Thompson Named for 2020 PRCA National Circuit Finals

The Pro Rodeo Cowboys Association has announced its choices for the National Circuit Finals positions next spring. Among those selected was our own Jim Thompson who will be announcer for the National Circuit Finals Steer Roping in Torrington, Wyoming, April 24-26.



Jessi Franzen, part of the Powder River Rodeo Company will be the assistant secretary at the National Circuit Finals in Kissimmee, Florida April 2-4. Jessi has worked in Belle Fourche as part of the Black Hills Round Up rodeo for many years. The alternate pick up man for that rodeo will be Brent Sutton of Ondia, SD. Brent is the son of Steve and Kim Sutton of the Sutton Rodeo Company.

For Thompson, it will be his 5th time to announce in the ten year history of the Finals. He was the announcer at the first three events from 2010-2012. At that point he started to slow down his career and limited his events to local ones in Belle Fourche, Deadwood, Rapid City, Baker, MT and Big Horn Wyoming. But in 2017 he was asked back to Torrington.

"I truly haven't even applied for the National Circuit Finals over the past few years.

Butte - Meade Commissioners Mull Combined Dispatch Center

BELLE FOURCHE – Tuesday, October 15, saw a meeting between Butte and Meade County Commissioners on the topic of a regional dispatch center, at the regular monthly meeting in Belle Fourche. Meade Commissioners Doreen Allison Creed, Talbot Wiczorek and Ted Seaman, as well as Sheriff Ron Merwin came to the meeting in a scheduled appearance to discuss the center.

"We need to know whose boss for employees, how are they hired, will there be one manager?" questioned Seaman. Those were some of the same questions the Butte County Commissioners were asking in this initial meeting. "We need to approach it in a regional way, we need good leadership, and not go talk to our commissioners, bypassing the supervisor."

Creed said that if the two counties were going to join forces, they needed to do it soon.

"Personally, I would like to get it done in the next couple of months," she said. "It seems to be a little less activity in the winter, and that way we can start saving as much money as soon as possible. As I understand it, the state will pay for lines going in now. If we wait, we would have to pay for those ourselves."

"We need some time to facilitate this and make those commitments," said Butte County Sheriff Fred Lamphere.

Wiczorek said that their commission had not discussed the topic in an open meeting, although they had met with

University looks to build stronger ties to the community.

(BELLE FOURCHE) - An administrative team from Black Hills State University, including Interim President Dr. Laurie Nichols, spent last Wednesday, October 16th in Belle Fourche in an effort to get to know the community better.

"We are doing this to really strengthen Black Hills State University's relationship with the community of Belle Fourche," said Dr. Nichols, "so we can learn what the business community is doing, the economic development efforts that are going on here and we want to know what the work force looks like to make sure we are producing the kind of graduates that can go to work right here."

The team consisted of President Nichols, Dr. Sharman Adams, Dean of Education and Behavioral Sciences, Corrine Hansen, Director of University and Community Relations, and Dr. Faye LaDuke-Pelster, Associate Professor, School of Education.

They spent the morning hours visiting two ag-related businesses, New Generation Supplements and Grossenburg Implements, doing interviews and hosting a luncheon at The Stadium with the Belle Fourche School Board, Superintendent Dr. Steve Willard and two Belle Fourche Development Corporation board members.

During the afternoon the group toured the Belle Fourche Area Community Center, met with students and administrators at the high school, toured the Career and Technical Education Center and ended the day with an alumni social at Grap's Burgers to maintain close relationships

between the school and their graduates.

Belle Fourche is the final stop on the tour that has seen them visit Sturgis, Lead-Deadwood, Sundance, Moorcroft, Upton and Hulett, Wyoming.

"These visits have been very informative, I have to say, I've learned a tremendous amount," Nichols said. "One thing that stands out is how every community we've visited is so different and unique. It's easy to say that

western South Dakota communities are all alike, but they are not."

As for her impressions of Belle Fourche Nichols said she was able to experience first-hand the importance of agriculture to the community. "We want to take that information and bring it back home to BH and ask ourselves are we preparing graduates that go and meet the needs of the future workforce in these communities. And that to me, that

alignment, is a big part of what we're trying to get out of these community visits."

Nichols says that although BHSU is not a huge agriculture-based university there are areas that could provide deeper collaboration. "Maybe we're not going to do agriculture per se but I think we have to look at perhaps some ag-business related things in which we could be stronger."

(BELLE FOURCHE) - Since its completion in September of 2018, the new Career and Technical Education (CTE) Center on the Belle Fourche High School campus has attracted state-wide attention. Last week it did so again.

During their day-long tour of the city, an administrative team from Black Hills State University toured the facility and came away impressed with ideas for how the university can build partnerships to the benefit of the CTE.

"I think it's a collaboration that's ripe to develop and we need to get after it now," said Dr. Laurie Nichols, BHSU Interim President.

BHSU has long been known as a teacher's

college, training educators in primary and secondary education. According to Nichols there is a fast growing niche in teaching that needs to be filled and Belle Fourche may be a key in that fulfillment.

"We have heard loud and clear that there is going to be a need for CTE teachers in the future," Nichols said. "It's an area where we're not producing teachers right now and we really need to step that up. We're exploring ways to bring back a CTE teacher education program."

The early vision for such a program might involve a three-way cooperative effort between Belle Fourche High School, perhaps Western Dakota Tech in Rapid City and BHSU.

Did With Evil Intent?

This week's Pastor's Perspective is provided by Pastor Tim Smith, First Baptist Church, Belle Fourche

Have you ever had your motives questioned or challenged? Ever wonder how someone can simply say that they have figured out why you did something, or they attach evil intent to an action that you 'supposedly did with evil intent?' We see this type of behavior all of the time in the political world.
"The reason that a politician does everything that they do is because of money," or for other nefarious reasons. My question is, when did we go from a society that respects those that lead or serve us? How is it that everyone from the 'other' party, or everyone that leads is automatically suspect?
When we find ourselves automatically judging another person's motives, we need to take a step back. We can not know the other person's motives. In fact, if we are honest, we sometimes don't even know why we do what we do.

Boy's XCountry Sends Team to State Meet

For the first time in 37 years a boys' team from Belle Fourche will compete at the Class A Cross Country State Meet. The Broncos placed third as a team at Thursday's Region 5A Championships held in Pine Ridge to qualify for state as a team for the first time since 1982.

Freshman Sawyer Clarkson won his third meet in a row, tying his personal record with a 5,000-meter clocking of 16:31 to take the individual victory. Devin Nowowiejski ran an incredible second half of his race to move from 37th place in the first mile all the way up to 16th at the finish line. Cole Hockenbary placed 20th, Ethan Jones was 24th, Wyatt Keegan finished 27th, and Nic Lambert rounded out the Bronc varsity squad with a 30th-place finish out of 59 runners.

The Belle Fourche girls' team also had a successful day, and will send three individuals to Huron for state, the most for the Lady Broncos since the 2004 squad qualified as a team. Eighth-graders Ava Allen (13th) and Allison Hayes (15th) will be joined by senior Harley Fischer (17th). They qualify based on finishing among the top 20 individuals in the varsity girls' division. Freshmen Alanah Pomrenke (24th) and Ayseluna Hockenbary (27th) just missed a top-20 finish. Eighth-grader Anika Main rounded out the Belle Fourche varsity team, placing 39th out of the 52-runner field.

Two ladies represented Belle Fourche in the JV girls' race.

Seventh-grader Adeline Thomson placed 13th in her first ever 5K high school race while senior Megan Keegan placed 15th in the final race of her high school cross country career.

In the JV boys' division, eighth-graders Jordan Sandoval and Aiden Voyles placed ninth and tenth respectively. Darian Pesicka recovered from a lost show mid-race to placed 11th, Isaac McKenney was 20th, Harley Rivera finished 21st, Levi Melanson was 24th, Zach Tonsager placed 27th and Dustin Kolb was 29th out of 35 competitors.

State Preview

Broadland Creek Golf Course in Huron will host the South Dakota Cross Country State Championships on Saturday (Oct. 26th) for the first time since 2016. Huron has the most "true" cross country course out of the current rotation in South Dakota (Sioux Falls & Rapid City also take turns hosting) with some hills throughout the course.

The Belle Fourche boys have a shot at placing on the podium (top six teams) at the end of the day if they can replicate what they did in Pine Ridge – going out competitively and moving up throughout the entire race. Sioux Falls Christian looks to be the dominate boys' team heading into the state meet with Custer, Vermillion, St. Thomas More, Lennox, Beresford, and Belle Fourche all looking to battle for the rest of the podium.

Individually, I don't want to jinx him, but Sawyer Clarkson has looked incredibly strong over the past month of

competition. He carries the third-fastest time in the state in Class A heading into Saturday's championship race and has consistently been right around the 16:30-16:40 range on some tough courses as of late. A quick pace will help the diminutive freshman attack the later stages of the race when the field strings out and competitors begin to tire. For historical perspective, the best finish in school history belongs to Colten Njos, who finished 4th as a senior back in 2011.

Cole Hockenbary is the only other boy we have with state meet experience as he placed 67th two years ago as an eighth-grader. He can hopefully crack the top 50 (or higher) this year and be joined there by at least a couple teammates.

On the girls' side, Harley, Ava, and Allison have all taken turns being our top runner throughout the season. Any of them could step up on Saturday and their best results usually come when they feed off each other throughout the race. Allison was 79th last year as a seventh-grader and should be able to improve on that as she has run consistently stronger all season long. No Lady Bronc has placed better than 49th in at least 20 years and all three of our girls could have a legitimate shot to do that on Saturday.

The last female from Belle Fourche to medal at state (Top 25) was Carrie Cole in 1988. That will be a tall order but any one of our three girls are capable with the way they have finished their season.

Broncs on Short End of 49-35

(STURGIS) - Woodel Field in Sturgis was littered with pink laundry last Friday night.

In recognition of October as Breast Cancer Awareness Month the referees used pink penalty flags instead of the traditional yellow. And as one Sturgis observer put it, "if a donation was made with every penalty, they've had funded a cure by the 4th quarter."

The penalty-filled season seemed to continue for the Broncos as they were flagged a season-high 17 times in Friday night's 49-35 shootout loss to the 5th-ranked Class 11-AA Sturgis Scoopers. The loss severely damaged the Bronc's playoff hopes as their record fell to 4-4.

There was a combined 718 yards offense between the teams with 165 yards in fouls. That means for every 10 yards gained there were 2 yards in penalties. But if you enjoy offense, there was plenty to see in the game.

The Broncos started quickly. After a failed onside kick by

Sturgis to open the game, Belle Fourche quarterback Colby Nowowiejski found a wide-open Jackson Tyndall on a 21-yard TD toss with less than 2 minutes gone in the first quarter.

But Sturgis matched the Bronc potent air assault with a punishing ground game. Trevor Erlenbusch found pay dirt from 2-yards out on a run-oriented drive that tied it at 7-7.

After forcing Sturgis to punt on their next possession the Broncos muffed the punt reception, leading to the first of 4 turnovers. The Scoopers capitalized with a short drive capped by a Daylen Rhodes 7-yard TD run.

But the Broncos tied it up when Nowowiejski found Kelby Olson for a 50-yard scoring pass and run on the first play of the 2nd quarter and it was 14-14. The Broncos then regained the lead after Olson scored on a 6-yard run with 3:57 left before the half.

But Sturgis managed two touchdowns in the final minutes of the half on a 33-yard run and a 34-yard pass on the final play of the half that followed a Scooper interception. It was 28-21

Sturgis at the break.

The Broncos struck back in the third when sophomore Aidan Griffen stepped in front of a Zach Shoun pass and out ran all Scooper defenders 77-yards down the left sideline for a score to tie it at 28-28.

After pinning Belle Fourche deep in Scooper territory a series of penalties left Coach Scott Slotten exasperated and one Bronc player ejected. Sturgis defender Justin Burnham then intercepted a Nowowiejski pass, which led to a Scooper TD a few plays later. Sturgis added another touchdown on a 40-yard Josh Fowler run to make it 42-28.

The Broncos got one score back in 4th with Olson's 1-yd TD run. Olson finished with 70-yards rushing and 2 touchdowns. It was 42-35 in the 4th. But Sturgis capped the scoring with a Tanner Ortlieb punt return for touchdown which made the final 49-35. It was the first kick return for touchdown the Broncos had given up since 2017.

The Broncos finish the regular season at home Thursday night against Todd County.

But this year I am told I was requested specifically by the Torrington rodeo committee. That makes it pretty special.” Thompson retired from the full rodeo life several years ago and has restricted his announcing to steer roping events. He’s also been asked to announce at the National Finals Steer Roping in Mulvane, KS in November.

He will announce the Legacy roping for those 50 years and older and also the Senior Steer Roping Association Finals held in conjunction with that event. Thompson’s newspaper column “The Good Stuff” appears each week in the Beacon (B2). He continues to produce “The Good Stuff” as a 5 minute radio feature on nearly 2 dozen stations in a 6 state area each weekday.

their sheriff a couple times. “I was thinking this would have regional management of it, I didn’t understand that was what we had discussed before.” Merwin said he felt like quarterly meetings with all players, including both counties, city entities, and first responders, if needed. “The federal government has some say, requirements that dispatch has to be managed by a law enforcement agency,” he said. “It has to ‘belong’ to somebody. The FBI will not let us manage dispatch as a board, and have access to all their databases. Butte County Chairman Kim Richards said he didn’t want to do the regional center in haste, that Butte County would be at a point of no return, while Meade County would still have a dispatch center. “We just want to have a say,” said Richards. Creed said many costs of a dispatch center are fixed, that certain procedures have to be followed. Belle Fourche Mayor Gloria Landphere said she felt like she was running to catch up and recommended a need for the City Council to be in on a discussion. “Our council members need to be educated,” she said. “This would be the point of no return, I agree completely. We are down the food chain, but the call volume we have in the city is considerable.” Fred Lamphere said that an article that came out in the paper put things in fast motion. He said a discussion Merwin had with a reporter, was just that, a discussion. “It’s emotional,” said Lamphere. “We have dealt with that. We’re budgeted to run into next year.” He said his main concern


was with functionality and saving money. At the end of the discussion Merwin said he hoped that the two counties could save about half of one of their budgets, an estimated \$150,000 to \$170,000 a year. He said that there was some good and some bad, and that he didn’t want this to get so big that there would be a loss of efficiency. In other Commission agenda items, the group discussed the haul contract with Western Construction for the Wilson Cemetery Road. The contract has yet to be signed by the company. The State’s Attorney’s office has been working on a template that would eventually be used for any company. The contract would give the Highway Superintendent the authority to determine if roads under a haul contract are being properly maintained by the contractor. “Our focus needs to be that our roads in Butte County are safe for public travel,” said Richards. “There should be something in there (contract) that if they don’t do it (maintain), we have the right to do it and bill back to them.” The potential Lawrence County rubble site, where trucks to the site would utilize Butte County roads was discussed and it was determined that the commission may need to institute a haul agreement with that company. The possible affected roads could be Snoma, 123rd Street and Whitewood Valley Road. Superintendent Dwayne Heidrich reported that he had another blade operator resign and that made three operators within the last six months. He had interviewed one candidate but said it was not a good fit.

Nichols says an example of what that would look like might involve a high school student who has an interest in welding. The student, would go through the CTE program and learn the trade. They would go on to Western Dakota and do an applied science two-year degree. The final step would be an opportunity to transfer to BHSU to finish their teaching certification, which might include student-teaching opportunities at the CTE. “Speaking for myself, Belle Fourche has by far the most impressive CTE opportunities I’ve seen in any of the communities we’ve visited,” said Dr. Sharman Adams, Dean of Education and Behavioral Sciences at BHSU. “But what we’re finding is that students who want to teach are coming out of WDT and don’t have any teacher education or even some of their general education credits.” Adams says a cooperative program between BHSU and WDT would help those students get the general education credits they need while at WDT that would then transfer directly to BHSU to help move them more efficiently toward teaching certification in their final two years. These are known as two-plus-two, or articulation agreements. “We want to make sure they’re not taking any credits that don’t count,” Nichols said. “So that would be two years at Western Dakota Tech, transferable to two years at Black Hills State for a four-year degree.” “We’re trying to get away from the old models where you spend a year or two at a technical institution and then you come to a university and you have to re-do everything,” Adams said. “We don’t want students paying for six years when they could have completed it in a four year program.” Nichols, while President of the University of Wyoming oversaw more than 200 two-plus-two articulation agreements with seven vocational and technical schools in Wyoming. “We worked tirelessly on it the entire three years I was there,” Nichols said. Adams says BHSU is already making progress in this area. They are working on agreements with WDT, Miles City Community Col-

lege and schools in Wyoming. The university has met with Superintendent of Schools Dr. Steve Willard to see how the CTE might play a role in the program. “There is a real shortage of CTE educators, not just in South Dakota, but regionally,” Nichols said. “In fact, at career fairs we’ve heard from high schools that have had CTE educator vacancies for up to two years.” For students who are not on a track to become a CTE educator, the articulation agreements are still a vital part of the future of higher education, according

to Nichols. Graduating with a two-year technical degree is fine for some but a four-year degree increases their marketability in the workforce and lifetime income. “Research shows us that a college degree still pays off really well,” she says. “Over a lifetime, a four-year degree will earn you a million dollars more. And 60% of the jobs in the future will require a bachelor’s degree. So what we’ve got to do is take those students where they’re at with a 2-year technical degree and help them to round out their education with a bachelor’s degree.”



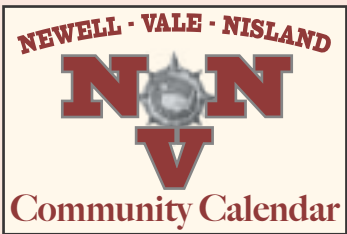

NEWELL – It’s been a whole year that the Newell community has enjoyed the sweet treats available at the Sweetery, a specialty store at 206 Girard in Newell.

“I started baking with my mom, and my grandmas at a young age,” said Courtney Fischbach, owner of the Sweetery. “(I) made my first from scratch apple pie solo at 10, and left the peels on all the apples.” She said she and her mother started making a simple version of truffles at Christmas time, after receiving some as a gift from a neighbor, along with a recipe card for the treats.

“Although the truffles I make now are quite different, my interest in them started with this yearly tradition,” she recalls. Fischbach and her husband moved to the Newell area in 2008, and the rest is history. This entrepreneur graduated from Sturgis high school in 2004 and attended SD School of Mines, where she graduated with an associate of arts degree in general studies. She went on from there to obtain certification as a dental assistant and worked in that capacity in Sturgis for five years. She and her husband have two children who attend the Newell elementary school. Fischbach first started out with a business called Bloomin’ Chocolates, pursuing her dream of turning a talent into an occupation. Bloomin’ Chocolates was born in May of 2014. She purchased chocolate molds from a friend who decided to pursue a photography career, and went solo, doing trade shows and church events. She soon outgrew the SD Cottage Food law, which allows sales of handmade food items. She was also getting inquiries about

wholesaling and custom orders, but needed a SD Food License to pursue this type of sales. She took classes at National American University and got her food handlers license, and set up in a commercial kitchen in Newell for three years. She eventually decided to move her kitchen to the current location the summer of 2017, continuing the Bloomin’ Chocolate business. “I decided I would like to offer some baked items, in addition to my chocolate work, and set a date to open The Sweetery, on September 1, 2018. We now offer custom cupcakes, French macarons, cookies, and other seasonal baked items in addition to our handmade truffles and caramel items.” Fischbach said the biggest challenge has been the location and the proximity to many of the wholesale locations and deliveries. She spends many miles and hours each week on the road, delivering product to a whole host of locations such as TJ’s Cafe in Newell, Grap’s Burgers and Posy Palace in Belle Fourche, Flying E Floral and Common Grounds in Spearfish, where she also sells

Then and Now *in Newell*

Oct.28, 1909

Hugh M. Vance and family arrived Tuesday from White Owl. Mr. Vance is here to ascertain whether it will be practical for him to erect a 3-story concrete block hotel or not. A meeting of the businessmen is to be held this week to confer with Mr. Vance.

The daily filings of homesteads are averaging 20 and some days as many as 57 have been recorded. The country north of Sturgis is also meeting with similar experience. During the summer there have arrived 125 full car loads of household good, besides other cars partly filled with the same variety of goods.

Oct 30 1919

Dr. J. E. Phelps State Veterinarian of Pierre was “snowed in” here for a few days and abandoned his car returning to Pierre by train.

Mrs. Louise M. Glenat closed a deal the fore part of the week with Jas. Counter, whereby the latter purchased her homestead east of town for a consideration of \$100 per acre. Mrs. Glenat will leave with her mother Mrs. Charles Fairbank for their future home at Agar. Mr. Fairbank, left Wednesday with their effects, the Irrigator wishes them success in their new home.

Oct. 24, 1929

Gliding from an altitude of 2,500 after the motor dropped out the plane, Claude Wilbur, pilot

of the Belle Fourche Air Lines, and his passenger, Mrs. Louise Thompson, landed uninjured in a tree-top north of Menomonic, Michigan, October 22. The vibration set up when the propeller broke and jerked the motor from the plane, Wilbur aimed for an open field but the distance was too great. Mrs. Thompson had been visiting in Alzada, Montana continued by another plane to Madison, Wisconsin.

While picking corn in a field a few rods southwest of the Spearfish limits, Lewis D. Smith, found a small cannon ball a few days ago. It is thought that the ball was one carried by the ill-fated Custer Expedition that passed through there, as they had the old-fashioned muzzle loading cannons small enough to carry on the backs of pack horses. The little ball is slightly over a 1½” in diameter and considering the number of years it has been in the ground, isn’t badly rusted.

Oct. 26, 1939

Lawrence Licking of Mullen, Nebraska trucked a horse from Castle Rock community to his home the past week. Mr. Licking will be remembered here as the government trapper of last summer. He made the announcement that he and Mrs. Licking were the parents of a fine baby boy, born 2 weeks ago.

Hans Rasmussen, Vale was re-elected commander of the Seth Bullock Camp No 1, Spanish-American aWar Veterans, when the group met with 8 of the 16 members present. Edward Lease, Rapid City was named

Senior Vice-Commander and F.C. Fuller was re-named Adjutant. Other members present were Ed. Moon and O. R. Badge, Spearfish; H. M. Voorhees, Nisland; Frank Stillwell, Rapid City and Harry Babcock Whitewood.

Oct 22, 1959

Animal Control a Bittersweet Job

Residents are reminded to be responsible pet owners.

(BELLE FOURCHE) - Clint Haffner will never forget that day.

It was during a cold spell right after Christmas in early January of this year when the city’s animal control officer got a call about a small abandoned puppy on the city’s northeast side, shivering under a bridge.

He immediately got into his vehicle from the Police Station and drove to the other side of Herrmann Park to the railroad viaduct on 10th Street. He spotted the 3-month old Labrador mix huddled under the bridge beams, shaking. Approaching with care, he reached out and picked up the puppy without incident and took him back to the station.

“We brought him back and got him warmed up, got him something to eat and began to look after him,” Haffner said. “We named him Max and kept him here for a couple days.”

The next step would be to post a picture of Max on the city’s animal control Facebook page to try and find his owners. After three days Max went unclaimed and now it was time to find him a home.

“We all wanted to fight to keep him but we knew that we probably wouldn’t be able to,” he said. “And after a number of days we started to look at adopting him out and found a really good owner. Part of me is like, I know that he’s going to a really good home, and the other part is sad because we all wanted o keep him.”

Whenever Haffner is on the south side of town he drives past Max’s new home, hoping to catch a glimpse.

“I see him inside the fence in his backyard, running around with his adopted family and it’s a good feeling,” he says. “And then I see dogs over hereon the other side of town that we’ve adopted out in the park walking with their new owners, and that also makes you feel really good,” he said.

But there are some days that aren’t so good. Like the case of the Border Collie named Paisley.

Paisley was a rescue dog who got along very well with its owners and family. But Haffner was called to investigate a biting incident involving Paisley and a mail carrier earlier this year.

“That was a tough time,” Haffner said. “After the first biting incident we do interviews, try to find out what happened and then educate the dog owners to try to keep preventative measures to take it from happening a second time.”

Prevention mostly involves keeping backyard fences in tact, gates closed or even keeping the dog on a lease while outside. But some dogs are

smart enough to find a way out. And Paisley was investigated for a second biting incident in May that led to a vicious dog citation.

“The second one gets a lot more serious,” Haffner said. “And the tension was a lot higher and emotions certainly were running high.”

The case was brought before the city council for a ruling last May and the council’s decision was that the dog had to either be put down or relocated out of town. Eventually Paisley was relocated out of the city limits.

“I remember how tough that was on everyone,” said t Reeves City Dispatch Officer. “Clint tried to have concern for the animal and its owners. There will be emotion and the flip side you have to make sure the general public is not being put at risk because of your feelings toward the animal or the pet owners.”

Fortunately most animal incidents have a happy ending. When the city of Belle Fourche first decided to add a Code Enforcement Officer position the number of at-large animals in the city was causing a strain on police department resources.

“We never had an animal control officer before (2016),” Reeves said. “There were times when we’d get 5-10 calls a day for animals at large and it taking away so much of the time from our police officer’s work. So having Clint here has allowed our officers to focus on the bigger problems.”

Haffner says the situation is much better today than it was four years ago but there is still room for improvement. Today the Code Enforcement office puts on a spring clinic each April where for \$6 residents can get their pets vaccinated for rabies and can get free license tags for their dog’s collar. It’s not uncommon for 500 residents to take advantage of the service each year. And Haffner’s team leads education sessions in the elementary schools each October.

“Eight years ago the number of residents who had licenses for their dogs was just a fraction of what it is now,” she says.

Haffner reminds residents to make sure their pets are under control and that your dog has a proper tag. Also know if your pet has a 1 year or 2 year rabies vaccination. Also, it is important to rely on dispatch when you see an animal at large

or even a pet who’s lease is tangled in a bush and they can’t get to their food or water.

“Sometimes that happens while an owner is away at work,” Haffner says. “We will respond right away and do our best to resolve the situation and let the pet owners know that they may need to relocate a dog dish.”

Haffner says it really takes a team effort to make it work. He credits the help from Reeves and the dispatch office, the police department, Belle Fourche Veterinary Clinic and the Who Let the Dog’s Out animal shelter, with whom the city contracts for animal impoundment.

“It’s a huge team effort,” he says. “There are a lot of people in this town who really care a lot about animals and together we have had many successful outcomes I would say.”

For example, the city employee who found a litter of 5-day old kittens abandoned in a box in the landfill. After calling dispatch the kittens were sent out to foster care with a local rancher who bottle fed them until they were old enough to be adopted. And today, most of them have found new homes.

Or the case of the silver tabby Jade.

A resident on the north side of town heard a faint meowing sound coming from somewhere in the front yard. It was a very cold May evening with heavy rain coming down. The resident found a small month old kitten hobbling around on three legs, with its back right leg dragging along. She immediately brought the kitten to the police station.

“It was shivering and very malnourished. I thought perhaps her leg was broken as if someone had thrown it out of a moving car,” Haffner said. “We warmed her up and got her something to eat. We took it to the vet who said the kitten had nerve damage to her leg and chances for it to recover were low.”

The veterinarian said the cat might require surgery costing up to \$3,000 in order to have a chance at normalcy. Since the kitten had no responsible owner, that option was not available. Haffner fashioned a split for the kitten and set out to find foster care for her.


“I think that splint was about 3 inches longer than her leg and she would drag it behind her but she seemed very friendly,” Haffner said.

Eventually a foster owner took her home and the kitten did get complete use of its leg back without surgery. Her new owners adopted the feline, naming her Jade and introducing her to an older male cat named Abe. The two have become fast friends.

Being an animal control officer means you must deal with more than cats and dogs. Haffner has trapped and removed 84 skunks from town in the past 2 years.

“I know there were some days when I smelled really bad, but getting skunks out of town makes it safer for residents and pet owners,” he said.

And sometimes the stories
