Bronc Fullback Logan Tyndall Plays With a Prosthetic Leg

The first time Belle Fourche football coach Scott Slotten noticed, now sophomore Logan Tyndall, was at a youth football camp. The drill allowed participants to run a play, score a touchdown and celebrate that touchdown. Slotten watched as Tyndall scored, undid his prosthetic leg before twirling it around as his celebration. "I figured I would do that because no one else on the field can do that celebration." Tyndall said.

Tyndall was born with a condition, Fibular Hemimelia, a congenital longitudinal limb deficiency characterized by complete or partial absence of the fibula bone.

Folks in Belle Fourche are well aware of Tyndall. The 5-foot-3, 128 lb. sophomore plays football, wrestles in the winter, pole-vaults in the spring and plays baseball in the summer.

"I just love being with my friends and playing team sports where we can all be together," he said.

Tyndall wasn't sure he was big enough to compete at the high school level. Once again the draw of being with friends helped him continue his football

"I just showed up because my friends were going," he said. "I didn't want to miss out on a whole season where I had to sit home and not play."

Tyndall found the weight room in sixth grade when we took a recreation weight lifting class. "He can bench 200 lbs. and can squat 275 lbs.," Coach Slotten

"He's a strong kid that loves the weight room.

Slotten shares a story of Logan and his older brother Jackson, an All-State, Honorable mention selection a few years back. "Jackson told Logan he needed to quit lifting because Logan would try to eat at the dinner table shirtless to show his muscles," he said.

Ordinance Approved by Committee **BEACON STAFF**

Amended City Cannabis

BELLE FOURCHE - The city's Legal and Finance Committee unanimously approved a city ordinance. Ordinance 8-2021, putting forth licensing provisions

for marijuana establishments in the city. The ordinance added specific items adopted by the state of South Dakota

into the language of the city ordinance. These included definitions of what parts and products of the plant will be included. It also added definitions of cultivation facilities, dispensaries, manufacturing facilities and testing

facilities. The ordinance was scheduled for its first reading at last Monday night's regular city council meeting. A second reading will be held during the first council meeting of November and then 20-days later the ordinance will go into effect.

Up to this point the state of South Dakota has only legalized the medical use of cannabis.

The recreational use, which voters approved in last April's election as Amendment A, was challenged in the state's Supreme Court which heard the case last April but has yet to rule. As a result the issue will need to be voted on again in 2022

> if enough signatures are obtained to get it on the ballot. An activist group, South **Dakotans** for Better Marijuana Laws (SDBML),

are attempting to collect the 17,000 signatures needed by November 8th to put the issue before voters in November of 2022.

In the near term, the city will provide forms for cannabis establishment licenses and no other application form will be considered. The applications would only pertain to medical facilities. The fee for submitting the application is \$30,000. License renewal fees will be \$10,000 each year.

The new software came with a due date for the city water bills on the first of the month. The previous due date was the 15th. Breanna Schaefer, City Finance Officer, felt the earlier due date was a burden on some residents since many payments are concentrated at the end or the beginning of the month, having the water bills due more toward the middle of the month was seen to be a more palatable situation.

In the intervening weeks G-Works and the city have been working toward a solution to give Belle Fourche residents more flexibility that the G-Works software would allow. It was finally worked out that

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




I currently work for myself as a Certified Quantum Energetics

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

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DAR Presents Vern Bills Literacy Champion Award

Special to the Beacon Catherine Thybo DAR chapter awarded Vern Bills with their Literacy Champion Award to individuals who are involved with community activities that promote literacy at their October 10 meeting. Vern has created a Little Library on his lot across from the Belle Fourche post office. The small library contains books that people are welcome to borrow or trade. Vern has collected so many books he created another smaller library for children's books. In his little library park there is a piano, a picnic table and bikes to ride, a very welcoming spot right near

the Belle Fourche river. The little library is a memorial to Vern's mother Dorothy Ogard who was an avid book reader. When community members add books to the library, Bills puts a sticker on the back of each book that says, "always a gift, never for sale," and attaches a pamphlet detailing how the library works. "I've been amazed that people use it as much as they do, and that it hasn't been tampered with," Bills said. "That tells me that there is a respect for books.'

LaVern O. Bills is a driving force for the economic and cultural change for over 45 years in our local northern Black Hills communities.

Raised by a teaching family, literacy has been paramount in his life not only as a businessman but as a teacher, which was his first chosen profession. It never left him.

Vern conceived of the Community Education Council 25 years ago that joined the school system with the business community to form a partnership to enhance literacy in Belle Fourche.

He stores the excess books that are dropped off in his garage next door and ends up supporting other Little Free Libraries from his abundance! He expanded his library to include a Children's Library adjacent to his original library. They are all at his own expense.

These are, of course, dedicated to his mother who was his first teacher.

Not content with the Little Free Libraries, he added a picnic table for those so inclined to recline with a book under the umbrella canopy.

Still not satisfied, he opened an auxiliary library in the near by laundromat for children and adults.

Vern, knowing there could be more amenities at this "culture vortex", copied an idea he had seen and placed an old piano next to the library! Now, this little corner of the world could provide literature and music to those interested in visiting this center of entertainment in Belle Fourche! It has provided musical notes for many gifted and not so gifted piano players and appreciation for those whose talent is "listening".

This is the third used piano that has been placed there! The weather cover and "tuning" of the piano are, again, at his expense.

Yet still more ideas flew from Vern Bills when he devised "Free Bikes to Ride and Return". So now people visiting the "Cultural Vortex" of Belle Fourche can read, make music and exercise along the Beautiful Forks. Donated bikes are made serviceable by Vern and Willard at South Side Standard. Fixing flats, brakes, seats and chains are again at his own expense! Bikes are donated and they are just asked to ride them and return them.

LaVern O. Bills is a champion of literacy, the arts and our community. He walks the walk of what we are called to be in a community.

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

Set your calendars for Friday October 22 for the 2nd Annual Belle Chamber of Commerce Moonlight Madness Chili Cookoff Contest.

I'm not a Facebook dweller, but have been shown by others where the battle for the claim to be the best has already begun there.

The modern dish we know as chili, also known as chili con carne (chili with meat), does appear to have roots in the American West, particularly the State of Texas. An old legend holds that immigrants from the Canary Islands brought a recipe for chili with them when they settled San Antonio in the early 1700s.

When it comes to the story of chili, tales and myths abound.

While many food historians agree that chili con carne is an American dish with Mexican roots, Mexicans are said to indignantly deny any association with the dish.

Enthusiasts of chili say one possible though far-fetched starting point comes from Sister Mary of Agreda, a Spanish nun in the early 1600s who never left her convent yet had out-of-body experiences in which her spirit was transported across the Atlantic to preach Christianity to the Indians. After one of the return trips, her spirit wrote down the first recipe for chili con carne: chili peppers, venison, onions, and tomatoes.

Another yarn goes that Canary Islanders who made their way to San Antonio as early as 1723, used local peppers and wild onions combined with various meats to create

early chili combinations.

Most historians agree that the earliest written description of chili came from J.C. Clopper, who lived near Houston. While his description never mentions the word chili this is what he wrote of his visit to San Antonio in 1828: "When they [poor families of San Antonio] have to lay for their meat in the market, a very little is made to suffice for the family; it is generally cut into a kind of hash with nearly as many peppers as there are pieces of meat--this is all stewed together."

In the 1880s, a market in San Antonio started setting up chili stands from which chili or bowls o'red, as it was called, were sold by women who were called "chili queens." A bowl o'red cost diners such as writer O. Henry and democratic presidential hopeful William Jennings Bryan ten cents and included bread and a glass of water. The fame of chili con carne began to spread and the dish soon became a major tourist attraction. It was featured at the World's Fair in Chicago in 1893 at the San Antonio Chili Stand.

By the 20th century chili joints had made their debut in

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over the west by the roaring '20s. In fact, by the end of that decade, there was hardly a town that didn't have a chili parlour, which were often no more than a shed or a room with a counter and some stools. It's been said that chili joints meant the difference between starvation and staying alive during the Great Depression since chili was cheap and crackers were free.

U.S. President Lyndon B. Johnson was a big chili lover. His favorite recipe became known as Pedernales River chili after the location of his Texas ranch. Johnson preferred venison, which is leaner to beef, probably due to doctor's orders about his bad heart. Lady Bird Johnson, the First lady, had the recipe printed on cards to be mailed out because of the many thousands of requests the White House received for it.

"Chili concocted outside of Texas is usually a weak, apologetic imitation of the real thing," Johnson is quoted as saying. "One of the first things I do when I get home to Texas is to have a bowl of red. There is simply nothing better."

In 1977, chili manufacturers in the state of Texas successfully lobbied the state legislature to have chili proclaimed the official "state food" of Texas "in recognition of the fact that the only real 'bowl of red' is that prepared by Texans."

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

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
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"Along Came a Spider" Mini Exhibit

Get the Work Done but Take Care of Y'urself

Not sure if this is what people want to read...but maybe some youngster will gather something from it.

When I was young..when branding calves..we just caught them by hand and threw them down and held them. We learned the best and easiest way to do that at a very young age and mostly wrestled the smaller ones.. leaving the larger ones for the bigger boys and men. As we got bigger, we could wrestle bigger calves.

When I was about age 11, some of the neighbors we helped, went to using a calf table. We younger boys were delegated to pushing the calves up the race or chute, to the calf table. So some brandings you wrestled and some you tabled.

Then heeling and dragging calves out on a horse to waiting wrestlers came along. So we had three different ways of doing the same job. Then we learned to use a Nord-

fork to hold he calves with, thereby using a horse to hold the calves. Then we learned heading and heeling, where two horses and riders catch the calves by head and heels, the calf is laid down by the ground crew and the head rope is moved to the front feet so the horse and riders could hold

We all became proficient at all the different ways. Who you were helping dictated how the work was done.

I was very good at pushing calves up a chute and preferred that job when using a table. And any time cattle of any size were pushed up a chute for any reason..no matter calf, yearling or cow..and I was part of there crew, that was where I usually worked. I liked it and seemed kind of handy at it and I wasn't handy at all with a vaccine gun! Heck, just ask my neighbors!

But...I also got my feet

stomped on a lot..while getting good at pushing cattle down a chute, especially where I was in the chute behind them. And even after I was good at it.. accidents happened...and I got my feet stomped on.

Fast forward to today..at 63 years of age. I am setting here recovering from surgery to fix my left foot. The doctor said she had never seen so much arthritis before. I am sure it is from all the foot stomping over the years..bones getting cracked and healing, leaving more and more bone, healed upon cracks.

This is a long way around to say this....I don't care how anyone gets their stock worked. There is a good argument for each style. But.....I never ever got my feet stomped on unless helping while using a chute.

Odd... ain't it? Take care of your body.. it's the only one you get!



application. City zoning laws now in place prohibit a marijuana dispensary or grow facility within 1,000 feet of a church or school or 500 feet of a residence.

The ordinance says licenses may be suspended if the holder allows anyone to consume or smoke cannabis on the premises of the cannabis establishment or dispenses to under-age individuals. It also may be suspended

if the license holder creates or allows to be created a public nuisance at the cannabis establishment.

Revocation may occur for several reasons, among them is the selling of non-cannabis controlled substances on the premises of the dispensary.

Breanna Schaefer, City Finance Officer, says the city does expect to see medical cannabis applications submitted after the ordinance goes into effect.

Dear Motor Medics,

I have a 2013 Camaro SS that's been in storage for two years while I was deployed overseas. There is a good chance that I will again be deployed and must store the car. I probably shouldn't have bought it but not having some family or other bills I felt moved to buy my dream car. When I got back the battery was completely dead, and I have not replaced it. I want to drive it but don't want to hurt anything so is there anything I should do before I start it up? My friends and I listen to your shows on podcast all the time on base. It keeps us going. We often listen to your callers' questions and try to guess what your answers might be. Thanks, Jeffrey Marcus in California

Thank you for your dedicated service to our country. The beauty of a newer car with a fuel injected engine is that if you properly store it you can return it to normal service easily. When storing it is a must to use a fuel stabilizer in the tank and to keep the battery in good condition use a battery maintainer. Talk with a local mechanic to get complete advice on other things to look out for but unless critters get into it while you are gone you should be able to store it often without having to do too much before driving. Dear Motor Medics,

I have a 2006 Dodge Durango and I lost the key fob. It's the kind with the remote opener for the doors built-in to the key head. I asked the dealership about a replacement fob and it was just too much, so I tried lock smiths and my local hardware store but neither one had the fob with the remote attached. I settled for a key that would start the vehicle without the remote for the doors attached. Is there anything else I can do besides spend several hundred dollars on the correct key so I can get my remote doors back?

Remote keyless entry fobs can be very expensive. While some fobs are as low as \$40, we have seen others in the several hundred-dollar range and then they still need to be programmed to the vehicle. What you might consider since you have already bought a key is to go with an aftermarket system. You can either get a low budget one that just works the door locks or a very high-end system that will hit the basics and remotely start the car. If you have ever wanted a remote start now may be the time. If you just want basic locks, you may check one of the many online fob resources for an aftermarket remote to hang on your keychain. You still need to program them, but it should save some cash.

A city ordinance was put in place on August 2nd that suspended late fees for water bills during the transition period.

The city extended that ordinance until further notice late last month.

'The city understands how you've got to rework your finances if the bills change and so we were hoping by waiving those fees it could help people get onto a different household budgeting cycle," Schaefer said at the time.

The resolution does not absolve citizens of any unpaid balances on water bills. It only forgives the late fees.

The city paid \$130,000 to li-

123 years ago Belle Fourche Times October 21, 1897 Mineral Wealth

The Black Hills will be the third largest producer of gold during the year 1897, and its output will be, according to a fair estimate, equal to that of the Klondike. The Chicago Times Herald has compiled a statement of the annual yield, which, it predicts, will be \$96,000,000. The division of this amount and the district from which it will come is as follows Colorado \$24,000,000; California \$20,000,000; Black Hills (four largest mines) \$7,800,000; Arizona \$6,500,000; Montana \$6,000,000; Idaho \$4,000,000; Oregon \$2,000,000 Total \$74,300,000. The director of the mint reports that the world's output for 1897 will be about \$240,000,000, or an increase of \$23,000,000 over last year's production. Two-thirds of this production is to be used and is used for money, the remainder going to the arts.

In Hoover there were no yes votes and in Castle Rock only 2 yes votes.





October 19, 1911 County Surveyor Carl C. Adams and Eugene Ball in company with R.K. Bates and Tom Gay began Friday at Willow Creek and are surveying the Old Bismarck Trail to the Meade County line, for the county Commission of Butte County. It is the intention of the commission to make this a legal

The work of remodeling the old skating rink building for church purposes has commenced. It is the intentions the Methodist people to partition off 36 feet of the front and fit it up for church and Sunday school. The interior will be prepared and ceiled and ample seating will be provided. It is now expected that the building will be ready for occupancy Sunday, October 29 at which time it is proposed to hold special opening services.

October 20, 1921 Hog cholera has been diagnosed on the Project, Dr. J.E. Phelps State Veterinarian; Dr. Weaver State College; Dr. Combs fieldman for Livestock Sanitary Board and G.W. Dunn local Veterinarian visited farms in the vicinity. At the Oscar Milberg and Hannah Wilson farms, they found both hog cholera and hemorrhagic septicemia. On the Adam Hill farm, cholera alone was found. Dr. Phelps will call a meeting with a view to lifting the restrictions for the use of virus eradication in the section, which has heretofore been termed a cholera free area. Perfect sanitary conditions should be carried out about the entire farm and the strictest kind of quarantine both for self and neighbors should be practiced.

The first of the week, the men interested in the Horse Creek Community Hall, turned out in force and put a substantial fence around the building while the ladies met the same day and finished a quilt which, we understand, is to be sold in the near future.

October 22, 1921 Postmaster E.R. Hill has received a limited supply of new 2-cent stamps which were issued to commemorate the 150th Anniversary of the Battle of Yorktown. The stamps bear the heads of Washington, Rochambeau and DeGrasse and are approximately twice the size of the regular stamps. They were placed on sale throughout the county on October 20th. The Newell Post Office receiving 1,000 for local distribution.

Chamber of Commerce's at Belle Fourche, Nisland, Newell, Vale and Fruitdale have issued "Ship By Rail" posters designed to encourage co-operation between the railroad and producers and shippers. The move followed announcements by Railroad spokesmen that service would be curtailed in areas where trucking threatened reduction of the year's revenue.

October 23, 1941 Concluding operating expenses were too high to maintain the Butte County Poor Farm for 1 or 2 person, it was revealed last week. The **Butte County commissioners** decided to abandon the Poor Farm it was revealed last week. The farm located about 3 miles southeast of Belle Fourche was being operated during the past few months for only 1charge. The farm will either be rented or sold. The Commissioners adopted a Resolution to pay for the care of the charge in a private home. Butte County's Poor Farm was established late 1913 and has been improved from time to time.

was supposed to freeze for the first time that night and then he spent the rainy day inside working on the new bookcase. It rained all day again on Wednesday and water is finally running down Olson Creek in front of our house for the first time this year! Casey went down


