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Roosevelt Events Center Condemnation Appeal Denied

(BELLE FOURCHE) - The appeal of the City's condemnation order placed on the Roosevelt Events Center was denied Tuesday, October 22nd, leaving the building's owners considering their next steps to bring the 100-year old landmark back to life.

Close to 60 people gathered Community Hall for the hearing, many of the observers sympathetic to the cause of keeping the Roosevelt open.

On October 9th the City posted the condemnation order on the doors of the Roosevelt based on the failure of the building owners to address 17 code violations that were spelled out in a Notice of Violation issued July 2nd. The code violations cited structural concerns with the roof, fire safety issues and ADA accessibility issues among others.

A five-member Board of Appeals heard testimony from both sides with the city arguing that they have been more than generous in giving 18-months leeway toward compliance and the building owners saying that some progress has been made while some of the code violations do not technically apply.

City Attorney Kellen Willert took the panel through a history of problems with the structure, dating back to the early 1990's when it was used as the Belle Fourche Middle School. At that time, Willert said the State's Fire Marshall identified safety issues and the presence of asbestos was identified in 1989 as a problem. The school district moved out of the structure after May of 1993, leaving behind what was termed a "facility in crisis."

After that, the building was purchased by Wendell and Mary Ann Johnson who sold it to Pietila Property and Repair, LLC, on a contract for deed beginning in November 2017. Pietila Property & Repair is owned by James and Provatia Pietela. The building then became home to the Belle Fourche Chamber of Commerce, a handful of small businesses, the La Belle Marche monthly market and other community events. In February of this year it was listed on the National Register of Historic Landmarks.

Beginning in early 2018, with the testimony of Interim City Engineer Steve Nafus and Building Inspector Chase Williamson, Willert navigated through a timeline of meetings and correspondence exchanged between the City and Pietila, in an effort to show that the city was willing to work with the Pietela's in bringing the build-

(BELLE FOURCHE) - Six of the nine seniors on the Belle Fourche Broncs' 2019 football team scored touchdowns as the Mighty Purple celebrated Senior night with a huge 65-28 win over the Todd County Falcons. A seventh senior, quarterback Colby Nowowiejski, threw three touchdown passes to cap off a stellar career, setting a single season passing record with more than 1,700 yards.

With the victory over the visitors from Mission, SD, the Broncs finish the season with a winning record, 5-and-4 but narrowly miss the post season 11A playoffs.

"The season didn't always go the way we wished, but we have

had so much with this group," said Head Coach Scott Slotten.

"The win was a lot of fun. We got all seniors a touchdown and the seniors even got to wear the headsets and have some fun."

The Broncs took the opening kickoff driving 47 yards, capped off with a 6-yard Kelby Olson touchdown run. The Falcons then responded with a touchdown drive of their own, and with a successful two-point conversion, took their only lead of the game, 8-7 with 4:35 left in the 1st.

But the lead was short-lived. On the ensuing kickoff Jackson Tyndall received the ball at his own 20 and raced 80 yards up the left sideline to give Belle Fourche the lead for good, 14-8.

The Broncs would score

City Council Reverses Decision on Employee Residency

Policy reverts to original language.

(BELLE FOURCHE) - At its regular council meeting on Monday, Oct. 21, the Belle Fourche City Council reversed its decision to change city employee residency requirements and voted 5-to-2 to keep city policy 5.19 in its original language.

After three months of revisions and motions the policy remains as it was prior to July 22nd. Policy 5.19 states that city employees must live close enough to the city to report to

work within 25 minutes. City department heads and supervisors must live in or within 3 miles of the city limits. A residency map had been drawn up as a guideline to determine the 3-mile requirement.

Over the course of the past 3 months the policy had been revised four times. At the previous meeting Oct. 7th the council voted 5-to-2 to update the policy to allow city department heads to live anywhere in Butte County as long as they could be at work within 25 minutes.

At the latest council meeting, Ward 4 Councilman Bob

Butte/Meade County Dispatch Center

If Butte County chooses to contract dispatch services to Meade County the City of Belle Fourche may not be under any obligation to make this same move.

Mayor Landphere is correct that the Belle Fourche City Council needs to be in on the decision as there are options. Again, if my memory serves me correctly our contract with Butte County was 4 times the cost as compared to contracting with the City of Spearfish. Our city government at that time didn’t consider other options.

Currently there are dispatch services with Meade County, Lawrence County and the City of Spearfish. This opens options for the City of Belle Fourche to seek requests for proposals for dispatch services and to possible lower costs for Belle Fourche.

One more interesting option

would be for the City of Belle Fourche to entertain dispatch services for themselves. If Butte County chooses to contract with Meade County, they may surplus their equipment. If so, Belle Fourche could bid on it.

There are options for Belle Fourche. Although Doreen Allison Creed may feel it is important for the Counties to act quickly, Mayor Landphere is correct that our City needs to weigh in and make a decision that is best for Belle Fourche.

Those would be:
Contract with Meade County
Take Requests for Proposals from other providers

Buy our own equipment and take care of our community.

There are options for the City Council to carefully study.

Teaching the Kids to Swim!

The end of this week wraps up the annual swim program that allows every third and fourth grade student at South Park Elementary the opportunity to learn how to swim. This cooperative effort between the Belle Fourche Area Community Center and the Belle Fourche School District has been teaching kids to swim for the past 16 years. The program began in 2003 when Aquatics Manager, Kathryn Bogner, had a goal to teach every child in Belle Fourche water safety skills regardless of their financial ability to participate in the summer swim lesson program. Each day during the month of October the kids are brought to the BFACC during their Physical Education class period. They alternate between lesson days and workout days. On lesson days, the swim students

are split into groups based on swimming ability and shown skills personalized to their swim level. The kids that come in who have been swimming for years are shown how to refine their strokes. Lifeguards encourage them to build on their strengths and become truly fearless in the water. Other children are afraid of the water and are sent to work one-on-one with volunteers where they are helped to overcome those fears by playing games that incorporate basic skills. Soon these kids can swim on their own and are eager to learn more each time they come to the pool. On workout days, kids develop their endurance by swimming laps for 30 minutes. They get to jump in the deep end and enjoy the time with their friends, while getting in a vigorous workout. Our hope as lifeguards is to teach valuable water safety skills and to encourage physi-

cal fitness. Once the kids learn basic water skills in a pool environment, they can translate that knowledge to all bodies of water. Belle Fourche's Sawyer Clarkson ended his October the same way he started it, with a smart and tactical race that ended with the freshman pulling away for his fourth victory in a row, this one to claim the first cross country state title in school history in Huron on Saturday.

Clarkson, who went undefeated this month at the Sturgis Invite, Black Hills Conference, and Region meets, took control about midway through the 5,000-meter Class A championship race and was not seriously challenged down the final stretch with a personal-record clocking of 16 minutes and 25 seconds. Adam Conser of Hot Springs finished second in 16:29 after getting by Milbank's Nick Batchelor (16:30) late in the race. Region 5A competitors claimed four of the top five spots and 10 of the top 25 medalist positions.

As a team, the Broncs took 10th place out of 15 qualified squads with a total score of 179 points. Sioux Falls Christian won the team title (40 points) ahead of Vermillion (57 points) and St. Thomas More (62 points).

Also for Belle Fourche, freshmen Devin Nowowiejski (79th) and Nic Lambert (97th) cracked the top 100 and were

followed closely by sophomores Cole Hockenbary (101st) and Wyatt Keegan (102nd) and eighth-grader Jordan Sandoval (123rd).

On the girls' side, eighth-graders Ava Allen (22nd) and Allison Hayes (23rd) became the first Lady Bronc runners to medal at state since 1988 with their top-25 finishes. Senior Harley Fischer rounded out the girls' squad with a 52nd-place finish. Belle Fourche did not have a complete girls' team qualify to get a team score.

Custer won their second consecutive girls' team title, easily defeating Hill City by a score of 28-69. This marks the sixth year in a row that a Region 5A team has won the girls' title (Hill

City & St. Thomas More have also won in that span). Including Allen & Hayes, Region 5A accounted for 15 of the top 25 medalists, showing how dominate West River has been in distance running as of late.

The nine Broncs who competed were the most for Belle Fourche since both squads qualified in the 1982 season. Six of those nine were making their first-ever state meet appearance and only one will be lost to graduation (Fischer).

Belle Fourche will wrap up their season with their annual awards dinner & banquet for team members and families and then athletes will get ready for winter sports and activities until the spring track season arrives.

35-straight points after giving up the first quarter touchdown. After a 4-and-out by the Bronc defense Belle Fourche took over on the 46 yard line in plus territory and Nowowiejski connected with Olson in stride as he was streaking toward the end zone in seam. A failed 2-point conversion left it 20-to-8.

After another Belle Fourche stop the Broncs would strike again. The Broncs opening up the playbook a bit with a swinging gate formation and Kelby Olson took the ball in from 13 yards out. It was Olson's third touchdown of the first quarter and it was 27-8.

The Falcons botched a deep snap on a punt deep in Bronc territory early in the 2nd quarter and Belle Fourche took over on the 1-yard line. At that point offensive lineman Michael Streeter lined up in the backfield and the 240-pound senior bulled his way in for the score. It was 33-8.

On their next possession the Broncs drove the ball 76-yards for a score as Nowowiejski hit Tate Larson on a perfectly-timed slant route for the score. Following that, Bronc's Jackson Tyndall took the option pitch 40-yards to the 17 yard line and Keaton Benson finished off the drive on the next play to make it 47- 20 at

the half.

Olson opened the scoring in the 2nd half with a 41-yard touchdown run. In all, the senior finished with 182-yards of total offense and 5 touchdowns. He also had 7 tackles on defense, including 2 tackles for loss.

Senior Cruz Kellem added a 32-yard field goal and the work was done for the upper classmen. Junior Blake Vissia led the Bronc offense to a final drive. Freshman Thomas McCoy broke a nice 13 yard run followed by a 24 yard carry to the 1. On the following play Vissia hit Junior wide receiver Aiden Giffin with a 1-yard scoring toss. Sophomore Gabe Heck hauled in a Vissia pass for the 2-point conversion and it would be 65-20. The final score 65-28.

"I really wish the season weren't over," Slotten said after the game. "This Senior group is so fun, hardworking and competitive. I want to say thanks to all the Seniors and their parents for a heck of a four year run and a ton of memories. They helped us set a precedent for the future."

Indeed the Senior class did set a high bar. Jackson Tyndall finished his career with the school record for receptions for touchdowns and quarterback Colby Nowowiejski set a school record for passing yards in a season with 1,700.

Somervold, a former city employee himself, asked for a reconsideration of the Oct. 7th vote. That motion passed 6-to-1 with Councilman Troy Shockey casting the lone dissenting vote.

After 15 minutes of discussion the motion to update policy 5.19 with the Butte County language failed 5-2. Shockey and Councilman Randy Schmidt voting to update the policy and Somervold, Vern Hintz, Chmn. Monte Talkington, Travis Martin and James Ager voting down the change. The result is that 5.19 goes back to its original language.

“My father has a name for something like this. He calls it monkey-business,” said Shockey who, along with Schmidt have consistently been proponents of updating the policy. “What are we going to do now, just vote until we get the outcome we like?”

Between Oct. 7th and 21st, two council members changed their votes.

After voting for the change on the 7th, Somervold asked for the reconsideration and voted against the change last week. “I just didn’t feel right after the

first vote,” he told the Beacon. “I’m not a lawyer and sometimes the way things get worded sound good the first time you read them. But I sat down and read the policy more thoroughly and I really wasn’t on board with it. I think if you’re going to be a department head you should live in the city.”

Ward 2 Councilman Travis Martin also changed his vote the second time around. “In the time I’ve been on the council I don’t think I’ve ever had as many people reach out to me on an issue,” he told the Beacon. “I was on the fence to start with and after I was approached by so many of my constituents I felt like I had to think it through again. When Bob brought it back to reconsider I thought that this was my opportunity to fix a mistake. I felt like I was voting against my Ward and I’m here to represent them.”

When the vote was held on Oct. 7th Annie Reich, Ward 2, voted to update the policy. Ward 3 Councilman James Ager was not present at that meeting. On the 21st, Reich was not present for the vote and Ager voted to keep the policy with its original wording.

ing up to code. Willert said if anything the City may have given him too much leeway.

For his part, Pietila, representing Pietila Property and Repair LLC, pointed to the areas where work had been done while freely admitting that more repairs were needed. He presented research that he felt suggested that several of the code violations in the July 2nd notice did not apply to the structure. He said that the four priorities agreed to in an August meeting with the city were being addressed, including an engineer’s report that he said showed there were no imminent structural integrity issues with the building.

Teresa Gibson, Belle Fourche resident spoke on behalf of the Roosevelt expressing dismay that the city was discouraging entrepreneurial leadership to try to improve the community. She said the Pietila’s were being “scapegoated” for problems that had been transferred to them from previous ownership. She questioned how the city could expect the Pietila’s to fix the problems in 1½ years that had accumulated over 26 years

of neglect. Also speaking on behalf of the Roosevelt was John Bennett who questioned the ethics of the city’s inspection and issues of compliance notification. He vouched for the safety of the building and said the actions of the city caused economic hardship for the Pietila’s in their efforts to do something for the betterment of the community.

In his closing argument Willert told the board that there were three areas that needed to be satisfied for a successful appeal: 1) The legally adopted code rules had been incorrectly interpreted; 2) Provisions of the code do not fully apply or; 3) the requirements of the code have been adequately satisfied by other means. He said none of these requirements were met. Willert applauded Pietila for what he was trying to do but that it needed to be done right, saying he was sympathetic to the fact that his “dream was bigger than his budget.” In the end, he said, the city must do its job.

After more than 4-hours of testimony the board deliberated for 23 minutes before announcing their unanimous decision to affirm the condemnation notice.

This means that the public is not admitted into the building until it is brought up to code.

According to the Appeals Board Chairman Ted Corean it was simply a matter of fairness in applying the rules. “Everybody else has to go by the code, then he has to go by the code,” Corean said.

“I guess I’m unsurprised by the board’s vote to affirm both the Notice of Violation and the Notice of Condemnation,” Pietila told the Beacon. “It’s been a very long two years, financially and mentally draining working on this thing and at this point we’re at the limit to basically what we can do.”

For the City’s part, Willert said that even as emotionally charged as this issue is, it cannot outweigh the health, safety and welfare concerns of the public. “Most of the code violations at the Roosevelt are pertinent safety codes that are in place to literally protect lives,” Willert said in a statement to the Beacon. “The City looks forward to continuing to work with Pietila Property & Repair LLC to ensure that the public is adequately protected while the necessary repairs are completed to make the Roosevelt safe.”

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Changes to Mountain Lion Season, Camping Fees

The South Dakota Game, Fish and Parks (GFP) Commission made several changes to the mountain lion hunting season.

The commission extended the season within the Black Hills Fire Protection District from Dec. 26 to April 30. The season previously closed on March 31. The commission also increased Custer State Park access permits from 57 to 75.

Changes discussed but rejected by the commission include adding 250 nonresident mountain lion licenses and expanding the allowance for the

use of dogs in a hunt that originates on private land to cross over or culminate on any public lands where unleashed dogs are permitted.

The Game, Fish and Parks (GFP) Commission moved forward with a proposal to increase state park entrance fees for the first time since 2014. The Commission also took action to raise select camping fees, many of which had also been unchanged for several years.

Pending approval from the Interim Rules Committee, the increases will go into effect

January 1, 2020.

This year, several parks have faced significant damage from flooding, with repair costs upwards of \$9 million. Additionally, revenue has been impacted by decreased visitation because of weather and weather-related damage. Some campgrounds had to be closed as a result of flooding.

Annual passes to state parks will be \$36 with a daily fee of \$8. A 7-day motorcycle pass to Custer State Park will be \$20. In campgrounds, prime campsites increase to \$26, preferred sites to \$23 and modern to \$20. Fees for non-electric, tent-only sites will be going down in some cases. These sites will now be \$15 statewide to ensure park opportunities are affordable for everyone.

The increase is in line with the rate of inflation and with fees in surrounding states. The revenue raised from this increase will directly support repairs and upkeep in state parks.

Commissioners Continue to Struggle with Bar

NEWELL – “I am doing my fourth job,” joked Finance Officer Jen Parrow, when asked who was managing the city-owned bar and liquor store.

The city wrangled with this issue once more during department reports at their monthly meeting on Monday, October 21. The meeting had been postponed from October 14 to 16, due to the Monday holiday. Then was reshuffled to the 21st.

The agenda didn’t show much more than liquor license approvals, but when they got down to other reports, the bar issue raised its head again.

Following the abrupt departure of the most recent manager, Lorri Olson, just prior to the long Labor Day weekend, set things in motion. However, there were issues prior to that as one bar manager after another, and several problems relating to records management and financial status.

“We have discovered some things at the liquor store,” began Mayor Ken Wetz as he shared what information he has. “The financial report; well se don’t have any idea if it’s accurate.”

That seems to be the case each time in the recent past when department reports have been given.

“(Things) weren’t being

reported accurately, inventory numbers are not really accurate,” said Wetz.

Recently the city paid for a new Point of Sale (POS) system that was supposed to make keeping track of inventory easier, make the accounting process better and give better reports. It seems that is not the case.

“Last fall I questioned that, after doing (an) investigation, the cash register system, and the inventory with scanner was not being utilized,” said Wetz. “I don’t know if those numbers are right, only estimates. Wetz said that the bar and the liquor store will be treated as two separate entities.

“Now you’re ordering two separate orders?” questioned Commissioner Connie Humble.

Wetz responded that they will be two separate businesses. This is necessary to make sure the liquor companies making deliveries keep the orders separate, and specify which business what inventory goes to.

“We need to retrain distributors where to put what,” said Wetz. “In the cooler, on-sale and off-sale (need to be separate) so it won’t get mixed up.”

When asked if the city planned to hire another bar manager, Wetz replied that there were no plans to do so at this time. But the commission did retire at the end of the meeting to discuss personnel issues.

Parrow will continue, with the help of the current bar tenders to run the two businesses.

The other area of discussion that took a good chunk of time was the public works department. Foreman Larry Parker reported that he had contact with A1 Sewer about cleaning the sewer line they have been working on behind the store from 2nd to 3rd street. The company’s machine had broken down.

“We are starting to treat the sewers,” said Parker. “It wouldn’t hurt to have people put water down flood drains and sinks that aren’t used much.” He warned there could be strong smells during the treatment time.

Work on the curb and gutter from 2nd street to 9th street, and from Dartmouth to Girard is ongoing. He said he is waiting for confirmation on how big the sidewalks are going to be and that it could affect moving some irrigation components.

An extension for the Community Development Block Grant, which is what has been used to do the sewer and street work this summer, was approved by the commission. The extension time asked was for six months.

“They still have a walk-through, grass, signs, and then the walk-through,” said Parker. “It probably won’t be needed.”

Then and Now *in Newell*

Nov. 4, 1909

Lucerne is the name selected for the railroad town on the Belle Fourche Valley Railroad. A public meeting held Wednesday evening last week. The meeting was held in the building recently erected for a hardware store at the townsite. A large number of ranchers and farmers of the neighborhood were present and after much discussion and making little headway it was decided to leave the naming to the only lady present. Mrs. Hans Sorenson was who promptly named it Lucerne and J.E. Stewart was named Post Master. The new town is 18 miles east of Belle Fourche on the bank of the Belle Fourche River and about 200 yards north of Nis Sorenson’s ranch home.

Several of the Nine Mile young folks attended the Halloween dance last Saturday night. The Ladies Union took in something over \$50 from their Halloween entertainment.

The “new divorcee” in town is a good manager, she got her house practically fixed up like new for nothing. She was engaged to the carpenter until all the wood work was finished and then she broke up with him and now is engaged to a plumber.

Nov. 6, 1919

As all who have occasion to ship stock know, that the local stock yards have been a veritable “sea of mud” for the past month and the unavailable delays in getting live stock loaded out has caused considerable loss to stockmen. All stock yards are full of stock awaiting

shipment. Such yards are knee deep in mud and stock dying from exposure. State Railroad Commissioner H. A. Ustad acknowledges the complaint of the conditions of the stock pens at the Newell Branch and shortage of cars for stock movement. Northwestern Rail Road loaded 52 cars out on the Newell Branch and still 13 more cars of cattle to go and 3 cars at Sturgis to be loaded in the next 48 hours.

Oct. 31, 1929

Fifty thousand hunters have taken advantage of the low prices on shot gun shells at Gambles Stores. This has done much toward lowering shell prices in the entire Middle West of which Newell Gamble Store participated.

Irvin Ernest came into Newell from Castle Rock with 4 horses to haul out part of his winter’s supply of coal and household staples while the roads are in fairly good shape.

Nov. 2, 1939

Elmer Ellis, who is manager for farms taken over for non-payment of taxes, states that Butte County has about 300,000 acres of such land. Figures of last spring show 99% of the land is now under lease.

A change was announced in the departments at Bratton’s Mercantile Co here this week, with Mrs. Walter Harman resigning from her position as bookkeeper there and Mrs. Hansen being transferred from the “Cash & Carry” to the department store and Miss Francis Ahonen being transferred as bookkeeper to the “Cash &

Carry” Store.

Members of the Newell Community Club have been invited to a dedication of the new bridge across Powder River near Brodus, Mont, on November 12, according to an invitation received by Secretary Govert Van derBoom. Formal dedication of the new bridge on Highway 212 will occur in the afternoon after which a banquet at 5:30 to be followed by a program and “dedication ball”. The new bridge is an important link on Highway 212 which eventually brings much added traffic into the Black Hills to Newell from both northwest and northeast states.

Oct. 27, 1949

Walter Milberg made a trip to Pierre to attend the newly formed South Dakota Thoroughbred Breeder’s Association meeting and other horse business Monday. He was elected to the Board of Directors. Walt was accompanied by Oscar Riegel of Belle Fourche and Kirk Malcolm of Newell.

Any resident of another state who has a pre-marital blood test for marriage to take place in South Dakota should make sure results of the test are made on a form prescribed by the SD Department of Health, Dr. G. J. Van Heuvelen, said this week. No Clerk of Courts in SD can issue a marriage license to an individual whose blood test results appear on a certificate issued by another state. A number of instances have occurred where weddings have been delayed because person applying for a marriage license held out-of-state blood test certificates.

Oct. 29, 1959

Research work being done by Clyde O. Brown, Newell High School graduate who recently received a \$700 grant under the National Science Foundation, is of a highly technical nature. Brown, an electrical engineering student at Oregon State College, Corvallis will work on the study of high-voltage conductors and radio interferences

and a study of plasma in fusion power research, a new 2-year old field. One use of plasma is in the eventual pro-pulsion of space craft in a near perfect vacuum.

A meeting has been set for November 6 in the BEC building in Newell at 7:30 PM at which interested men of Newell, Vale and Nisland will hear an outline of the workings of the Lions Club International Organization, about programs of service to persons of an area who are in need of assistance and for whom many the welfare programs are not available. The program is sponsored by the Belle Fourche Lions Club. Philip E. Hastings, special representative of the International Association will present the general program and its value to the community.

Oct. 31, 1979

A joyous event was held at the Newell Assembly of God Church when they conducted a Mortgage burning service along with a dinner and rally. The Mortgage has been of the church built in 1968 and dedicated in 1969 and the parsonage in 1973. Assisting the ceremony were current Pastor Morris

Conklin, witnesses, previous pastors, past and present councilmen, building so very little money.

Newell Fire Department at 11 AM Thursday was called to a fire in the south Hilan community southeast of Newell. Quinton Watson was combining corn for Harlan Palo when the hydro-static drive on his 815 International 4-row combine broke and leaked oil on the engine. The fire destroyed the combine. The firemen used foam to contain the fire by covering the whole combine with foam and was really something to see. No other damages were reported other than Watson burned his hand.

Several families from this area attended the Germans from Russian dinner at the Roosevelt School Sunday in Belle Fourche. George Erk, Newell, furnished dinner music on his accordion. Members prepared the authentic German food; Eugenia Reinhardt, Newell prepared the menu; Lydia Stump, Belle Fourche, Chairman of the group acted as mistress of ceremonies and Rev. F. Holgren, Pastor at St James Lutheran Church, led the group in singing traditional German songs.

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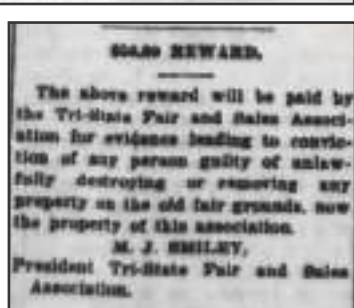

Potato Pickers!
The eighth grade boys are real potato pickers. The proof is now stacked up at the school about two tons of proof. Here's the story. The early frost caught Bill Jeremiason's potato crop still in the ground. As a result he was unable to sell them, so he offered to turn them over to the school lunch program, provided someone picked them. Although the potatoes could not be sold, because they could not be stored, they are good potatoes and if used soon are fresh and delicious — and since the school uses about 300

pounds per meal when they serve spuds, there's no storage problem. If someone had to be paid to pick the potatoes, there would be little saving for the school lunch program. 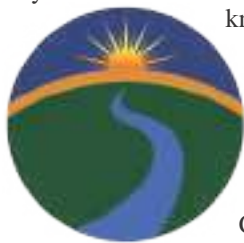

dioxide emissions. The goal is to be 76 percent carbon free statewide and 36 percent free nationwide. Nelson said the PUC has been approving many wind generation farms, which will help in that effort. "In renewable energy, how high can we go?" he asked. Many believe that wind turbines and wind-generated energy is the way to go and that the companies should go completely that direction. "However, you remember that cold night in January?" he asked. "No one knew that when it gets to -22 degrees, wind turbines shut off due to vibration. That shut off the electricity and we just wanted to be warm." Nelson did say that the government subsidies are going to go away next year, which means

the wind energy companies are making the big push to get the wind farms approved. It is difficult to know what the future will bring for electricity.
