Middle School and High School Hold Veteran's Day Programs

When VFW Post 3312 posted the colors at the program, it was more special than usual. Student Council emcees John Hale and Alexis Picket announced that the flags and stands that day were donated to the BFMS by VFW Post 3312.

Another notable event during the program was recognition of the BFMS Outstanding Veterans Day Program Supporter, Joann Stephens.

Here is an excerpt from the award introduction presented by Principal Kevin Smidt: "Joann Stephens was one of the founders of our Veterans Day Program at BFMS. In 1997, a Veteran by the name of Jim Matson and his wife Cynthia heard that our 7th grade students and middle school musicians were planning to celebrate Veterans Day in the Community Center.

With the help of these two and many other local veterans, Joann was part of a partnership that would last for over two decades. She always said her own



father, a veteran, was the reason she was excited about doing the program every November, and she also helped our students recognize their family veterans year after year.

Over the years, Joann encouraged all of the students to participate in our veterans activities and helped organize small programs in the community for students to present. To this day our middle school students present a separate program for our local nursing home on Veterans Day so that those Veterans know they are appreciated also."

Another notable event during the program was a presentation by "Center of the Nation" VFW Post 3312: a Veteran statue titled "Stand for the Flag" and a commemorative plaque.

Post 3312 Commander Nathan Juelfs read the text of the plaque. "In special recognition of Ms. Reva Potter and Mrs. Joann Stephens for producing the BFMS Veterans Day Program since 1997. Their commitment has led to the education of multiple generations of students in citizenship, patriotism, and a great appreciation for the American way of life. Their model has shown each of these students a greater gratitude for Veterans and their sacrifices. Through their dedication we have become a more patriotic school and community." The 7th grade program team tested the audience's military knowledge with an entertaining jeopardy-style trivia game. The BFMS band performed under the direction of Rebbeca Fahey as well as the middle school choir students under the direction of Karlee Gusso, and

a number of 7th grade poetry presenters. Following the program, the middle school student council students hosted a coffee, punch, and cookie reception for the guests.

The Veteran's Day program at the high school also started with VFW Post 3312 posting the colors, and the BFHS Choir singing "The Star Spangled Banner". Mayor Randy Schmidt read the city's Veteran's Day proclamation.

Ayden Kummer recited Lincoln's 1863 Gettysburg address followed by special guest speaker, SSG Sarah Wipf, US Army SD National Guard.

Morgan Mackaben and Dylan Martin told of the symbolism of Flag Folding while it was demonstrated by Evelyn Lyons and Anthony Budmayr.

A"Tribute to All Who Serve" video, produced by the students and filmed by Lily Nore, Aleyah Carbajal and Sloan Young and presented by Allison Labrier was shown.

"The Unknown Soldier" was recited by Aubrie Hobbs, followed by "Armed Forces on Parade" by the BFHS band under the direction of Mr. Micah Pennel.

Parents Express Concern Over District Apology Letter

news@bellefourchebeacon.com BELLE FOURCHE - A group of parents and students, attending the Nov. 8th regular Belle Fourche School District board meeting, politely expressed their displeasure over an apology letter written on behalf of the student body of Belle Fourche High School that the district sent to the Red Cloud School following an incident at a Bronc home volleyball game on Oct. 14th.

Red Cloud Indian School is located on the Pine Ridge Reservation east of Rapid City and is often on the Broncs' yearly athletic schedule in a variety of sports.

Twelve parents and students were present as they made their concerns known during open forum time at the meeting. Two parents of Belle Fourche students, Laura Young and Kelly Keegan, spoke on behalf of the group. Young presented a letter she had written for the group of parents, and Keegan read into the public record a letter her daughter Sloane, a senior, had written. The presentation was cordial and lasted about ten minutes.

At home volleyball games, according to Young, the student section customarily has a theme night. The theme night for the Red Cloud game was USA and patriotism. It was to have been the theme night for the previous home game, but that game was canceled due to weather. The majority of students and fans came to the game wearing red, white, and blue apparel with a few students wearing shirts with profanity, according to Adam Nowowiejski, Belle Fourche Schools Activities Director.

"They were wearing political attire, Trump attire and Biden attire. Some of it was inappropriate," Nowowiejski told the Beacon. "And to those students, I made them dispose of their stuff."

As the match was about to begin, Young told the school board that the Red Cloud team, coaches and fans peacefully protested the flag by turning their back to it during the National Anthem. "And this is their right," Young said.

When asked about that later, Nowowiejski told the Beacon he personally did not see the silent protest. He was outside the gymnasium at the time resolving a ticket booth issue, but was later told about the incident.

At some point during the match, according to administration and eyewitness reports, the assistant volleyball coach at Red Cloud approached high school principal Matthew Raba and Nowowiejski, who were sitting behind the scorers' table, with a complaint. The complaint centered on war whoops

and chants of "go home" coming from the Belle Fourche student section.

"Matthew and I were behind the head table and one of the coaches felt that one of our students was saying some things and making some noises that were insensitive," Nowowiejski told the Beacon. "I went over there and took care of it. And that was essentially what happened at the game from my perspective."

Nowowiejski said he was not able to comment on what disciplinary action was taken.

Red Cloud sent letters to Belle Fourche High School and to the state's activities association registering their complaint regarding the lack of sportsmanship exhibited in the student section. "They were asking for some action to be taken," Nowowiejski said. He declined to say what action was requested.

Nowowiejski said the school administration held a meeting to discuss wording a letter to respond to the Red Cloud School. "Red Cloud felt as if they were treated in an ill way, so essentially that's where that motivation came from, to right a wrong."

An emergency student council meeting was held on or about Oct. 26th. During that meeting a letter, drafted by the district, was presented to the student council. The Beacon was provided a copy of that letter from Dr. Steve Willard, Belle School Board A8



Belle Fourche Youth Baseball Seeks Coaches for its 2022 Season

Belle Fourche Legion Post 32 has begun a search for coaches for its 2022 season. Coaches are being sought in three divisions: VFW Head and Assistant Coach (ages 13-14), as well as Junior Legion Head and Assistant Coach (ages 15-16) and Senior Legion Assistant (ages 17-18).

The letter apologized for the conduct at the game and was submitted on behalf of the entire student body, signed by Raba, Nowowiejski and Karen Schlekeway, District-wide Librarian and faculty advisor to

written by her daughter Dru, who plays basketball and runs track for BFHS. She was at the game and said she did not observe the behavior referenced in the apology letter. She said the student body does not deserve to be labeled racist and then to



the student council. The letter was reviewed and approved by Willard.

"We know how our actions were racially insensitive and unsportsmanlike," the letter read in part. "We will make it our mission to learn from this experience and will use this as a chance to develop empathy and mutual respect for all our opponents. We look forward to welcoming you back to our school and our gymnasium on February 1st when we play you in basketball."

The parent group was specifically upset at how the letter was written in light of the fact that many of them never observed or heard the inappropriate behavior at the game and were troubled that the entire student body was lumped into what the administration saw as the actions of a few students.

"I was in attendance at the Red Cloud game," Young told the board. "I personally saw or heard nothing that would warrant such a letter and I was personally offended that this administration called my daughter and the other students racially insensitive. I felt like it was a slap in my husband's and our face for our parenting too."

Young said she was able to meet with Mr. Raba on November 4th to discuss the school's apology letter and was told that having the letter written on behalf of the entire student body was the best approach to resolve the issue, a response she was less than satisfied with.

"This is a huge mistake to admit guilt for something we did not do," Young continued. "In the future, if some unfortunate event happens, Red Cloud can now say we have a history of racism. They can pull out this letter and show that even their staff has admitted that their entire student body was being racially insensitive."

Several student letters were submitted to the board for

have a letter written without their knowledge and signed on behalf of the student body.

"During many basketball seasons we have been taught to never talk back when their crowd is upset and their girls are upset with us," Keegan's letter read. "We are always respectful to Red Cloud when we play them. When they play their Native National Anthem we stand up so is it too much to ask for the same amount of respect?"

Willard stood by the letter. "From what I understand when they showed me the letter it was a general apology for some behavior that was not becoming of sportsmanship," he told the Beacon, "I think it was a fan that said something they shouldn't have and Adam addressed it immediately and that was it."

Willard said a copy of the apology letter was sent to Dr. Dan Swartos, Executive Director of the South Dakota High School Activities Association.

"He was happy with how the two schools worked things out and the response Adam made toward the situation. He sent emails giving Adam kudos. You can tell it had an impact because when we went to Hill City and when we played Lead-Deadwood the kids were absolutely great, I'm so proud of them."

The parent group told the school board they would like to see an apology from Ms. Schlekeway for not allowing "the student council to use the democratic process to vote on whether the apology letter should have been written or not." They would also like Raba to explain the meaning of "making it our mission to learn from this experience," a reference from the letter. And they requested a definition of sportsmanship from Nowowiejski, because "from where we were sitting the crowd did

Masks Required at 2021 WNFR

LAS VEGAS - Based on current State of Nevada guidelines that have been in place since September, Las Vegas Events announced today the Wrangler National Finals Rodeo at the Thomas & Mack Center and The Cowboy Channel Cowboy Christmas at the Las Vegas Convention Center will both require masks for entrance. Proof of vaccination is not required to gain entry.

When proof of vaccination isn't a condition of entry for indoor events or in crowded outdoor settings throughout

Clark County, all individuals, regardless of vaccination status are required to wear face coverings.

The Wrangler NFR will run from Dec. 2-11, while The Cowboy Channel Cowboy Christmas will open Dec. 1 and run through Dec. 11.

Masks will also be required on the complimentary Teton Ridge NFR Express Shuttle buses that run from 24 sponsor hotels to the Thomas & Mack Center.

The event offers a purse of more than \$10.2 million.



Been a sad week around here. A friend from down in Nebraska had a young son injured in a car wreck. He was thrown clear and had injuries, the worse being to his brain. They life flighted him to Omaha and had been having good luck getting him revived and fixed for about a month. He had been up and walking about and was complaining of having to stay in a hospital but yet stayed cheerful as best he could.

Then we had an older cowboy pass away. Knew him most of my life. When I was young he was known as someone who would start bronc, didn't matter how tough

the horse was. After a wife and child came along, his wife made him swear off. But he passed on his knowledge of colts to two sons.

His funeral was truly a celebration of life. Many great remembrances of him. It helped that one of the pastors had known him for years and was a friend.

I remember hearing of him working for a local ranch that raised horses. He was breaking colts. He would tie one bronc to another ones tail, ride the one in front and head out. When he cam back later in the day, he would be riding the back horse, who he had switched to the front and saddled somewhere out in the big wide open. It wasn't Ray Hunt style, but I bet he got them sacked out good!

One day we had gathered cattle out of the breaks, up on top to brand. We penned them in a set of portable corrals. As most cattle people know, cattle tend to sort back the best, out of the same gate they came in. That is normal operating procedure. Evidently no one had explained that to this bunch!

We tried sorting cows back off from their calves out of the gate they came in, but it wasn't working at all. So we went to the opposite end and tried sorting that way. It didn't work any better.

So in exasperation we

opened the pen up on the side and started trying to get them out that way. About then, this cowboy I am talking about showed up to help. Just drove in without a horse. Walked up and went to helping. Pretty soon he was in the gate, afoot, and things started to improve. I had taken off my jacket and passed it to him and he used it like a matador would his cape, so to speak. When a calf was coming for the opening, he could stop it with a slight movement of the jacket, while cows went on by. He slipped and slid from side to side, much like a good dancer. It was wonderful to watch.

In hindsight, now, I realize he really understood cattle and how they worked. He knew when a calf was going to stop and let his mother leave him and when he had to stop it. Beautiful!

Few who do not work around cattle and many who do, have no idea how someone who can read stock like that can make life easier for the cattle and the crew. I often think of that day whenever I am involved with sorting cattle.

So, as I go about this week, I will think fondly of Ronnie and that little cowboy who is giving so much to help other. May God bless him and his family.

Fruitdale Feedlot Fire Claims Thousands of Bales

news@bellefourchebeacon.com FRUITDALE - Foothills Feeders, located at 19156 Danish Rd., Fruitdale, was a hot spot, from the first call-out to the Nisland/Arpan Fire & Rescue (NAVFR) on Wednesday through Saturday when the final truck left the site

from east river, ignited spontaneously. It had been moved to a different location than the original stack but was close enough that it was quickly engulfed and caught other bales on fire.

"This was in the same hay yard but in a different spot,' said Lewis. "They considered safe as it had not ignited tore the original stack apart and set bales all over the place. The response to the second call on Thursday saw that one bale combust and since it was on the most western area it got away before they realized what was happening, according to the chief.

"The enormity of it can't be put into words," said Lewis. "No idea how many bales, in

the thousands, big rounds and big squares."

Nisland got the first call and stayed through Wednesday. The second call was NAVFR initially and then Belle Fourche and Vale came onboard. There was also mutual aid from Sturgis with a brush truck.

"I called for everybody that was available. You can't throw all your resources at one deal. We needed some available to cover for us."

The extreme winds contributed to the event which lasted through Friday night at 5:30

"Our first call came around 12:50 on Wednesday," said NAVFR Fire Chief Stan Lewis, the incident commander. "This was really two separate fires, with the same location." Lewis said NAVFR got the call and responded to big round bales of hay that had spontaneously combusted.

"They called us to say they had some hot bales that they had set out and that it would be nice to have a fire truck on hand," said Lewis. "They got into the stack and bales began igniting as they were moving the stack. Our department burned those bales. We were there till around 10 p.m. that night."

The next signal came on Thursday morning around 5 a.m. as another bale, from the original truckload that came

previously and hadn't caused any issues." The feedlot owners



Handling Livestock in a Low Stress Environment

VALE – There were over 75 ranchers and stockmen gathered at the Blair Brothers Ranch near Vale, SD to hear Curt Pate share his knowledge on stockmanship. The Montana rancher has been conducting demonstrations and clinics centering on stockmanship, colt starting, horsemanship, and safety for more than two decades. The event was sponsored by the South Dakota Grassland Coalition.

The morning started out with a clinic inside with Pate sharing his knowledge and engaging the crowd in several stories to supplement his pointers.

"I'm not trying to change what you do," he said. But he gave the group several ideas on ways to enhance their stockmanship.

It's all about ideas, he continued. The hardest thing he can do is to teach stockmanship, a word he uses to demonstrate that working with livestock is more than pushing them from one place to another.

The modern world takes away from being a true stockman according to Pate. Everything in the world today is to get behind something to make it go. The habit of today's lifestyle is to push, push, push. So as a stockman, Pate said that it is important to get rid of the habit to be pushy and crowd and to follow the one in front. Pate encouraged the gathering to learn to get the feel of things around them and see what is happening.

began to explain the pressure of Driving. Driving can also be from the side, the flatter the angle of approach, the less strong is the drive. Because of the biology of a cattle's eye, it's vital to realize how the livestock handler is seen by the animal. Cattle can see behind to a certain extent, but the vision is blurry. As the stockman comes closer to the shoulder, vision is clearer. The animal's instinct makes them to turn their heads to see what is behind them, instinct drives them to see with both eyes. As Pate pointed out, it's important to have the animal "switch eyes" when moving them straight ahead. As many livestock handlers know, cattle slow down so they can see you.

Drawing is as simple as shaking a bucket of grain or hauling a bale of hay out with a tractor. It's very interesting, pointed out Pate, that an animal can only think about one thing at a time. That is an important point to consider when working with livestock. Keep the animal on the thinking side of the brain (the right side) to maximize the handling process. According to Pate, if livestock are handled using the reacting (panic) side enough, the animal will become stressed and sickly.

"Keep them on the thinking side and decrease the flight zone," Pate said.

That brings the final type of pressure, Maintaining or Balancing. The balance point is just behind the shoulder. This point keeps the animal moving forward. By moving to the front of the shoulder, the animal will turn. session, Pate said, "It's about you and how you work. You may need to change things. Feel, read the animal, and know what to do."

Following lunch, the crowd moved outside to the pens at the Blair Brothers Ranch. Pate demonstrated techniques for working with cattle and horses on the ranch.

"With the volume of water coming into the basement, there has to be something going on besides rainwater runoff." The board did vote to approve the expenditure of \$3400 to place Piezometers for testing water levels. There will be two piezometer's placed 24 feet below the foundation floor level.

"Leave the human world behind," he said.

Sometimes, he pointed out, we get a "mad" on to work our cattle and forget what a great thing being a stockman can be.

"Some of the worst days of my life have been working cattle and some of the best days of my life have been working cattle," he said.

The first thing that Pate addressed was the three kinds of pressure used in stockmanship. A stockman needs to get the concept of pressure. As a sensitive thing, cattle can feel pressure and if a stockman puts on the wrong pressure, they won't work.

The three kinds of pressure are Driving, Drawing, and Maintaining or Balancing. As Pate outlined each type, he gave practical demonstrations using his body language and his hat as a prop.

Most stockman drive cattle

It's important to appreciate that the balance point is always changing, Pate said.

Maintaining pressure is achieved by focusing on stockmanship, maintaining a presence, and doing enough to keep the animal thinking about you, the stockman.

According to Pate, it is very important in how the cattle perceive who you as a stockman are. Cattle need to feel comfortable around people. They will gain better and be in better health.

Pate emphasized that the only way to work cattle quickly is to work slowly. Don't think too much, just do, back off and restart if you need to, he said.

"The simpler you keep things, the better," he said. Don't lose control of your emotions he reminded the crowd. As he concluded the morning he needs to do additional investigation and wants to place monitors that the school maintenance staff would check regularly. He wants to re-route downspouts away from the footprint of the building and then monitor through the spring and summer months. After that, the foundation of the west side of the building may need to be excavated. Bengs said he fully understood the impact on the school's budget, and that he estimates on the high side as he doesn't like to come in higher than the estimate.
