BH Roundup Wins Rodeo of the Year for 4th Year

news@bellefourchebeacon.com If the third time was a charm, the fourth time is flat-out fantastic, according to Black Hills Roundup Chairman Keith Anderson. The Belle Fourche community's signature 4th of July event was just named the PRCA medium outdoor rodeo of the year for the fourth straight year. The award was handed out in Las Vegas during the PRCA's annual awards banquet at the South Point Hotel's grand ballroom.

Winning the award in and of itself is a huge achievement. But when you consider the Roundup is able to favorably impress the contestants, officials and contractors enough during the PRCA's busiest weekend of the year to gather ample votes to win in December – that's simply remarkable. Few, if any, rodeo committees can go from one "Cowboy Christmas" to the other with similar success. And to do it four years in a row is a triumph that any rodeo-loving western community would covet.

"As always I was nervous heading into the banquet," said Keith Anderson, Chairman of the Roundup Committee. "There are so many good talk" with officials from the San Antonio Stock Show and Rodeo who also expressed their congratulations.

"It's pretty awesome when folks like that come up and shake your hand and tell you that you did a good job," Anderson told the Beacon. "To have that caliber of rodeos notice what you're doing is a great feeling and good for the community."

Even top specialty acts and rodeo performers are now approaching the Black Hills Roundup to be a part of the event in the future. "It's kind of funny. Now we are on a lot of those guy's bucket lists," he said. "The rodeo is a century old and getting a lot of recognition so a lot of them want to work it so they can say they've been there." Since the announcement of the award last week the Roundup has seen a bump in ticket sales. Last year's attendance approached what the event used to see in the 1940's. And with the fireworks, cattle drive, carnival, concerts and huge holiday parade the city of Belle Fourche is becoming a 4th of July weekend destination for a lot of rodeo fans and tourists. "Oh, absolutely," said Belle Fourche Mayor Randy Schmidt. "A lot of people like to come out to the Black Hills during that time but knowing there's a four-time rodeo of the year certainly draws folks in. They're looking to have a good time and see a good show. I think it speaks well for the committee, volunteers and Roundup B 5


The USCA Annual Meeting brings our nationwide membership together to discuss the past year's successes and their priorities for the year ahead.





Another Perspective "A Pilgrimage to Secure Boundaries"

Lift your eyes now and look from the place where you are northward, southward, eastward, and westward; for all the land which you see I give to you and your descendants forever Arise, walk in the land through its length and its width, for I give it to you. (Genesis 13:14b-15, 17)

My visit to Israel at the end of 2002 marked the first time that I have ever referred to one of our trips to the Holy Land as a pilgrimage but it was just that a mandate from the Lord to go and pray in Israel. We were a group under God's hands, joining in prayer with multitudes also praying for the peace of Jerusalem. We knew somehow that our actions in the invisible realm were pivotal, invoking through prayer the rule of God Almighty. Never have I felt involved in a more significant venture. Believers and secular people alike in Israel were deeply moved by our visit.

We went with a sense of mission to exercise the practice of prophetic prayer, literally moving through the land to touch the North, South, East, and West. As a prayer team, we built altars at each of these boundaries of the nation, where we lifted up key issues to be proclaimed over the land. These are the same issues that need to be raised up over your life kingdom principles that apply to all of us.

In the South, we built the Altar of TRUTH (Psalm 119:165), praying that Israel will honor the Word; that the Word be made alive a veil removed to see more than words; to see truth: You shall know the truth and the truth shall make you free. (John 8:32)

In the East, we built the Altar of LIFE (Ezekiel 37:9,14), praying that there would come an outpouring



tabernacle of God is among men, and He will dwell among them, and they shall be His people, and God Himself will be among them, and He will wipe away every tear from their eyes; and there will no longer be any death; there will no longer be any mourning for the former things have passed away

The Bible is full of hope for those who put their trust in Jesus and trust that His death on the cross is the payment for all their sins. Paul wrote in Romans 8:1-2 "There is therefore now no condemnation to those who are in Christ Jesus, who do not walk according to the flesh, but according to the Spirit."

whom they pierced. In the North, we built the Altar of WOR-SHIP (Zechariah 14:16-18), praying in intercession that all who worship the Lord now in spirit and in truth would become a token invoking further grace, including breaking the drought in this land.

In the West, we built the Altar of PRAISE (Psalm 113:1-3), praying praise to drive back the darkness; praise for what has begun; and praise that Israel's boundaries not only be secured but expanded in her mission to mankind.

I gained three convictions from this divinely appointed visit to Israel. First, the Spirit of prophecy is ready to come upon people who will rise in faith, obey with action, and work with discernment. Second, the Spirit of life is breathing with force ready to break down walls and bring salvation. Finally, the Spirit of harvest is calling for a cadre of prayer warriors who will resist the Adversary and contend for God's boundaries of intended blessing.

More than ever, there's reason for us as the people of the Lord to let our hearts be quickened with anticipation and stirred with a sense of accountable duty. We are called to occupy until Jesus comes, and that responsibility centers on intercessory prayer and a faithful life of service that shows the love of God in everything we do. As the world faces uncertainty, let us march forward in full confidence that He has called us to action in prayer that will result in the securing and expansion of boundaries of intended blessing in our world and in each of our lives



Coach Pottorff's outlook on the season: "We have a good



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Miss Rodeo America Crowned




LAS VEGAS, NV - Hailey Frederiksen from Wellington, Colorado, was crowned Miss Rodeo America on Sunday.



Editorial Too Many People

"Given its current economic base, South Dakota has too many people." There's a statement we haven't seen before, but when one thinks about it, there is much to support it. One small sentence explains the outmigration from the state, the low per capita income and many related problems. The statement was made by State Planning Director Lynn Muchmore recently while discussing the problem of attracting industry to South Dakota. Muchmore said manufacturing holds out a ray of hope to bring South Dakota's problems into balance. He says

South Dakota has paid "only lip service and a little more to the commitment which must be made before industry is to come to South Dakota." He praised the work of IDEA, but said the agency stood almost alone in its quest for industry. He said the people have not conceived a development strategy, have not established goals, have not forced economic growth as a major issue, and until economic growth becomes a major issue in government, "there will remain little leverage for changes in state policy." The apathy probably stems from the fact that most Dakotans are more or less content and are not enthusiastic about inviting the problems that accompany industry. Deep down, we feel the same way. We hate to see our community get too much bigger or the state get more crowded. At the same time, we know that communities and states do not stand still. If we fall behind, the problems will be far more serious than reasonable growth, as the only alternative would seem to be a stepped-up effort to attract suitable industry and a change in attitude toward new industry.



Local Spending May Be a Matter of Life and Death!

George Bernard Shaw said, "The reasonable man adapts himself to the world; the unreasonable one persists in trying to adapt the world to himself.

Therefore, all progress depends on the unreasonable man". For two years, this column has discussed the critical nature for local communities to encourage local spending the best they can. During this Christmas season and after nearly two years of COVID, this has become more critical. I cannot stress this enough. This is indeed a case of either surviving or becoming obsolete as a community.

One cannot under-estimate the true value of spending locally. At the risk of repeating myself, I will share an example from a community of 5000 residents. If each resident spent just \$25 more each month locally that may have been spent elsewhere, the community and your neighbors would see huge results. That small monthly commitment to your community would equal \$125K monthly, \$1,500,000 yearly and nearly \$5,000,000 each year when factoring the compounded impact of dollars spent locally. How many businesses will that keep open? How many jobs will that save? How many tax dollars will that generate? We can simplify by saying for every dollar a resident of your community spends online, out-of-town, or with a corporate chain, that is between \$3.00 and \$7.00 NOT being spent in your community.

Local communities can't look



Ultimately, after all the free handouts dry up, it reaps disaster on not only the community along with their small business base, but on large corporate chains who will also suffer as no one will ultimately have income to purchase their products and services.

The numerical reasons for keeping dollars local has been well established and is beyond dispute. The proof is readily apparent across the country. Most need not travel very far from home to see a nearby town that was once prosperous only to become a shell of what it once was. They are now shells of themselves because among many reasons, they supported General stores in lieu of their

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rates increase, more local businesses go under, local jobs are lost, housing prices decrease, tax base dwindles, crime rates increase, and the list goes on.

I cannot stress this enough; communities MUST act quickly. If this issue isn't on the radar of local community leaders, it must be placed on that radar. Once on the community radar, communities need to quickly assemble a task force with the sole purpose of addressing this critical issue. To be effective, this task force must include city leaders, chamber and/or Main Street representation, business leaders, media representation, civic club and economic development leaders, and whomever else makes sense. As a team, they must brainstorm potential solutions, possible community initiatives, citywide promotions, and other tactics.

Proactive communities can tackle and impact these problems. It is being done every day around the country. The

It isn't an easy task, but nothing worthy of great effort usually is. I implore you, don't miss the boat, this is an issue that isn't going away and will only worsen in the coming

years.

His case has been to the Supreme Court, where his attorneys hoped to get a new trial, but which was refused after due deliberation of the Supreme Court. Before departure, Stumbaugh noted that he should have entered imprisonment directly after conviction, as the cost has been enormous and he still has to serve the same sentence. He apparently was left in Sioux Falls in good spirits.

Schrader will explain the new standards and grades for dressed turkeys and conduct grading demonstrations at the West River Poultry Show at Rapid City.

Lucille Price seems to have rather bad luck when it comes to automobile accidents. The Monday after Thanksgiving she was in a car upset, but luckily no one was hurt. Then this past Monday, in the snow storm on highway 212 east of Newell, Robert Price's car collided with a truck driven by Donald Van Loan, hauling a truckload

The children brought their music under the direction of Jenn Stomprud.


