2023 City Tax Levy to be Lowered \$100,000

2nd Ward Councilperson Clark Sowers requested that \$100,000.00 be removed from the currently certified 2023 Tax

Many Councilmembers voiced concern of where the budget could be cut to accommodate for a substantial decrease of this amount.

With most of the Council agreeing to proceed with the reduction in the Tax Levy, Finance Officer Jason LaFayette was given the directive to remove \$100,000.00 from the current levy request and adjust the budget to accommodate the change.

The council will reconvene in Regular Session on Monday, November 7, 2023, for the first reading of Ordinance 12-2022 -2023 Appropriations.



Confusing Ballot Initiatives? Not so this Year

Now less than a week away, the 2022 midterm election promises to be spirited, competitive, and engaging. Some contentious battles among candidates will take place and decisions will be made regarding two hotly debated initiated measures in our state.

Here are a few things voters can expect on the Butte County

Initiated Measure 27 proposes the legalization of possession, use and distribution of marijuana. Constitutional Amendment D proposes expanding Medicaid eligibility in South Dakota.

In some past elections voters have been critical of wording that confuses the issues thus

making it difficult to know whether you are voting for or against a measure. That is not the case on the 2022 Butte County Ballot. Both Initiated Measure 27 and Constitutional Amendment D are well worded. The Attorney General's explanation clearly explains what changes are being proposed and what the fiscal outcomes might look like.

There's some serious competition among high energy, candidates and passionate candidates. And there are third party candidates. May the best candidates win, and may the voices of the people be heard. Butte County Sample Ballot on page A8.

Proposed Ordinance Includes 15% City Employee Pay Raise

news@bellefourchebeacon.com BELLE FOURCHE - Most city hall watchers would agree that this year's city budget process has gone much better than the last few with nearly a dozen City Council budget work sessions, special council meetings and copious amount of input from citizens. With a fresh start on city finances, following an extensive audit of the city's books, the process has involved the normal debate regarding appropriations and decisions on expenditures and allocations. But one issue, finally on the path to being resolved, has proved sticky; how to best go about giving raises for city employees.

To their credit, this council took on the issue that most agree was long overdue and has held up this year's budget process until recently. Last Wednesday the council set the date for the first reading of Ordinance 12-2022-2023 which would provide a 15% across the board increase in city employee salaries, effective Jan. 1, 2023, with a 5% merit-based increase effective July 1. The first reading will be held at the council's regular meeting on Monday night Nov. 7, at 6:00pm.

The original plan, proposed in late summer, included a 20% across the board increase. That was modified during Oct. 12 special session to be what is now referred to as the 15/5 plan.

"I think it is very important to get our wages to be more competitive to other municipalities and bring them up to a livable level and the 15/5 is a good compromise," said Heidi Parker, Ward 1 Councilmember.

During the Oct. 19 special session Councilmember Randy Sowers presented an alternate plan which he said addresses the large pay gap between the city's entry level employees and department heads.

With the 15% across the board increase employees who make more money will make a lot more. Employees making less money make a little more money. With the 15/5 across the board increase, most money is going to management."

Sowers provided the council with figures indicating the difference in allocation between department heads and rank-and-file employees. His figures showed that the city's 20 department heads would collectively make \$1.3 million more while the 80 other city employees would split \$2.3 million.

"I just don't think that's right," he said. "We've got to start closing the gap.'

Sowers pointed out that it's difficult to attract entry-level employees to city jobs because the starting salaries are so low. He proposed allocating more of the increase in salaries toward the bottom tier of employees and less toward the department

The discussion lasted about 90 minutes with input from several city employees in attendance. The reaction to the proposal was mixed with some mid-level city employees wanting clarification on how the tiered allocation would work. Sowers presented a copy of his plan to a city employee to see the details.

"Some get 10, some get 15 and some get 20," Sowers said. "You have to look at the position. In July, the 5% will be based on people. The January increase is based on position. And the across-the-board approach just makes the pay gap wider.'

Sowers said his plan was not perfect but was a step in the right direction, "because pretty soon the head's so heavy the body can't support it and this is about fixing the underlying issues.'

Ward 2 Councilmember Clark Sowers pointed out that in every council meeting they are looking to fill entry level positions, not department heads. "We're having trouble getting people hired on. This is an attempt to try and fix that," he

Ward 4 Councilmember Rebecca Larson, who proposed the 15/5 compromise, spoke in support of the plan which she, in agreement with councilmember R. Sowers, would be the first step in a two-year plan to fix the city's salary situation.

"The 15/5 was to give everybody the ability to hopefully make it through this next year with us and to be able to give us time to make a more educated look at the city's pay structure. We need to look at the situation closely." Larson said. "This is a two-year fix, yes. And next year was the year we can even it out. So let's really look into that. But we need to take an educated look with human resources and the department heads. Everybody needs (a raise) and everybody deserves it."

"I think Randy makes some good points, but this plan feels kind of rushed," Parker said. "I think the 15/5 is a godo compromise and we really need to stick with that.

The Oct. 19 meeting adjourned with councilmembers wishing to seek input form citizens and to study both plans

further. In the followup budget work session on Oct. 24, Ward 3 Councilmember Larry Schmaltz recommended a different approach to solving the city pay

issues. "We really can't go through a process of revamping our entire pay structure as part of our budget process. This should have been done prior to our budget process," Schmaltz said. "The correct way I would propose in the future is to establish a committee of HR, City Finance Director, department heads and two or three council members to develop a revised pay structure that is considered equitable across the board. That recommendation would follow the normal path through Legal and Finance and then the council. I think everyone here is in agreement that our employees are underpaid and we need to bring our entire city staff up to a competitive level and make logical adjustments using this new process."

Furthermore Schmaltz pointed out that the city might find itself involved in minor legal issues by singling out certain staff positions. "I'm not an attorney so I don't know that for certain," he said.

"The Grace to Be Wrong"

forever in Heaven.

I am becoming increasingly sensitive to the need for grace in believers which will allow them to be wrong.

Not to do wrong. But to be wrong.

There are far too few who simply acknowledge their own humanity when their own doings, calling, efforts, or sincere goals are called into question.

This past week I encountered three occasions where this grace was needed: at a gathering of men who were consulting together over a specific ministry to the Body of

And in a conversation over the radio, in which I was being interviewed on the subject of the believer and his willingness to acknowledge his failures; and in a private counseling session in which we discovered a man's preoccupation with his sense of God-given mission, to the point that he couldn't see the need for balance.

He was too taken with his sense of the importance of what he felt he was supposed to do.

Somehow, being right isn't as easy as one thinks. Our own sense of dimension on a matter is the key to balance, and the fact is that when something seems important or necessary to me, it tends to become ALL important... ABSO-LUTELY necessary. And the time for the answer to this important/



necessary matter is always NOW! Especially if God and His will are involved in the matter

ering a small but growing band of folks who are willing to trust the Lord to cover their imperfections whether it

be in timing, in understanding, or in sense of urgency. They are gaining the capacity to be wrong in their perspective, as right as they might be in their purpose. I find that grace was powerfully

present in the early Church. I hear the apostles and elders at Jerusalem say, concerning a decision that would reshape the Church's future, It seemed good (Acts 15:28). Before they invoke the ultimate of divine authority, they simply says, We thought a lot about it.

It seemed good to the Holy Spirit and to us. History confirms the decision they made, but I am most impressed by the non-authoritarian air with which the judgment was communicated.

Paul says twice in 1 Corinthians 7 that his counsel is offered as a concession, not as a commandment (v. 6); and that his directives concerning marriage and the single life were according to [his] judgment (v. 40). He does affirm that he believed him-

self to have the mind of the Holy Spirit on the subject, but again, the authority is exercised with wisdom. There is an apparent willingness to hearing others out on the subject.

I love Peter's capacity to not know as much as another brother, and still to love and trust that brother's words toward him. Second Peter 3:15,16 manifests a readiness to receive the gift of another's wisdom and expertise, without denying or having to hurriedly insist that you have received much already yourself.


Somehow, you and I experience a painful reluctance to utter the words, I don't know. Or, I may not be entirely right. Or, I need your balancing cunsel on this, my friend. It's hard for us to say these things and mean them with a truly teachable spirit.

Some matters, of course, are not negotiable. But my personal inclinations, however sure I might feel about them, must be kept available to modification within the circle of those who love me in Christ.

Such vulnerability is the only safety valve against the recurrent problems which rugged individualism has wrought in personal and family lives, in business and government matters, and in the Church of the Lord Jesus through-

out history. Let's keep hands joined in trust. Mine and yours may not be perfectly clean, but keeping hold will sure help us keep our balance.

Ultimately the council decided at the Oct. 24 session to put the 15/5 plan up for consideration in the city allocation ordinance. It must pass two readings to take effect. The proposal would call for the 15% pay raise across-the-board on Jan. 1 with a 5% merit-based bonus possible July1.

"And I will hold my department heads to make the decisions and do the evaluations," Mayor Randy Schmidt said.
"I don't expect the department

heads to just say 'yeah, I'm going to give everyone a 5% bonus.' That's not going to fly this year. It has to be truly a performance bonus."



"I don't know," replies the owner, "I've only had him for four years.".



Community Hall. Voter Rights and Responsibilities

Voters with disabilities may contact the county auditor at 605-892-4485 for information and special assistance in absentee voting or polling place accessibility.

Voters have other rights too. Any voter who can't mark a ballot because the voter has a physical disability or can't read may ask any person he or she chooses to help the voter vote. Any voter may ask for instruction in the proper procedure for voting. Any voter at the polling place prior to 7:00 p.m. is allowed to cast a ballot.

If your voting rights have been violated you may call the Butte County Auditor at 605-892-4485, the Secretary of State at 888-703-5328, or the Butte County State's Attorney at 605-892-3337.

There are some voter restrictions too. Any person who is convicted of a felony on or before July 1, 2012 loses the right to vote. However, any such person may register to vote following the completion of the person's felony sentence.

Any person who is convicted of a felony on or before June 30, 2012 and who receives a sentence of imprisonment to the adult penitentiary system including a suspended execution of sentence, loses the right

Any such person so sentence may register to vote following completion of the person's sentence. Further information available at www.sdsos.gov

Anyone who makes a false statement when voting, tries to vote knowing he or she is not a qualified voter, or tries to vote more than once has committed an election crime.

A test of the automatic tabulating equipment will be conducted on Nov. 3rd at 10 a.m. at the Butte County Auditor's office located at 117 5th Avenue in Butte County.

Plans and specifications will be open for inspection after October 14 at the Auditor's office in Belle Fourche. By order of County Commissioners S.W. P. Sellers, County Auditor.

> Two of the Robbers Captured Tuesday

Word has just been received by A. H. Marble, cashier of Butte Co. Bank that O'Day and Putney have been captured. Farther particulars show that these men were captured on Falsebottom and that they were nearly famished, having had nothing to eat since Sunday night.

They were taken to Deadwood where double precautions will be taken that they do not again escape. The Jones brothers were heard from at Crow Peak. They had stolen a couple of horses on Crow Creek and were headed towards Bear Lodge. No doubt exists now but that the prisoners were without aid from the outside as it has been shown that they had neither firearms nor horses, and the officers are confident that the Jones boys will soon be taken, as the stolen horses are poor ones and the officers are hot on the trail and are covering the entire country. No trace has yet been found of the negro Moses who was being held for the murder of Frank Staley.

100 years ago Northwest Post November 2, 1922 LOST IN THE WILDS OF **COLONY**

Mrs. Ray Warner and Miss Elizabeth Storey came out from Belle Fourche to the Big Bend in a Ford sedan on Friday to get Mrs. Joseph Dylia, who had been hired to work in the Club Café, in which Mrs. Warner's husband has a half interest. On the return trip in the evening they missed the road and got stuck, about three miles west of Colony, in the bottom on a draw which was muddy from the seepage from a reservoir. To add to their troubles they found they were out of gasoline. Mrs. Warner and Miss Storey started out to find help and after wandering around the wilds of Colony in the dark for a couple of hours they found a good Samaritan who had an abundance of gasoline and a car. Half an hour later the three ladies went on their way rejoicing in the Ford sedan, although two of them were mighty tired from their strenuous efforts in locating a habitation in Colony in the

night-time. RESENT THE INSULT

Two years ago, during the last few days of the campaign, the republican politicians flooded the country with sample ballots, marked with a cross in the

SOME DESTRUCTION RE-SULTS FROM HALLOWEEN PRANKSTERS IN CITY

There was some destruction, and a few windows were soaped, but generally Belle Fourche suffered little damage from pranksters on Halloween. Police Chief A. O. McCullough reported the bulk of the damage was the result of activities of one or two bands of boys who tore down fences in the south section of town, upset an outhouse or two and damaged a house trailer. Leslie and Sturis, livestock feed dealers, has a few bad moments Saturday morning when they discovered that 1400 sheep which had been segregated in four pens, were jammed into one pen by pranksters. 50 years ago Belle Fourche Daily Post November 3, 1972 It Was A Good Year, Broncs Leave Behind Impressive Statistics for 1972

Belle Fourche High School's Broncs have put away their football uniforms for another year, leaving behind an impressive set of statistics as well as the second consecutive Black Hills Conference Championship. The Broncs went undefeated for seven games, finally fell to Sheridan and Rapid City Central in the last two games. In the course of nine games the Bronc ran up 202 points while the opposition accounted for only 92. With the exception of the Sheridan game, which the Broncs lost 3-1, no team scored more than two touch-downs against Belle. The Broncs piled up 400 rushing plays for a new gain of 1695 yards. The opposition ran 311 plays for 1167 yards. For Belle, that averaged 4.34 yards per play. It was Phil Clarke's second year; he is assisted by Wally Kiewel and Jim Wallman. One other set of statistics should be mentioned those recorded by Dan McGinnis, the workhorse of the Bronc backfield. The durable Bronc tailback piled up 1197 yards rushing during the season. He carried the call 259 times for an average of 4.6 yards per carry



Successfully Navigate the Coming Digital Shift

this past week from a reader of my weekly column that made me think of this quote. Winston Churchill once said, "To improve is to change; to be perfect is to change often." The reader asked the most common questions I routinely receive. They asked, what are some of the strategies a small business can incorporate to compete in today's business

climate? Before I cover a few basic, proven, and inexpensive strategies small businesses can employ to better compete, let me provide some contextual landscape. Currently, the baby boomer generation and those even older are currently sitting on over half of the total wealth of our nation. As these older generations continue to dwindle in size, we will witness and experience the greatest transfer of wealth the world has ever seen. Not only will it be the largest, but it will also be the most revolutionary transfer of wealth. It will change and impact many of the traditional aspects of our current life. The younger generations, those that will be the beneficiary of this massive wealth transfer, think vastly differently than do their predecessors. They value experiences over material things. They value digital assets such as crypto over traditional stocks and bonds. Their work habits tend to vastly different. But above all, they have been raised practically solely in a digital

Loyalty brings about repeat business which is the holy grail of successful business survival. This is something local Chambers should be assisting with within their community.

Your reputation management and word of mouth marketing (think positive video reviews and plugs) are huge and so much more effective, powerful, and widespread when done digitally. I am constantly amazed at how many haven't a clue when

we discuss and train businesses on the need for this simple digital asset.

Most importantly, understand that data is king. I am also amazed at the number of businesses that have no idea who their customers really are. Yes, they know some of the old-timers and friends that wonder through their business, but they have no real clue about the others. You will be unable to effectively compete in the future without knowing who your customers are, what drives them and how to reach them on their terms. Obtaining data need not be expensive or difficult, but it is critical. Perfecting data allows for repeat business beyond your wildest dreams.

Lastly, your mobile strategy is critical. The ability to reach your customers or potential customers on their mobile phones is imperative. If you don't have a texting, newsletter, and a social media strategy, you will be unable to keep up with the change coming down the tracks. Notice, I didn't say "or", I said "and", all three of those will be essential in the future. The ability to reach them by texting, newsletters and social media will provide a businesses a huge advantage and are not difficult or expensive.





The Whistle Stop Continues

NEWELL - "The idea started as a project in Whitewood when caring for mom," said Patty Karas, the brainstorm behind the once-a-month vendor craft market in Newell. "It was a fundraiser for different organizations (when I lived) in Whitewood."

Now that Karas lives in Newell she saw the need for a fundraiser to keep the doors of the NVN Senior Center open. And this is it.

"I saw it (the center) was struggling and figured this would be a great way to help out," said this energetic senior. "The Whitewood Chamber puts it in their newsletter, as does the Belle Fourche Senior Center." Karas said it is nice to have other towns support each other.

The idea actually came from A&J's in Whitewood. They had trains there and a depot at one time. "Custer had planned to put a depot in from there to Deadwood with a stop in Whitewood. It's always been a train town and even the sign (at the entrance to town) has a train

So, along with help from Tina

Bertolotto and Judy Heisler, the trio built a ticket booth, similar to an old train depot, grabbed their stripped conductors' hats, sold tickets for door prizes, tossed in their train whistles, which they blow every quarter hour notifying another door prize drawing and away they

The first Whistle Stop market was the first Saturday in October and the next will be on November 5. The show runs from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. and the vendors change each time. Some are regulars but Karas plans to switch things up so there is variety.

"I love dressing up," said Karas, so this event fulfils that desire. "It's a way to give back. We have sent money to others in need, but the main funds will go to the senior citizens hall." Karas said the wonderful building is not being used the way it needs to be.

"It's a perfect place, tables and chairs to set up," she said. "We want to improve and let people know that it's available."

Vendors pay \$15 for table space, and Karas said she wanted it to remain reasonable. She feels they have already had wonderful vendors. There was

even a photographer that traveled with her photography.

"People love flea market finds," said the organizer. "Everything sells. We want to make it fun, so tooting the horn when there's a drawing (keeps people around)." The doorprize tickets are just \$.25 each and there's a drawing every 15 minutes, which gives people an incentive to come in the door.

The variety includes knitting/ crocheting, wood working, jewelry, homemade baked and canned goods, and dozens of other specialty items. Some things are antiques, so the cost is more for those items, but most things are priced low to

The December Whistle Stop market is planned to coincide with the Festival of Trees event, which is an all-day event next door at the Newell city hall. "We hope to draw people to both locations for each event," said Karas.

"The only way to see the future being any better than it is now is by giving back to the community," she said. "The local folks are the ones that are keeping you going. People like Judy (Heisler) who made soup



Meyer was present to explain her background and reasons for running for office. She sees the need for a great change in handling the Auditor's office. fications for Commissioner of School and Public Lands. He sees his office as a place of stewardship.

The present person on the South Dakota Public Utilities Commission, Chris Nelson, was present to discuss his reputation for listening and advocating and focusing on reliability. He is running against Jeff Barth who appeared in a video.

There is no one running for District 28 State Senator Ryan Maher, but he was present to outline his focus in the State Senate. He also explained his position on Amendment D, saying that it could have a high cost for the people of South

Two candidates are vying for State Representative in District 28B. Neal Pinnow, Republican, is from Lemmon and has spent many years in local government. Calvin Reilly, an Independent, is a small business owner and has lobbied in Pierre.

Butte County Auditor Annie Capp had resources for the community with information on Amendment D and IM 27. Amendment D proposes a constitutional change to expand Medicaid eligibility in South Dakota. Initiated Measure 27 (IM 27) legalizes the possession, use, and distribution of marijuana and marijuana paraphernalia.

Dr. Bonnie Omdahl, JD, MD

explained her position on IM27 and cautioned the audience on the increase of anxiety and depression.

"It's not the drug of the '70s," she said.

Candidate for State Representative Calvin Reilly is pro legal marijuana siting several cases that he is aware of that the use of marijuana has been helpful in many medical areas.

A vote yes on IM27 will adopt

the measure and allow the legalization of marijuana. A vote no will leave South Dakota law as it is. More

information can be found

on IM27 on the Secretary of State's website or at the Butte County Auditor's office in Belle Fourche.

State Senator Ryan Maher spoke to the effects he felt Amendment D could cause South Dakota. He said the money needed to expand Medicaid would come out of education to fix the expansion.

"Remember, you would be amending the Constitution," he

A vote yes will adopt the amendment. A vote no will leave the constitution as it is. More information is available at the Butte County Auditor's office.

The Educated Voter event has been sponsored by the WIT Coalition for several years. It brings the residents of the area and the candidates in contact. The amount of money transferred for each acre in the tract shall be equal to the average amount paid per acre during the previous calendar year to landowners of the adjacent property under the walk-in area program. As an experiment Mrs. Ellis Buck, our local chicken fancier, made a suit of clothes for a shivering molting Plymouth Rock. Where upon 65 other nude chickens followed her about until she had to clothe them all.

October 26, 1922

Oscar Milberg, Guy Livingston, Lloyd Kendall and Harry Webb are feeling pretty well satisfied over the returns received from a carload of macaroni wheat which they shipped to Minneapolis, the shipment netting them 68 cents a bushel.

Louie Thompson has filed at the Irrigator office a vigorous complaint about the automobile drivers who go sailing around a man with a team and neglect

to give any warning of their approach from the rear. The rules of the road are that a motor vehicle driven must sound the horn before passing a vehicle going in the same direction. This was the highest price for a load of yearlings ever sold at the Belle Fourche yards. The steers were raised on the Richards' ranch on Willow Creek, east of Newell.
