.

"Our city department heads really did a wonderful job in holding the line and there was a lot of team work this year," said Mayor Gloria Landphere. "And I felt that the council had very good conversations and got right into making the decisions they needed to in order to get things done."

By law, the budget must be approved after the second reading prior to September 30th. A 20-day waiting period is now in effect before the budget becomes a city ordinance.

The budget includes an increase of \$165,250 for capital improvements for a total of \$3,076,000 in the CIP fund. The two largest line items in the CIP are \$1.24 million for 17 street projects and \$587,500 for the Belle Fourche Area Community Center (BFACC).

The BFACC plans to use those funds for new weight room equipment (\$50k), HVAC replacement (\$300k) sidewalk and concrete repairs around the building (\$2.5k), a new emergency backup generator (\$85k), cold storage for the theater (\$60k) and establishment of a reserve fund of \$90,000.

"I felt it important that we establish a reserve fund each year that accumulates to eventually pay for big projects that we may need in the future," Landphere said. She added that a reserve fund has also been established for the Roundup grounds beginning with \$45,000 this year.

"The mayor's intention here was to start setting aside funds so that we had cash on hand when something came up," Schaefer said. "For example, last year we had a boiler blow (at the BFACC), and we were scrambling to come up with \$20,000. This way we can actively work on things like lobby and kitchen improvements, but still have emergency fund money if needed."

Other large allocations include \$1.8 million in the capital project budget to replace the 40-year old Day Street lift station. The lift station serves 75% of the city, roughly from Custer Street to the south edge of town. The new pump will have three times the capacity of the old one, lifting wastewater from the lower elevation of Day Street up to the wastewater treatment plant lagoons on the city's far north side.

Among other budget highlights are a \$60k increase

## Contractor to Pay \$180k Penalty on 8th Avenue Project

BELLE FOURCHE - Liquidated damages of \$180,000 have been set for the 8th Avenue Sewer Project that went well past its intended completion date. The money will be paid by the prime contractor on the project to the City of Belle Fourche.

Wet weather and an exceptionally cold February are seen as primary reasons for the delay in completing the project.

According to the contract between the two entities the prime contractor on the project, Heavy Constructors of Rapid City, is required to pay a penalty of \$900 per working day past the original completion date. According to Chris Robinson of HDR Engineering, the firm overseeing the construction, it was determined that the project was 200 days overdue.

"We've informed them (Heavy Constructors) and haven't heard them come back and say no, or try to negotiate that. So as far as we know, yes they'll agree to that," Robinson said. "That (penalty) will be included in the final payout, once they sign that and it goes through council that will formalize that piece of it."

The completion date had been set as October 15, 2018. According to Robinson the project was determined to substantially complete earlier in the summer so the clock has stopped running. However there are a few smaller items on a punch list that need to be completed.

The City is holding back the final payment on the project to make sure the liquidated damages are accounted for.

HDR Engineering was required to remain on site past the Oct.

15th date to continue their duties of supervising and testing the work. Much of the \$180,000 penalty will be used to cover HDR's additional costs.

"We had additional costs for travel time each day and each day that we had to be on site monitoring the work, extra testing for the additional concrete work that had to be done and construction observation time," Robinson said. He estimates that HDR's additional costs for the 200 extra days will be around \$175,000, about \$5,000 under the amount of the penalty.

One of his trips in the twin engine was flying Slug, Poppy, Darlynn, Charlee, and Jane to Tennessee where Slug and Charlee did a wild boar hunt while everyone else went to Dollywood and Gatlinburg

Lawrence was very mechanically inclined and could engineer and build just about anything you could imagine. In high school he loved tinkering on cars and hot rodding them around. He may have had a time or two that his driving habits in these hopped up cars produced some pretty good stories. It wasn't just cars that Lawrence was handy at. He was pretty good with electrical work too and did a lot of the

rewiring in the buildings in Boyes. He also took great pride in building his own log house on the ranch. This was a project he started in 1982 and was not finished and move in ready until 1991 doing most of the work himself. Another accomplishment he was proud of was serving the community of Belle Creek by being on the Belle Creek School Board for several years. 




Devin Nowowiejski (15th), Cole Hockenbary (19th), and Isaac McKenney (26th) helped the Broncs to a third-place finish as a team.

BELLE FOURCHE – If Belle Fourche Head Coach Scott Slotten was looking for some positive signs, he found plenty after Friday night's 27-24 homecoming win over the Custer Wildcats at Lou Graslie field. Going back to last season his teams seemed to struggle through the fourth quarter.

Not last week. In fact, after a slow start, they looked strongest in the final 15 minutes on a soggy night plagued by a 2-hour lightning delay.

The Wildcats opened the scoring on their first drive after senior running back Micaiah Grace scored on a short run. The 2-point try was good, 8-0 Custer.

The Broncs came back and on 4th and goal from the 15, quarterback Colby Nowowiejski scrambled down to the two yard line before he was stopped. It remained 8-0 Custer after one quarter.

Belle Fourche's Jackson Tyndall then intercepted Custer quarterback Dathon Elmore but the Broncs could not take advantage, punting the ball away.

Custer put together it's second touchdown drive of the half moving 77 yards in only 4 plays as Grace scored on a 38-yard run, it was 16-0 Custer.

On the ensuing kickoff
Tydall set the Broncs up with
a 27-yard return into Wildcat
territory at the 48. On the very
next play, the big-play Broncs
struck like the lightning on the
distant southwest horizon. Kelby Olson took it 48 yards for
the score and ran in the 2-point
conversion to make it 16-8.
Olson had his best game of the

season with 221 rushing yards and a touchdown.

After Custer went four and out the Broncs took over on their own 47 with 5:22 left in the half. Belle Fourche stayed on the ground with Olson powering a 10-play drive, capped off with Brextin Garza 10-yard run up the middle to pay dirt. The 2-point try was no good and the half ended with Custer leading 16-14.

After nearly a 2-hour weather delay the second half finally began. Custer tried an onside kick which was recovered by Belle Fourche near mid-field. The Broncs then put together a workmanlike drive with short runs until it was 4th and 14. That's when Nowowiejski found Tyndall on a 26-yard connection to give the Broncs the lead - the longest pass play of the night. The 2-point try was no good and it was 20-16 Broncs after three.

Now the fourth quarter and the Broncs were looking to finish strong on homecoming night. But after a nice Belle Fourche punt, Custer's Dathon Elmore nearly broke the Broncs string of games without a kickoff or punt return. Elmore took the kick at his own 15 and navigated his way 80 yards to the Belle Fourche 5-yard before he was stopped. From there, Elmore, who is also the Wildcat quarterback, took it up the middle and with a 2-point conversion gave Custer a 24-20 lead with 10 minutes left.

But this time the Broncs did not run out of gas in the closing minutes. Far from it. They put together their best drive of the game. A highlight of the drive came when Nowowiejski bobbled the snap from a shotgun formation, picked it up, and breaking several tackles, turned a sure loss into a nine-yard gain. Two plays later Brextin Garza took it in from 44 yards out, his longest run of the night. The kick was good and the Broncs led 27-24 with 5 minutes left. Garza had 7 carries for 71 yards and two touchdowns.

"I challenged the offensive line this week and they really stepped up in a big way," said Scott Slotten, Belle Fourche Head Coach. "Led by Logan Goeders. I thought he had a huge game."

Custer had one last shot and after a nice kick return set them up at midfield Elmore broke off a 23-yard run and the Wildcats were in Bronc territory. But two plays later Elmore would throw his third interception of the night as Belle Fourche's Lan Fuhrer stepped in front of the ball and returned it 12 yards to the 44. In all the Wildcats tallied 4 turnovers but none as costly as that one.

The Broncs took over with 3 minutes left. And converting two third down situations, including a Kelby Olson 27-yard run, the Broncs kept the drive alive and ran out the clock at the Custer 15-yard line.

"I think the team really showed how resilient they are," Slotten said. "They really played their butts off with all the distractions we had. It was a great game from our captains."

Belle Fourche racked up
371 yards total offense to 276
for Custer. Most of that was
on the ground with 328 yards
total rushing. The Broncs had
no turnovers and had just 4
penalties for 40 yards. Nowowiejski was 3 for 10 passing with

The Broncs pick up a conference win, the final 27-24, and even their season record at 2-and-2. Next up for Belle Fourche is a road trip to Pine Ridge next Friday before returning home October 4th for a key matchup with fifth-ranked St. Thomas More

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

in funding for the Tri-State Museum and Visitor's Center. According to Schaefer this will go toward personel, additional advertising and added promotion since the museum is taking over the Frisbee golf course and plans to host regional tourna-

As for public safety and health and welfare, the budget includes small increases for the city police department, dispatch, building inspection, code enforcement and ambulance. There is also a \$100 per month increase in the city council member's pay. According to Council President Monte Talkington it has been 20 years

since council members have seen an increase. He says it is important to keep an eye on this if the community hopes to attract citizens to serve as council members in the future.

On the revenue side the city will bring in slightly fewer tax dollars but will see increased revenue from licenses and permits, the community center and from the city's four enterprise funds; the city liquor store, water, sewer and landfill services. Revenue from the landfill is projected up \$133,000 and revenue from the city liquor store should increase by more than \$120,000.

In other revenue news the city saw what Schaefer termed "exceptionally good" sales tax

numbers in August. A total of \$399,501.88 was brought in to go along with \$30,487.40 in third-penny revenue. The figures were the highest monthly totals in at least the last five years and the first time third-penny hit the \$30k revenue mark since before 2014.

"Unfortunately we really don't get the information from the state that we would need to be able to say exactly why these numbers were so good," Schaefer said. "We do know that the 100th year of the Roundup, ShopKo's going out of business sale and revenue from online sales tax were most likely factors."

The figures for August were 24% higher than last August

and put the city on pace to exceed last year's sales tax revenue by 6%.

"These are wonderful numbers," Schaefer said. "You'd really like to take them and run with them but you have to take a more conservative long-term approach before you can establish any real trends as to why it's happening.'

"There is a Golf Channel, the NFL Network, a baseball network, a tennis channel, and so on. Now rodeo has its own channel(s). 

Meeting with the commissioners was Steve Clooten who has proposed the site and has met numerous times with the commissioners during their monthly meetings. Clooten has a small tire-shredding business in Belle Fourche, but currently takes that shredded material to Bison. He is proposing that Butte County get into the business; thus the meeting at the proposed site. This site is also a county-owned location for disposal and storage of materials that have been removed from county projects, such as collapsed culverts and scrap metal and wood. It is also the location where the county was responsible for burying

livestock that died in the Atlas Storm of 2013. It is also a location take Keith Franke has been leasing to run his sheep. Clooten is obviously anxious to get the project going, but commissioners are still waiting for answers.

"We've been waiting for you to bring us a proposal," said Commissioner Karrol Herman. Up to this time it has been mostly Clooten sharing what could happen, and how the county could benefit.


However, there are costs involved in getting the site up and running, should the county decide this is in the best interest of the residents in Butte County. And the landscape as a whole. According to Clooten, he has the state on board and has been working with a state official at the Department of Natural Resources. Scientist for the state, was in attendance but did not comment. Also in attendance was Brett Foshiem, of Butte Electric, to discuss bringing power to the site; just one of the costs. According to Foshiem, it would run anywhere from \$20,000 to \$30,000, depending on which way they came from current three-phase power.

Along with Foshiem, Clooten had brought along Paul Elias of Hauck Electric, who will be doing some of the work at the site once power is brought in. The proposed area is in a swale below a bluff where the dead livestock was buried. It would be 400' x 400' and at least 15' deep, but could go as deep as 30', according to Clooten. There would be a pad area where at least one 16' dump trailer of tires would be brought daily for shredding and disposal in the mono-fill.

said Clooten, "This could last as long as 40 years." However, to prepare the area it would take approximately \$25,000 of dirt work, where a berm would be placed between the pit and the dry creek running on the northeast side of the area.

"It would be about \$4,000 to \$5,000 for the county each month," said Clooten. He is to meet with the commis-

sion again on Tuesday, September 24, and offered to set up a conference call with the DNR official. Elias said he wasn't sure he could have a detailed report ready for the commission at that time, based on costs of the work his company would be doing.

"It's not going to happen Tuesday," said Herman. "We need a lot of questions answered."

## Then and Now in Newell

"Looking Forward to our Past" by Linda Velder

from the Newell Museum

Sept. 30, 1909 With this issue of The Irrigator it starts on its 3rd year. The publishers wish to thank their many friends and patrons for their help and liberal patronage. They have tried to give the people of Vale and vicinity a paper that they could feel proud of and if and ever increasing business proved, anything we have done it. The Irrigator has and always been for Vale, first, last and the time and is yet.

The First Annual Belle Fourche Valley Fair held in Vale this week was a success from start to finish. Although only 2 weeks was given the committee to make all arrangements, advertise the fair and get the exhibits lined out, nothing was left undone and the crowds were as large as could be expected.

Sept. 26, 1919 Capt Seth Bullock, pioneer, a personal friend of the late Theodore Roosevelt and prominent figure in the history of the Black Hills, passed away at his home in Deadwood Tuesday morning as the result of intestinal trouble with which he has been a sufferer for years past. Bullock came to the Black Hills in 1876, locating in Deadwood, he was appointed sheriff of Lawrence County soon after its organization and in that capacity he did much in the way of straightening out some of the crookedest camps in the Hills within his

Sept. 26, 1929

Those from Newell and vicinity who attended the elegant ball at the Black Hills Sugar Plant Thursday evening of last week declare it to have been one of the most enjoyable social events of the season. The ball was given in the huge warehouse which was beautifully decorated with flowers and colored lights. In the decorative scheme, attention was called to every point on the project, a huge star for Vale, a water tank for Newell, a hub for Nisland, bee hives for Fruitdale and a cowboy for Belle Fourche being premantley displayed in an artistic manner.

The stealing of bees and honey has caused much alarm among local bee keepers. Bees and stocks of honey were stolen this week from D.E. Jones, John Egger, William Manses and James Lodge. The thief is said to be very clever. He has left no marks, according to the people who lost bees.

Sept. 28, 1939 Comes now porcupine eggs. Two women tourists halted at a filling station here and carefully unrolled from wrapping tissue several spiked oval objects

bought in a Black Hills town.

"Porcupine eggs" one volunteered proudly "and only \$1 a piece", the other added. The 'eggs" were cockle burr pods. The women said they had been told they would "hatch" in a few weeks.

The lease of the building, which Mr. Moutka has been redecorating is effective Oct 1, he revealed Jolley plans to put in a complete Variety Store, same to be operated by a daughter-inlaw and son-in-law Mr. & Mrs. Michael Holmes, who recently moved to this area from Texas.

Sept. 24, 1959

"Gator Day" has been selected as the permanent theme or title for NHS homecoming, according to action taken by the Student Council on suggestions submitted by the student body. Homecoming plans for next Friday are already well underway, pep rally Thursday evening 7:30 in study hall, traditional burning of the "N" and snake dance through the streets of town. Larry Johnson Student Council President and Tom Pickard President of Student Safety Council issued jointly a statement for safety on the streets to watch for students and traffic.





123 years ago **Belle Fourche Times** Sept. 26, 1896 Belle Fourche Early Saddler Wells Saddler




