Commission **Discusses Five Year Bridge Plan**

Medical Marijuana Debated

news@bellefourchebeacon.com **BELLE FOURCHE-The** Five-Year Highway and Bridge Improvement Plan for Butte County was explained to the **Butte County Commissioners** at the regular monthly meeting held Tuesday. Several bridges in eastern Butte County are slated for construction and preliminary engineering in 2023 through 2027. Grants received in 2021 or 2022 are anticipated to begin construction in 2023-2025 according to the plan developed by Brosz Engineering. Some of the projects include gravel surfacing and chip seal on county wide roads. Local funds include matching BIG (Bridge Improvement Grant) money, Federal funding, and state funding.

Commissioner Karrol Herman pointed out that the county

Early Absentee Voting Numbers Strong

BELLE FOURCHE - Early absentee voting numbers are strong leading up to the Nov. 8 general election.

County Auditor Annie Capp says her office has received 145 ballots, or requests for ballots, as of a week ago Monday. Absentee voting in Butte County opened on Sept. 23.

Capp gave her report to the city council last week as she reminded them of voter education and voter registration timelines.

"I just want to remind everyone that voter registration will end of Oct. 24," Capp said.

There will be a voter education night on Tues. Oct. 25 at Newell High School's auditorium The event, sponsored by the Whatever It Takes (WIT) Coalition will begin at 6pm.

Along with local, state and national candidates on the ballot Capp distributed information to the council on two additional ballot questions: Constitutional Amendment D and Initiated Measure 27.

Measure D is an initiated amendment to the SD Con-

stitution expanding Medicaid eligibility. This constitutional amendment expands Medicaid eligibility in SD. It requires the State to provide Medicaid benefits to any person over age 18 and under 65 whose income is at or below 133% of the federal poverty level, plus 5% of the federal poverty level for the applicable family size, as provided in federal law. For people who qualify under this amendment, the State may not impose burdens or restrictions that are greater than those imposed on any other person eligible for Medicaid benefits under South Dakota law.

The law, if approved, would take effect July 1, 2023. Initiated Measure 27 would legalize recreational marijuana use in the state. According to



the State Attorney General's office this initiated measure legalizes the possession, use, and distribution of marijuana and marijuana paraphernalia by people age 21 and older.

Individuals may possess one ounce or less of marijuana and may also distribute one ounce or less of marijuana without payment or other consideration.

Marijuana plants, and the marijuana produced from those plants, may be possessed under specific conditions. Marijuana plants may only be grown, and the marijuana from those plants may only be possessed, in counties or cities where no licensed retail marijuana store is available or where allowed by county or city ordinances.

Certain violations of the restrictions the measure places on the possession, use, and distribution of marijuana and marijuana paraphernalia are subject to various civil penalties. Individuals under the age of 21 can attend drug education or counseling instead of paying a civil penalty.

Holiday Pay and City Director Residency Requirements Again

The Belle Fourche City Council once again is reviewing its policy on residency requirements for city department heads. Policy 5.19 was moved from the consent agenda to the regular agenda after a request from council member Derrick Erhart. It was then sent back to the city's Legal and Finance subcommittee for further discussion after council member Randy Sowers moved that it be reviewed to discuss exemptions to department head residency requirements. The motion was seconded by council member Larry Schmaltz. The remainder of changes to Policy 5 were approved in the same motion.

In general, City Manual Policy 5 deals with recruitment and selection of city employees. In 2020, subsection 5.19 came under scrutiny as some council members at the time felt that changes to the policy that require city department heads to live within the city limits or an area that is not more than three miles outside the city limits be relaxed. Proposals at that time allowed department heads to live in Butte County within a 30-minute response time of their job post. The matter passed the council but was rescinded later and sent back to committee where the amendment failed and the policy remained unchanged.

The present-day proposed changes would require the City Manager and "appointed" department heads, instead of "all department heads" to live in the city or within three miles.

"I just think we ought to be able to make exceptions to that rule where we need to," Erhart said.

Jason LaFayette, City Finance

Officer, reminded the council that there was a difference between city manager positions and city department heads and the policy change reflected that distinction. Appointed city positions are paid by salary while other department heads are paid hourly.

"I'm all for residency requirements," said council member Larry Schmaltz. "But in a small town like Belle Fourche there's not a lot of fish in the pond and there may come a time when we just can't fill a position with the right person, in Belle Fourche, and we'd like to have the ability to have an exception to that rule."

Further changes to 5.19 spell out that full-time employees in a health and safety position may have specific residency requirements that are more restrictive in terms of response time. Regular full-time employees of the city are currently required to be able to meet a 25-minute response time when called to duty.

"I think it's important to remember that these changes aren't really reflecting anything new but they simply update the things that the city has already been doing," said council member Rebecca Larson, chair of the Legal and Finance Committee.

Larson reminded the council that department heads that were not appointed, have not had to live within the three-mile rule and historically, they were being approved by council.

There was a policy in place but there was a difference in the way things were done," she said. "(This update) still keeps the appointed department heads here and doesn't require

Broncs Face Tough Outing at Sturgis

BELLE FOURCHE – After a promising start the Belle Fourche Broncs found the going rough in the second quarter as they fell to the Sturgis Scoopers last Friday at Woodle Field in Sturgis.

The Broncs scored first and looked to be on their way to establishing themselves for yet another road.

But injuries sidelined the Broncs top two runningbacks and Sturgis responded with 34-straight points on their way to a 49 to 14 win.

After a Sturgis punt Belle Fourche took over on the Scooper 39. Kyren Nulle had 7 of his 12-yards rushing on the night in the next two plays. On ther Broncs third play of the game Thomas McCoy took the ball virtually untouched 34 yards for the score. It was 7-nothing Belle Fourche with 9:31 left in the first quarter.

Sturgis responded before the end of the quarter as Brown QB Owen Cass threw a bubble screen to Tyan Buus and Buss went 40-yards for the score. The extra point tied it up at 7-7.

But before the end of the first quarter the Bronc's top rusher Kyren Nulle left the field under his own power with a few minutes left in the first. When Sturgis got the ball back Thomas McCoy got pancaked on a block and had to be helped off the field. Neither would return to the game. It was still tied after one.

Sturgis set the tone for the devastating second quarter by scoring on four of their next five possession. They threatened more with less than 2-minutes to go before halftime, but Cass was picked off by Belle Fourche's Andrew Newlander. He took the ball from the end zone out to the 27-yard line where the Broncs ran out the first-half clock. It was 34-7 at the break.

In the third quarter the Broncs would score their second touchdown. Going to the air QB Nolan Wahlfeldt would convert a 3rd and 20 by completing a pass to JT Haney. On the next play Wahlfeldt connected with Lane Longbrake for 38 yards. Longbrake would have scored if not for a stumble at the 12. On the next play Wahlfeldt found a wide-open Evan Vissia for a 12-yard scoring strike. With the extra point it was 34-14.

But Sturgis got the equalizer capping an 80-yard drive with a short two-yard run. The two-point conversion made it 42-14 after three quarters. The Scoopers added a fourth quarter score to make the final 49-14.

The Broncs are now 3-4 on the season. They close their regular season with two home games beginning this Friday as they host Sioux Falls Christian with a 6pm kickoff at Lou Graslie field. The 4-and-3 Chargers saw their four-game win streak ended last week as they fell 20-18 at home to Beresford.



Fitzgerald was selected by the South Dakota State's Attorneys Association members as its 2012 Prosecutor of the Year. Between 2016-2020 Fitzgerald was elected Vice President and then President of the SD State's Attorneys Association by his fellow State's Attorneys. Fitzgerald currently is the Chairman of the South Dakota State's Attorneys Association Board of Directors.

Fitzgerald understands from his practice of law the issues that face the Court system, like illicit drugs, crime, the increasing costs of the criminal justice system to the taxpayers and the importance of the institution of the family.

Fitzgerald is concerned about the practice of law in our State. Fitzgerald believes the ability of the ordinary citizen to access the Court system is of great importance.

An outdated method of licensing lawyers in our State and other factors are negatively impacting the ability of the average citizen, especially those in the rural areas, to access the Court system. As a result the pool of court appointed attorneys available to represent persons accused of crimes has shrunk and the burden to the taxpayers in our State who pay for our justice system has increased.

South Dakota ranks 46th out of 50 states in per capita of lawyers. Some counties in the Fourth Judicial Circuit have no lawyers living in that county. Decreasing the supply of lawyers has increased the cost of hiring a lawyer, and impacts those who need lawyers the most. Some people don't like lawyers, or judges but they are essential to upholding our Constitution, freedoms, property,

and our inalienable rights. Fitzgerald has resided in rural Saint Onge with his wife Mary for the past 25 years. They have three children and six grandchildren.



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

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



If I hold it for a day, you'll have to call an am-


the longer I hold it, the heavier it becomes."

Badlands Circuit Finals This Weekend Features Area Athletes

Minot, N.D. - The toughest, most talented men and women in the Badlands rodeo world will be in Minot this weekend. And they'll be competing at the Badlands Circuit Finals Rodeo, to prove who's the best of the best.

The circuit finals, the crown jewel of pro rodeo for the Dakotas, takes place Oct. 14-16 in Minot at the N.D. State Fair Center. And the top twelve in each of eight events stampedes into town, in hopes of winning the Badlands gold buckle.

For barrel racer Jessica Routier, circuit finals is old hat. This marks the seventeenth time the Buffalo, S.D. cowgirl has qualified for a circuit finals (including four times in the Great Lakes Circuit). She'll be aboard the phenomenal mare Fiery Miss West, "Missy," an elevenyear-old palomino who has four times been voted the Women's Pro Rodeo Association Barrel Horse of the Year.

At the eighteen Badlands rodeos Routier rode Missy at this year, she won money at sixteen of them, which speaks to the horse's consistency. "She just likes her job," Routier said.

In the saddle bronc riding, the leader, Cole Elshere, suffered a broken leg in July at Cheyenne (Wyo.) Frontier Days, and sat out till August. But the Faith, S.D. man had won enough money to hold on to the number one spot, till he returned. "I had a really great Fourth of July run, so I took a pretty good lead."

This is Elshere's thirteenth circuit finals qualification; he loves coming to Minot.

"We have a great time there," he said. "Everybody brings their families and we hang out for three days. At the hotel, we spend a lot of time at the pool. The kids play together, and we enjoy a few days off."

He also loves the caliber of bucking horses the Badlands Circuit offers.

"The Badlands horses are just phenomenal. We have such a great selection of horses to pick

from. That makes it fun, too. We get to get on great horses for three performances in a row."

For bull rider Jestyn Woodward, Custer, S.D., it will be his first trip to circuit finals. The eighteen-year-old's pro rodeo career didn't start easily. After he made a qualified ride at his very first pro rodeo, he bucked off at the next dozen rodeos. By early July, his confidence was back and he began riding

The son of Jacey Woodward, the 1994 Badlands Circuit bull riding champion and a 2022 graduate of Custer (S.D.) High School, he will continue his pro rodeo career this fall, forgoing college.

In the steer wrestling, a special horse has gotten Nebraska cowboy Reed Kraeger to the top of the standings.

Kraeger, of Waco, Neb., didn't think he would ride his horse, Tyco, after the sixteenyear-old gelding came down with pleuropneumonia in July of 2021.

Other first place leaders heading into this year's circuit finals include bareback rider Ty Breuer, Mandan, N.D.; tiedown roper Clint Kindred, Oral, S.D.; team ropers Clay Ullery, Valleyview, Alb. (heading) and Matt Zancanella, Aurora, S.D. (heeling); and breakaway roper Brandy Schaack, Chadron, Neb.

The Badlands Circuit Finals takes place in Minot at the N.D. State Fair Center. Performances begin at 7 pm on Oct. 14-15 and at 1 pm on Oct. 16.

Tickets are \$20 for adult general admission and \$10 for kids ages 3-12. Gold buckle seats, the five rows closest to the arena floor, are \$30 for all ages.

Commission from A1 wheel tax was helpful in getting grant funding for the bridge improvements. Commission Chair Kim Richards added that it has led to successful repair of man bridges.

A question was asked by Travis Ismay concerning Gammon Bridge near Vale. He was told by the commissioners that Sheriff Fred Lamphere was planning to put up concrete barriers to prevent trespass on the unsafe bridge. There is a Federal program for bridge removal that will be pursued further.

The attorney for Center of the Nation Cannabis Cultivation and Manufacturing was available to clarify the questions asked by commission members at the last commission meeting. Matt Kinney explained the plan for water to be used by the cultivation facility. The original plan for the growing facility had been downsized, he said, to aid

the people of Butte County in the amount of water that would be used. There were also economic reasons because of the availability of supplies.

He acknowledged that his

group had been informed this summer that there would not be enough water supply for them to drill a well so plans were changed to put in a 3800 gal. cistern within the fenced





"We will not use any other sources unless it is approved," he said. "All water will be trucked in at this time." Kinney added that they estimate the marijuana plants will use 350 gal. of water per day. "We use less water than a standard home," he said.

Commissioner James Ager asked Kinney if the changes concerning the water source had been sent to the State. He had researched the Administrative Rules to check on the procedure changes. Kinney said that as far as he understood, even if the plans were not in the original application as long as the State was notified it would be all

"It is a State regulated industry," he pointed out.

Center of the Nation Cannabis cultivation facility was approved by the county commissioners in November 2021, State approved in May 2022 and according to the original Ordinance dated November 25, 2021 "the County will issue a permit to operate."

The former ordinance approved in November 2021 reads as follows:

3. Permit Application Procedures. c. n. A permit application to operate as a medical cannabis establishment requires: Once a successful applicant obtains a valid state issued license under the provisions of SDCL 34-20G-55 and ADSC 44:90:03:01, and has paid the balance of the application fee, the County will issue a permit to operate.



Council member Erhart suggested allowing employees to choose eight holidays and a further two "floating" holidays, that they could choose later as they saw fit. He says that would still give employees 10 paid holidays a year. That met with opposition from council member Larson.

"It's already hard enough to get employees," she said. "Trying to get a workforce right now is very difficult. And I think cutting a benefit to the current employees that they are used to having, would be very negative to morale. We already have a great group of employees and I don't want to take that away."

Only regular full-time hourly city employees qualify for the current holiday pay rate. The Police Department, liquor store, landfill and rec center employees are among the most often needed to work holidays.

Council member Randy Sowers cited budget figures that would indicate that paid holidays cost the city about \$100,000 and adding another

hourly ones to have that residency requirement. It's not changing the general practices that have been in place the last few years, it's just putting into writing what it is."

Positions that would fall under the residency requirements would include the city attorney, city finance officer, police chief, public works director, city administrator and city engineer. Department heads that would be exempt would include positions such as human resources director, city liquor store manager, code enforcement officer, museum director, building inspector, and library director. According to Mayor Randy Schmidt those positions are characterized by a manager who has their own budget but have no managers or directors under their supervision.

A discussion was also held on Policy 9.26 dealing with the addition of another city employee holiday and holiday pay. The current city policy provides regular full-time hourly employees with 2.5 times their hourly rate if they work a recognized federal holiday.

Council members Schmaltz and Erhart informed the council that after researching area businesses the 2.5 time pay rate for working a holiday was too high and should be revised to be more in line with what they were seeing.

"I called five different com-

panies that I've worked with over the years and every one of them was absolutely astounded when I said two-and-a-half times the hourly rate," Schmaltz said. "No one in any of those industries said they would ever approve something like that."

Also at the meeting council member Randy Sowers remarked that he was pleased with the current culture in city government that allowed Assistant Finance Officer Jason LaFayette to be promoted to the position of new City Finance Officer last month. The council also approved the hiring of Krystal Cazer as accounts receivable clerk for the city finance office.

Local Civic Groups Protest Curtailment of Air Mail Service Four civic groups of Belle Fourche have entered protests to postal authorities at Washington, D.C. and to U.S. Senator Chan Gurney on the present curtailment of air mail service, from the Black Hills airport to the Rapid City airport. The groups sending in protests have been Belle Fourche Chamber of Commerce, American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, and Belle Fourche Lions club. A number of weeks ago, the mail carrying plane, which has been operated by the Western Air lines, between the Black Hills airport and the Rapid City airport, met with an accident. Since that time, dispatching and receiving of air mail from the Black Hills airport by special carrier has been canceled, and at present air mail dispatching and receiving from Belle Fourche and other northern Black Hills post offices have been by regular star mail carrier, to the Rapid City airport. It was pointed out by the protesting groups that the curtailment, which the operating air line states is due to inability to get needed repair parts, has no official authority from postal authorities, and that it has been put into effect by the operating air line company for reason as stated above.

At the Drag Races In a country steeped in western tradition, where talk of things like stirrups, cinches, bit and bridles is standard, it's a far cry to conversations involving "headers" or "cubes" or "dumps," but the transition is taking place rapidly at the Black Hills Dragway west of Belle Fourche which has just completed its second weekend of drag racing. In simple terms, a drag race is an acceleration contest between two cars racing from a standing start over a straight line, on a precisely measured quarter mile course. That's simple enough, but because of the big differences in cars they have to be classified and there are over 100 classifications. Cars in the same class race each other. These class winners, or elapsed time qualifiers, then progress into final runoffs which determine overall winners. It all sounds complicated, but somehow the crowd understands what's going on and has a good time. Some 3000 people were on hand for Sunday's event.

Quite a few times of late, when I order a Hamburger I am asked if I want cheese on it. Worse are the times when they don't ask and just put it on. Or maybe worse than that when I tell them, "No cheese". And they still put it on. I like Cheese. Just not on my burger. So when did a hamburger become a cheeseburger? The sign says Hamburger. But the picture shows a cheeseburger. Just a little thing, but it

Oh yeah, and the good guys all played guitars and sang a lot. While on horses, sometimes! I play the guitar. I ride horses. Never could make either work very well at the same time. I guess they must have been top

hands. And had really well trained horses! And rodeo is another word that has changed. Maybe evolved is a better way to put it. In it's origination, it meant to gather cattle and hold them in an area to be worked. Whether branded or mass butchering or what ever was needed doing by the season. Then it evolved to mean when working hands got together to test their skills against each other. Dad told of on the Fourth of July when they got together to celebrate, they always had a bronc riding and baseball. Now it can mean a gathering of people (not usually working hands) who try and ride and rope the best. Some events are timed to determine the winner and others are judged by at least two people, as to who rode better. Both rider and animal are judged

and scored. It can also mean an event involving motorcycles. Danged if I know what that involves as I have never been to one and have no plans of every going. Not sure how they decided to call it a rodeo, other than marketing. "Yeah, if we call it rodeo maybe we can get these country hicks to show up and buy tickets to watch it!"There has also evolved what they call a "ranch" rodeo. Purportedly the events mimic what real cowboys do on ranches, day to day. Now, I have lived on a ranch all my life. I have been accused of being a cowboy, but the day to day ones would probably laugh at that. But I do know and participate in activities on a ranch. Most of which involve some form of work to benefit cattle. And in all my life, if I had ever went about working cattle as they do in most events at a ranch rodeo, I would have had my butt chewed out or been fired, depending on the rancher who's cattle were being worked on. But I have seen some of that change. It seems on some ranches, getting the cattle worked efficiently, quietly and trying to do it as humanly as possible, is not the main goal. It is our human way I think. Problem is, animals ain't got watches.

There is an old expression in the livestock business, "slow is fast". And it's true. But most don't realize what it really means is "smooth is fast". And when your doing it smooth, there are no hiccups and bumps. It is efficient and probably boring to most who would be watching. And probably most of the time, in this area at least and with most of the people I get to work around, they are really good to remember that. But in a ranch rodeo, or a regular rodeo, when you measure the winner by who can accomplish the task the fastest, it kind of sets it up to not be that way. And if it isn't fast or exciting, who wants to pay money to watch that? So the names take on a new meaning. If you wear a hat and boots, or even shoes, these days, your called a cowboy. No matter what you do for a living. Don't get me started on "cowboy poetry"! Ain't many cowboys performing it! And so many of those who write it are nice, well meaning folks. But let me tell you, most don't have a clue.

And of course, all this is just my opinion. You sure don't have to agree. I guess I am just to literate as my bride tells me I am. And old and cranky. Heck, call things what you want. before the show, during intermission, and after.



McCoy, who has taught for nearly 30 years in Spearfish said they worked on the design with the scroll work and the 4-H clover emblem to create something of aesthetic beauty that would be long-lasting.

Wich said there are other options during other times of the year such as Poisoned Oats and Fumitoxin and they are licensed to applicate in South Dakota, North Dakota, Montana, Wyoming and Nebraska, so do some traveling as well as provide service locally. We are trying to market directly to the community through direct involvement in the community in place of traditional advertising.

"This season we are going to donate a portion of every bag sold of Prairie Dog or Gopher Bait to the local volunteer fire department of the person who buys it," said Wich. "We have joined the Nisland/Arpan department and auxiliary because we feel it's important to be involved."

Wich said pasture grazing capacity can be cut in half or more with an active prairie dog colony and that towns can double or triple in one year.

The couple said they feel they can offer great products and services at affordable prices so hope that people who have need of their services will reach out to their website or Facebook page.

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
