South Dakota Well-Represented in Upcoming NFR

Eight contestants along with rodeo of the year competition give area fans plenty to watch for.

Ft. WORTH TX - Between nightly rodeo competition, awards ceremonies and royalty activities rodeo fans in the Rushmore State will have plenty to watch for at this year's Wrangler National Finals Rodeo in early December.

The rodeo portion of the event begins Thursday night, Dec. 3rd at Globe Life Field in Arling-

ton, home to the Texas Rangers. Belle Fourche residents will also be watching on Wednesday night Dec. 2 when the PRCA holds its annual Awards Banquet. The Black Hills Roundup is once again a finalist for rodeo of the year. The other four finalists in the Medium Rodeo category are Burwell, Neb., Cave Creek, Ariz., Coleman, Texas and Guymon, Okla. The Black Hills Roundup has won the award the past two years.

Also of note is Miss Rodeo America who is from western South Dakota. Miss Jordan Tierney of Oral, SD, was

crowned last year in Las Vegas and will officially earn the unprecedented status this year of serving two consecutive terms. Tierney was the fifth from

South Dakota to win the crown and the first since Mackenzie Haley in 2011.

The coronavirus caused many rodeos to be canceled in 2020 and thus several local and state pageants. Because of that the

2020 Miss Rodeo America pageant was also canceled resulting in Miss Tierney's reign being extended for

an additional year, something

that has never happened before. 'It's going to be a little more relaxed this year, I'll be able to enjoy it a little more," Tierney told the Beacon. "I'm still looking forward to the appearances I'm going to be able to make down there in Ft. Worth. One thing is for sure, I'll be the most well-rested Miss Rodeo

America in history.' Tierney, whose father Paul was PRCA champion tie-down roper and mother Robin was 1985 Miss Rodeo South Dakota, says it has been a once in a lifetime privilege to represent the sport of rodeo, especially

being from South Dakota.

"In South Dakota, our number one sport is rodeo," she said. "We're all about that western way of life out here. To be able to represent rodeo means a lot

> to me, not only because it is so embedded in my family's history but for my state. It is very special because of where I come from."

On the contestant front the state will have eight partic-

ipants in six rodeo discipline, including the first-ever Breakaway Roping competition.

The name Garrett will be making a return appearance at the NFR, Shorty Garrett. In fact Garrett is the highest-ranked South Dakota contestant going in. The Eagle Butte cowboy is fourth in the world right now in saddle bronc and this will be his first NFR appearance.

"I've had a real good year," Garrett told the Beacon. "This is the best year I've ever had as far as being healthy."

Garrett, whose uncles are former Belle Fourche world champions Mark and Marvin Garrett, started the year off right with a win at Rodeo Rapid City



Obituaries Dillon Heinzerling 63

The song of the American Dream rang loud and true in the heart of Dillon Walter Heinzerling. We remember fondly how often his voice carried a song. That song's beat began strong into our world on May 8th 1957 in the Black Hills of South Dakota, the day God blessed him to Bess and Larry Heinzerling. We are heartbroken by his sudden passing the evening of November 25th, 2020, taken from us far too soon by heart attack.

Dillon loved his family and anyone who got to know him. He genuinely cared for all people. He would always

make time for a weekly call to his Mother or another family member. He always had a song on his lips, and the words were always his own. He had a brilliant mind and a great sense of humor.

His passing was preceded by his grandparents, his father Larry, numerous Aunts and Uncles, and his brother Dan whom was a joy to our gatherings. His Aunt Della Wilkens passed on November 13th, 2020. Growing up back East in Huron, Aunt Della would let young Dillon borrow her Mustang, especially to take girls out for dates. To be sure, he had found true love. Mustang

In 1977 Dillon's song howled loud and raw accompanied by the rhythm of Ford V8 THUNDER! Echoing across the prairie, the roar of that 351 Cleveland would become a habit he could never break. A great year for him, buying his white and green 1971 fastback that became known as The Shamrock Express. A Ford man forever, he would keep and enjoy this special Mustang for the rest of his days.

Dillon Heinzerling and Julie Erickson were married on February 14th, 1982. Their union would be blessed with three beautiful children. All would carry his proud American song in their hearts, adding their own distinct harmonies to Daddio's melody. Daughter Hannah has a Salon in Hill City, Hannah's Heart of the Hair. Son Matt owns Heinzerling Concrete, based in Spearfish. Son Dan is a fellow veteran, whom honorably served our Republic as a Marine. They all made Dillon beam

Dillon's need for Mustang Speed was permanent and hereditary! All three of his beloved children grew up and bought their own. His daughter Hannah, and his sons Dan and Matt all shared his love for America's favorite muscle car. THE Heinzerling car. In 2004 Dillon added a special Mach 1 to the stable, placing a factory direct order for a 40th Anniversary Oxford White Mach 1 with manual transmission.

Both sons would also pay tribute to Dillon and grandfather Larry on the track. Starting in 2000 the Heinzerling boys were back in the races, with Matt driving and Dillon running his pit crew. His oldest son Dan would also join them, driving in Super Stock for two seasons, and a B Modified for three more years. Nothing made Dillon happier than watching his sons on the track and taking care of them in the pits. For the next twenty years Dillon would follow Matt to tracks all over the country, only missing a handful of races. Helping Matt win sprint car Championships in 2009 and 2010, and another Championship in 2019 driving Modified made him proud beyond words.



American made homes were the legacy of Dillon's career. Places for the Dream to live in the hearts of young families as they sing their own unique songs of Love and Freedom. Homes to shelter Lovers, their children, and their American Songs even long after the men that built them pass on from this world. Dillon designed and helped build some of the most beautiful and unique homes in the Black Hills. His long line of polished and engraved service awards will try telling his story, 40

dutiful years of architectural design and contract sales. Appreciated tokens, but the real story reads between them, and especially inside those homes he helped build. And the jobs created by the necessity to build them by the men he did business with. Helping provide honest jobs for families and homes for their dreams is among the most honorable of professions.

Married September 6th, 2015 Dillon and Lora's wedding was one to remember. Surely the great food, live music, and dancing were so fun. But will I ever attend another wedding party with a private car show? Mustangs EVERYWHERE! And other sweet blue ovals too. Jesse's Torino, Larry's Falcon, the cars COVERED the yard.

Racing is Heinzerling heritage, starting in 1965 when father Larry drove the Ford powered racecars he built with his brother Merlin. Dillon loved to share his memories of working in Marlen Winter's pit crew in the 80s. In more recent years Dillon would further honor his father Larry's days of thunder, restoring one of his old modified racecars with his beloved wife Lora and dear friend Larry Bronemann. Their friendship and labor of love earned them the Best in Show award at the 2016 Counts of the Cobblestone Car Show.

Dillon's mark on this world includes sixteen grandchildren, the highest mark of all. The pride and joy of their parents, and the renewed hopes and dreams of their grandparents Dillon and Lora will have the chance to sing again in the hearts of Pyper, Asher, and Aiden Heinzerling. Alison, Gary, Kenzie, Porter, Jaydin and Kylee McCoy. Gabe, Honey, Ezra, Micah and Judah Donnell. Wyatt and Beau Herman. They'll miss Papa's laughs, jokes, tickles and love. And not to forget Daizy, Dillon's beloved dog.

He is survived by his mother, Bess Aman. The love of his life, Lora. All three of his children, Dan, Matt, and Hannah. We miss him desperately. His name was Dillon Walter Heinzerling. "I settled for the best."

The funeral service will be held 10:30am Thursday, December 3rd, 2020 at the Countryside Church in

Pastor's Perspective

This week's Pastor's Perspective is provided by Mike Reade, St. James Episcopal Church

"Happy New Year"

Yes, well Sunday was the beginning of a brand new year...for the church. The First Sunday in Advent marks the beginning of a new season. Along with the dawning of a new season and New Year comes the anticipation of starting fresh, starting over, making changes and expecting better days ahead. Advent is the four weeks and Sundays that lead up to Christmas day, December 25th.

One particular part of our scripture passage today in verses 32-27 gives us a glimpse of the importance of keeping watch and standing guard for the coming of Jesus. First and foremost is the most obvious in verse 32 that proclaims that "no one knows the day or hour" when Jesus will come back...not even Jesus... or the angels. Yes, even Jesus "stands guard" for God's "signal" to make his return.

The emphasis here is not saying that Jesus is clueless or lacks knowledge. The point is that Jesus teaches us to be concerned more about preparation than calculation. In other words, don't waste time trying to figure out or guess "when," but use your time wisely to "be ready."

We all have our own work to do. We have our own "calling" in ministry, our own gifts, talents and abilities. We should be using them to the best of our abilities "while the master is away." The reason for keeping alert and working hard at what we are called to do is to prevent any embarrassment of the master coming back unexpected and getting caught "sleeping on duty," messing around, and not doing what we are supposed to be doing.



The last thing we need to be "caught doing" is nothing at all. We cannot afford to be sloppy, lazy, indifferent, and unconcerned about doing things for God and for others. Let's not allow God to find us "dozing off."

So, how can we maintain a watchful attitude and 'stand guard" while we await the return of Christ? think at least two things can help us stand guard. They are: know your faith and, know the faith of others. I believe these two things can help us get

The first way to stand your guard is to seek and know more of God's word by learning its truth, treasuring it in your heart and sharing it with others. Secondly, know the faith of others! We, as believers must have a general knowledge of what other faiths believe. We don't need to be experts, but we need to be able to understand basic information about other faiths.

So, work towards a better understanding of your faith and seek a general understanding of other faiths, so that you can become a stronger, more knowledgeable Christian who is less likely to go astray and be "caught off guard" when Christ returns.

As you journey in your faith, continue to make this Advent season a reminder once more that Jesus is coming again! So, stand guard and watch! And from verse 37: Jesus says," And what I say to you I say to all: Keep Awake.'

2 Corinthians 5:6-8 - So we are always of good courage. We know that while we are at home in the body we are away from the Lord, for we walk by faith, not by sight. Yes, we are of good courage, and we would rather be away from the body and at home with the Lord.



"Building Main Street, not Wall Street"

Great Leaders Know, Many Hands Make Light Work

W. Edwards Deming once said, "It is not necessary to change, survival isn't mandatory". Last week we discussed attributes great leaders must possess and nurture in this challenging economic environment while leading their local communities. This week we will offer a few thoughts and ideas that might assist local leaders and media companies chart a path forward propelling local communities to greater heights.

Additionally, in recent columns, we have spent many pages discussing the solid financial reasons for spending our personal and government dollars hyper-locally. Let me revisit one example I previously shared showing the power of a concentrated locally-owned and operated community spending program, especially in these times of COVID-19. The below example works in any small and mid-sized community, just adjust to your community size.

In a community of ten thousand residents, what is the impact if every resident spent an additional \$25 each month locally that they may have spent outside the community or online? The impact is powerful. Ten thousand residents multiplied by \$25 is \$250,000 per month or \$3,000,000 per year spent locally that otherwise would have left the community. When we add the 3-7X compounding impact realized when spending money locally (how many times each dollar gets re-spent locally), that \$3,000,000 impact compounds

to between \$9,000,000 and \$21,000,000 each year. How many jobs will that save or create? How many businesses will that keep open? How many dollars will be added to the community tax base? Needless to say, spending locally can change the course of your commu-

Understanding the need to encourage local spending, what are some low-cost initiatives a community might employ to make locally-owned and operated spending a community effort and focus?

Many have heard of the American Express "Shop Small Saturday" that occurs the Saturday after Thanksgiving. While a noble effort, this is merely a small band-aid on a deep wound. I have seen communities take the "Shop Small" effort to a whole new level. They select a day each week, year-round to promote a 'Shop Local Tuesday" or any day they select. The city schedules other events around this effort such as farmers markets, outdoor music venues, and other communitywide events. They work with the local media to promote it as

I recently saw a great program instigated by Adams Publishing Group in Idaho called \$2 Challenge. This is where they have invited the entire community to spend \$100 on Christmas at locally-owned shops. They go to the bank and sign the pledge and are then issued fifty, two-dollar bills in exchange for the hundred dollars. Then they visit the local shops to spend

their two-dollar bills for Christmas. Everyone making the pledge has their name published in the local newspaper which in turns encourages others to do the same thing. This or something similar can be done in any community and cost nothing.

Not only do these and similar initiatives cost you nothing other than a bit of time, when you shop at locally owned businesses, you are also casting a vote for the true American dream. You are voting with your pocketbook and saying you believe in your community. Shopping local is one of the most effective ways for residents to push their business base upward into the middle class. Your dollars spent locally are in a true sense investing in enhanced local entrepreneurship, which also results in real economic growth.

The future of our small and medium size towns will rely on the success of the locally owned businesses. True support starts at the top and need not cost money. When we support local businesses, we are building our own Main Streets and sending that much less to Wall Street. When we figure out the ways to build our communities through a locally owned business base, we are building long-term sustainability and increased self-reliance. Those two items are what will assure our community survives the economic conditions, regardless of what they might be.

last February. He credits a positive attitude from his travelling partners, Isaac Diaz and Brody Cress with keeping the momentum going. Both Cress and Diaz will be competing alongside Garrett at the NFR this year.

"It's pretty hard to be down in our rig," he said, "those are two really positive guys to be travelling with. I'm just going down to Ft Worth to have some fun, ride bucking horses as best I can and we'll see what the outcome is."

Saddle bronc riding has been a strong category for South Dakota athletes all year. At one point the state had 10 cowboys ranked in the top 50, more than any state in the nation.

One of those competing is bronc rider Cole Elshere of Faith, SD, who will be making his fourth NFR appearance and first since 2014. He is sitting 6th in the world right now and will head to the big event for the first time with his wife Kyndra and 3-month daughter.

"I'm just super blessed to be able to make it back," Elshere told the Beacon. "I have a lot of peace within me and will have my family to support me and try to win every night I'm there."

It's been a year of opportunity and blessing for Elshere. He started a side hustle business with a ranch-to-table beef delivery service during the COVID shutdown last spring. When Newell bronc rider Lane Schuelke had a knee injury this fall Elshere hired him to drive a delivery truck in September while Cole and Kyndra welcomed Everley.

"It really worked out," Elshere said. "I was able to do other things and he was able to have some money in his pocket, not being able to rodeo. I was great for both of us."

Australian transplant Jamie Howlett will be making his first NFR appearance as a bareback rider. Howlett is originally from Queensland but moved to Rapid City to work the ranch with fellow bareback rider and college mate Shane O'Connell. Howlett ranked as high as third during the summer and is currently 6th in the world standings with wins this year in Grand Island, Minot, the NILE, Brookings, Mobridge, Wall and Salmon, Idaho.

"The start of the year was outstanding for me, no one can complain about that," Howlett said. "Summer was pretty good until my neck injury in September. Took that month off to heal up for the finals. It's feeling pretty good right now and I feel like it's going to be 100 percent by then.

"Belle Fourche is a great place. You've got a huge rodeo here and everyone wants to hit it. They are doing a great thing for this community and this send-off party is huge thing," Howlett said.

Western South Dakota will once again have two barrel racers competing at the NFR. 2018 Reserve World Champion Jessica Routier from Buffalo is currently ranked 9th and Lisa Lockhart of Oelrichs is ranked 13th. For Lockhart it will be her 15th trip to the NFR and she has two WFNR average titles to her credit. The two riders have been training in Oklahoma this month preparing for the big event.

Sturgis heeler Levi Lord will be making his first NFR appearance. He has been training in Texas. This year he recorded wins in Mobridge and in North Platte. Right now Lord is ranked 12th in the world standings.

Steer Wrestler Jace Melvin of Ft. Pierre will also be making his inaugural appearance at the NFR. Melvin is ranked seventh in the world this year after wins in Peterson, Iowa, and Alamosa, Colo.

New to the competition this year is Breakaway Roping. Tanegai Zilverbert of Pierre will be among those competing for a gold buckle in 2020. Tanegai, who was born in Australia and moved to the United States in 2004, is currently ranked 8th in the world standings. She is the Reserve World Champion Tie-Down Roper and won the average title at the WPRA World Finals in Waco, Tex., earlier this year. She was also co-champion of the Cody Stampede this year and tied for second at Kildeer,

Breakaway competition will begin on Dec. 8th at 10am at Globe Life Field, prior to the start of the 6th round of the NFR. There will be three rounds of competition, ending on Dec. 10th. The purse will be \$200,000 as women ropers will compete for the first-ever world championship.

The NFR moved from Las Vegas to Arlington this year due to coronavirus restrictions at the Thomas and Mack Center. It's the first time since 1961 it has been held in Texas. With a short time remaining on the Las Vegas contract Ft. Worth is expected to make an all-out effort to move the event to the DFW metroplex on a more permanent basis.

"I think this (move) needs to be permanent. They've got a year or two, that's my understanding on their contract in Vegas. And when that comes up, we intend to full well bid for it and get them back here. They started in Texas, why not get them back?" Betsy Price, Ft. Worth Mayor told reporters at a pre-rodeo event.

Now I look forward to being South Dakota's Historian and working with the Society's Trustees and members, universities, researchers, authors, archeologists, preservationists, and the public in preserving, promoting, and explaining our state's history.'

Jones was born in Sioux Falls, grew up in De Smet, and after graduating from SDSU, served as a US Air Force officer for twenty-three years before returning to South Dakota. He has a masters degree in History from the University of Nebraska and a PhD in History from the University of Kansas. He's the author of Eisenhower's Guerrillas: The Jedburghs, the Maquis, and the Liberation of France and contributed essays or chapters to other books and presented his research around the United States and the United Kingdom.

The Odd Fellows, of which Mr. Stokes was a member, then took charge of the body and escorted the casket to Pine Slope cemetery where the impressive Odd Fellow burial service was given. 



for the presentation and then immediately deposited the check in the account the group holds at the local bank. Both First National and NIC are big supporters of supporting local businesses.





December 1, 1910

Carl Adams, County Surveyor-elect, was in town Wednesday on his way northeast of town to do some work. Mr. Adams has been surveying a road running south of town.

A number of Reclamation boys of Orman had a bachelor dinner Sunday with Jerry Hunkins, just west of town. Jerry had baked an enormous feast of turkey and goose for his guests, but when they departed there wasn't enough fowl left to keep the kitten from mewing. Jerry says he is going to kill an ox the next time the boys come over.

Have you seen Hartwell & Sault's hand painted china? It is on display in the windows at present. Fancy bottles of perfumery or a box of choice candy for your sweetheart make excellent presents for any lady.

December 9, 1920

John Werzer and Alfred Lindell are helping Henry Jacobsen fix his reservoir which was washed out last spring by the heavy floods. The Davidson boys and John Middleton are going north to put in a dam on the Davidson homestead.

The Stephens & Johnson herd of registered Polled Herefords was disposed of last week to Tetrault Brothers of St. Onge. Several other farmers intend shipping about the 15th. Knute Tysdale, W.F. Long, B.B Glover, T.J. Baldwin and possibly others, hoping the market is advancing.

December 4, 1930

Considerable excitement was created in the Sheriff's Office at Belle Fourche, when word came from Arpan that a Mexican had died of exposure in the storm on Thursday of last week. Dr. A.W. Smith, deputy coroner, and 2 men set out in the storm, driv-

ing a hearse and an automobile to the scene. Roads were drifted and it was cold. Arriving at the hut where the Mexican corpse was comfortable and playing a guitar. His face was swollen and they found that he had been on a "jamboree" and had lain in the snow and had his face frozen. He was happy in spite of it all, and looking forward to a good dish of chili con carne, mucho

D. Wayne George of Spearfish was a visitor in Newell Wednesday afternoon of last week. Mr. George was here to take Miss Phipps, member of Newell School faculty, to Spearfish as his guest over the Thanksgiving vacation.

A cold, caught during the Thanksgiving vacation, is thought to have aggravated his condition immensely.

November 28, 1940

Butte County Nurse Lavinia Simon announced this week three free immunization clinics to be held at Vale, Newell and Nisland during the forepart of December. The clinics are free and both pre-school and rural children are welcomed. Diphtheria inoculations and small pox vaccinations will be given and diphtheria and tuberculosis tests will also be made, the latter to be read 48 hours after be-




