HS Winter Sports COVID Policy Goes into Effect

BELLE FOURCHE - The Belle Fourche School Board unanimously voted for the less restrictive of two options for dealing with COVID during the

winter sports season.

The South Dakota High School Activities Association (SDHSAA) Winter Sports/ Activities Task Force developed two protocol options for the state's schools to handle COVID cases. Belle Fourche Activities Directors Adam Nowowiejski presented both options to the school board at their regular meeting on Monday night Nov. 9th.

Option one had more restrictive protocols while option two, which was approved, was a bit less restrictive.

"Option one does not allow for any tournaments in basketball wrestling or any outside

Passage of Amendment A Raises Local Concerns

New Marijuana laws could bring unintended consequences, local leaders fear.

BELLE FOURCHE - The passage of Amendment A legalizing recreational marijuana use in the South Dakota is raising concerns among local law en-

forcement and school officials.
For Butte County Sheriff
Fred Lamphere it signals a
society that has given up on
protecting vulnerable segments
of the population who have the
potential to disengage from
being productive members of

the community.
For Belle Fourche School
Superintendent Dr. Steve Willard it means increased pressure on school administrators who must monitor the potential for increased abuse among students 18 and under.

On Nov. 3rd South Dakota became the first state in US history to pass both medical marijuana and recreational marijuana use simultaneously. Medical use had the support of nearly 70% of voters statewide while recreational use had 54% support statewide.

As reported in last week's Beacon Butte County voters rejected recreational use by a 53% to 47% margin while approving of medical marijuana use 61% to 39%.

A total of 15 states now approve of recreational use with Arizona, New Jersey and adjacent Montana joining South Dakota voters in approving ballot measures earlier this month.

Sheriff Lamphere says the long-term affect on society and

especially young people as well as the gateway effect of widespread marijuana use leading to harder-drug use are chief

"I'm not going to say it's the only drug that leads to other drugs," Lamphere told the Beacon, "but the people that we deal with through debriefs when they're at their lowest point, when they're in trouble with meth, heroine or cocaine, some of the heavy hitting drugs, when we've talked to them on-on-one, almost everybody tells us their first drug experience is with marijuana. There is some credence to it (being a gateway drug)."

Lamphere says that under current laws when first offenders are arrested for marijuana possession it doesn't necessarily mean that a life has been ruined. Often times it can lead to mandatory early intervention to prevent a life from spiraling downward. With legalization that intervention "guardrail" is removed.

"When they (proponents of Amendment A) advertise that one arrest can ruin a life I'm going to say that if this person's got a clean record and they've never been dealt with, and they get arrested, most prosecutors around the state and those I've dealt with locally, they take that into consideration," Lamphere said. "They don't hammer those young people to make a mark on their life forever. I'd say 80 to 90 percent of those people have been offered treatment in lieu of incarceration or prosecution; treatment plus maintaining sobriety."

In legalizing marijuana use Lamphere feels that society as a whole will be giving up on certain segment of the population that won't stop with just marijuana use.

"By saying it's okay, one of things that we're going to have to do is accept the responsibility that those people are not going to be able to be a productive part of society and we're accepting them as drug users," he said. "We're accepting them as someone that we don't give any chance of a future because (extensive drug use) is a short lifetime. A lot of guys I dealt with 30 years ago that were younger than me aren't living anymore because they were extensive drug users. And even if they do live beyond that, they become dependent on the system to support their lifestyle. It's kind of a circle that doesn't stop spinning."

Another area of concern is parents who may leave mar-

ijuana-laced products in the household where children might have access to them.

"It's blended into so many products," Lamphere said. "It's pretty innocent when you see some kids eating on gummy bears 10 years ago, but now when you see an 18-year-old chewing on gummy bears their eyes might be glassed over. How do we know as an educa-

School Board News

District Employees to Get COVID Stipend

BELLE FOURCHE - Employees of the Belle Fourche School District will soon be receiving a little extra with their paychecks. The school board gave its consent to a plan that will provide full time employees with a \$500 stipend and part time employees (30 hours or

more) with a \$250 payment.

The expenditure is allowable under the Coronavirus Relief Fund (CRF) money, which was allocated by the state of South Dakota to the school district, an amount based on enrollment. Other area school districts in western South Dakota have

already made similar moves. "It is an allowable expense,"

Superintendent Dr. Steve Willard told the Board. "This is for all the extra work that staff has had to do during the pandemic."

"We took a similar action at the (Black Hills) Special Services co-op meeting to do stipends for those folks too," said Board Member Jean Helmer.

These will be one-time payments made out of the CRF funds. The money allocated to the district through the CRF could total \$689,000. The request passed the school board with five affirmative votes and two abstentions (Nita Justice and Tammy Clem).

The CARES Act is also providing the district with COVID relief funding in the amount of

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

Duane Eugene Olson, 67, of Belle Fourche, SD, died Friday, November 6, 2020 at St. Vincent Healthcare in Billings, Montana of complications caused by COVID-19. He departed this earth holding the hand of his beloved "Lynnie", while she gave him an earful for it.

Duane was born September 11, 1953 at John Burns Hospital in Belle Fourche to Alfred and Julia (Roberg) Olson. He was the youngest of five children, loved by siblings, LeRoy, Leone, Lloyd, and Norma. He grew up in Belle Fourche, spending time at the family ranch near Gustave, SD. Duane and Lynn were looking forward to his retirement in the summer 2021. They planned to become

Pastor's Perspective

This week's Pastor's Perspective is provided by Pastor Paul Howard, Christian Life Center

The Lord is Our Refuge and Strength

In December of 1776, Thomas Paine began his editorial entitled "The Crisis" with the famous statement that... "These are the times that try men's souls." He went on to affirm that only God possessed "unlimited power" and that He (God) Almighty will never give up a people to destruction or leave them to perish.

This document was written by Paine during the dark days of the Revolutionary War and our history clearly demonstrates that God, indeed, did have His hand on those who trusted in Him.

It can easily be said that we are presently experiencing a crisis in our nation today with the COVID 19 Pandemic, unrest on our city streets, and a deeply divided people. I, for one, have recently witnessed and experienced the impact of our present crisis and been pressed to encourage those around me to trust in the Lord Jesus Christ.

To a lesser degree than Revolution, perhaps, we can say once again that these are the times that try men's souls and look to the Almighty God for refuge and strength. I am reminded of the crisis in the life of King David when he was being chased by King Saul and he was unable to access the sanctuary of God in Jerusalem. As a fugitive from his home, family, and the sanctuary of God he was chased into the wilderness and he, himself, spoke of the "trying of his soul" during this time of alienation.

I have always treasured David's attitude during his many crises. Scripture describes David as one "who encouraged himself in the Lord" (I Samuel 30:6). We can discover his path to security and peace in many of his Psalms as he encouraged himself in the Lord. One in particular, Psalm 27, not only encouraged King David as



he wrote but also holds the same inspiration and blessing for us today. It begins with an affirmation... "The Lord is my light and my salvation".

You will notice here that it does not say that the Lord provides light and salvation (which He certainly does) but that He, Himself, is my Light and my Salvation. We find in the Lord Jesus Christ our Light and our Salvation as we trust in Him, worship Him and commune with Him. David goes

on to affirm that we need not fear and that we can be of good courage as we wait upon the Lord and draw strength from Him. David wrote it this way... "The Lord is the strength of my life, of whom shall I be afraid".

I treasure his words as he describes his desire to dwell in the house of the Lord and in the time of trouble that the Lord would "hide me in His pavilion, the secret place of the Lord and to be set upon a rock". The word that I

emphasize here is the Lord's "pavilion".

It is a descriptive and enlightening concept. It describes the Lord's den, hiding place, sanctuary, or stronghold.

What a comfort for the believer to find a hiding place with

the Lord Jesus Christ!

David would write again of finding a stronghold, a safe place where he could settle in and commune with the Lord. As we experience these times that try our souls, let us remember that we have, in our relationship with the Lord Jesus Christ, a place of refuge and safety in His pavilion.

We find light, salvation, and the freedom from fear in the comforting presence of our Friend, the Lord Jesus Christ.

<u>2 Corinthians 5:6-7</u> "Therefore we are always confident and know that as long as we are at home in the body we are away from the Lord. For we live by faith, not by sight."

Tri-State Museum and Visitor Center store rebrands with new merchandise.

The Tri-State Museum and Visitor Center's gift shop has long carried regional books, scarves, handbags, jewelry, décor items and tourist-related local memorabilia. It is now downsizing some of that especially, during the tourist "off-season" - to rebrand itself

With merchandise coming in almost daily, the store's changed look is still a work






in progress. But Reausaw and Thielen both hope the store will be well-stocked with merchandise in time for the holiday



DSS Finds Loving Adoptive Homes For Children

PIERRE – Today, there are 81 children in South Dakota's foster care system who are legally available for adoption. The greatest need is for older children, sibling groups, and children with emotional, behavioral, or medical needs.

"All children are born with potential for a bright future," said Department of Social Services (DSS) Cabinet Secretary Laurie Gill. "We want children to have every opportunity for happiness and success and DSS helps find homes where children will be cherished, encouraged, and safe."

Children and teens are placed in foster care with DSS as a result of child abuse and neglect court proceedings. The goal is to return children to their biological parents when it is safe and in the best interest of the children to do so. However, if a child or sibling group cannot safely return home, the court may terminate parental rights and place the child for adoption with DSS. Most children adopted through DSS are adopted by their relatives or foster parents. Many children have brothers and sisters of varying ages and wish to be adopted together.

"DSS goes to great lengths to ensure adoptive homes are safe, and that adoptive families and children are the right fit," said Gill. "We take the wellbeing and security of South Dakota children very seriously."

When there is no adoptive

family identified, DSS develops a child-specific recruitment plan to match each child with a family who is suited to meet his or her needs.

To adopt children in foster care, families must complete an approved adoption home study. The study includes interviews with the applicants and household members, background checks, reference checks, health report, and a home safety check. Training is provided to prepare families for the needs of children who have experienced trauma


'Pete' Gordon Anderson had been busy at the ranch all week. He got out to church at the Methodist Church in Camp Crook on Sunday.

Black Hills National Forest Christmas Tree Permits Now on Sale

CUSTER, SD - Black Hills National Forest Christmas tree permits are available to purchase either online at Recreation.gov or from private vendors throughout the Black Hills. Details about where to cut your tree and height restrictions may be found at Recreation.gov.

"For many families, venturing into a National Forest to cut their Christmas tree for the holidays is a treasured tradition carried on for generations," said Scott Jacobson, Public Affairs

To purchase a Christmas Tree permit online, visit Recreation. gov and search for Black Hills National Forest Christmas Tree Permit. It is important to carefully read the overview and need-to-know information prior to purchasing the permit. Visitors will need to set up or login to a Recreation.gov account to

complete the transaction. Each permit is \$10 for any tree, plus a \$2.50 processing/transaction fee (processing fee pertains to online permits only). Users can purchase up to five permits per account. The permit must be printed and visible as you remove your tree(s) from the Forest.

The Forest Service is using Recreation.gov as an added convenience to purchase a permit, as well as provide an alternative to in-person transactions at offices that remain closed to walk-in business due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Many Forest roads are subject to seasonal closures. Free Motor Vehicle Use maps are available online or by downloading the Avenza App.

You can only cut trees within the national forest boundary and must respect surrounding

private property.

The Black Hills National Forest has a tree height maximum of 20 feet and a stump height maximum and diameter of 6 inches.

The forst service requires users to take the whole tree and simply remove the top of the tree; cut down the entire tree.

All 4th & 5th graders throughout the United States receive a FREE Christmas tree permit, as part of the Every Kid Outdoors Program. If utilizing the online system at Recreation.gov, enter the voucher or pass number when prompted. Call your local Forest Service office for more information on the Every Kid Outdoors Program.

groups," Nowowiejski said. "It's a little bit more restrictive as far as fans are concerned. Only two tickets would be allowed per rostered individual, and that's in all sports."

According to Nowowiejski option one would further prohibit any outside group from using the school's facilities for practice or games the remainder of the year. "What those outside groups include are indoor soccer, AAU wrestling, travelling basketball teams and various other groups that pop up throughout the year," Nowow-

Option two, which was approved, will allow 2-to-3 tickets per rostered individual at home contests. Nowowiejski says the fan restrictions are necessary and he would evaluate the schools COVID exposure for making any future recommendations as to the 2-3 per rostered individual ticket policy.

There will be no lower level basketball tournaments this year. Varsity does not have tournaments.

"I was wanting to host a wrestling tournament this year but was planning to shrink it from 26-to-28 teams down to 12, and that's via the South Dakota Activities Association recommen-

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dations," Nowowiejski said. In that wrestling tournament Nowowiejski says that the state recommendations are to limit it to 112 athletes. There also will be no fans allowed at the tournament which would allow the teams to occupy space in grandstands, similar to competitive cheer and JV volleyball

tournaments.

"As far as the outside groups go I feel like they do a lot for our kids and our school district as well," he said. "I actually was going to, within this plan, allow them come in and use our facilities for practice, however they would not be able to use them for tournaments. So this would allow them to prepare their kids for games elsewhere."

Nowowiejski recommended option 2 to the board saying that by doing so the kids, coaches, parents and fans would still be

able to enjoy winter activities in the most normal routine possible during the pandemic.

"Obviously we also can restrict that more if something changes, such as the number of positive cases increases more," Nowowiejski said. "We could go no fans completely and just let the kids play, but I'm recommending Option 2."

Board member Jean Helmer asked at what point would a decision have to be made to prohibit fans. Nowowiejski said he did not have a definitive number but said a decision on that would be made in collaboration with High School Principal Matthew Raba and Superintendent Dr. Steve Willard.

"Nobody in the Black Hills Conference has a particular number or standard that they go by," Nowowiejski said.

\$344,000 from the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) fund. The ESSER has restrictions, which prevent the payment of stipends through that fund, instead focusing on COVID expenses; hardware, software or other student educational needs within the district. Some of the ESSER funding has been spent for grades K-8 with the purchase of the Canvas Learning Management System (LMS), a \$40,000 investment that serves as an online learning platform in addition to tending to the administratively focused needs of education.

As for COVID within the district Willard said he is very concerned about the virus but reported to the board that the district is managing the issue well thus far.

"I appreciate our administrators and how creative they have been in taking care of our conferences and programs coming up," Willard said. "They have put a ton of time in and I'm really proud of them.

"Brandi (VanSickle, School Nursing Supervisor) and our school principals are doing contact tracing for our students and staff when someone is reported to have the COVID virus and they are doing an excellent

job," he continued, "and that's how we're able to keep the schools open when we have a surge in our community and in the area. But that surge hasn't reached the schools and report after report is finding that the best place for kids is in school."

The board also voted unanimously to accept the US Dept. of Justice Accessibility Agreement that was presented in mid-October. This move brings to a close a 2-year push to take care of 25 ADA deficiencies that were identified after a July 2017 site visit. Most issues were minor including lack of handrails in some locations, braille signage and the space between toilet paper dispensers and grab bars in some restrooms.

According to DOJ documents the department made a second site visit in June of 2019 and determined that significant progress was being. As of last month only three issues remained; classroom door knobs in the high school, a cross-slope issue near the ticket counter at Lou Graslie Field and lowering the concession stand counters by 1-inch. Willard said those issues would be taken care of this summer. As a result of the district's action the DOJ has closed its investigation, which was reflected in the agreement approved by the board.

tor or law enforcement officer that it's not just candy.

"Why do they even make it into candy? I feel like it's a little bit to attract that younger mindset," he said.

It's feeling that Dr. Willard agrees with and knows that it has the potential to be a real problem within our school

something else on their plate." According to local legal experts there are still a lot of issues to be worked out with both IM 26 and Amendment A. The South Dakota Department of Revenue will need to work out license requirements for commercial growers, testing facilities, wholesale packaging and processing centers, and retail sales outlets. Complications could arise as regulations are designed to limit illicit production and over concentration of licenses within a municipality.

Those familiar with the process say that local municipalities, such as Belle Fourche, could issue their own city ordinances that would ban the commercial side of the marijuana business within city limits but cannot ban the private use of the drug

The Amendment calls for marijuana to be taxed at 15%. The Legislative Research Council estimates that Amendment

A could generate \$60 million in the state's coffers by 2024. After the tax revenue is used by the Revenue Department to cover costs associated with implementing the amendment, 50% of the remaining revenue was earmarked to be appropriated to fund state public schools and 50% would be deposited in the state's general fund.

Colorado, the first state in the nation to legalize recreational marijuana use, has found mixed

results with the tax revenue issue. A study by Colorado Christian University's Centennial Institute found that for every dollar gained in tax revenue, Coloradans spent approximately

\$4.50 to mitigate the effects of legalization. Costs related to the healthcare system and from high school drop-out rates are the largest cost contributors according to the report. The study also has shown that in Colorado the number of people who attended college and use marijuana has grown since legalization, and marijuana use remains more prevalent in those with less education. Also calls to Poison Control related to marijuana have increased, traffic fatality rates due to drugged driving have increased and people who use marijuana more frequently tend to be less physically active, according to the study.

Critics of the study say that opioids and not marijuana is the state's top health issue. In 2018 the state allocated \$1.5 million for a study on the impacts of marijuana on opioid addiction. Since becoming legal in 2014 Colorado's Department of Revenue says that marijuana sales account for about 1.8 percent of all of the state's tax revenue. Marijuana sales tax in Colorado has surpassed alcohol sales tax and cigarette taxes as of 2017.

There are several civil penalties contained within the Amendment. These include; a fine of \$250 if a person grows marijuana plants that are visible from a public place; a \$250 fine if cultivated marijuana plants are not kept in a locked space; \$250 if a person grows marijuana in a local government jurisdiction that has marijuana retail stores (unless the jurisdiction has authorized home-grow for individuals); \$100 for smoking marijuana in a public place unless the place is licensed for such activity; \$100 or attending up to four hours of a drug education/counseling program for smoking marijuana if a person is under the age of 21. All marijuana sold in South Dakota must be grown in South Dakota according to the Amendment.

Still unclear are several items. Among them are the issue of transporting the drug across state lines and the penalties involved with the retail sale of weed to known citizens who were going to transport across state lines to a jurisdiction where the drug is still illegal. Also, an employer's ability to fire an employee for failing a drug test if marijuana is involved is still unclear. However the Colorado Supreme Court ruled in 2015 (Coats vs. Disk Network) that employers in that state could fire employees for using marijuana since federal law prohibits its use.

"It's still hard for people with that (drug user) mindset to maintain a good job," Lamphere said. "If they're raising a family and they aren't employable but they are okay to use dope, it just doesn't lead to a progressive future. If (drug use) is their priority for a lifestyle there isn't many employers who want someone like that."



National Reclamation
Convention At Denver Urges
Extensive Work

Extensive Work J. F. Koller, secretary of the Belle Fourche Commercial club, one of the delegates to the annual convention on the National Reclamation Association, held last Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday, at Denver, stated that the association urged, through various resolutions passed, an extensive program of work for reclamation and flood control be passed by Congress and operation started in the coming fiscal year. A supplemental budget of \$11,918,000, in addition to the \$3,200,000 already passed by Congress was recommended for the Missouri River Basin development.

Does Belle Fourche Want It? There is one seeking a location in South Dakota, according to a communication received this week by the Belle Fourche Commercial Club, from Governor Sharpe, speaking for the National Resources Development of this state. Gov. Sharpe enclosed with his letter, a communication advising him from the North Star Woolen Mill Company, represented by Dr. Derse Shybekay, director of market research for the company. The enclosed communication states that the firm has been doing business since 1964, and at present have two mills, one at Minneapolis and the other at Lima, Ohio. Its leading product is woolen blankets. Specific information needed the number of sheep produced within 100 miles. In the way of water the newly established mill would require 2,000 to 15,000 gallons of water for each 100 raw wool processed. The questionnaire also asks about inducements offered.

Death At Sky Ranch







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

NAVFR Gets Certified

NISLAND - The Nisland/ Arpan Volunteer Fire & Rescue (NAVFR) members took a certification for CPR. Many of the members have been certified in the past but had lapsed. They decided it was time to get prepared. The fire chief, Stan Lewis, is already trained as a paramedic and runs with the Newell ambulance, but he trained right alongside the 10 other members who showed up to certify.

Tyrel Lewis and Veronica LaFayette, of the Belle Fourche Ambulance, were the ones who did the training for the group. It consisted of watching videos giving information about the different components of the training. It included responding to an event, during a fire department run or even in personal lives of the members.

Learning about personal protective equipment, how to run a defibrillator, the proper CPR (cardio-pulmonary resuscitation) method, what to do if someone is choking, differentiating between techniques for resuscitation according to age, and a host of other things were on the list to understand.

An AED, or automated external defibrillator, is used to help those experiencing sudden cardiac arrest. It's a sophisticated, yet easy-to-use, medical device that can analyze the heart's rhythm and, if necessary, deliver an electrical shock, or defibrillation, to help the heart re-establish an effective rhythm.

"The AED will tell you everything you need to do,' said Lewis, demonstrating the training unit. He also discussed the difference between adult and children's AED pads. "The unit will prompt you to continue

Then and Now in Newell

"Looking Forward to our Past" by Linda Velder

November 17, 1910 Quite a lot of excitement was caused at about 10:00 AM when a gasoline light tank became ignited at the rear of the New England Kitchen. The fire was soon extinguished and little damage done. Mr. Crosby, the proprietor of the place, had both his hands badly burned. The New England Kitchen has been enlarged by having another

room built in the rear.

Tuesday evening about 11:30 a raid was made on J.L. Newville's shack here and he was arrested for running a gambling house. That Newville was running a gambling den in Newell has been suspected for some time and officials had been on lookout for evidence. A few nights ago some fellow in the game wrote several worthless checks on one of the banks here and Sheriff Moses was notified. Deputy Sheriff Cates came down from Belle Fourche and another Deputy raided the place and captured the table, cards, checks, money, etc. and arrested Newville.

November 25, 1920

Sam McDonald is taking the honor as a trapper for the South Sulfur locality. The extinction of the famous little musk rat is almost a certainty if Sam keeps

a quantity of hay. A verdict was returned in favor of the defendant, Karinen in both cases for action and against the plaintiff, Lakso. Karinen received damages in the sum of \$400.

The Neighborhood Club gave an oyster supper at the Gordon Van Loan home the evening of November 19. About 100 persons partook in the eats. The program was spicy and varied. The meeting was called to order by Chairman W.F. Long after which America was sung followed by a talk by the chairman. There were many other numbers on the program. All guests went away feeling the evening was well profitably spent.

November 20. 1930

Rex Smith, who lives on the Moreau River, is the possessor of a watch which was brought

to America, he claims in 1756 from London, under the name Norton. It was brought to America by distant ancestor and has been handed down since, until it came into the hands of Mr. Smith's mother and he decided to place it in the bank for safe keeping. The watch was carried through the War of 1812 by Col. John McKinley, a distant relative of President McKinley, as well as of the mother of Rex Smith. The watch has every indication it has had long usage, as the back of the case is worn through, to protect the inside, 2 thicknesses of paper had been cut out and fitted in. The bits were cut from the Washington Federalist, a paper of early day's American history.

On exhibit were: a Spanish Mouser, taken from a dead soldier on San Juan Hill during the Spanish-American War; a Henry's single action Army rifle picked up from the battlefield out of Peking, before Peking fell during the Boxer Rebellion; Philippine Bolo knife secured from the islands; a Philippine spear head, found sticking in a tree after a battle; a Philippine dagger and a 45-70 Springfield Army rifle.

The Hoffmeyer boys tore down the shed formally used by Ben Culbertson on the Anton Votava place and are re-erecting the same on their own place to use as a sheep shed.

November 14, 1940

Nisland Church Holds Packing Party

NISLAND – The Nisland **Independent Community** Church held its annual Operation Christmas Child shoebox packing party on Wednesday, November 11. They packed over 113 shoeboxes with toys, hygiene products, books, crayons, stuffed animals and as many other items as could be stuffed into a small box. Along with the regular items the church added a special letter from the church and a Christmas bell ornament.

"It's so much fun," said Clancy Todd as he raced around the basement of the church stuffing the "main" items such as bar soap, a washcloth, a comb and

toothbrush, a cup and school-related items into his box. He then zipped off to the Sunday school room designated 5-9-year-old boys where he added at least one clothing item, some flipflops, a couple small games and some socks.

The small group of around 15 people, started at 6:30 p.m. and by eight they had over a hundred boxes lined up on a bench. They rubber-banded them shut in preparation for them to be picked up next week by the local representatives, Dean and Julie Brunner.

Operation Christmas Child is a project of Samaritan's Purse, an international relief organization. The Nisland church has been involved for many years, increasing the number of boxes

each year. They also add \$9 per box for shipping the boxes to their destination, which the church tracks with a special barcode that the organization scans allowing the church to see where the boxes are in transit.

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The mission of OCC is to provide local partners around the world with shoeboxes filled with items as a mans of reaching out to children in their own communities with the Good News of Jesus Christ.

The OCC program was started in the United Kingdom in 1990 by Dave and Jill Cooke. Three years later they formed a partnership with Samaritan's Purse. Since 1993 OCC has delivered shoeboxes to over 168 million children in more than 100 countries.
