City Approves Plan to Hire School **Resource Officer**

BELLE FOURCHE - The Belle Fourche School District will now have a full-time police officer on campus beginning after the first of the year. The city council unanimously approved the creation of the position within the Belle Fourche Police Department, known as a School Resource Officer (SRO), which will operate under a contractual agreement between the city of Belle Fourche and the school district beginning January 1st.

The SRO will spend most of their time rotating between the high school and middle school campuses and also spend time at the elementary schools. The primary role will be safety and security on campus but the position will also involve a role in classroom education, teaching students the dangers of alcohol, tobacco and drug abuse.

"If he or she does the job right, they will be the most popular officer in the city of Belle Fourche," Police Chief Marlyn Pomrenke told the Beacon. "Their top priority will be the security of the schools but I also want them to work on community education. We're also looking at D.A.R.E. as well as ABC.'

Pomrenke says the SRO will also work with the school district on truancy issues and he says the department will probably see an increase with service calls for the school. Part of that increase, he says, will come with an expected increase in child abuse cases and more sexual assault cases, not because of an increase in crime but an increase in the discovery of existing situations. The SRO will be trained to see the signs of abuse as the child brings these issues from home to the schools.

Albany Farms Relocates HQ to Belle Fourche

BELLE FOURCHE - Albany Farms has chosen to move the headquarters of its food manufacturing operations from Los Angeles to Belle Fourche, S.D., with the goal of beginning production of their signature line of ramen noodle product later this year. According to Bill Saller, President and CEO, the operation will initially employ up to 60 workers with expansion plans to be phased in over the next four years that will greatly increase production and bring more than 500 hundred

"This is an exciting time for Belle Fourche and an exciting time for our community moving forward," said Renae Shaffer, President of the Belle Fourche **Economic Development** (BFED) Board of Directors. "What is most impressive about this company is how it works with our roots in agriculture. It's the type of business that is perfect for our community."

Hollie Stalder, BFED Executive Director, said their organization along with the Governor's Office of Economic Development (GOED) has been working on this for the past 10 months and it finally came together. "Belle Fourche was perfectly positioned for this project," she said. "We have the transportation network in place with the trucking in our region, the rail that serves our community, and the industrial park which was ready and presented the perfect opportunity for them."

Saller told the Beacon there were two factors that prompted his company to make the complex decision to relocate from the west coast. The first was

Road Concerns Top the County Commission List

BELLE FOURCHE-The **Butte County Commissioners** were faced with discontented residents of the county as concerns for road noise and unnavigable gravel roads were brought to their attention during the regular monthly meeting.

Belle Fourche residents Lon Dale and Dennis Mullins explained to the commissioners that the road noise from Croell Redimix was disrupting their area. The families live near the junction of Ziebach and Helmer Road. Their major complaints were road noise from the heavy truck hauling and the dust caused by the trucks.

"We do appreciate the mag water," said Mullins. But it's still not enough to cut all the dust.

Although the gentlemen had

met with representatives from Croell, the company had not attempted to change hauling methods. Trucking begins in the early mornings before 7 a.m. and go late into the evening around 9 p.m. According to Mullins and Dale, this disrupts the day and makes it difficult for family members.

'We have a problem and something needs done about it," commented Dale.

Dale said that there just needs to be some respect from Croell and wants to see what the county will or can do to remedy the

The county commissioners had tried to establish zoning within the county, but according to Commissioner Kim Richards, the taxpayers were not in favor of zoning. He pointed out that the commission room had been filled several times in previous years whenever the subject was

approached.

Richards suggested the men seek the input of DENR. He said there could be ways to handle the situation through that agency.

Charles Reid was again on hand to discuss Reid Road. The road had been worked prior to recent moisture, but now was worse than it had been. Reid pointed out that he had understood that improving the road was "way down on the list" of county projects and he was asking to be put on a priority.

Richards assured him that County Highway Superintendent Duane Heidrich had plans. He stated that the Commission does not tell the superintendent which roads to do, but that Heidrich handles the day to day workings of the department.

Heidricks assured Reid that he

Pastor's Perspective Belle Fourche UCC & St. Onge UCC Faith Doesn't Come Through Destruction

"Then they demolished the pillar of Baal, and destroyed the temple of Baal, and made it a latrine to this day." [2 Kings 11:27]

Back in 2016, a group of archaeologists uncovered an altar in the Holy Land with raised corners used for sacrificial ceremonies. This particular altar was used to worship a Canaanite goddess. No big news flash there. But what was intriguing was that someone had cut a hole in the stone to turn it into a toilet! Putting a latrine at a holy site was considered to be sacrilege as it soiled a religious location, as you could imagine. This find, at Tel Lachish (southwest of Jerusalem), was the first time that an altar-turned-toilet had ever been found. (And no, tests show that it had never actually been used as

So who would have done something so vile? Chalk that one up to the good Judean King Hezekiah around the 8th century B.C..

So why did he destroy (and desecrate) so many religious shrines in Southern Israel?

To teach his people (they were all living in his country) that the God who sent the spring rains, the summer sun, and the autumn harvest was the Hebrew God—not some Canaanite goddess idol.

He thought that if they destroyed the idols and the places where idols were worshiped and sacrificed to, then folks would return to worshiping God. History shows that this purging of King Hezekiah was met by only limited success.



The take-away for us almost 3000 years later... destroying the property of others does not work as an evangelization technique. Faith doesn't come through destruction and defacing property. It doesn't come from leaving religious tracts where you know they are not welcome. Faith comes from human relationships uplifting one another, and sharing the vision of a better community for everyone. Faith is built by people growing together—for if we cannot love another, we cannot love God.

Note, that love in this context is not a "feeling" but something you do. How do you show love? Love without action is not love. Paul says in Ephesians 2:10, "For we are what [God] has made us, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand to be our way of life." Our way is showing love through good works. If we do this, faith will blossom, even in late October. Amen.





"From top to bottom, I appreciate all these seniors. It's been a tight knit group and lot of them came in with great numbers and they stuck it out," said Bronc Head Coach Scott Slotten. "They fought with everything they had and it wasn't quite enough. But they are going to be better men because of it.'

Spearfish took the opening kickoff and moved 47 yards in seven plays to take a 7-0 lead with just under 9:00 left in the first. Belle Fourche responded with a 7-play 66-yard drive powered by a 51-yard pass play from quarterback Nolan Wahlfeldt to senior Gabe Heck. Sophomore Kyren Nulle powered in standing up from 3-yards out for the score. The Newell transfer completed an impressive season in the purple and white. Anthony Staley's extra point tied the game at 7. Staley was perfect during the 2021 on all of his extra point attempts.

Each side traded possessions

in the second quarter with the Bronc defense stopping Spearfish on 4th down in the red zone. Late in the second Spearfish's Ian Rath blocked a Nulle punt and drove 31 yards in six plays for a score. The touchdown came on a 1-yard quarterback sneak on 4th down that was the final play of the half, it was 14-7 Spartans at the break.

After an early 3rd quarter unsuccessful fake punt by the Broncs the Spartans capitalized going 37-yards in four plays to take a 21-7 lead. Spearfish extended the lead to 28-7 after a 4th down 1-yard quarterback sneak for a score to make it 28-7 after three.

Belle Fourche mounted a comeback in the fourth quarter. Spearfish quarterback Jaden Guthmiller fumbled at the 48 and the Bronc's Jayden Sechser picked it up and returned it to the 13-yard line. Three plays later Wahlfeldt took it in from 3 yards out and it was 28-14 with

11:30 left in the game. Sechser came to the fore on the Spartans next drive as he intercepted a 4th-down pass from Guthmiller to set the Broncs up on their own ten yard line. Belle Fourche then put together a 90yard drive in 11 plays to score. Wahlfeldt hit Gabe Heck on a 12-yard pass over the middle for the score to make it 28-21 with 4:48 to go in the game, and that's where the scoring ended.

The Broncs finish with three wins as they did last year. Eleven seniors were honored before the game: #78 center Riley Newman, #77 tackle Sean Wahlfeldt, receiver #12 Dalton Davis, lineman #79 Ryan Evans, tight end/linebacker #22 Aidan McCarty, lineman #74 Brooks Clooten, center #62 Cade Bikerdyke, lineman #52 Dagan Burns, fullback/ linebacker #89 Devin Burns, receiver/ linebacker #33 Gabe Heck and receiver/ defensive back #7 Ryker Audiss.

Slotten paid special recognition to his team captains in his post-game comments; Dalton Davis, Aiden McCarty, Gabe Heck and Brooks Clooten. "I can't thank those captains and those seniors enough," Slotten said. "I picked those guys for a reason. Gabe Heck, we've talked about all season. He's that dude, and still is, and did everything we've asked him to all season. Dalton didn't start football until he was junior and look what he's done. Aiden, a Spearfish transfer, he meshes with all our boys right away. Whatever the team needs he tells me he can do it. Brooks came back from a serious knee injury and no one knows the hard work he's done to get that knee back to full strength. It's not the way you want to end the season, but at least we ended up fin a fight. They gave everything they had.'



had placed finishing Reid Road was near the top of his list and as the weather allowed the road would be in better shape soon.

Fred Wells, representing Butte County Local Emergency Planning Committee, presented the commissioners with the latest Hazardous Material Plan he had developed for the county for their approval.

The HAZMAT plan consists of five parts that include information on the LEPC, Butte County Commission, and County Government, a list of all hazardous reporting facilities, a list of facilities by location, a list off resources and protocols, and a comprehensive analysis of Hazardous Material Incidents in Butte County from 2009 until

The plan not only lists the facilities but includes photos and location maps with GPS coordinates. Site procedures and emergency plans comprise a narrative that firefighters and law enforcement can incorporate with their approach. The useful tool is located at all fire departments and law enforcement departments in Butte County.

State's Attorney Cassie Wendt informed the commissioners that she is working with 911 Coordinator Vicki Greenwood in setting up a budget spreadsheet to present to the commission. This would help both dispatch and commissioners to a better understanding in dispatch costs and which costs are constant and which costs

They are also working on the annual dispatch contract with the city of Belle Fourche. Wendt asked the commissioners if it should be a one, three, or five-year contract. The present contract is up at the end of this

With the future of dispatch still undecided, Wendt thought it would be best to put together a contract that would be ready to go with Belle Fourche and was leaning toward a three-year contract.

"I think we would want a one-year contract until we know where we are going" with future plans for dispatch said Commissioner Frank Walton. It has been discussed that Butte County Dispatch may merge with Meade County Dispatch, but no concrete plans have been finalized.

"If we are entering into an agreement with the City, we need to do it as soon as possible," said Wendt.

Several Right of Ways were granted by commissioners including Ollila Road and R Ranch Land, LLC. Work is progressing on Riley Bridge with new culverts coming the first of November.

Following discussion and with Commissioner James Ager posing the only dissenting vote, Lisa Nelson and Jerry Nelson were placed as authorized signers to the county bank accounts with the removal of Auditor Elaine Jensen. Jensen is leaving her position effective November 5, 2021.

There will be a special commission meeting Monday, October 25 at 1:30 p.m. for the second reading of the Amended Ordinance to Regulate Medical Marijuana. The next regular **Butte County Commission** meeting will be held November 2, 2021 at 9 a.m.

I have been looking at trucks to be used as both primary transportation

Dear Motor Medics,

and for pulling a camper in the summer. I have a half ton gas powered truck now that is used for about 20,000 miles per year but after upgrading my camper to a larger size this past summer, I don't feel it is safe to use as a pull truck any longer. I am a Ford guy and want to go with a diesel truck in a 3/4 or 1-ton model 4x4 but hear that most of the trucks in my price range are equipped with a 6.0 engine and that they have some inherent problems. What kind of things go wrong with the engine and what can be done to fix them? I may be willing to buy one and make the repairs.

Thanks, Darrin in White Plains NY

Dear Darrin,

It is smart of you to think safety. You should never pull with a truck that is too small for the job or safety will be compromised. The issues we see with the 6.0 are usually the egr cooler and the engine oil cooler. There are some strong aftermarket parts available to update the engine and once done we have seen greatly improved strength and no repeat failures so far. There are some great deals to be had on the 6.0 and if you find one budget for the upgrades to help prevent major future breakdowns.

Dear Motor Medics,

My car is dying. I have been told that it is unsafe to drive due to rust but on the outside, it looks fine. I have a 2000 Grand Prix and they have shown me major rust in the rocker panel area that is covered up by the plastic ground effects. The rocker is gone but it doesn't seem to be supporting anything. I want to drive the car for a few more years but they tell me the rust has severely compromised the structural integrity and the main support structure is weakening so it will be very unsafe in a collision. Are there any repairs that I can make to help get it by for a couple years until I'm ready for a new car?

Dear Mark. I own one of these cars and I am in your exact situation now. The rockers were a concern a few years ago and I suspect yours were too. I'm afraid our few years have passed and with structural safety compromised the safest thing for us is to replace the car. Once rust has become this bad the cost to repair it usually exceeds the economic value of the vehicle and replacement is a better choice. Daily driving may get us around but if a collision should occur our lives could be at risk, with rust there really is no temporary structural strengthening you can do to get by.

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City Collects Record September Sales Tax

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BELLE FOURCHE - City sales tax figures continue to reflect strong economic activity in the community for 2021, but some say the numbers may not last past this year.

According to city finance office figures a September monthly record \$423,633.95 was collected. That was the best September on record by far and follows a record collection of more than half a million dollars taken in during July, an all-time high monthly total.

The yearly total through nine months shows \$2.846.870.42 in sales taxes collected. With fourth quarter figures yet to come in, that total surpasses the yearly total in 2016, 2017 and matches the 2018 annual figure. With a monthly average in 2021 of \$316,318 the city is on pace

to set a record for sales tax collection if the trend continues. The holiday season is coming up and October and November are strong retail months, however supply chain issues could be a drag on economic activity.

The September total is 57% ahead of last year and set a September monthly all-time record by more than \$144,000. Year-to-date collection is 19% ahead of last year. Third penny sales tax also

set a September record at

\$32,363.19 and is the second-highest monthly total on record. July 2021 set the bar with \$36.842.70 added to city coffers. Third penny tax generally reflects tourism and visitor/ resident activity as the tax is collected on hotel stays, alcohol and dining. The September figure was a whopping 73% higher than last year's pandemic

affected number and collections are running 30% ahead of last year. With the fourth quarter yet to go the third penny collections are also expected to reflect record-levels as the 2021 yearly total matches 2017's yearly total and is just \$11,000 short of 2019's high-water mark.

As the city is in the midst of budget planning right now Breanna Schaefer, Finance Officer, cautions that the trend may not continue, in light of all the pandemic-related stimulus spending among residents and local government entities.

"One thing I keep trying to emind people is that we've had a lot of stimulus funding, people have had cabin fever, those factors ramped things up quite a bit," she said. "It's great while we've got it for sure, but I don't know if we'll be able to sustain those numbers after this year."

BF School Board Receives Silver Level Award

news@bellefourchebeacon.comBELLE FOURCHE - Members of the Belle Fourche School Board used the 2020-21 school year to enhance their knowledge of school board work and earned recognition for their dedication.

The board earned a Silver Level award for their participation in the Associated School Boards of South Dakota's (ASBSD) board recognition program ALL, which stands for Act, Learn, Lead. The award honors the school boards who are dedicated to service to the students of South Dakota. Belle Fourche was one of only four west river school boards to earn silver recognition.

"We wouldn't be able to do it with just one of us, it's an all-out effort of all of us put together," said Tammy Clem, School Board President.

The ASBSD Board Recognition Program is designed to recognize school boards for their dedicated and ethical service to the students of South Dakota. The program recognizes board members' participation in outside activities, board development and training, and demonstrated leadership at various areas and levels.

"We're pleased to be able to recognize the Belle Fourche School Board for their efforts going above and beyond to enhance their knowledge of school board work," ASBSD Executive Director Dr. Wade Pogany said.

officer. Any potential victim will be more inclined to talk to an officer they get to know," Pomrenke said. "When they see the officer there every day with them on the playground, helping them through fire drills and lock down drills, they're going to get to know that officer. It can be scary for a child to talk to a police officer for the first time, especially one they don't know."

The challenge will be starting the program in mid-year, according to Pomrenke. He says that the schools already have education program curriculum established for the year and while they will work with the education component, he expects the SRO will establish themselves with the emphasis on security, crime suppression and dealing with drug issues.

Last February the Belle Fourche High School Youth Leadership Team (YLT) presented to the school board programs on which they had been working. In one of those programs the students identified the need for a School Resource Officer due to several issues including the use of marijuana at the high school campus, particularly in the school parking lot during the lunch hour. An police office on campus, YLT said, could at best prevent or at the least deter the illegal underage use of the drug.

"The students within the high school requested this so it is really going to be supported by the children," said Dr. Steve Willard, Belle Fourche Superintendent.

The school board and school administration advanced the idea as COVID funding became available. The district will pay for 9-months of the SRO's salary while the city will pay the other three months during the summer. In the summer months the SRO will assist the Belle Fourche Police Department with investigative and other work. The SRO position is funded through May of 2024 when the pandemic money runs out. After that it will be up to the district and the city to determine if the position is worth maintaining.

"I think a lot of that will depend on how well the officer does and much the school values them," Pomrenke said.

The police department will provide the vehicle and equipment that the SRO needs to perform his or her duties. Pomrenke says they will be looking to promote from within for the SRO position and the council also agreed to fund an additional police officer to take the place of the SRO.

Among the duties outlined in the job description is the provision that the SRO coordinate law enforcement coverage for extracurricular activities, provide a presence that sends a strong message that violence and negative behaviors are not acceptable, meet regularly with school officials, serve as a primary responder to school-related calls for service and investigations, and perform general police department work duties.

early November," Saller said.
"If all the machinery arrives
and our engineering team gets
it up and running we're hoping
to be packaging at the end of
November."

Saller says there will be additional machinery to create another production line that should go online in January with the goal of being in full production mode by late March or early April 2022. By then Saller says they will need 150 employees, from machine operators to assemblers to plant managers, engineers, and human resource personnel.

"These are all new jobs, fresh jobs," Saller said. "We feel confident that we can find enough folks to fill those positions."

Stalder is confident that the local workforce has the skills that Albany Farms will be looking for. "I think of how diverse our people are here because they have agricultureal backgrounds," Stalder said. "They know how to operate equipment and have more multifunctional skill sets."

Albany Farms began developing its ramen product five years ago and began selling it under the "Signature Panda" branding in major retail outlets such as Wal Mart in 2019. To date the company has moved more than 50-million packages during the pandemic. It is a stable and nearly recession-proof product and Saller sees the demand growing every year.

"Ramen is quick, cheap and it's there when you need it," he said. "Global sales are now at \$30 billion dollars and that is expected to grow to \$70 billion in 5-to-6 years."

Saller says they have customers waiting right now for their

US made product. And Albany Farms plans to keep up with the rising demand by expanding the new Belle Fourche facility in phases over the next four years. The next step will be adding a 100,000 square foot addition onto the existing building to increase production. After that Saller says they will build 150,000 square feet of new construction for another plant on 23 adjacent acres they have purchased from BFED. That move will allow them to expand into other food product lines such as boxed macaroni and cheese. By that time manufacturing will have grown from 600 ramen packages produced per minute to a minimum of 3,000 per minute.

"Ultimately the plan is for the Belle Fourche facility is to be one of, if not the largest ramen producing facilities in the country," Saller said.

The Belle Fourche made product will be sold under the brand name Twisted Noodle and will be distributed nationwide. The package labeling will include text which says the product was made in Belle Fourche, SD.

"We're going to be very proud of that," Saller said. "Normally when we import we make that font (type) as small as possible. Now that we're here, in the Center of the Nation, it's going to be a very prominent font I can assure you."

Saller says they plan to use wheat grown in South Dakota for production from day one. "There's a fiscal reason for that in addition to doing the right thing for the local community. Flour locally sourced in the U.S. is much cheaper than what we're currently importing, which is about 35% more. It's better fiscally but also provides business for our neighbors."

Saller also adds that they want to locally source as much as they can including corrugated packaging, films, oils, and protein sources.

By June of 2024 Albany plans to construct a flour mill at the Industrial Park which will produce not only wheat for production but packaged consumer wheat under the Albany Farms brand. By-products of the milling process will be used to provide some electrical power generation for the plant and local feed for ranchers. At that point Albany expects to employ between 800 and 900 workers.

"It (the expansion) is contingent on our partnerships at the state level and the federal level," Saller said, "because the amount of investment will be very significant to get to this point."

Saller expects that up to \$40 million will be required to fulfill that vision.

As Albany Farms grows its footprint in Belle Fourche, BFED knows that the community will need to be prepared for the challenges that will accompany that potential growth. Those challenges include workforce recruitment and training and housing.

"That's why it is going to be important to have the support from the Governor's Office of Economic Development and it will be critical to moving forward," Stalder said. "The state has some great programs for training and they've indicated they will assist with that. And it (Albany Farms) was a driving force behind our recent housing study and making sure that it doesn't just sit on the shelf and gets put to work."

"Your community has two choices, either it moves forward or it dies," said Shaffer. "We don't want to be the latter."

It is an assured fact that something definite will be given out in regard to the "Pierce deal" in a very short time and it is generally believed that it will be the news of the final consummation of the deal. At the present time the head men in the big deal say nothing in regard to the matter,

100 years ago Belle Fourche Northwest Daily October 27, 1921 Lead Catholic Priest Murdered: Father Belknap Victim of an Assassin At An Early Hour

Wednesday Morning Father A. B. Belknap of Lead, one of the best know Catholic priests in the Black Hills, was murdered near Poorman's Gulch in Lead early Wednesday morning. The Priest's lifeless body was discovered shortly after daylight Wednesday morning. A wound on his head, apparently from some blunt instrument, indicates that Father Belknap had first been struck down and then shot with a revolver. He was shot in the right side of his breast, the bullet passing through the heart. The greatest excitement prevails in Lead and up to the hour of going to press had made no arrests in connection with the murder. A coroner's inquest will be held at once, and it is likely some clue may develop at that time. That the murder was premeditated is indicated by the fact that Father Belknap was

called on the phone at his home at three o'clock Wednesday morning to visit a sick member of his church. It was while answering this summons that he was stricken down by the assassin.

Father Belknap was very well known in Belle Fourche and throughout the Black Hills. He was the priest in charge of St. Paul's church in Belle Fourche and the Catholic church at Spearfish prior to Father Donnelly's arrival here, when Father Belknap was given the pastorate at Lead, locating in that city about two years ago. The murdered priest was aged about thirty-one years, was a man of splendid physique and always very popular with his congregation and with anyone with whom he was acquainted, being of a genial and pleasant disposition. At this time there is no known motive for the crime.

Work To Start Next Monday Dobson Construction Company To Have Two Big Ditching Machines Here on Ditch Work

The Dobson Construction Company of Lincoln, Neb., the firm securing the contract for installing the new \$150,000 water works system for Belle Fourche, expects to begin active work on the contacts next Monday morning. Two big ditching machines, similar to the one used in putting in the sewer system here several years ago, will do the excavating for the pipe line leading from the springs to the reservoir on Sundance Hill, and with any kind of favorable weather that part of the work will be completed in a few weeks. The ditching machines have already been shipped and will probably arrive in this city the latter part of the week. There will be no delay in securing the iron and wood pipe, as most of this material has already been loaded for shipment. Both ditching machines will be operated from the springs and work towards this city and the pipe will be laid and covered as the work proceeds. The Dobson company will have a sufficient force of men to rush the construction work to an early completion, and for the first time Belle Fourche will then have an abundance of the best water in the land for all purposes.



When I visit and think about small and medium sized local communities, I am reminded of the famous line used many times in the movie series, The Hunger Games, that goes, "May the odds be ever in your favor". The publisher of the newspaper in Keene understands the power of the media working together with their community to make things happen. They have developed a concept that has come to be known as "Radically Local' that resonates throughout the area. In fact, it resonates so well, they have built an entire conference around that theme which draws hundreds of people wanting to learn about being radically local. This is a great example of the media and the community working together to build a greater community



while educating the community and others to the value of being truly local for the entire community to grow and thrive, not merely accept survival. The other example

I would like to point out occurred in the mid-sized community of Canton, Ohio. Canton is the home of the Pro Football Hall of Fame. One might ask, how did the football HOF end up in the community of Canton when there are hundreds of larger communities close to NFL cities that might make more sense? The reason is very simple, the leaders of Canton had a vision, or better put, a dream. They wanted to be the city where the HOF was placed and set about in working toward that dream. The leaders worked with the community media company 24/7 to promote, envision and expect success. It was the tireless efforts of the entire community that finally turned these dreams into realities. Those realities today bring tens of millions of dollars to Canton that otherwise may have never been realized without the visions and dreams of a few willing to dream big and not settle for small.

While I point out these two examples, I am sure there are many more like them scattered across our great country. With that said, I can also confidently say one thing. Many communi-



sioners to address the issue for residents. Mayor Ken Wetz directed Finance Officer Jennifer Parrow to follow up with a phone call to the sheriff. The commissioners had no other comments.

It was noted that there are signs that state "U Turn At Intersection Only" and are posted in several prominent places. These signs are not suggestions, but are to be enforced. Larry Parker on behalf of the Newell Fire Department reported that several runs had been made to county residents with controlled burns that had not been called into Dispatch. These controlled burns, if not called into Dispatch, may begin being fined by the county.

Mayor Wetz pointed out that it is a county issue, not city. However, because it is the Newell Fire Department, it should be brought to everyone's

If you plan on doing a controlled burn call Dispatch at 605-892-2737. They will be able to pass the information to local fire departments.

Following discussion concerning changing zoning of Block 95 Lots 1,2,3, and 4 from General Industrial to Ag-residential, the commissioners voted approve the change. Commissioner Allen Youngberg had questioned whether a zoning commission was needed to approve any changes. However, according to South Dakota Codified Law, a city commission can approve or disapprove

zoning. This zoning also includes the Kjellsen residence.

A temporary building permit was granted to Dakota Myers and Donald Jones to establish a tiny house until improvements on the land they had purchased and a custom house could be built at 601 E. 6th St. They informed the commission that they thought a home could be built within a year.

The Newell Library has suffered major water damage due to the recent storm. The roof has been repaired, but inside work still must be finished.

The front of the library is also in need of repairs since recent work has not been finished. An emergency was declared to fix the front of the building allowing for local contractor Brandon Norman to proceed with the job.

There was damage done sometime after the annual homecoming painting of Third Street to some local vehicles. Commissioner Lori Olson reported that she discovered bright pink paint on her car after she had driven through the area painted by Newell students. She noted that there were other people with paint on their vehicles. The paint will not come off her car. 

Bonnet, and everyone who has pitched in to give her rides or bring a meal.


Although she is back to work, her days are still limited as she heals from her injuries.

The new machine is of the latest type, which will insure perfection of that part of the performances. Frank says that considerable more time had been required in preparation for the opening that was at first anticipated, but the opening date has now been defienlty set for next Wednesday night.

Caleb and his family were there too, so we got to visit with that

October 26, 1961 Book No 6 of a set of World Book Encyclopedia is reported missing from the Newell Elementary School and school

authorities are asking students and parents to check for same. Supt Kenneth Hauge believes the book may have been borrowed by someone who forgot to return it, so asks that it be returned immediately.

Two cows found dead on a Newell ranch during the antelope season died of natural causes, not gunshot wounds. This was the report of Dr. Gene Wheeler, Sturgis veterinarian, who performed a post mortem on the animals following a complaint made to the Department of Game, Fish & Parks by the cattle owner. Dr. Wheeler said both cows died in their tracks, examination showed no signs of bullet holes. Death was caused by poisoning of some kind. Some common causes of all livestock poisoning include prussic acid poisoning from

chokecherry trees following frost; arsenic poisoning from old grasshopper bait; malignant edema; hemorrhagic septicemia and so forth.

Nearly \$600 in fines were paid by the Suhr Transport Co of Glendive, Mont following arrest of drivers for South Dakota trucking regulation violations. The trucks, engaged in moving oil drilling machinery from Camp Crook over to Enning were stopped in the Arpan area by the Motor Patrol after having traveled across Indian Creek, the truck weighed 35 ton crossed the North Canal bridge posted for 8 ton and another bridge with a 10-ton load limit. Also fined on no license plate, compensation plates and operating overweight. Jail sentences were suspended upon payment of fines and costs.


Taylor Gaer got some nice returns from the back line during Friday night's match with Timber Lake. -Brunner photo

On Site Auto Detailing Comes to You

SPEARFISH - Technically, Karl Berger and his "Karl's Custom Detail Mobil Cleaning" service, is located in Spearfish. But this man, who has become his own boss in recent months, brings the service to his customers. Berger got his training on the job and worked for a period of time at Queen City Motors under the supervisor of car detailing there.

"Dave (supervisor at Queen City) showed my how to clean a car from the inside out," said Berger. "Each individual vehicle can take anywhere from five to eight hours depending on if the person wants the outside cleaned and how deep they want the job done.'

Berger currently lives in Spearfish, but was born in south Texas. He came to the Black Hills in 1982 with his mother and cousins, and attended grade school in Nisland and high school in Newell through the middle of his junior year, then transferring to Spearfish and graduating in 1991.

"I spent a while in Texas, but felt God calling me back home (Black Hills area)," Berger shared. He worked at several different jobs over the years, including concrete, where he worked in Denver helping to build the runways at the Denver International Airport. He was also a manager for two different car washes during his six years in Colorado. One day as he was cleaning out a car trash can he found a crucifix. He rescued the icon from being tossed.

"Jesus has been riding with me ever since," said Berger. "He guides me where He wants me to me and doing what He wants me to do."

Following his time in Denver a fellow student friend from Spearfish, Chad Wiseback, who is a successful businessman.

This is his first season doing the custom vehicle detailing. He is looking for a spot that either has a shop that can be heated or some place to construct a shop where he could work year-round. Currently his jobs depend on the weather being appropriate for an outside detailing job.

He recently traveled to the Newell area where he spent about five hours cleaning the inside of a Cadillac. It turned out great, and he was able to remove long-standing stains. His process is simple, first vacuuming, then doing the cleaning of doors, gaskets and inside console area. He uses a specialized professional "Tornador" steamer to loosen all dirt and grime for this process. He then moves to the carpeting and seats using an Extractor that is the same as the dealerships use.

This extractor has a 400-watt heater that puts up 210-degree water, and Berger uses a detergent called Genesis Gold which is a professional grade cleaner.

He will do the outside of a car, but that would be an extra charge if it falls outside the 8-hour minimum time frame for his basic fee. He wants to make sure he gives quality service on every job so there's a question-and-answer period where he determines the customers desires.


"I'm a custom guy, not fast paced," said Berger. "I like to make sure the job is done well." Berger is looking at future expansion, hiring other employ-

"I'm hoping to get blessed with a shop," he said. "Then I could do both mobile and at a shop."

He said he doesn't do much out of work hours.

"There's too many cars to do," he laughed. "I just concentrate on doing a quality job with quality equipment. I'm not scared of what the future holds. If we scared to fail, we're not trusting the Lord."
