Kissack Wraps up best PRCA Season Yet

As PRCA tie-down roper Dane Kissack reflects on it, he finally had the year he wanted.

The local rodeo cowboy settled in around the kitchen table at his parent's place alongside Spearfish Creek south of Belle Fourche for a chat with the Beacon on a cool misty morning with a warm cup of coffee nearby. Wife Kelli sat across, tapping on her laptop, listening in while keeping up on things in her job as a certified Legacy Guide and freelance writer in the Western industry.

It had been quite a year for the couple as Dane's PRCA career reached heights. When asked for his thoughts on the season, Kissack, with his energetic and engaging style, took a deep breath and looked out the window before responding.

"You know, before we were done with rodeo I just wanted to know at least once what it would feel like if I concentrated on nothing else other than the NFR and seeing how much I could win in a season," he said. "And now I know. We gave it 110 percent. And I'm glad I did."

Kissack finished 31st in the PRCA World Standings with \$51,316 in earnings. The top 15 qualify for the National Finals Rodeo in Las Vegas. He would have needed an additional \$35,000 to reach the 15th slot held by Cooper Martin of Kansas. As it was, Kissack was the highest finishing South Dakota cowboy in an event where 80% of the top circuit's money is won by competitors living in the southern states.

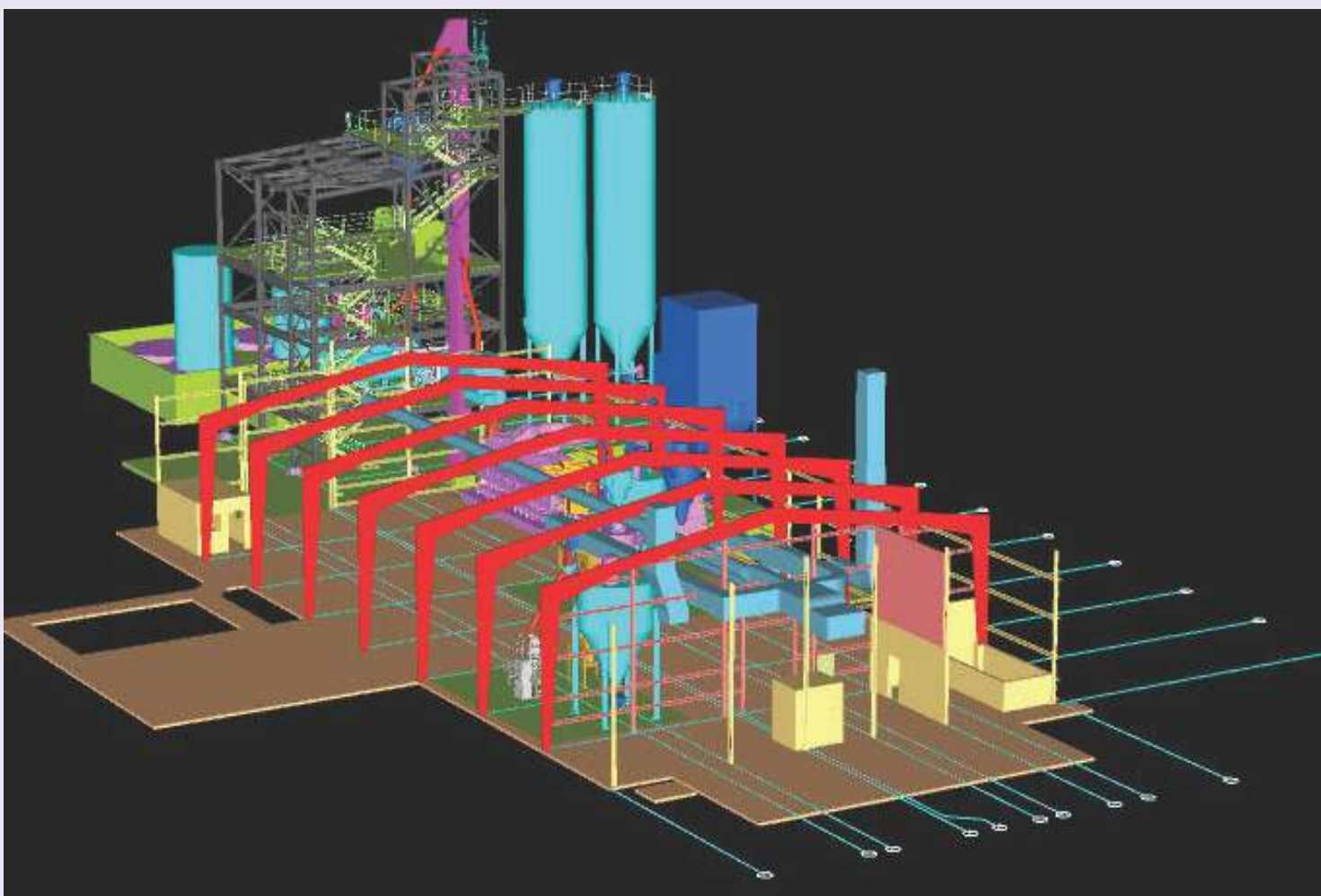
"Roping events are a little like golf," he said. "If you want to be successful on the PGA tour you need to move to Florida where you can play year around. If you want to be the best in roping you need to live where there's warm air and sunshine, and no snow, year around."

That's a road that Kissack took right out of Gillette College. He moved to Spring Town, Texas, for the winter months from November through March, working on ranches and training horses.

Egyptian Company Breaks Ground on Plant Addition

IDIC Specialty Drilling Chemicals Belle Fourche Plant

BELLE FOURCHE: IDIC Specialty Drilling Chemicals broke ground on the 40' x 40' addition to the steel structure three miles north of Belle Fourche adjacent the airport.

The Alexandria, Egypt based company under the supervision

of Dr. Ahmed Rasheed, the company's Managing Director, is on hand to oversee the start of the construction. Completion is targeted for June of this coming year.

Albright Construction, Belle Fourche was hired as the

concrete contractor and began excavation for the foundation of the addition on the south side of the existing structure. They will also pour a concrete slab on the west side of the new addition for the location of two product silos.

IDIC purchased the property this past year and EZ Fabrication and Welding of Belle Fourche is undertaking the task of overall project manage-

ment. They will construct the new steel building as well as fabrication and installation of the equipment in the processing facility.

EZ Fabrication has been involved the construction of Bentonite related production facilities for several decades.

The IDIC Specialty Drilling Facility will process drilling products to be used in the oil and gas industries world wide.

Stereos 'N Stuff Continues On Under New Ownership

Oz Hespe and Keynen Merrell are both celebrating birthdays this month. But the two have a lot more in common than that. After nearly 36 years as the face of Stereos 'N Stuff, a RadioShack dealer, Oz is heading out the door and turning over the keys to Keynen. The two Belle Fourche natives share the same vision for the future of Stereos 'N Stuff with Keynen now looking to join forces with AT&T after Oz and Verizon parted company this past June. Along with AT&T comes DIRECTV®. And Brinks Home Security is being added to the Stereos 'N Stuff lineup along with smart home technology. The familiar RadioShack product



line is being continued as well. Five years ago, Oz attended a special school in Texas to learn cellphone repair with associate Randi Schuh now the resident expert on most brands.

As Oz explains, "RadioShack is still a functioning company. After first filing for bankruptcy five years ago and being purchased by General Wireless, RadioShack had to again file for bankruptcy three years ago but this time it was the company-owned stores that were closed, leaving the dealer-owned stores to decide whether or not to remain open." Fortunate for Belle Fourche, Oz wanted to remain a viable asset in the community. Personal service has always been a hallmark of dealer-owned RadioShacks with Oz noting that his customer base spreads as far as eastern Montana, southwestern North

Dakota and eastern Wyoming as well as the loyal following right here in Belle Fourche.

For his part, Keynen is more than capable of taking on ownership, having worked periodically for Oz since he was in high school. His expertise includes computer repair and, in search of better weather, he had been spending the winter months in California doing low voltage integration systems in high rise buildings for Jason Fuller, owner of TPS Technologies. This work included camera systems, audio and video, networking and access control, to name a few.

The original Stereos 'N Stuff opened in 1983 and was a partnership between Oz and Sandi Hespe and Randy and Sherry Drolc, the couples even standing up for each other at their respective weddings. The store back then was located on 5th Avenue across from Tri-State Museum. The Hespes purchased the Drolcs' share of the business four years later and, in 2008, relocated to Stereos 'N Stuff's current location in a new building further south on 5th Avenue.

And Oz hasn't exactly walked out the door of Stereos 'N Stuff forever. While he and Sandi are looking forward to some different adventures and are happy to help a young person get a start in the business, Oz will still be popping in and out while the transition takes place.

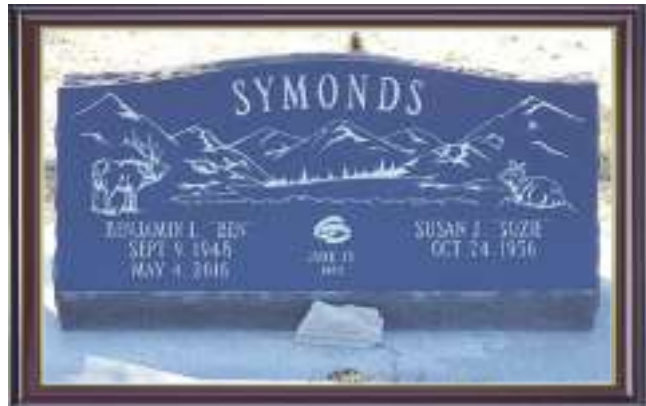

The Beauty of Obedience

Christians will often say that they really want to know God and be used by God. And that is an exciting place to be as a Christian and that is a noble aspiration! But, unfortunately, sometimes there seems to be little evidence that they are genuinely pursuing that goal. Their lives look very similar to those who do not claim the name of Christ. In other words, their lives don't line up with their claim.

In John 14:21 Jesus said this, "Whoever has my commandments and keeps them, he it is who loves me. And he who loves me will be loved by my Father, and I will love him

and manifest myself to him."

We often wonder how we can know God better and please Him more. The answer to that question is abundantly clear from this verse. As Christians we honor God and grow in our relationship with Christ when we spend time with Him and then have enough love for Him to simply obey Him.

Broncs Battle Cavaliers in BH Conference Tilt

BELLE FOURCHE - In a battle for the Black Hills Conference outright lead the Belle Fourche Broncos took on the St. Thomas More Cavaliers in a battle of teams that were unbeaten in conference play. In a game that was closer than the final score would indicate the Cavs came away with the win 31-7.

On the game's opening possession the Bronc's drove the ball 60 yards to the STM 20 yard line. After a Brextin Garza gain of one on the ground, Belle Fourche quarterback Colby Nowowiejski took three straight shots at end zone with each pass falling incomplete.

STM sputtered on their next possession and the Broncos took over once again at their own 20-yard line and drove all the way to the Cavalier 9 yard line only to be thwarted again.

After More recovered a Bronc fumble they drove 48 yards for the game's first score and with a blocked extra point it was 6-0 STM after one.

In the second quarter the Cavs turned another Bronc turnover into points on a 47-yard TD pass and with the added 2-point conversion it was 14-nothing STM.

Often times in the game the Broncos were ever so close to executed another big play. With 2 minutes left in the half, an almost sure touchdown pass was dropped that could have cut the STM lead in half, but it stayed 14-0 at the break.

More drove their opening half possession in for a score with Ryan Wojcik doing most of the work. He finished with 289 yards rushing and a pair of scores.

On the ensuing kickoff Belle Fourche's Kelby Olson returned the kick 90 yards for an apparent score only to have the play called by due to an illegal block. Even so, Nowowiejski drove his team to the four yard line powered by his 38 yard scramble. On 4th and goal he

hit Jackson Tyndall who was stopped inches from the goal line.

STM added another 3rd quarter score and it was 28-nothing.

With about 9 minutes left, the Broncos struck like lightning as Nowowiejski hit Keaton Benson on a 56-yard strike, leaving the More defensive players in his dust as Belle Fourche regained momentum.

Trailing 28-7 the Broncos executed an onside kick and recov-

ered the ball on the STM 47-yard line. The officials indicated a first-down for the Broncos only to have the call reversed a minute later and given back to STM. The apparent ruling was the ball was touched by the Broncos before it had travelled 10-yards but the replay did not beat that out. The ball was then spotted at the STM 49 yard line, only to have it re-spotted at the Belle Fourche 49 yard line just prior to the snap. There was no flag on the play and no further explanation was available. In all there were 26 penalties called during the game for 180 yards.

The Cav's would add a late field goal to make the final 31-7. For the Broncos Nowowiejski was 7-for-20 passing for 179 yards and a touchdown. Benson, who had his best game of the year, had 98 yards receiving and five tackles with 4 assists. Kelby Olson had 14 rushing attempts for 86 yards. Olson led the defense with 8 tackles and 1 assist. The Broncos totaled 297 yards offense and are 3-3 for the season.

Next up for Belle Fourche a short road trip to Northern Hills rival Spearfish on Friday night.



Notice of Destruction of Special Education Records

DATE: October 2019

Attention Parents/Guardians, Former Students, Eligible (Adult) Students:
Special Education records which have been collected by the Belle Fourche School District related to the identification, evaluation, educational placement or the provision of Special Education in the District, must be maintained under state and federal law for a period of five (5) years after Special Education Services have been ended for the student. Special Education services end when the student no longer is eligible for services, graduates, completes his or her educational program on June 30th of the year after he/she turn age 21, or moves from the District.

This notification is to inform parents/guardians and former students of the Belle Fourche School District's intent to destroy the Special Education records of students who received Special Education services during the 2013-2014 school years. These records will be destroyed in accordance with state laws unless the parent/guardian or eligible (adult) student notifies the School District otherwise. After five (5) years, the records are no longer useful to the District, but they may be useful to the parent/guardian or former student in applying for Social Security benefits, rehabilitation services, college entrance, etc. The parent/guardian or eligible (adult) student may request a copy of

HEREFORD, SD- South Dakota saddle bronc rider J.J. Elshere, who qualified for the 2019 NFR, broke the tibia and fibula in his right leg while competing at the Corn Palace Challenge in Mitchell Sept. 27. Elshere had surgery to repair the injury in Rapid City the following day and says he expects to the ready for the NFR. Elshere suffered the injury following his 84.5-point ride on Korkow Rodeo's Broken Angel. "I ran my leg into the panel while riding and caught it on an upright, I guess, and just bent it back," said Elshere, 39. "It was

right after the whistle blew." Elshere placed third at the Corn Palace Challenge and earned \$2,680. That money helped him finish 15th in the Sept. 30 unofficial world standings. Elshere was \$1,025 in front of 16th-place Isaac Diaz in the standings. "I was told by the doctor that I should be good to go in eight weeks," Elshere said. "I'm going to try everything I can to get her healed up as quick as I can. I have never had an issue with my right leg before this. I'm planning on getting healthy and competing at the NFR."

Newell Improves Over Last Home Game

NEWELL – The Irrigators took on a tough Hill City Ranger team for their homecoming match on Friday, September 27, and came away with tough loss. But the hometown fans saw a definite improvement over Newell’s last home performance against Timber Lake on Septem-

ber 13. Play started in the first quarter with a touchdown by Alejandro Meza of the Rangers with 8:16 left on the clock. He would be the Irrigator’s nemesis for the entire game as he bulldozed his way through the line again and again. Newell had to punt the ball away on their first possession,

but once Hill City had the ball, Chase VanDerBoom was able to intercept a pass to give things pack to Newell. A nice pass play to Huttson Weeldryer set up a TD run by Nate Randolph for Newell’s first mark on the scoreboard. With the two-point conversion play a fail, the score stood 7-6, Rangers.

Once again Meza came through for Hill City with an 80-yard kickoff return that took just seconds off the clock. A kick by Alexis Mireles set the score at 14-6 with 4:27 still left in the first period of play.

Newell had an incomplete pass and a sack setting them up for another punt. This time Benjamin Mireles ran it in for the Rangers, with another kick to bring the score to 23-6. The Irrigators next possession ended in a turnover on downs just after the quarter break.

The Rangers fumbled the ball on their next possession, giving

Newell the chance to move the ball. A personal foul and a fumble turned the ball back to Hill City. They struggled with penalties, giving Newell the same opportunity to move the ball downfield. They could not gain yardage and turned it over on downs, following an incomplete pass to Weeldryer.

Several changes in possession saw the Rangers with the ball at the half-time break, with no further scoring.

Newell kicked it shallow after the break setting the Rangers at the Newell 43. A fumble several plays later saw the Irrigators recover. Along with several penalties on Hill City and a completed pass to Weeldryer, set up a touchdown run on a QBK by John Jackson. VanDerBoom took the ball in for the conversion to bring Newell within nine points, 23-14.

A quarterback keeper by Hill City just before the quarter and

a good conversion play pushed the Ranger lead to 29-14. Punts by both teams with not enough yardage gained set Hill City up for another TD run by Meza. A completed pass to Groven gave the Rangers a 37-14 lead. That ended up being the final, as Hill City took a knee on the final two plays.

“The guys are starting to mesh well, and starting to show good improvement,” said Coach Tyrel Bonnet. “We struggled getting the momentum in our favor, and to keep it there when it did. A lot of silly mistakes, that cost of valuable yards, and too many turnovers, were some keys to the game.”

Winkler Bridge Project Started

BELLE FOURCHE – In a shorter meeting on October 1, the county commissioners were notified by County Highway Superintendent Dwayne Heidrich, that his crew had started on the demolition portion of the Winkler Bridge project. This new bridge will replace an old one that had been condemned and unused for several years. It will provide a detour route for those who have utilized the bridge on Orman Road over Horse Creek. “We got the first deck off and part of the second,” said Heidrich.

Chairman Kim Richards questioned Heidrich about whether there would be supports at the mid-way part of the bridge, but Heidrich said there would not. “That’s like a 65-foot span,” said Richards. He and Commissioner Stan Harms were obviously concerned about the span but Harms said, “As long as we’re convinced that it’s gonna work, we’re good.”

Heidrich said he wasn’t sure when the spans (three four-foot sections of 70’ long concrete) would show up. “As soon as I know more, I’ll let you know, but middle of October is the plan.” Heidrich said they hope to have the project, which the county crew is doing a good chunk of construction on, wrapped up by mid-November. “When it all comes down, we’re going to save about half on this project,” said Richards. In other areas, Heidrich said

his crew, which is down by two blade operators who quit to find other positions, is very, very busy. “We’ve only received one application so far,” said Heidrich. He has his crew spread out, with a couple still working on mowing, a couple more blading roads and pulling ditches, and he and his foreman, Tony Smith doing the work on the Winkler site. He said their weed and pest employee, Sandy Hammil, finished up with the DOT contract, which will bring in \$22,290.80 to the county.

Heidrich also said they had wrapped up the Erk Road culverts, and were working with a landowner on Snoma Road on an approach. The crew had also worked on the Wilson Cemetery Road and the commissioners discussed that next topic on the agenda. An agreement had been sent to Western Construction to review and sign which would define duties of the county and the company pertaining to the Cemetery Road, which was in bad shape, due to heavy haul trucks with loads of gravel.

The county’s state’s attorney’s office sent an email via Lori Johnston of the Highway Department to the commissioners outlining concerns with the agreement. The agreement would require Western Construction to blade and repair identified areas of the road, apply and maintain a mag treatment to certain area for dust control, blade and maintain

the road in a safe and suitable condition, whenever Western Construction moves more than 4,000 tons of material in a 30-day period, and restore the road to a previously established condition after the lease with Oaks Sand and Gravel Pit was terminated.

However, Butte County Deputy State’s Attorney LeEllen McCartney, had some issues with the proposed agreement, including the county agreeing to repairs of drainage structures, repair or replacement of culverts, and agreeing to repair the road in certain areas, maintain signage, and mow the road’s shoulders.

“These items are not normally a part of the County’s Haul Road agreements and, while there are no legal issues with agreeing to the tasks, it should be noted that the County would obligate itself to complete the tasks should the county sign the agreement. She also noted that the 5,000 tons of material in any 30day period are different than the standard template. She noted ambiguous requirements and felt than changes needed to be made to the proposed agreement, citing that tonnage requirements are problematic.

“It’s a matter of when it gets bad, they need to fix it,” said Richards. “We want them to be responsible for the damage they do.”

“In the meantime (while the agreement is waiting to be final-

ized) they’re driving the heck out of that road,” said Commissioner James Ager.

Richards said he felt the commission should wait until the next meeting on October 15, to finalize the agreement to give the state’s attorney’s office the chance to tweak it.

The commission approved the receipt of BIG funds for both the bridge on Orman Road and the one on old Highway 85, which were designated to be used to pay preliminary engineering.

“That way we can give Jason (with Brosz Engineering) the go-ahead with those projects,” said Richards.

A bump in hours was given to Registrar of Deeds employee Julie Brunner, raising her time to 40 hours per week.

“Is Paula’s (Walker-ROD) office the only one that doesn’t have a full-time employee besides themselves?” questions Commissioner Karrol Herman.

A discussion was held and then a voice vote was taken with Ager voting nay.

Herman reported on the recent fairboard meeting and said Spurs Bar and Grill was interested in holding a beer garden at the county fair on Thursday and Friday nights and after the sale during the concert.

“I told her (Katrina Wetz, Spurs owner) she would have to go through the commissioners,” said Herman.

Then and Now *in Newell*

Oct. 14, 1909

The children of Mr. & Mrs. W. F. Long who are “batching” on the Rosander Flats, while attending Vale School enjoyed a pleasant visit from their parents over Sunday with supplies. Narcisse Nancelle, one of the most prominent old half-breed stockmen of the west river country, was found dead on the road north of the Cheyenne River October 2 morning. He had evidently been killed by being thrown from his wagon when it went into a rut.

Oct. 16, 1919

The time will not be changed until Sunday October 26th at 2:00 PM when you are expected to arise from your downy couch and set the clock back 1 hour (ahead 11 hours if you prefer). Personally we figure on pulling said stunt the night before.

Carl A. Anderson closed a deal for the 200 acre tract adjoining him on the south this week. The tract belonged to Rev. J. Arthur Edwards who received \$5000 for the consideration. Only a part of the land is under irrigation.

Oct. 10, 1929

The Davis-Fink threshing rig compelled to stop work last Thursday on account of the rain, but was able to start up again Sunday. If the nice weather lasts they will complete the threshing in the neighborhood by the last of the week and bring the machinery home.

Mrs. M. Fugate of Harding, SD arrived at Hoover recently and plans to teach the Storm School if she can find favorable boarding conditions. This school

has been without a teacher so far this term. Mrs. Fugate was brought here by her daughter and husband, Mr. & Mrs. Ted Cooper.

Oct. 12, 1939

Reconstruction work on the Vale school gymnasium under the WPA project recently approved by the President and state WPA officials, started at that place Wednesday of this week, according to information received here. Between 10 and 15 men are employed on the project, which is expected to last about 60 days. Specifications call for raising the ceiling 4 feet, which will necessitate rebuilding of the trusses in the gym roof. The amount of the project is listed as \$1,914, of which \$493 will be born by sponsors for material.

European War demands are already keeping American horse traders up nights. The Army mule and cavalry horse have come into their own again despite a lot of talk about mechanized armies and the US Army may once more become the source of supply for France and Brittan and other nations, just as it was during early days of the World War. While foreign buyers are scouring farms and ranches of the west for war horses and pack mules, there are at least 2 elements working against them; there are only half as many horses to choose from as in 1914-1919 and the American Human Society hopes to shut off the supply by including animals in the list of supplies that may not be supplied to belligerents. Aged

horses and mules are retired to green pastures after their service days are over.

Two truckloads of sheep belonging to Wm. Marty of Strool got mired in the gumbo mud north of Hoover last week and had to be unloaded and trailed to a Hoover ranch.

Oct. 6, 1949

Funeral Service for Rev Father Agatho Donnelly CP, widely known Catholic Church pastor died of a heart attack at St. Leo’s, Kansas Sept. 22 were held at St. Francis Church St. Paul, Kansas last Tuesday. He had many friends and relatives in all parts of the US and had visited at Newell on a number of occasions after his folks moved here from Woodstock, Ill in 1917. Among local relatives surviving are his brother Edward Donnelly and family and Mrs. H. R. Wolcott and daughter Anne of Newell who all attended the solemn Requiem services in Kansas, retuning Sunday.

President Ward Van Horn, Buffalo of the Western SD Sheep Growers Association, announced today that the 12th Annual Convention of the association will be held at Belle Fourche Friday & Saturday Oct 21-22. Legislation pending before the National Congress is of the utmost importance to the sheep industry will be discussed by J. M. “Casey” Jones and J. Byron Wilson officials of National Wool Growers Association. The “Make It Yourself With Wool” contest will take place at the High School and the winners presented immediately after the banquet.

Oct. 8, 1959

Within the next few days, Newell residents may see Strategic Air Command eight jet B-52 heavy bombers flying low level practice bombing missions over routes within visual range of the local populace, 2nd Air Force officials and Barksdale AFB, LA announced today. Previously flown only by SAC’s B-47 Stratojets, this marks the first time that low-level practice missions will be flown by the larger, heavier B-52 Stratofortresses. Originally schooled to begin September 1 but was delayed for modification of plans.

Mrs. Sophia Falk received painful 2nd degree burns about her face, neck and left arm last Wednesday noon. Mrs. Falk was burned when the pressure cooker exploded while she was canning pears; spewing its contents over the kitchen. Her daughter Mrs. Wilbur Maki, rushed her to the Sturgis Hospital where she received medical attention.

Oct. 10, 1979

The classic play “Cheaper By the Dozen” has been chosen for the NHS fall production scheduled for December 1 & 2. The play calls for a large cast of 10, but there will be no problem filling the parts due to the amount of interest shown. Ms. Marjean Creal is the Director and hopes to see a lot of veteran actors and actresses turn out for the play and people to help on the production staff. The play books are in and those interested should stop by Ms. Creal’s room and check one out to become more familiar with the play. Virgil Simmons and Kenneth

Fenton, representing The Nisland Lions Club, have donated eye equipment to the Newell School. The money for the equipment was raised through various fund raisers.

Accepting the equipment were Elementary Principal Trula Fields and School Nurse Patricia Lee.

Wm Anderson, representing the Butte County Bar Association met recently with the Butte County commission to discuss the progress report on plans for providing additional space for the County law library. The board told Anderson a plan was drawn for an addition in the County Highway department building east of Belle Fourche. When the addition is completed the highway department will vacate its office in the basement of the courthouse for the law library.

The Rest of the story of Seth Bullock and Sugar Factory

21 Sept 1916 Great Western Company Buys The Bullock Ranch

It is pretty evident now that Belle Fourche will be the location of the branch refinery which will handle the sugar beets raised the irrigated districts of the Black Hills and which will be treated by the Great Western Sugar company

of Denver. While it was believed all along that the location of the branch refinery of the big concern would be located somewhere along the Belle Fourche river, close to the beet fields. Captain Seth Bullock, who left for Denver Monday night, while there closed the deal by which he has transferred his ranch to the Great Western company at the price of \$80 an acre, or an aggregate amount of \$92,000.

26 July 1917 Official Great Western Sugar Company Here Today

Today the Burlington train from Edgemont will bring the Denver & Salt Lake private car "Marcia" with it into Deadwood, bringing about 15 officials of the Great Western Sugar company here. While the car will be transferred to the Northwestern tracks and taken to Belle Fourche, there will be sufficient number of cars from Belle Fourche to take the party directly to that place upon

arrival. It is expected they will spend several days looking over the sugar beet situation in the Belle Fourche valley with a view of definitely deciding upon when to commence work on the proposed million dollar plant. The enthusiastic boosters of the valley town are hoping they will decide upon immediate action.

11 Dec 1926 Factory Site

The Utah-Idaho company has an option on the ranch, beet dumps and all equipment belonging to the Great Western Sugar company, and while no definite announcement has been made as to location, it is a foregone conclusion that the factory site will be on the sugar farm, a mile east of Belle Fourche, probably on the west side of Federal highway No. 212, facing the present beet dump. We understand the Utah-Idaho

es while competing in southern rodeos. But his focus had always been split between competing on the Badlands Circuit and competing for the NFR. For his 10th season as a professional cowboy he decided to solely focus on the World Standings.

"Finally I told Kelli let's forget the badlands for one season and just focus on the NFR. Give it all we got for one season and whatever happens, happens, and we can live with that," he said.

And, for the first time 2 years, Kissack went into the 2019 rodeo season with fresh legs, having finally overcome a pair of injuries, a torn ACL and a herniated disc in 2017, that thwarted his season and caused 2018 to be a recovery year.

"It really took about 18 months to get back to where I was," he said. "It's crazy what an injury can do your body."

His rehab included having to sleep in a recliner for five months as it was too painful to lay flat. During that recovery he was constantly reminded of how much teamwork it takes for a timed event cowboy to maintain his career.

"I can't say it enough, how important it is for you to have a strong team," he said. "Kelli was helping me with stretching and getting my body back in shape. Once you do get back on the road, we had family members on both sides jump in and help with the driving. And having great sponsors is important. Except for one I've had the same sponsors stay with me and I can't thank them enough."

During the 2019 Dane was able to maintain a more consistent level of success than ever before, highlighted by winning a major rodeo in Red Bluff, California.

"I think the biggest accomplishment was winning a couple big rodeos and being in the top five at a handful of others all throughout the year," he said. "In the past it seems like I've been able to win one big rodeo a year but I haven't been able to do it consistently."

Along with Red Bluff, Kissack was in the final round at San Antonio and Houston. He was reserve champion in Casper and for the second time made an appearance at the National Circuit Finals Rodeo in Florida.

"And there was one day during the season I remember. I roped in Estes Park (Colorado) in the morning and then in the short round at Casper that night," he said. "In one day I won \$7,600, and I won \$9,600 for the week. That also was a really cool accomplishment to almost win ten

thousand in a week, not during the 4th of July."

During the season the number of qualifying rodeos for the Badlands Circuit Finals was also reduced and Kissack found himself within range of once again being able to qualify. He added four circuit events to the schedule and did compete this past weekend in Minot, North Dakota. Last year he was the second tie-down roper qualified for the NCFR in Kissimmee, Florida. At the 2019 Circuit Finals he had a much tougher hill to climb and winning the average was his only chance for a repeat spot in the NCFR.

Recently Dane and wife Kelli sold their land in Texas and purchased some land a short distance from his parent's place in the Spearfish River valley south of Belle Fourche. They are currently building a house that they hope to complete by Christmas.

"We made some really great friends and had super neighbors in Texas," Dane said. "But we both really were looking forward to settling back in the Black Hills region."

Now that the season is over the couple plans to settle in for a while and look to the future. Dane now has an insurance license and is considering joining his father's business. But they will return to Texas for at least one more winter season to work horses where the pull of competition will not be far away. With

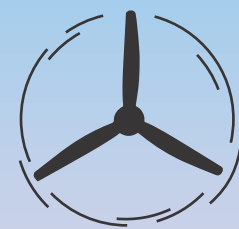
