Public Comments **Take Center Stage**

The Butte County Commission room was filled to capacity at the regular meeting held Tuesday, December 7. Many of those gathered were on hand to discuss the Medical Marijuana applications that had been sent to the county auditor, while several were there to discuss road conditions, hunting regulations, and the county budget.

The decision to accept the Medical Marijuana applications was held after an executive session with the State's Attorney. The commissioners decided that the applications would be reviewed by the sheriff's office to determine any outstanding legal issues before being sent onto the State for final approval. Four applications were approved that included product manufacture, cultivation and dispensary.

State's Attorney Cassie Wendt also mentioned that Amendment A (recreational use of marijuana) had been determined to violate the constitution and was struck down. However, it is general consensus that it will be pursued further in the future. Dale Simonson would like the commissioners to discuss the condition of Hope road from Hwy 212 west to the Newell City Dump with the City of Newell. He said the road is in "bad condition" and wondered if something could be done by the two government entities. Chairperson Karrol Herman assured him that she would try to discuss the situation with city officials and see what could be done.

Although, the county commissioners cannot do anything about hunting violations, they heard from Ken Alexander of the rural Newell area about his concerns regarding hunters this deer hunting season. Alexander had brought his concerns to



Another Perspective

Spective *This Another Perspective is from the archives of Foursquare pastor Dr. Jack Hayford "The Grace To Be Wrong"*

I am becoming increasingly sensitive to the need for grace in believers which will allow them to be wrong.

Not to do wrong. But to be wrong. There are far too few who simply acknowledge beir own humanity when their own doings call-

their own humanity when their own doings, calling, efforts, or sincere goals are called into question. This past week I encountered three occasions where this grace was needed: at a gathering of men who

this grace was needed: at a gathering of men who were consulting together over a specific ministry to the Body of Christ; in a conversation over the radio, in which I was being interviewed on the subject of the believer and his willingness to acknowledge his failures; and in a private counseling session in which we discovered a man's preoccupation with his sense of God-given mission, to the point that he couldn't see the need for balance. He was too taken with his sense of the importance of what he felt he was supposed to do.

Somehow, being right isn't as easy as one thinks. Our own sense of dimension on a matter is the key to balance, and the fact is that when something seems important or necessary to me, it tends to become ALL important... ABSOLUTELY necessary. And the time for the answer to this important/necessary matter is always NOW! Especially if God and His will are involved in the matter.

Thankfully, I am discovering a small but growing band of folks who are willing to trust the Lord to cover their imperfections whether it be in timing, in understanding, or in sense of urgency. They are gaining the capacity to be wrong in their perspective, as right as they might be in their purpose.

I find that grace was powerfully present in the early Church. I hear the apostles and elders at Jerusalem say, concerning a decision that would reshape the Church's future, It seemed good (Acts 15:28). Before they



invoke the ultimate of divine authority, they simply says, We thought a lot about it. It seemed good to the Holy Spirit and to us. History confirms the decision they made, but I am most impressed by the non-authoritarian air with which the judgment was communicated.

Paul says twice in 1 Corinthians 7 that his counsel is offered as a concession, not as a commandment (v. 6); and that his directives concerning marriage and the single life were according to [his] judgment (v. 40). He does affirm that he believed himself to have the mind of the Holy Spirit on the subject, but again, the authority is exercised with wisdom. There is an apparent willingness to hearing others out on the subject.

I love Peter's capacity to not know as much as another brother, and still to love and trust that brother's words toward him. Second Peter 3:15,16 manifests a readiness to receive the gift of another's wisdom and expertise, without denying or having to hurriedly insist that you have received much already yourself.

Somehow, you and I experience a painful reluctance to utter the words, I don't know. Or, I may not be entirely right. Or, I need your balancing counsel on this, my friend. It's hard for us to say these things and mean them with a truly teachable spirit.

Some matters, of course, are not negotiable. But my personal inclinations, however sure I might feel about them, must be kept available to modification within the circle of those who love me in Christ.

Such vulnerability is the only safety valve against the recurrent problems which rugged individualism has wrought in personal and family lives, in business and government matters, and in the Church of the Lord Jesus throughout history.

Let's keep hands joined in trust. Mine and yours may not be perfectly clean, but keeping hold will sure help us keep our balance.

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

Broncs Boys Drop Opener to Spearfish

The Broncs came out the gates fast and jumped out to a 14-10 first quarter lead. Spearfish came back strong in the second stanza and took a slim 34-32 margin heading to the locker room. Belle Fourche came out in the third period and took the lead 48-47 at the end of three, but the Spartans outscored the Broncs 18-13 in the final quarter to come away with a 65-61 win.

Seth Hamilton pumped in 18 points for Spearfish and Ryan Heinert added 9. Ryker Audiss had a good night for Belle notching 16 points including a trio of three pointers. Three other Broncs were in double figures as Aiden Giffin put in 13, Cole Hockenbary 11, and Anthony Staley 10. Belle outrebounded Spearfish 32-25 with Audiss pulling down 10 completing a double-double for the evening.

"We battled hard all night long. Gabe Heck played fantastic defense for us, and Hockenbary gave us lots of energy. I'm excited to see what this team can do this season," commented Broncs Head Coach Clay Pottorff.

In the B game, the Broncs came away with wild 70-68 victory. Jet Jensen and Nolan Wahlfeldt scorched the nets with 19 points each for the Broncs. Jayden Secher added 14 and Rance Bowden chipped in with 8. The C team played a double header in Douglas on Saturday. The little Broncs dropped their opening game to Custer 43-27. Jordan Sandoval led Belle with 9 points and Carter McKenna 5. In the second game the Broncs were victorious over RC Christian 32-30. McKenna paced the Broncs with 18 points and Sandoval dropped in 8.



Other common symptoms are shortness or breath, chest pain or tightness, insomnia, muscle or joint pain, depression/anxiety, and stomach problems like stomach aches, loss of appetite or diarrhea.

What's The Fatigue Like?

reason. The fatigue is so severe that it impacts the ability to complete daily tasks.

What About This **PESE Thing?**

Post-exertional symptom exacerbation is a disabling and often delayed exhaustion disproportionate to the effort made. Patients are referring to this as a "crash". PESE is very common in people suffering from Long COVID. 75% of people who have Long COVID have PESE after 6 months. The activity that brings on the crash is something that the person could easily tolerate before their COVID-19 infection. Things like taking a shower, walking, attending a social activity, or even being in a high sensory environment with flashing lights and loud noises may all now trigger a crash.

Who Does Long **Covid Affect?** This is difficult to answer. We still don't understand what causes some people to have

experience Long COVID. Long COVID isn't related to how severe your initial symptoms were, or if you were hospitalized. It also doesn't appear to be related to your previous health as it affects children and people who were previously fit and healthy. Now that you know what Long COVID is, in our next installment we'll talk about what's being

Questions of the 2022 budget were brought to the attention of the commission by Travis Ismay after he had studied the itemized budget he had received from the Butte County Auditor's office. Commissioners answered each question in turn as Ismay pointed out items that had come to his attention. It was pointed out that the budget is discussed at regular commission meetings throughout the year, with department heads bringing individual department budgets before the commission. Public budget hearings are announced via the county website, newspaper, and posted meeting agendas before the budget is finalized. The county website is found at buttesd.org. Agendas and minutes of commission meetings are found under the heading "Commission" and can be accessed anytime on the web.

Butte-Lawrence County Fair Board President Chad Macaben updated the commissioners on this year's 2021 county fair. Although the fair had gone over budget, he said it was a great fair, especially since there was no fair in 2020. Several upgrades were done to buildings including redoing the goat barn and doing one section of

electricity. The fair board did receive grants to upgrade the electricity and has a plan to put in three transformers and redo the electricity in several buildings.

The use and possession of keys because of fairgrounds rentals was also discussed and will be addressed. Commissioner Kim Richards noted that any money received from renting will be put into improvements for the fairgrounds.

There was a public hearing concerning vacating section lines in the Hay Creek Subdivision. A petition had been received with the requisite number of signatures according to Deputy State's Attorney LeEllen McCartney. The section lines rung through the middle of lots in the subdivision and have not been used for roads.

"Basically, they are blank prairie," McCartney pointed out.

Commissioner James Ager questioned the order of approving vacating the section lines, wondering why it wasn't done at the beginning of the plan. Randy Deibert, on behalf of Diversified Incomes, LLC, explained that the lots would have to be larger to accommodate the setbacks necessary from the section lines. The subdivision was plotted with lots large enough to afford the setbacks if necessary. He said that it de-

the order of events. There have been significant findings on several bridges in the county following the completed 2021 bridge inspections. The structures had "significant defects and deficiencies" and may need to be considered under-designed for today's vehicle loads, according to a Brosz Engineering letter sent to County Highway Superintendent Dwayne Heidrich. Included in the bridges is a concrete box culvert on Snoma Road constructed in 1962 that is at 50% of legal load. A bid has been awarded and repair is scheduled for 2022.

A second bridge is a five span timber beam bridge constructed in 1940 on Mail Road. A three span timber beam bridge con-

structed in 1960 on Riley Road needs to be replaced as soon as possible. A 93 ft. Pony truss constructed in 1919 on Viken Road has been closed as of July 24, 2021 and should be scheduled for replacement. Finally, a 75 ft. six span timber beam bridge constructed in 1940 on Old Highway 212 has been awarded an FHWA replacement grant.

There are grants available to repair several of these bridges and other road work to be done in the county.

Sheriff Fred Lamphere has been checking into new body cameras for the department. The present cameras have become inconsistent and need replacement.

During the past week we were informed, by parties who were in a position to know, that a company had been formed, and had already contracted for a large tract of land adjoining this city, and were about to secure another piece of property. As the parties who own the property were not in the city, we were unable to get a confirmation of this statement. However, this fact is apparent, that the water supply in the Hills is inadequate and that we have all abundance of water. 
