Questioning Voter Integrity

news@bellefourchebeacon.com BELLE FOURCHE-A group of concerned citizens appeared at the regular meeting of the **Butte County Commissioners** last Tuesday to point out problems the group has observed in many of the elections held across the state and nation. The website for South Dakota Canvassing Group states that it is a group of citizens working together to secure election integrity. According to their website, sdcanvassing.com, they have discovered "serious election issues in South Dakota" and are attempting to inform county commissioners across the state of these issues.

Spokesperson for the group, Kate Johnson, pointed out that voting machines are hackable and asked the commissioners to consider hand-counting ballots for the upcoming General Election. The group believes that machines can change the number of votes and should be suspect of being entirely legal.

Also according to the SD Canvassing Group, it is far too easy to establish residency in South Dakota. South Dakota codified law 12-1-4 states "For the purposes of this title, the term, residence, means the place in which a person has fixed his or her habitation and to which the person whenever absent, intends to return. A person who has left home and gone into another state or territory or county of this state for temporary purpose actually lives, if the person has no present intention of leaving. If a person moves to another state, or to any of the other territories, with the intention of making it his or her permanent home, the person thereby loses

residence in this state."

Jim Kallas, the General Manager of Riverfront Black Hills, was honored as the "Broadcaster of the Year" by the South Dakota Broadcasters Association (SDBA) at their State Leadership Conference held September 26 & 27 at the Spearfish Canyon Lodge, Lead, SD. The award is given annually to Broadcasters in recognition of service to their community.

Jim has been involved in numerous charitable activities over the years. He is a past United Way campaign chairman, Junior Achievement board member, and continues to serve as a local advocate for St. Jude Children's Research Hospital coordinating local fundraising efforts that have raised over \$800,000 to date.

Chaplain (COL) David Peterson, retired, age 81 of Sturgis, died Wednesday, October 19, 2022 at his home, surrounded by his loving family.

A funeral service will be held 11am Thursday, October 27th, 2022 at Foothills Community Church in Sturgis. There will be no visitation. A second service will be held 11am Monday, October 31, 2022 at the Reformed Presbyterian Church in Lemmon. Interment will take place in Greenhill Cemetery in Lemmon, with Military Honors provided by the Brattvet-Green American Legion Post #66.

Chaplain (COL) David P. Peterson, Retired, was born on January 4, 1941 in Lemmon, South Dakota. He graduated from Lemmon High School in 1958 and received his BA degree from Covenant College, St. Louis, Missouri in 1962. He continued his studies at Covenant Theological Seminary, St. Louis, Missouri, receiving a Master of Divinity in 1965 and was ordained as a Presbyterian Minister in July 1965. While at Covenant, David met the love of his life, Sandra, and they married on June 9, 1964.

As a Chaplain in the U.S. Army, David ministered to soldiers of all ranks for 30 years. David was as equally concerned about ministering to enlisted soldiers and non-commissioned officers during two combat tours in Vietnam as he was about ministering to the most senior commanding officers during Operation Desert Storm. In his assignments throughout the United States, David positively impacted soldiers and their families with his living Christian testimony. He provided comfort, wisdom, and encouragement to everyone he knew. He retired from active-duty service in 1995 and moved to Sturgis, South Dakota.

Following military service, David served as the Executive Director of the Presbyterian and Reformed Joint Commission on Chaplains and Military Personnel (PRJC) and Coordinator for Chaplain Ministries, Mission to North America (MNA), Presbyterian Church in America (PCA). In these roles, David recruited, sponsored, and mentored dozens of Chaplains who served in multiple branches of the military and communities of service. He retired from this ministerial role in

While David had many significant professional accomplishments, his source of joy was serving God, serving others, and uplifting his family. He and his beloved wife, Sandra, created a refuge for family gatherings where wonderful memories were created for his children, grandchildren, great grandchildren, extended family, and so many others. He fixed four wheelers, saddled up horses, guided pheasant hunts, prepared the swimming pool, jumped on trampolines, and refereed family skeet shooting competitions. He did all this with contagious enthusiasm, a fun-loving attitude, and an endless supply of "grandpa sayings" that endeared him to all. He never faced a task too great that he couldn't complete for the enjoyment of his family. The love he showed and generosity he shared left a legacy of happiness, joy, and love. His life will continue to be an inspiration for many generations.

David is survived by his wife, Sandra of Sturgis, South Dakota; son, Jeffrey (Lili) Peterson of West Point, New York, daughters, J'Lane (Peter) Dunning of Beaufort, South Carolina, and Julie (Paul) Durfield of Hattiesburg, Mississippi. David's grandchildren include Jessica (Joshua), Kayci, Sydney (Ian), Olivia (Blaine), Benjamin, Joseph, Anna, Stephen, Clara, Meghan, Faith, Ginny, Caleb, Hudson, Heath, Colter, and Jeremiah, as well as great-grandchildren James and Elizabeth. 

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Belle Fourche Defeats ST More in Clean Sweep

The Broncs only had one game last week, beating St Thomas Moore for the second time this season with set scores of 25-15, 26-24, and 25-19. The win improves Belle Fourche's record to 28-6. This keeps them at 8th place in the Class A standings and earns them the most wins of any Class A team in South Dakota at this point of the season

The Broncs set the tone for the game with Chloe Crago's ace to take the first point and lead of the match. The Cavaliers answered, and each team went point for point to a tied game at 8-8. Adryana Hovland took Belle to 9-8 when her attack appeared too much to handle for the STM libero. The Broncs built off that momentum to carry themselves to point 25 before the Cavaliers could get out of the teens.

In set two, the cavaliers put on the battle for a while longer, taking the lead from mid-way. The Broncs held on, though, and didn't let the home team get out of reach. At a score of 17-19 in STM's favor, Mataya Ward and Ava McLennan teamed up for a right side block. A few points later, Ward slammed it between two STM blockers for a hardwood kill to give Belle Fourche the lead 20-19. STM's offense answered as they gathered the

lead back up at 23-22. Ward got a service ace to put them back in the game at 23-23. Hovland followed that with a kill off the top of the block to take the lead. The Cavaliers earned the next point, officially sending set two into volleyball overtime. Belle Fourche took a point lead to be at game point once again and Crago's tough serve caused the Cavaliers to overpass right into the hands of Grace Clooten who met the ball at the net for a kill.

Clooten became a net monster in set three, giving the Broncs a 5 point lead 13-8 with a solo block. She stopped another when the game was tied at 18-18 and twice more at 22-19 and 23-19 to put the Broncs at game point. A scrambled save by the Bronc team members turned into a Hovland kill for the set and match win.

The Bronc's team effort is reflected even in the stats from the game. Clooten finished the game with 8 kills and 4 blocks, joined defensively by Crago for 12 digs. Dylan Stedillie had 11 digs and 2 service aces to add with her own 6 kills. Ward also added 2 service aces with her 15 kills, followed by Adryana Hovland for 9 kills and an impressive 15 digs. Setter Lily McCarty dished out 35 assists.

The Broncs finished up the regular season at home against Hill City Tuesday, October 25th.

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Broncs End Season with Loss to Vermillion

BELLE FOURCHE – The Belle Fourche Broncs ended their 2022 varsity football season with a 27-0 loss to Vermillion last Friday night at Lou Graslie field. It was the final football game for 10 departing upper classmen who were honored before the game on Senior Night.

With the first quarter scoreless and on the Bronc's second offensive possession of the night Belle Fourche looked to score first. Junior QB Nolan Wahlfeldt kept the ball on a designed quarterback run and broke free down the right side of the field for a gain of 67 yards to the five. Unfortunately the Broncs were unable to score and the ball went over on downs to the Tanagers.

With the score still tied 0-0 in the second quarter the Broncs put on a goal line stand of their own.

The Belle Fourche defense stopped Vermillion on four plays inside the ten.

The Broncs took over at their own six and on the very next play a fumbled pitch was recovered by the Tanagers. Vermilion freshman QB Hayden Christopherson took it in on the next play to make it 7-nothing.

Two possessions later Vermillion scored again, completing a 6-play 57-yard drive with a Jason Heine 6-yard run. It would 14-nothing at halftime.

The Broncs were ready to make a game of it following halftime taking the opening third-quarter kickoff and setting themselves up at the Vermilion 30. However, on the first offensive play of the quarter, Wahlfeldt was intercepted by the Tanager's Trillion Sorrell who returned it 42-yards for a touchdown. The extra point was no good and it was 20-nothing Vermillion.

Vermilion added another third quarter score to make it 27-0. Belle Fourche countered on their next possession to get the ball into the red zone after a 42-yard run by senior Thomas McCoy. The Broncs powered

the ball to the seven before turning it over on downs once again. There was no scoring in the fourth quarter and the final was 27-0. The Broncs finish their first season under head coach Justin Walker at 3-and-6.

Belle Fourche football will bid farewell to the following seniors: OL/DL Gunner Geib who hopes to attend tech school to become a diesel technician; WR/DL Joshua "JT" Hahne who hopes to play football or baseball in college and get a degree in physical therapy or sports training; WR/DB Lane Longbrake who hopes to attend college and study exercise science or kinesiology; RB/LB Thomas McCoy who hopes

to attend college and wrestle on the collegiate level; RB/LB Devin Nowowiejski who plans to pursue a career in engineering at South Dakota State; WR/LB Jayden Sechser who hopes to continue his athletic career on the college level; OL/LB Andy Tonsager who plans on attending Dakota State University and major in network security and administration; K/P Anthony Staley who plans to study business marketing and finance in college and start his own drop shipping business; and WE/LB Evan Vissia who hopes to play collegiate baseball and study exercise science. Congratulations to the seniors and best of luck in your future endeavors.





Don't Quit, You Will Succeed

news@bellefourchebeacon.com NEWELL - "If you don't quit, you will succeed," said Jake Steinfeld, Chairman of the National Foundation for Governors' Fitness Councils (NFGFC). That theme echoed again and again, as the students at Newell school listened to the fitness expert and the Governor of the state of South Dakota, Kristi Noem, share during the assembly prior to the ribbon cutting ceremony for the new \$100,000 weight room on the school campus. The event happened on Wednesday, October 19.

Newell school was one of three South Dakota schools, which included Sturgis and Custer, of 140 videos sent in, vying for the \$100,000 gift.

The gift was presented in the

form of equipment packed into the tiny weight room in the basement of the high school building. Newell was chosen as one of the state's most outstanding schools for demonstrating leadership in getting and keeping their students fit. Governor Noem signed a proclamation declaring October as "Don't quit! Fitness Month." The NFGFC event on the Newell campus was the 42nd school to receive the \$100,000 gift. The organization is supported by Coca-Cola, Elevance Health Foundation, Wheels Up and Nike and does not rely on taxpayer dollars or state funding. My Fitness Store Commercial provides all the fitness equipment. The NFGFC's goal is to build a nation of the fittest, healthiest kids in the world. "I believe that when you give the schools the tools they need, it's amazing what can happen," said Steinfeld. "We choose four states every year and we are in our 11th year of funding these projects.

Nominator and weight room instructor teacher Anna Erk saw the contest information and entered the contest in March. "We found out about the contest when our new business office manager, Jaquelin Birner sent the link to me after seeing we were running a contest to make money for the weight room,"

said Erk. "We had two weeks to make the video and fill out the paperwork. We had to wait a long time to find out we won." Students who participated in the video the group created included: Sarah Erk and Braylee Freytag-main speakers, Rowdy Franklin, Miya Mailloux, Tayla Neely, Macey Wendt, Malachi Whitacre, Natalie Yates, Jorey Clements, MKenzie McTaggart, Bethany Mahaffy, Angela Derschan and Kendra Johnson. The students participated in the assembly in Austin Auditorium and then moved to the front doors of the high school building where Steinberg and the Governor cut a red ribbon. Then the exercise session moved to the weight room while both dignitaries walked through giving pointers to those students. Spectators, teachers and other students filtered through to view the students demonstrating the pieces of equipment. According to the NFGFC's website, physical activity and exercise have been shown to help prevent and treat more than 40 chronic diseases, enhance individual health and quality of life and reduce health care costs. In schools, physical activity and exercise have been shown to improve academic achievement, increase confidence and self-esteem, reduce discipline problems, cut absenteeism, and foster better



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

Cowboy. Rancher. Pickup Man. Pilot. Sheepman. Neighbor. Friend. It doesn't matter how you describe Jim Wilson, but most people who know him will say that he is a true example of the Western way of life. He always said that starting at about six years old, he knew he wanted to be a cowboy, and he wanted to be the best cowboy.

Robert J. Wilson was born in Broadus, Montana, on May 15, 1945, the eldest of three boys, to Bob & Betty Wilson. At that time, they were employed by Bob's uncle Bob Ormesher. Jim started cowboyin' while riding with his Dad and uncle as a small child. He doesn't ever remember not being able to ride. Riding horseback, Jim attended several one-room country schools during his elementary education. Oh, the shenanigans that took place on those rides back and forth to school! Jim graduated from Belle Fourche High School in 1963 and returned to the ranch to work full time for Uncle Bob. Shortly after that, he married the neighbor girl, Donna Harris, and they started a family. Bart

was born in 1967, and Boni Jo was born in 1969. Jim's father passed away in 1972, followed by his Uncle Bob in 1976. Since Bob had no children, he left the ranch land to Jim. Several years of financial struggle ensued to pay off the IRS inheritance tax bill and to re-stock the ranch. Jim & Donna later divorced, and he married Louise Hanson in 1989.

For many years, Jim picked up at local amateur, high school, and college rodeos. In the early 1990's, Jim joined the PRCA, and added pro rodeos to his travels. He worked mostly in North and South Dakota, Montana, and Wyoming. He picked up at all the big rodeos in the Badlands Circuit and was selected six times to pick up for the Badlands Circuit Finals. Voter Rights and Responsibilities

Voters with disabilities may contact the county auditor at 605-892-4485 for information and special assistance in absentee voting or polling place accessibility.

Voters have other rights too. Any voter who can't mark a ballot because the voter has a physical disability or can't read may ask any person he or she chooses to help the voter vote. Any voter may ask for instruction in the proper procedure for voting. Any voter at the polling place prior to 7:00 p.m. is allowed to cast a ballot.

If your voting rights have been violated you may call the Butte County Auditor at 605-892-4485, the Secretary of State at 888-703-5328, or the Butte County State's Attorney at 605-892-3337.

There are some voter restrictions too. Any person who is convicted of a felony on or before July 1, 2012 loses the right to vote. However, any such person may register to vote following the completion of the person's felony sentence.

Any person who is convicted of a felony on or before June 30, 2012 and who receives a sentence of imprisonment to the adult penitentiary system including a suspended execution of sentence, loses the right

Any such person so sentence may register to vote following completion of the person's sentence. Further information available at www.sdsos.gov

Anyone who makes a false statement when voting, tries to vote knowing he or she is not a qualified voter, or tries to vote more than once has committed an election crime.

A test of the automatic tabulating equipment will be conducted on Nov. 3rd at 10 a.m. at the Butte County Auditor's office located at 117 5th Avenue in Butte County.



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Looking Back in Belle-

125 years ago Belle TIMES

November 4, 1897 Returned to Sioux City John Pierce, who has made his come in Lead the greater part of the past year, left for Sioux City, his old home, where he will probably be fully occupied in the future. This does not signify that the Pierce deal, which concerns Lead so much, has been abandoned or called off, but that Mr. Pierce is realizing something far beyond what he ever expected out of the enterprises that he integrated in Sioux City a few years ago, and out of the property that he has held there for so long. There are no new developments in regard to the big mining deal that Mr. Pierce has been at work upon here. Mr. Giles, one of Mr. Pierce's friends, a capitalist of great wealth and influence, has been over the ground personally, in company with Mr. Twombly, the expert who represents the syndicate, and has gone east again. Mr. Twombly is still looking after the deal at this end.

State Auditor's Office The office of the state auditor is the scene of much trouble these days. The office of Insurance Commissioner is the direct cause of all the mischief. Again the wisdom of our state legislature is shown in levying tribute on insurance companies for failing to property direct the disposition of the proceeds. Thousands of dollars have been collected but there was no statute directing that the money be turned over to the state treasurer and consequently remained in the auditor's hands. Date was left in the office showing that proceeds had been received and the receipts signed by the state auditor gone out. Hipple received during his term as shown by the examination of the state examiner, nearly \$10,000 and Mayhew \$2,500. The office has been in charge of C.H. \$11,000 Payment November First Retires '37 Issue – Last of '28 Ronds Due in 1948

'28 Bonds Due in 1948 According to a statement coming from County Treasurer Carl Wiessner Tuesday, Butte county is approaching the no bonded indebtedness status – in fact, the county treasurer says that the county has virtually reached that stage, since the final bond payment next year on the last of the bonded debt of the county has already enough cash on hand to take care of the the last one on the books. On November first this year, the county will pay the final installment on the 1937 refunding bond series of \$88,000. This payment will total \$11,000 plus the interest bill. The last bond payment will come June first, next year. It will be for \$26,000 on the 1928 bond issue, which was for \$360,000. The permanent school fund indebtedness has been paid up. Twenty years ago, the bonded indebtedness of Butte county was past the three-quarter million mark, or \$760,000. On November first, this year it will be only \$26,000, and as tated above the sinking fund is already sufficient to meet the final 1948 payment.

Chamber of Commerce meeting. Mr. Reiger, a former South Dakotan residing at Webster, in his remarks called attention to current national and international affairs, drawing parallel comparisons between economic and governmental events. He sounded several warnings to commercial interests "not to stick their necks out" during the present inflationary period and that a little conservatism in present business expansion would prevent extreme retrenchment when today's inflationary situation had returned to a more normal basis. It was evident from his remarks that Mr. Reiger was an observing student of current happenings and their relation to governmental affairs.

that, to his knowledge, while picking up, he never caused any injuries to a cowboy. He worked for Korkow Rodeo, Sutton Rodeo, Mossbrucker Rodeo, and for Burch Rodeo when they joined the PRCA. He still believes the reason he was able to pick up as long as he did was due to two things - good horses and the ability to read livestock.

When Jim and Louise were married, they opted to have a little jackpot roping with a potluck supper instead of a formal wedding reception. The roping was followed by a barn dance. It was all so much fun that they decided to do it again the next year. By then, they had added a bucking chute to their arena, so they included bronc riding in the mix. The year after, they bought and installed five chutes. That was the beginning of Wilson Rodeo, which ran for 10 years. It's pretty amazing to look back at the paperwork and see how many guys that rode broncs in the back yard went on to compete at the National Finals Rodeo.

In the mid 1980's, Jim purchased and learned to fly a Brantley B-2B helicopter. He loved flying and hunting coyotes with it. To this day, he comments on "good snow for hunting." The helicopter met its demise while being used to chase wild horses, but Jim survived to tell the story. Now, you can say you know of a guy that has survived helicopter, plane, train, automobile, motorcycle, and horse crashes. But those other crash stories are for another day.

Jim has always been very handy with both saddle horses and teams, and so, he enjoyed helping small local wagon trains for many years. He also ran a branding wagon in the Ridge, Montana area, where he would gather up the neighbors who traded help. They would head out with the wagons and brand for about a week. They usually branded about 4500 calves and traveled a distance of about 20 miles before they were done. It gave local ranchers young and old alike an opportunity to get a taste of what branding was

like back when the West was a lot more wild. There are lots of stories from those days!

In 1989, Jim was selected to be the Carter County representative to help wrangle horses and trail cattle on the Montana Centennial Wagon Train from Roundup to Billings. He had the time of his life being involved with handling such a large number of horses and cattle. Later, he was part of the Powder River Wagon Train and Cattle Drive as the Horse Boss. It was a week-long destination vacation, on which they hosted anywhere from 25-80 guests from all over the world. In 2012, the final drive rolled out on that adventure and operations ceased, a victim of rising insurance costs and a lack of well-broke horses.

Another big adventure for Jim was going to Arizona to rope wild cattle. His comment was that there's nothing more exciting than dropping a loop on something that has never seen a human! He not only roped wild cattle, but he also roped most anything that moved, like deer or antelope, for the sport of it. He still carries 60 feet of rope just in case he needs a big loop or a long reach.

For the past 59 years, he has served as a local brand inspector for the State of Montana. He has always gone horseback and helped to gather, as he feels it gives him a better look at the cattle he is inspecting, and a chance to spot livestock that might be in the herd from neighboring ranches. That job is slowly being handed down to

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

Don't think for one-minute big gov-



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The Vore Buffalo Jump: A Local Archeological Treasure

In the late 1960s when the
interstate highway was being
constructed near the South Dakota Wyoming state line, some
highway engineers became concerned. Something was wrong.
The ground under the proposed
highway was unstable.

To learn more about what the problem might be, soil tests were conducted. Core samples brought up bison bone, in fact, so much bison bone that archeologists from the University of Wyoming were invited to conduct excavations.

What the archeologists discovered during the summers of 1971 and 1972 was a natural sinkhole, with well-preserved bison bone deposits as well as other artifacts; a treasure trove of information.

Although bison jumps and traps are common in the area, the site known as the Vore Buffalo Jump (VBJ) is of special interest to archeologists and

Because the VBJ is a sinkhole, and deeper than most other jumps in the area, artifacts have been unusually well preserved allowing archeologists to advance their understanding of the Native American cultures.

The sinkhole comprises hundreds of discrete layers of sediment, deposited annually. These layers, known as "varves" can be counted like tree rings and in combination with other dating methods, archeologists have been able to determine when each the first seven of the twenty-two bison jumps at the VBJ

Archeologists have been able to determine how many bison were killed in a mass hunt, something that hadn't been possible at other bison jumps studied. Additionally, archaeologist have discovered bison skeletons that had not been butchered. There were occasions when more bison were killed than they could butcher before the meat spoiled. Evidence such as the remains of scavengers such as grizzly bear and wolf-dog hybrids, have been found in the hole. Among plains tribes, the bison hunts, almost all of which occurred in the fall, would provide food and supplies necessary to survive a winter. Anything that the hunters didn't or couldn't carry out remained in the sinkhole. Bison hides became clothing and shelter, bones were fashioned into tools, sinews, hooves and even brains had a purpose. Extra meat was dried, and often combined with chokecherries and bone marrow before being dried and preserved. The buffalo jump hunts took place before horses and guns were readily available to plains people. Those items came about as white settlers began to populate the plains.

In the absence of guns and horses here's what the hunt might have looked like: A lone young man, (definitely someone who was athletic and could run fast) would act as a decoy disguised with a bison robe skin. The decoy might have placed himself between a herd of bison and the precipice of the jump. His job was to lure the bison toward the jump while other tribe members surrounded the herd on the back and flanks. When signaled by the decoy, the "flank team" would run after the bison to push them toward the

Participating in the bison jump must have been fast, exciting and especially terrifying for the decoy. To avoid being trampled to death, the decoy would have to find quick cover, or get out of the, as the thundering animals ran over him to their capture and demise below. As the bison landed in the pit, broken legs or other injuries rendered them immobile. Tribal members waiting below have killed any bison remaining alive using bows and arrows. Archaeologists estimate that from approximately 1500 to 1880 at least 4,000 bison were killed at the site. As evidenced by layers of excavated bison bone the site was used 22 times. About 225 bison were killed during a hunt, and subsequently butchered in the same area about the size of a basketball

The VBJ is located halfway between Sundance, Wyoming and Spearfish, South Dakota. From Belle Fourche, visitors can reach the site by traveling west on I-29 to exit 199. The VBJ is just three miles east on the access road and easily recognized from the signage. The site is open from June 1 through Labor Day. Guides take visitors through the site, which is handicapped accessible. Restrooms are available. School groups tours are welcome off-season.

The Vore Buffalo Jump is managed by an eight-member non-profit board. A seat on the board is reserved for a member of the Vore family, the original homesteaders of the land. When the significance of the site was realized, the Vore family donated the land to create the Vore Buffalo Jump Foundation (VBJF). Ted Vore, who lives in Belle Fourche serves on the board as treasurer.

A meeting of the VBJF is held every fall that is open to all VBJF members. Members are invited to attend, and those interested can become members prior to the meeting. The annual membership is \$50; members are not charged admission for tours during the summer. A biannual newsletter is included. This year, the meeting is scheduled for October 29 at 10 AM at the VBJ. Tours of the site will be offered beginning at 9 AM.

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City Commission

New Loader in City's Future

NEWELL-The Newell City Commission had a tense discussion on the purchase of a new loader for the City. The present loader is several decades old and is in need of major repairs that could cost the City in excess of \$15,000. According to City Foreman Larry Parker, that would only be the beginning of repair work on the loader. Commissioner Allen Youngberg argued that it is too soon to make a decision on a new loader.

The quote from John Deere for a 344L loader with 215 hours, which is still considered new, is \$158,151.00. This includes a 60-month, 3,000-hour warranty.

According to Mayor Ken Wetz, there is enough money in the General Fund to pay for the new loader without financing. There is money available in the budget from Streets, Water, and Sewer that can be used since that money has not been used for projects it was planned for in 2022. Finance Officer Sheila Smith stated that the project money is still slated for 2023.

"We need to get some quotes to repair the hydraulic pump first," he said. "Tonight is too soon to make a decision on \$160,000."

Mayor Wetz said that he had checked with John Deere for a repair quote and wondered if there was any other business to

"If we don't get a new one now, we may not be able to find one for a couple of years," Wetz

pointed out. The pump has been bad for two years according to Parker.

Motivational Speaker Cory Greenwood Speaks

NEWELL – In two different programs, titled "Your Story Matters," for grade 6-12, and "ACTive KINDness" geared toward younger elementary, Cory Greenwood, motivational speaker and energizing young man, shared his heart with Newell students on October 11

in Austin Auditorium. The early morning program began with music by Ashton Brooke Gill, of American Idol fame, sharing special songs from her heart, such as "Don't Stop Believing." That revved the students up for the introduction of Greenwood, a Minnesota native. Greenwood travels the U.S. speaking about different topics, but hitting the statistics of suicide, since that is primari-

ly "his" story. According to information shared during the middle/high school program, Greenwood said suicide is at an all-time high among youth.

He encouraged the students to do several things including finding a mentor and engaging in healthy conversations, as well as asking for help.

"Focus on solutions instead

of dwelling on problems," said Greenwood. "Make healthy decisions." Toward the end of his presentation, he encouraged the students to make their way to the gym floor and write "just one thing they could change" on a piece of paper. Doug, Clint and Beau Doll, and Bill Holt came to help these guys sort off the heifer calves



"Looking Forward to our Past" –

October 24, 1912 The Northwestern State Bank people started Monday to break ground for their bank building on the corner of Girard Ave. and 3rd Street. The basement will be completed this fall and if the season remains open considerable work will be done on the building this winter.

Drinking liquid from a bottle the contents of which he was ignorant, caused the death of Chris Anshutz, aged 39 years, at the home of a farmer south of here. Anshutz had gone down to the barn in the early morning and was in good health. He saw the bottle standing on a shelf and drank its contents. Nothing was thought of the act until a few hours later, when he commenced to show symptoms of a serious illness.

A special meeting of the Vale Rebekahs is to be held at Mrs. Morsemen's Wednesday to cuss and discuss ways and means for a good old fashioned Halloween party for the Rebekahs and guests.

October 19, 1922 Messers' Ruff, Snyder and Jones of Nisland and Charles Yoder of Newell are bringing their horses to the Newell track this week on Friday and Saturday. They expect to pull off a few interesting races. The Nisland fellows, it is said, have a longing to beat that Aune mare and the prospects are good for some excitement at the race track this week. The track has been cleaned up and dragged in

preparation for the coming of the races.

The Women's Club met with Mrs. C.A. Woods Thursday afternoon, October 5. The club is especially interested in the school's having hot lunches this winter. Both teachers and pupils need them. The ladies are busy sewing for a bazaar to be held soon. Wait and buy your aprons there. The Club will meet with Mrs. Alexander on Thursday afternoon, the 19th.

October 20, 1932 A "no conviction" term of Circuit Court closed in Buffalo last week with acquittal for Henry McCleny and Elmer Sankey in cattle theft charges and for Dudley Hanson on assault of a County Assessor. The Livingston Case in cattle stealing has been postponed until the next term of court.

One of the worst snow storms in many years swooped down in this section of the state Tuesday night and continued in all it's fury Wednesday, piling huge drifts in many cases over 6 feet high. A heavy fog or mist on Tuesday covered the ground and sidewalks and a drop in temperature the mist froze on windshields and made traveling hazardous. Fears were felt for many stockmen who were reported as being on the trail with either sheep or cattle. Reports are some cattle loss but sheep are dead, piled up in draws.

October 22, 1942 Elmer Milberg, manager of by Linda Velder

the local Gamble Store, was high bidder for the stock in the J.J. Christian Store; however, before possession is given the sale must have been approved by the probate court at a hearing to be held within a few days. Five bids were filed with S.D. Buchholz, Executor of the Christian Estate for the stock of new and secondhand goods. Bids offered on the building were all so far below the appraisement that none of them were considered. Mr. Milberg informs us it is his intension to offer the greater part of the good at public auction sale at an early date.

Mr. & Mrs. Livingston Edward took their son Alan to Rapid City Wednesday to place him under Doctor's care for a badly infected throat. Mr. & Mrs. Howard Kinghorn took their youngest daughter, Shirley also to Rapid City last Friday where a tonsillectomy was performed on her Saturday morning. They returned home Monday.

Orin and Palmer Eide of the Arpan District marketed a big truckload of alfalfa seed at the Bober Seed house in Newell on Monday of this week. Orin set a record this year with a big field of barley that yielded 80 bushels per acre.

October 23, 1952 Mr. & Mrs. Hemming Strong arrived here by bus Friday from Reedley, Calif. and are busy repairing and repainting their

house here, which is occupied by Dr. & Mrs. Joseph Pokorny and son. The Strong's are houseguests at the home of Mr. & Mrs. Muotka.

Funeral services of Charles Sterling Russell, 40-year-old Sulphur rancher who died of polio last Thursday at Hot springs, were conducted from the First Congregational Church in Newell. The progressive and popular Sulphur rancher had been ill for but a few days before entering the West River Crippled Children's Hospital & Polio Center at Hot Springs the previous week, suffering from what was believed bulbar polio. Russell was born, April 26, 1912 in Butte County and lived his entire life here. Residents from over a wide area of Butte, Meade and Perkins Counties attended the services, and most businesses were closed in his honor. It was described as the largest attended service ever witnessed in Newell.

October 18, 1962 The first Western Jr. Home Economics Show held in connection with the Western Calf Show at Rapid City included judging of a wide variety of ready-to-wear school clothes. Mona Fields, Newell entered all contests but the dairy demonstration and rated red in each division. Diane Greenwalt, Nisland, entered only in the

bread demonstration and rated red. The livestock judging team was Mona and Nina Donahey, Kathy Swan, Bruce and Gary Gottfredson, Cliff Crago and Dwight Knuteson who all won blue ribbons.

Leroy Teal, local farm laborer, was assessed a fine of \$5.00 and costs, when arraigned on a public intoxication charge before Newell Magistrate Harry Cunningham. He was also ordered to either leave town with his family or straighten up to become a law-abiding citizen. Teal and his wife and motherin-law were apprehended by City Police Chief Don Moore and Deputy Everet Munroe on the charges Thursday afternoon.

Dogs which have been following children to the Newell Schools and creating disturbances there recently will no longer be tolerated on the school grounds, Newell City Police Don Moore warned this week. City Ordinance which requires licensing of dogs also prohibits dogs from runningat-large. As a result all dogs straying to the school yards will be picked up, held in impoundment for 2 days and will then be promptly destroyed. Besides claiming dogs from the police, owners will also have to pay holding charges of \$3.00 per day.



Nisland Park Benches; A Long Journey

The idea of park benches for the Town of Nisland came to life during a fundraising event the Fall of 2020 while several of the Nisland Arpan Fire and Rescue auxiliary women were together at the Nisland Fire Hall. Tracy Seieroe, a Nisland resident, has wanted to see a park bench in front of the Nisland VFW Hall for several years now, not only for others to enjoy, but a place to rest while she weeds the flower gardens at the hall. The Newell Improvement Corporation, which I was a grant writer for at the time, had held a monthly meeting where we talked about doing projects in the neighboring communities of Nisland and Vale to do improvements in those towns too, as well as Newell. While the Newell splash pad project was on hold waiting for a plumber to install the water lines, the Newell Improvement Corporation members could be working on other things.

Tracy Seieroe attended a
Nisland Town Council monthly meeting to get approval in
January 2021; I attended the
February meeting to confirm
they wanted park benches and
determine who would install
them. The town board was
pleased at the prospect of this
donation to their community
and had some folks speak up to
volunteer their labor.

I solicited several corporations to fund the park bench project and received notice that there has been an overwhelming request for donations and that they would not be able to fund this project at this time. I decided I would donate a park bench on behalf of my insurance agency, Northstar Insurance LLC . Pioneer Bank and Trust in Belle Fourche decided they would donate for the other park bench in April 2021. Runnings in Belle Fourche offered to cover the shipping charges.

The park benches were ordered through U-Line Company that delivers to Runnings in

Belle Fourche, which ended up taking six weeks for the benches to be manufactured due to the covid19 pandemic. The shipping cost for those two benches cost as much as one of the benches! I delivered the benches prior to a Nisland Town Council meeting and council members packed the boxes one by one inside to be stored in the VFW Hall until the volunteers could assemble and install these benches. Due to volunteer coordination issues, the Town of Nisland ended up hiring a contractor for some concrete work elsewhere in town, who said he would fit it into his schedule to do the assembly and install of

the benches.

It was August 2022 when
Paula Heidrich from the Town
of Nisland called to say the contractor had arrived so I could
get pictures of the contractor
placing the first bench near
the VFW Hall flower garden.
The town council decided the
second bench should go near
the basketball court behind the
VFW Hall. It was September
2022 before the concrete work
to anchor the benches was
completed.

The plaques were done by JJ's Engraving LLC in Rapid City to give credit and thanks to the park bench sponsors Runnings of Belle Fourche, Pioneer Bank and Trust of Belle Fourche, and Northstar Insurance LLC of Nisland. The engraver JJ's did a beautiful job and had them done within three days of ordering, the cost of the plaques was donated by Northstar Insurance LLC.

I am so glad this project is done! Now time for a sit on a park bench!
