Dispatch Center Merger May Take in More Territory

BELLE FOURCHE - During the Butte County Commissioners' meeting Nov. 5th officials indicated that plans for a regional dispatch center may proceed a bit slower than previously thought.

Sheriff Fred Lamphere said the planned merger with Butte and Meade counties that was expected shortly after the beginning of the year will slow down a bit and it might encompass an even wider regional footprint that would include Lawrence County.

"We don't have to do anything right now, we're in a position to make some choices," Lamphere said.

As it stands Butte County's dispatch center serves fewer than 30,000 residents, which means the county may only recoup 70% of 9-11 taxes that are collected in the county. With a merger that number would exceed 30,000 and the county would recoup up to 100% of the tax, which is a surcharge on telephone services.

The 9-11 dispatch centers, known as Public Safety Answering Points (P-SAPS) are the important link between callers who need help and emergency response teams. These could include house fires, traffic accidents, burglaries, weather disasters and many others. Over the past few years there has been a merging of P-SAPS statewide to create greater efficiencies.

Lamphere noted regulations for dispatch centers are universal across South Dakota. For example, Butte County must meet the same standards as Pennington County. He added, "I think that discussion needs to stay open and we need to explore all of our options."

Another update from the Sheriff's Department was the decision that any new vehicles purchased in the future would be three-quarter ton pickups rather

JCA Members Say Harding County Gas Well Abandonment Must Be Dealt With Joint Committee on Appropriations West River tour visits Spyglass Wells.

Appropriations held their West River Tour early last week. After a planning discussion

in the conference room at the Deadwood Holiday Inn the tour headed to Spyglass Natural Gas Wells in what is know as the Jump Off Field. The were directed to the site by landowners Ray and Linda Gilbert.

The grouping is located south off the Hett/Gilbert Road three miles west of US Highway 85. The Harding County site is in District 28, the District of our

State Senator, Ryan Maher of Isabel. Senator Maher is Vice-Chair

of the Joint Appropriations Committee.

Maher told the Beacon that he is confident that Committee will work with the DENR to provide the landowners permission to utilize their land and deal with the abandoned property.

Maher stated, "The east river Appropriations committee members said this cannot continue. Just because it is in an area of the state where the population is sparse it cannot be ignored." They continued, "If this situation existed anywhere in the eastern part of the state it would already have been dealt with."

Between 2006 and 2010, Spyglass Cedar Creek, a Houston, Texas company drilled 40 natural gas wells in northwestern South Dakota. In 2012, half of the wells were not producing gas and were no longer in compliance with state regulations.

The South Dakota Department of Environment and Natural Resources directed Spyglass to bring the wells into compliance or submit a request for temporary abandonment. Spyglass did **GAS WELLS** A6

City Council Kicks Around Longterm Soccer Association Agreement

BELLE FOURCHE - The Belle Fourche Soccer Association and the City have reached agreement on a new lease for the use of the soccer fields at the Roundup grounds that will run through 2029 and limit the use of the fields to soccer and soccer-related activities only. The approval came at the City Council's Nov. 4th regular meeting after about 20 minutes of discussion.

After the usual agenda adoption and approval for minutes, Mayor Gloria Landphere read a proclamation honoring area veterans and recognizing Nov. 11th as Veteran's Day in the city. Following the speech, veterans on the council and in Afterwards, Mayor Landphere swore in a new City of Belle Fourche Police officer, Stephen Schmeltzer.

Before the debate on the soccer field agreement, several reports were given by local organizations. The Tri-State Museum & Visitors Center provided statistics from last month. October saw 876 visitors from 46 states, 10 countries, and recorded more than 200 volunteer hours. Continuing in her report Director Kristi Thielen included a jovial touch adding, "Our 3rd annual Pumpkin Fest was a great success judging from the highly scientific method of how many goody bags were given out."

The Legal & Finance Committee had four items on the consent agenda slated for and Butte County Commissioner, James Ager asked that one item be pulled from the consent agenda to the regular agenda for discussion.

The issue at hand was approving a 10-year exclusivity agreement for the use of the soccer field near the Roundup grounds.

Ager questioned the length of the contract and Councilman Randy Schmidt also added that a shorter lease term might be advisable saying, "I was just kind of hoping it would keep the council involved."

Mayor Landphere noted that although it seemed like a long time frame, there was a purpose behind it. The City Council then asked for input from members of the Belle Fourche Soccer Board to find out more information on why an exclusivity agreement and 10-year term **SOCCER LEASE** A6

Rail Park Siding Improvements Ready for Business

\$40k road and loading area complete but more to come.

BELLE FOURCHE - Improvements to the rail siding transloading area at the Belle Fourche Industrial and Rail Park on the city's northwest side are complete, but more improvements may be on the way.

In order to allow for smoother large vehicle access a west entrance road to the rail siding was added and an additional transloading area was built along the siding this past summer. The \$40,000 improved access road and siding transloading space was to accommodate a new customer.

In all, since 2012 more than \$4 million dollars has been invested on infrastructure and rail in the park, which has full utilities in place. But the new access road appears to be just the beginning of future improvements.

"We know that we have more development that we want to do," said Hollie Stalder, Belle Fourche Development Corporation (BFDC) Executive Director. "We have customers that are utilizing the rail siding and we are running out of space."

The siding will hold 33 railcars from switch to switch and the siding is used regularly by at least two customers, a local plastics manufacturer and a steel pipeline operation. Stalder says she is getting more and more calls from customers who want to bring additional carloads into

the transloading facility but space is already very tight.

"I don't want to have to turn people away," Stalder said. "So we're looking to see how we can continue to develop the rail plan to accommodate more customers, utilizing the rail siding and maybe even getting new business to locate in Belle Fourche."

The next phase of development is already underway as the BFDC would like to add nearly 4,000 feet of additional rail siding. Funding that expansion is off to a good start.

"We have applied for a grant and we have our initial approval to continue to move that process forward," Stalder said. "We know that we have a 5-year plan that we're looking at with that. A lot of that will happen within a year or two but we've given ourselves a buffer there since there's quite a bit of work at hand."

The grant project is set at just under \$2.4 million dollars. It is an 80-20 matching grant meaning that the BFDC will need to secure 20% of the funding for the 80% to be released.

The BFDC set priorities and goals at their late October community work session and the industrial and rail park figured significantly into those plans. The organization would like to increase inquiries into the park by 50% over the next five years and the expanded siding would help fuel that goal.

"A big part of our funding is how do we market the assets that we have in Belle Fourche to potential businesses," Stalder said during the work session. "We're thankful for the support that we receive and we really rely on that to be consistent with our plan of work so we can grow the property tax base and create those jobs that are so important."

To date, the industrial park houses two tenants employing more than 60 people with a total investment of \$12 million.

Belle Fourche Chamber Names New Director





He grew up in Spearfish and grad-


uated from Spearfish High School in 1953. He graduated from the South Dakota School of Mines and Technology in 1957 with a degree in geological engineering.



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

Black Hills Reads!

Badlands Head Start: Prenatal to Five was awarded \$1,000 from the United Way of the Black Hills to purchase books through First Book Marketplace to distribute to enrolled children throughout the year. Over 450 books with 45 different titles were purchased. This grant gives children a chance to pick a book out to keep for their home library which helps increase children's literacy. Badlands HS is grateful to the United Way of the Black Hills and the First Book Marketplace for this awesome literacy opportunity for the families they serve.

Black Hills Reads is an initiative under the United Way of the Black Hills umbrella. Black Hills Reads focuses on helping children reach reading proficiency by 3rd grade. They are the backbone initiative that is bringing together partners across sectors to create a greater collective impact on early childhood reading proficiency and make sustainable results.

In May 2019, Black Hills Reads was Selected among over 100 applications to receive and award of \$7,250 for new books and eBooks through the First Book OMG Book Awards program.

Black Hills Reads distributed 1,913 books to 6 different organizations including: TREC: Badlands Head Start, Early Childhood Connections, Rural America Initiatives, South Dakota Department of Health, Black Hills Special Services Cooperative, 21st Century Discovery Centers, and Baby's First Book Bag through the Black Hills Reads program. In addition, 32 teachers in the Black Hills received credit from the grant to order books for their classrooms.

Along with Receiving books, Badlands Head Start partnered with Black Hills Reads for their reading challenge. Black Hills Race to Read Challenge will showcase our service area by putting up snowflakes with the number of families and books read at each cluster or center at the Civic Center for the holiday season.

In conjunction with the Black Hills Race to Read Challenge, our teachers and home visitors were asked to challenge their families to participate in a local challenge within their classrooms. Throughout this reading challenge time frame in Butte County, 35 of our children participated with 721 books being read.



not respond. By 2014, all wells were out of compliance and inspections revealed that some were leaking gas. The wells were subsequently abandoned by Spyglass Cedar Creek. The state DENR estimates it will take \$900,000 to plug the wells. The state has sued the Texas energy company for \$15.5 million.

With the site in litigation landowners have not been able to utilize or maintain any of the abandoned property. Equipment of value has long since be retrieved and in one case ripped the wall off the side of a building to retrieve a compressor. The building located on the Hett Ranch can not be repaired or the shed used.


To start this week, I'd like to publicly apologize to the people of the area.



A New Way to Help

NEWELL – It's long been known that most teachers spend a good chunk of their paychecks on supplies for their classroom each year. It may come in the form of items needed for specific projects the teacher decides to do, with no funding available from the school for these things. But more often, it is just the everyday items that students cannot supply for themselves.

That's why a new fundraiser idea, which is practically painless to family, friends and community members, is such a great idea. Just by logging onto a website at schoolstore.com, a shopping for a variety of items including books, food, home décor, jewelry and magazines, a portion of the purchase price will go back to the school. This may run from 3 to 5 percent, depending on the merchant supplying the items to SchoolStore. When someone shops on the site, they designate the Newell Elementary school, and even a classroom and student of their choice, including the school library. As students are selected, they earn prize points and in return receive prizes such as an I-pad, Drone, and Echo Dot as well as other great prizes.

People can also shop at dozens of different stores such as Kohls, J.C. Penny, Barnes & Noble, Office Max, and many others just by clicking on the Merchant tab.

"The school has participated in this fundraiser in the past with great success," said Karen Wallace, the coordinator for the school. "I decided to participate again when I was contacted by a School Store representative.

Supporters can also make donations of gift cards rather than shopping for items, rather that purchasing items, and they can designate the gift cards go directly to a specific classroom teacher. The full amount goes to the teacher to purchase needed "The nice thing about this fundraiser is that it lasts the entire school year," said Wallace. "So, you can shop through schoolstore.com at one of the retail merchants and know you are making a difference on the local level even though shopping online."

Wallace generates reports through the website and it shows how much each class has brought in through people shopping or buying gift cards. Schoolstore then sends the gift cards for all monies to the school. The teachers then choose what to purchase with the donations.

Wallace said that while there is a good selection of books and magazines, she really likes the Home Décor that is offered, saying there are tasteful decorations for all the seasons as well as the holidays.

"I like this program because there is a \$0 cost to the school to participate," she said. "We do not have to pay and shipping or handling fees or anything at all to receive the prizes. Since they are tracked by schoolstore.com, they will automatically send the student rewards as they are achieved."

Wallace said she considers this a win-win for the students and teachers, sharing that it only takes five minutes for the classroom teacher to present the video and hand out student packets to inform families of the program.

"Within just a couple of days of having the info out to the families, there was around \$2,000 raised in donations," said Wallace. With reports generated once a week, kids have the chance to win more prizes, while the school classrooms and teachers have a bit of the burden lifted. This type of program, where all the heavy lifting is done by the company itself, saves a lot of time and effort for fundraising by teachers who already carry a big load.

news@bellefourchebeacon.com NEWELL – On her darkest days, Hope Komes, Newell, knows there are a whole host of women she can contact. And though they might not be available to physically interact at a moment's notice, most are willing to be woken in the middle of the night when this local woman reaches out.

It all started years ago when Hope and Todd Komes' son, Joseph, entered the military. "I accidentally found it (the closed Facebook page)," said Komes of this page that is Military mom's supporting other military moms. "I found it online and that led to some good friendships, a lot of emotional support and the chance to know that there were others out there just like me."

Komes said she has always struggled with emotional support, but when her son entered the military and was deployed in various dangerous areas, many of which she cannot name, she needed help. And who better than another mom in the exact same situation.

Komes said she would set up times to meet others on various chatrooms where they could vent to each other, lend concrete advice, and just be a support system like no other.

"I met one gal, Tiara, from Arkansas, and it was so cool cause her son was over there too," said Komes. She told of how her friend's son would see Komes' son, and relay the info that he was ok, even during blackout times, when no information flows about where troops are located or what they are doing.

"My son, Jeffrey, talked to Joe, and he's okay," Tiara would relate. Jeffrey and Joe graduated boot camp together and that started the bond. Over the years the two have been located together various times.

"God puts certain people in your path to help you," said Komes, of her Military Mom's friends. "When I'm upset, I can call one of these ladies and feel the calmness wash over me, and know that all these mom's put him on their prayer list at church."

Tiara actually came to South Dakota to visit Komes and they met for the first time. They went camping, played tourist, and although they'd known each other for 15 years, they had never met.

"We call each other, send Christmas cards, truly like a family," said Komes. "We're never really alone, because we can reach out at any time to the MM site."

Another friend Komes met through the site is Brenda, from Indiana. Komes has also met this woman in person when she went to stay with her not long ago.

And long-distance support is not the only thing these moms do for each other. Recently they sent gift to the funeral of a military member who was killed. These small gifts remind the survivors that there are others out there supporting them, praying for them, and available to them.

And they do need the support, especially women like Komes, who has had, not one son, but three enter the military. Her youngest son, Matt, is in the National Guard and is a fireman at Camp Rapid in Rapid City. Joe, her eldest, entered the service before his senior year of high school and has been posted in various parts of the world. Currently he lives in the southeast part of the country, but may soon be transferred to a different post in December. He is currently an overseas school, master fitness trainer. Komes said he has had various opportunities as he entered the service as air-born infantry.

"He weaved his way through the military," said Komes. "In his position now, he helps (military) people get nutritional needs correct, and is a personal trainer. He has gone to school for a lot of these things." Her middle son, Jesse, is currently deployed.

"We can't talk about where he is and what's happening," said Komes. "The government and military have put certain procedures in place." This is where the MM members go into action. They may hear from their child who has seen Jesse and be able to relate, once they are out of their current environment, that their child reports that all is fine.

Komes said that currently there are probably 15 mom's she is in contact with that have soldiers deployed. And it's not about where their children are or what they are doing, but more about supporting each other through the tough times.

123 years ago Belle Fourche Times Nov 13, 1896 Election News

After January 1st, the editor of this paper will be empowered to perform marriage ceremonies, having been elected justice at the late election. We shall make no charge so far as finance is concerned, but there is one point which we charge all applicants to keep in view. They must secure the "Aid and consent of foreign nations." This is the system under which we now live, and in order to be loyal, we shall conform. *Talk of the Town* District court convened Monday. A number of important cases were on the docket. Harry Young, charged with horse stealing, plead guilty to petit larceny, and was sentenced to thirty days in jail at hard labor. In the case of T. W. McDonald vs. George Fuller, verdict was rendered in favor of plaintiff. Wm. Yokum, charged with the murder of James Barnes, pleaded not guilty. The case was continued until January.

Mr. Whiting admitted that he had been to France previously.


"Then you should know enough to have your passport ready.'


