## Sweet Is A Sweet-16 Volleyball Victory

Etching their names into the history books, the 2022 Bronc Volleyball team has earned Belle Fourche's 6th ever state appearance. Four of those have been under the direction of Head Coach Loree Schlichtemeier. The Broncos' only state championship title came 30 years ago in 1992. In 1995, the team finished 8th, and in 2012, 2013, and 2017 Belle Fourche earned 4th place honors.

To get their piece of history, the Broncos had to defeat Mobridge-Pollock in Sweet 16 action last Tuesday night at Harding County High School. Belle Fourche was able to dominate the first two sets winning 25-17 and 25-15. However, they

lost a bit of momentum as the tigers swiped set three 25-20. The Broncos narrowly escaped having to go to a 5th and final deciding set with a game point kill to win set four 25-23 and the match 3-1.

Game highlights include Adryana Hovland's service ace while tied 3-3 in set one. Her serving run would swing the pendulum of momentum to the Bronc's side of the court. Up 8-6, Sloan Young ran a quick play in the middle to find an open spot in the Tiger's back court. Grace Clooten found the other open corner from the middle to bring the Broncos' lead to 20-12. Mataya Ward tooled one off the top of the block for game point and a finalized set

## Butte County General Election, Nov. 8, 2022

The Belle Fourche Community Hall was bustling with activity on midterm election day, November 8, 2022 as Butte County voters turned out in large numbers.

"We're on track to have a really good turnout" Auditor Annie Capp predicted mid-afternoon on November 8 from her vantage point at the polls. "We are averaging a 50% turnout compared to a 39% turnout for the primary election." There

are also a considerable number of absentee and early voter ballots to be counted as well as the usual after work rush to the polls. She noted.

At the end of the day when all the votes were counted, Butte County voters resoundingly endorsed Republican candidates and rejected the legalization of the distribution, possession and recreational use of marijuana. An initiated amendment to the South Dakota Constitution expanding Medicaid eligibility was narrowly approved. Butte County voters have spoken.

## Sergeant LeLund Morris Kahler Bridge Dedication

The occasion was somber and celebratory at the same time. The bright sunshine warmed the chilly air providing a fitting atmosphere as a sizable crowd gathered to dedicate the Sergeant LeLund Morris Kahler Bridge. The bridge serves as an entrance to the Belle Fourche Roundup Grounds and will be well traveled in coming months and years.

In 1969, at 22 years of age, Sergeant Kahler was killed by a sniper. Prior to his death, Ser-

geant Kahler received a host of honorary medals and badges for his service during the Vietnam War. As a soldier, he was something special. He was someone who put the welfare of others before his own.

It's difficult to really imagine what it must have been like for Sergeant Kahler as he rescued a comrade on fiery terrain amidst the sounds of gunfire. It's difficult to imagine the hundreds of acres of trees defoliated by agent orange he and other soldiers passed through without understanding the danger

What is easier to picture is the

face of his mother, Mrs. Kahler going home from her job as a Belle Fourche teacher the day she was officially notified that her son was dead.

Belle Fourche is proud to remember and honor a native son, LeLund Kahler. Despite the cold temperature a large crowd gathered on Friday morning to dedicate the LeLund Kahler Bridge.

Honored guests included LaNyce Whittemore, LeLund's sister, Linda Rothermel, sister-in-law to LaNyce, and Joe Whittemore, brother-in-law to LaNyce.

## Council Appropriates Funds to Replace Rec Center Lighting

**Security camera installation also approved**

**BELLE FOURCHE** – Upgrades to the Belle Fourche Rec Center's lighting and security system will be coming soon. At last week's regular city council meeting the council approved appropriations for the installation of LED lighting and installation of security cameras at the facility.

A bid from Hauck Electric and Controls, Inc. (HECI) a Belle Fourche in the amount of \$38,883 was accepted to replace indoor and outdoor fluorescent and halogen lights with

LED lights. The breakdown of the bid included \$18,609 for materials and \$20,274 for labor. HECI's bid was chosen over GenPro Energy Solutions of Piedmont.

According to HECI's proposal the lighting that will be replaced includes the lights in the mechanical rooms, offices, exterior street and building lighting, conference rooms, bathrooms and shower rooms, storage rooms, cafeteria, entry ways and the gymnasium. It does not include lighting for the racquetball court, auditorium, or existing LED fixtures. HECI's bid included cost for disposal of existing fixtures.

The new longer-lasting LED

fixtures will be brighter and more cost efficient than the existing incandescent bulbs. Rec Center Director Nate Velandar expects the center will be able to recoup the cost of the installation with energy savings within three years.

The city's new Technology Advisory Board recommended to the council that a quote from Belle Fourche based Technology Inc. be accepted for the installation of 13 new security cameras at the complex. The council unanimously approved this measure as well with the bid coming in at \$23,417.53. When completed the facility will be protected with 36


It has been four years since the BFHS theatre department has performed a full-length drama, in fact, most of the cast members have not acted this genre previously.

**Sundance State Bank Donates to Vore Buffalo Jump**

The Sundance State Bank presented the Vore Buffalo Jump Foundation (VBJF) with a corporate donation of \$5,000 in October. The VBJF is actively working to establish a world-class research, education, and cultural center at the Vore Site.

The Vore Site was discovered in the early 1970s during construction of interstate 90. Extensive excavations by archaeologists from the University of Wyoming have established that the site is an exceptionally well preserved bison trap that was used by Native American hunters from about 1550 to about 1800.

In 2013, the Sundance State Bank loaned the VBJF funds to drill a well and to build a tipi at the site to display exhibits. The most recent donation will be used to reduce the principal on that loan. 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

Set two led off with a pair of kills from Clooten to take the early lead. Mobridge was able to snag a point before Clooten tapped down another tight ball at the net for a 3-1 score. Dylan Stedillie was able to keep the serving run going to a score of 5-1. Ward and Clooten met up for a block against the right side to bring the lead even wider. The Broncs were able to sustain their lead and ended set two 25-15 with another Clooten-Ward block.

Mobridge-Pollock knew they had nothing to lose and had to take set three or go home early. The Tigers found themselves up 11-7 when Stedillie blocked the outside to bring Belle Fourche back within 3 points. The Tigers snagged a couple of more points to gain their largest lead of 7 at 22-15. Hovland served an ace to narrow the gap and start a shift in momentum, but the Broncs were not able to get within reach and dropped the set 20-25.

Set four saw the closest battle of the night with the Tigers again needing the win to force a fifth set and the Broncs fighting to secure their state trip early. Stedillie managed another block to bring the Broncs up by two points at 9-7.

The battle for the points continued on to point 24-23, Bronc advantage. Ward put some extra spice on the ball and it proved too much to handle for the Tiger defense, ending the set 25-23 and securing the Broncs' spot in the SD Class A Volleyball Tournament.

Statistical leaders for the Broncs include a double-double for Lily McCarty with 19 digs and 28 assists. Chloe Crago, Hovland, Stedillie, and Ward followed with 18, 16, 15, and 14 digs respectively. Clooten led the defense at the net with 6 blocks.

Crago also proved to be a serve receive machine and received 48 serves from the opponent throughout the night, only erroring on two. Ward paced the offense with 19 kills and Clooten threw 8 into the mix.

Serving proved to be a strong point for the Broncs. Stedillie was 30/30 serving with 2 aces, Ward had 5 aces going 15/15, McCarty was 12/12 for 1 ace, and Hovland had 2 aces for 21/23. Crago and Young also served 100% on the night.

The 2022 Lady Broncs are grateful for the opportunity to compete and represent their school amongst a slate of highly competitive Class A schools. The Class A qualifiers in order of rank include: Wagner, Miller, Elkton-Lake Benton, Sioux Falls Christian, Dakota Valley, Belle Fourche, Platte-Geddes, and Elk Point-Jefferson.

The 6th seeded Broncs will face 3rd seeded Elkton-Lake Benton Thursday, November 17th at 6:45pm CT for first round play.

cameras.  
The additional cameras, both inside and outside the facility, are seen as a means to increase safety and security for those who use the Rec Center. The BFPD has pushed the Rec Center to increase its video monitoring capabilities.

Technology Inc. plans to install 5 new outdoor dome cameras at the Rec Center. Each fixed lens camera will have the capability of storing video recordings for 30 days.

The plan also calls for installation of 8 cameras in the interior of the building. These cameras will also have a 30-day

storage capacity.

In addition to the new cameras the bid includes the relocation of three existing cameras. Two cameras on the northside gym doors will be moved to light poles while one camera on the westside will be moved onto a pole in the park.

The council also approved unanimously to accept the legislative audit for the two-year period ending Dec. 31, 2021. Immediately following the approval, the council reviewed the only request for qualifications they received for Certified Public Accountant services. It was submitted by Wayne Drealan. His RFQ was approved by

unanimous vote of the council with Councilmembers Randy Sowers and Clark Sowers abstaining from the vote. The city will move forward with contract negotiations with Mr. Drealan.

Councilman Clark Sowers asked if Mr. Drealan could provide a review of the 2-year audit and present a report to council on Nov. 21. That request did not move forward as Mayor Randy Schmidt pointed out that no contract had yet been initiated with Mr. Drealan. City Attorney Kellen Willert suggested that any communication with Mr. Drealan should be relayed through the City Administrator and not directly

through councilmembers.

The council also approved the "Light up the Night" fireworks show on Nov. 25. More than 3,000 pounds of fireworks will light up the night sky over the city with the show originating from the grounds of the Tri-State Museum and Visitor's Center. The annual celebration also includes a holiday light parade and lighting of the city Christmas tree. There will also be a Belle Black Friday retail promotion on Dec. 3 that is organized by the Center of the National Business Association.

Councilman Randy Sowers also reported that the Black Hills Roundup ticket sales this

past July were up 1.3% from the previous year and sponsorships were up 6%. Additionally, Chutes for Charity has donated an impressive amount of \$405,000 regionally since 2012 to individuals with life altering events.

Fred P. Stearns received fifty-five (55) votes for commissioner of 2nd district and L. P. Jenks received forty-four (44) votes. On motion board adjourned as board of canvassers and processed as a board of County Commissioners to do regular business. The bids for construction the Redwater bridge at Eaton's place were next opened and were as follows Jno A. Scotney for cast \$600.00; R. McLeod in warrants 552.00; Sam'l Lanning in warrants 474.00; Geisler Bros ditto 434.00; Brion & Northrop ditto 468.00 and H. E. Thompson ditto 440.00.

On motion Rob't S. Stevens was appointed sheriff of Butte county to succeed M. W. Buttes, resigned. Sheriff bond of Rob't S. Stevens with Jos Weckert, Geo Z Richards and D R Evans as sureties was presented and approved.

*STATE BOARD REPORTS ON PENITENTIARY Population of State Prison Largest in its History – Appropriations Needed*  
Sioux Falls – Nov. 15 There never was a time in the history of South Dakota when the population of the state penitentiary at Sioux Falls was larger than it is at this time nor were there ever so many men of real criminal tendencies to be dealt with, according to the seventeenth biennial report of the state board of charities and corrections. The report declares that it is impossible for this institution to be properly conducted unless sufficient appropriations are made by the legislature to pay the bills. "This should be especially clear to the people of the whole state with the knowledge they have of the escape of four convicts, after attempted murder of the deputy warden and kidnapping the warden under sensational circumstances." Says the report. "Other attempted escaped equally desperate and sensational in character were frustrated both before and after the case which is of general public knowledge. The greatest need of this institution is additional cell room and modernization of the old cells which are today a reflection on

the humanity and enterprise of the state. The old cells were built forty years ago; they are too small and are not equipped with toilet facilities. This a cruelty on the inmates and the reaction against their health and spirit is most unfavorable. Due to the large increase on the prison population many of the convicts have been for the last year absolutely without employment. This is inhuman and also increases the problem of discipline. We recommend as appropriation of \$25,000 for the installment of 25 new spinners in the twine plant which would increase the size of the plant one-fourth. The prison plant is now making only about fifteen per cent of the twine used in the state and there would be no difficulty in marketing the product of the enlarged plant.

*A Narrow Escape*  
Melvin McIntire, a student in the Belle Fourche high school had a narrow escape last Saturday morning while hunting near the diversion dam. In company with some other high school students the boys left here early in the morning, and on their return home stopped at the bottom of a hill and while trying to get the car started Mr. McIntire's gun accidentally discharged in the car. The force of the shot struck the steering wheel and town most of the spokes loose; some of the shot lodged in Mr. McIntire's hand and he also received some power burns about the face. It was fortunate that the steering wheel stopped the force of the shot as fatal results probably would have occurred. The boy was brought to Dr. Crouch's office where his wounds were dressed and he was able to resume his school work on Monday.

*Funeral Service For Mrs. Larson Held On Sunday*  
Funeral service for Mrs. Louis P. Larson who passed away at the John Burns Memorial Hospital Wednesday night, November 5, was held Sunday afternoon from the Belle Fourche Methodist church. Rev. L. A. Johnson officiated at the service, assisted by Lebanon Chapter No. 78, Order of the Eastern Star. Burial was in the Danish Lutheran cemetery of Fruitdale. It was one of the largest attended services ever to be held in Belle Fourche, friends and neighbors coming from all parts of the county, bespeaking of the high esteem in which Mrs. Larson was held. Norma Belle Giddings was born November 22, 1889, at Minneapolis, Minnesota, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Giddings. When a child she moved with her parents to Houston, Texas, where she grew to young womanhood. In 1910 Mrs. Larson came with her brother, Clyde Giddings to this country. She was united in marriage to Louis Larson in 1911, the couple being married at Deadwood, and establishing their home in the Indian creek community. In 1919, Mr. and Mrs. Larson moved to Fruitdale. Thomas, state senator from Butte and Harding counties now serving as a member of the American mission for aid in Greece, a public ceremony was held recently in Athens at which time the Rushmore memorial picture tendered by the Miller-Magee Post, American Legion, Belle Fourche, was accepted by D. Leonardes, vice president of the chamber of deputies as a representative of the Greek parliament.

*Riedy Posts Slim 12 Vote Victory*  
John Reidy, Democrat, a farmer from the Thunder Hawk area south of Lemmon appears to have won the contest for state senator from the newly created 19th district by a scant 12 votes. Unofficially but complete tabulations from the four counties involved – Butte, Harding, Perkins and Corson – give Riedy a total of 4387 votes while veteran State Senator Alfred Burke, Republican, came up with a total of 26 votes. Burke had spent six terms in the legislature, starting as a senator from Butte and Harding counties, then from Bute, Harding and Perkins counties. This time the district was enlarged to include Corson county. Riedy scored decisive wins in Corson and Perkins counties to give him the edge he needed. He collected 1031 votes in Corson which Burke had 668. He had 1427 votes in Perkins county, Burke had 119. Burke managed to win in Harding and Butte counties, but the margin wasn't enough to offset Riedy's edge in the east end of the district. Harding county gave Riedy 339 and Burke 59. Butte county give Riedy 1590 and Burke 1897.


*Dr. J. L. Chassell may have set a South Dakota voting record Tuesday.*

The 101 year old Belle Fourche resident made another trip to the polls yesterday to cast his ballot, something he has been doing since he was old enough to cast his first vote for president back in 1892. Dr. Chassell said he was in Chicago at the time, but returned to his home in Iowa to vote. He voted for Harrison that year and his man was defeated. In the 80 years he has been voting, the doctor says he has missed only one presidential election. That was in 1900. He was in medical school at the time and couldn't get back home to vote. Sterling Clark assisted the doctor in marking the ballot, since Dr. Chassell's vision is failing. Dr. Chassell asked Clark to five him a hand. Even though he is 101 years old, there was no absentee voting for the doctor. He marched right into the Community Hall to cast his ballot.

## What Happened to our Weather Radar?

At approximately 1pm MST on Wednesday, November 10, the radar suffered a catastrophic failure when the slip rings seized during rotation. This led to several cables being snapped and broken during the radar’s rotation. Among the things that these cables are responsible for are transmitting the electrical signals to and from the radar dish to the processing equipment in the main building below the tower. Visibly there are at least 8 cables that have been broken. That number may climb once our technicians actually get into the radar pedestal and begin the process of dismantling all the broken parts. Making the repair process even more difficult is the fact that the tower itself is ice

covered from the freezing drizzle Wednesday. This makes climbing the 100 feet to reach the pedestal treacherous. We anticipate that our radar may be down for up to a week for repairs. During the repairs, images from the Bismarck, ND; Aberdeen, SD; North Platte, NE; and Cheyenne, WY NWS radars will be available at: <https://radar.weather.gov/>. The North Dakota State Water Commission radar in Bowman, ND can be viewed at <http://swc.nd.gov/arb/loop.phtml?radar=bowman>. The Rapid City WSR-88D is part of a network of 159 operational radars across the United States and its territories. 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## Is Agritourism for You?

Today my mind is on agritourism opportunities as I prepare for some upcoming educational and networking opportunities for those who are interested in agritourism. And with the first day of fall quickly approaching, I am also thinking of opportunities to squeeze in some last-minute vacation time. Maybe an agritourism location will be on that list!

### What is agritourism?

Agritourism is what you get when you put the words “agriculture” and “tourism” together. And I think that is exciting. They are two of the top industries in South Dakota, and we can combine them to make something that could be very beneficial for farm and ranch operators, our local community and visitors. Agritourism links the agricultural lifestyle with tourism to attract visitors to a farm or ranch for the purpose of entertaining or educating visitors, while also generating additional income for the farm or ranch.

What would visitors like to see and do? You might be surprised at the opportunities available right on your own farm or ranch! You may take the everyday rural and ag experiences for granted as everyday life, but to 80% of urban Americans, experiencing agriculture is an interesting opportunity.

### Types of Agritourism

Perhaps the most familiar type of agritourism is on-farm direct sales, although if you visit your neighbor’s farm to purchase sweet corn, you might not think of it as agritourism. On-farm

direct sales includes u-picks and farm stands, but also includes outdoor recreation, such as hunting, fishing and horseback riding.

Another type of experience is providing accommodations and lodging, like farm stays, guest ranches, bed-and-breakfasts and camping. While many types of getaways require guests to leave their accommodations to experience something new, agritourism lets them enjoy some time of peace and quiet in the country, or maybe even join in on farming activities if that is something that interests you and them. And lodging options can be so varied! Maybe you offer space in your house, or in a stand-alone cabin, or a replica Conestoga wagon. I was recently at a location where guests could stay on the farm in a train car.

### Education and Entertainment

Educational activities, such as tours of your operation, demonstrations, classes, and farm-ranch work experiences, allow guest to learn about agriculture and develop a relationship with a person who works in agriculture. You may use your own passions and skills to offer workshops. I have seen photography workshops, birdwatching workshops and barn quilt painting workshops advertised recently.

Entertainment may be offered in the form of events, such as farm dinners, trail rides, music and story nights, and campfire sessions. Entertainment could also mean allowing guests to participate in activities, such as corn mazes, stargazing and feeding bottle calves. Many times, education and entertainment overlap, making for a rich

experience for visitors.

### Benefits and Risks

The benefits of agritourism are mutual for landowners, visitors and the local community. Agritourism provides landowners the opportunity to use the resources of the ag operation in another way to generate revenue. Through agritourism, visitors have access to activities that teach them about agriculture, connect them to the land and help them form a relationship with someone involved in agriculture. Agritourism also stimulates the local economy.

Out-of-town visitors can have a positive economic impact on the community, as they may stop to purchase fuel, snacks, meals, souvenirs, etcetera.

Of course, there are risks associated with agritourism as well. Those risks should be discussed with your insurance agent to see what kinds of policies would cover what you want to do. A discussion with an attorney can help you determine what type of business structure would be the best for your agritourism endeavors.

### In Summary

So, what do you think? Would you like to add a side hustle to provide additional income opportunities? Do you like people and want to provide educational or entertainment opportunities that showcase your rural lifestyle? If so, agritourism is an opportunity you may wish to explore!





## With Freedom, Comes Responsibility

When taking road trips, one often drives through states and counties abundant with sheer beauty, beautiful lakes or rivers, and places calling your name. Often on these drives, one enters the city limits of a community located amongst this beauty.

Unfortunately, at times one may feel they have entered a war zone. Homes and lots that look more like the local landfill. Yards that haven’t been mowed in months (or years), rusted vehicles, houses with garbage piled to the roof, downtown buildings that haven’t seen a paintbrush or upkeep in a generation or two. My heart sinks for these communities as they have no future without change.

In talking with leaders in some of these communities, while not visionary leaders, they are good people. When asked about the blight they oversee as leaders, they quickly say, oh - we value our freedom around here, we don’t tell people how to live their lives. Not to sound harsh, but these are code words for, apathy, leadership malpractice, and above all, they are entrenched in the poverty mindset that has overtaken the community. Another sign this community won’t prosper again until the mindset changes.

These leaders have a warped sense of what real freedom is. They are in bondage to misplaced freedom and have no idea of the responsibilities that come with true freedom. I am as big a fan of freedom as one will find, but I also understand

my freedom can’t encroach upon other’s freedoms. I can’t drive my car into other cars, I can’t light my neighbor’s house on fire, I can’t endanger others in the name of my freedom.

Shamefully, communities will allow trash to accumulate attracting rats, animals and diseases that spill over onto nearby properties. What about the rights of those nearby property owners? They will allow fire hazards that can impact entire neighborhoods. What about the rights of the others in the neighborhood? They allow yards to be unkempt attracting snakes, rodents and so forth that will move to nearby properties. Don’t the nearby owners have any freedom or rights to live in a clean area? They in fact are allowing blight, decay, and uncaring to have greater freedoms than those that want to live in a community that is a desirable place to work, live and play. The minority is being allowed to hold the community hostage and draining whatever future that community might have.

Many of these communities wonder why their children go off to college, never to return. The answer is simple, what have you provided them to return to? Many of these communities have the illusion of attracting manufacturing and jobs. Stop thinking about that nonsense now, you are wasting your time. You reap what you sow. You allow blight and decay, you get what accompanies blight and decay, not what accompanies

They strictly enforce those ordinances knowing that it is critical to the long-term survival of their entire community. They understand, if you want children to take pride in their hometown and if they want to recruit businesses and jobs that matter, they must have pride in their appearance and attitudes.

It may seem I am being harsh towards communities that don’t have the resources of bigger communities. Yes, I have been harsh because this is one problem that doesn’t cost much more than great leadership to correct. Leaders that care about future generations. You will always have a few residents that will yell and scream they have rights to live as they wish; you must push ahead and think of the good of the community as a whole.

If you want to build a vibrant community that everyone can be proud of, one that people want to move to, one that your children will return to, one that businesses will flock to, and the next generation will be happy with, you must start instilling that pride today. Don’t let the few dictate your future – plan now for a better tomorrow!

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### Desperate Need for Local EMT's

Six needed; potential grant could fund training expense

NEWELL – EMT Courses could potentially be free for interested people who would like to sign up and begin working through the multiple hour-program starting right after the first of the year. This is according to Newell Ambulance Director Sherry Hocking, who is looking for six viable candidates to sign up soon. The course would normally cost \$850 per person but due to the potential of a large grant funded through Sanford Health, each candidate's fee would be compensated.

Practical classes would be taken locally at the Newell ambulance hall and candidates would not have to travel for the four Saturdays needed to pass the course.

This online interactive video educational class would be each Tuesday and Thursday evening from 6 to 10 p.m. CST via Video Conferencing. A computer with a high-speed internet connection would be needed. Students will be required to attend the Saturday lab skills sessions to gain hands-on skills and to fulfill course objectives. A noon meal will be provided during the skills labs.

There is another facet to this program which affects high school seniors who are interested in potential medical education degrees.

Due to the desperate need of EMT's, Sanford Health is encouraging high school seniors to sign up for the EMT Hybrid/Online Course offered through the local school curriculum. Scholarships are available for these young people as well.

The need is across the United States and the State of South Dakota. Completing an EMT course will provide high school seniors seeking to support community projects, civic service along with future career and



He got it so it will sew again, but we need to take my serger and the church's serger someplace to get them both fixed good. We quit sewing early and I drove to over to the Reva Store on a

really icy highway. School was called off in Buffalo at noon that day because of the nasty roads and there was a vehicle wreck near Ludlow that morning because of the icy highway. School was called off on Thursday because of the nasty snow storm that day.

According to the calendar, winter doesn't start until December 21 but winter has set in hard around here. It started snowing late Wednesday night and it snowed all day Thursday, leaving the ground buried in the deep white stuff. Taz and Trig had been helping Colt Floyd all week, but they stayed home to help with chores during the storm on Thursday.

Friday was Veterans Day and we woke up to a temperature of 11 degrees below zero that morning with the ground covered with snow. The little peo-

ple from next door got dressed up warm and had a fun time out playing in the snow and sliding down the hill in the sled. Casey and Missy went to Bowman that afternoon and the roads were getting a lot better.

It was 16 below when we woke up Saturday morning, but it didn't feel all that bad outside with no wind and it warmed up to 20 degrees above that day. Bryce and Braxton came up from Rapid City before noon. Reub and I went to Hettinger that afternoon and we came over to visit Bryce and Braxton when we got home. Missy had Taz and Amanda and the kids and Reub and I for supper that evening and we got to have a good visit with Bryce before she and Braxton drove back to Rapid that night.

We had Ladies Aid after church Sunday morning because it is usually held on

Tuesday, but that was when the Veterans Day program was going to be held at the school in Buffalo Tuesday afternoon and we didn't want to interfere with that. Casey brought Reub home from church and fed him lunch and Missy brought me home after the meeting. These young folks sure take good care of us old folks!

My great uncle, Gustav Schmidt, a full-blood German, changed his name to Gus Smith and went overseas to fight those nasty Germans in WWI and he died in France on October 31, 1918, two days after his 23rd birthday. His body was shipped home and is buried in the Greenhill Cemetery in Lemmon. This is what was on the banner with his picture that was sent to my grandmother, Lydia Wilkinson, who was his sister:

He heard humanity's clear call,  
And knew the voice divine;  
He gave his life, he gave his all,  
In deadly battle line.

The silent stars in love look down  
Where lies this loyal son;  
In frost and dew they weave a crown  
Of honor he has won.  
There is no North, there is no South,  
There is no East or West today;  
We're one big Nation, following-  
The Man and Flag who lead the way!  
My father, Sgt. Bryce White, helped to liberate Paris and I was reminded of that when I read this:  
Robert Whiting, an elderly gentleman of 98, arrived in Paris by plane. At French Customs, he took a few minutes to locate his passport in his carry on.  
"You have been to France before, monsieur?" the customs officer asked sarcastically.  
Mr. Whiting admitted that he had been to France previously.  
"Then you should know enough to have your passport ready."  
The American said, "The last time I was here, I didn't have to show it."  
"Impossible. Americans always have to show their passports on arrival in France!"  
The American senior gave the Frenchman a long hard look. Then he quietly explained, "Well, when I came ashore at Omaha Beach on D-Day in 1944 to help liberate this country, I couldn't find a single Frenchmen to show a passport to."  
You could have heard a pin drop.

November 14, 1912

The Reikke bridge 10 miles north of town has been completed and it makes a great improvement in the Newell, Castle Rock and Hoover road. The Willow Creek Bridge at Peter Edward's place has been repaired and the public is again traveling that road.

C.F. McClung's Billiard Hall is for sale, having been moved out of Newell, he desires to sell the Billiard Hall, lot and buildings thereon at a bargain. All if taken before January 1st, 1913. For particulars call or address Mr. Clung at Newell.

In the Tarrell School of Freeman School District No. 1, the following pupils were neither late nor tardy during the month: Delia, Lillie, Robert and Ruth Richards. Mr. William Greenberg is the teacher there this term.

Mayor Damon suggested that the League give a benefit affair of some kind and raise the necessary funds for same.

The long delayed shipment of factory brick needed for the completion of the new school building arrived Saturday and the masons are again active. Weather permitting; the brick work will be completed in about 10 days.

Fred Keaston has attained splendid success in the operation of his radiophone, which was installed a few weeks ago. It is working fine and the Kenaston residence is now the scene of almost nightly radio parties. Fred is able to quickly pick up a large number of the big broadcasting stations and many fine concerts all being enjoyed by the Kenaston family and their guests. With the present equipment he has been receiving especially fine concerts from the following cities: Fort Worth, Dallas, Kansas City, St. Louis and some foreign countries.

Work on the Newell Lake project spillway was resumed this week under authorization of the State Game & Fish Commission after having been abruptly halted several weeks ago when the Reconstructive Finance Corporation funds were about to be depleted. 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Horse Creek School - It was a central meeting place for the Horse Creek Community. Besides holding school classes, they hosted many fund raisers for worthwhile causes.

November 9, 1922  
At the Newell City Council that met at its regular monthly meeting, presided by Mayor Damon; Justice Jamison appealed to the Council to provide a room for his court. The judge reported that he had heard 9 cases in the past few weeks and was in need of suitable quarters. Alderman Scott was delegated to arrange for a court room. A request of the Civic League for a fence around the city reservoir, as a protection to the school children was presented.

November 10, 1932  
A total of \$38.11 was realized from the benefit dance recently given by the ladies at the Horse Creek hall for Henry Reikke. The money was turned over to Henry on October 16th to help out with the expenses incident to his hospital treatment. Latest reports are that he is improving from the effects of having his leg amputated, but he is still required to make visits every 2 weeks to the hospital for treatment. Dance music was furnished by the Newell

Farmers and their sons whose services are necessary on the family farm will have a hard time enlisting in the Navy from now on. Co-operating with the Man-Power Commission, the Navy says it will no more draft eligible men of dairy, livestock and poultry farms who have been placed on deferred classification by their Draft Boards. The step has been taken, the Navy said, to assist the nation in keeping the home front man-power in tact. Because of the labor shortage, both on the

farm and elsewhere it is expected that there will be a lull in tree shelterbelt planting for the duration. Because of its success, however expanded activity is expected when the war is won.

November 13, 1952  
Annual membership of the Butte Electric Co-operative to be held at Newell city Hall this Saturday, it has been announced by Douglas Eickelman, BEC Manager, Registration will begin at 10:00 AM and business session will begin at 1:00 PM. three directors for 3-year terms will be elected. Donuts and coffee will be served all day. Several door prizes will be awarded to members in attendance, donated by local electric dealers and also a special prize for an Ironrite Automatic Ironer. At the close of the day a "R-E-A Day" dance will be held at the City Hall to music by Johnnie Hines and his orchestra.

November 8, 1962


