Community Readies to Light up the Night - Finally

BELLE FOURCHE - Better late than never. After winter storm Ezekiel postponed the post Thanksgiving festivities the city will celebrate the season with its annual holiday celebration this Saturday, Dec. 21st.

"Light up the Night" will feature fireworks, stagecoach rides, a parade, downtown shopping, the Cowboy Band chili feed and more. The event is presented through the cooperation of several community organizations including the Center of the Nation Business Association, Belle Fourche Chamber of Commerce, Tri-State Museum and Visitor's Center, Revitalize Belle Fourche and the City of Belle Fourche.

Events kick off at 4:15pm with carriage rides on State Street. The rides are free with a donation of two cans of food that will be collected for the Compassion Cupboard. From 5-6pm will be the Belle Fourche Cowboy Band Community Chili Feed at the Community Hall on 6th Avenue. The band will be performing on stage while guests can enjoy homemade chili and the fixings. There is no charge to attend.

The Tri-State Museum will be holding an open house from 5-7pm for anyone who would like to visit. But according to museum director Kristi Thielen the open house will last until the final visitor has left.

The annual Parade of Lights will begin at 6pm. The participants will gather at the Roosevelt School grounds for staging. The parade will proceed down State Street through downtown to Highway 85 where it will turn north and end in the museum parking lot.

Fireworks will follow the parade at 7pm. The fireworks will be launched from behind the Tri-State Museum and will be visible from nearly any vantage throughout town. For those new to town the "Light up the Night" events are accessible on foot in the downtown area. Venues are within walking distance of each other and there is generally plenty of parking available in the downtown area.

Dual-Credit Scholarship Fund Receives First Donations

Fund will help high school students earn college class credits before graduation

BELLE FOURCHE - The Belle Fourche School District will soon be awarding it's first dual-credit scholarships to high school juniors and seniors to help them get a jump start on a college education.

"The way to help people out of poverty is through education," Superintendent Dr. Steve Willard told the Beacon. "And what better way to do that than to get a career or technical education and get it started in high school."

For several years high schools in the state have been able to offer juniors and seniors the ability to enroll in classes that give them both high school and college credits at the same time, in selected subjects. The program is known as the High School Dual Credit (HSDC) program. Students were required to pay for the courses. Even though it was a reduced rate a three credit hour course could still cost several hundred

In 2014 the State Legislature funded a request by Governor Dennis Daugaard to begin an annual program to provide the majority of that cost to participating state colleges and universities to reduce the cost to high school students. The Reduced Tuition Dual Credit (RTDC) program only charges

high school students \$48.33 per credit hour. Thus a 3-credit hour course would cost less than \$150, about 1/6th of what the regular college tuition would

The Belle Fourche School
District has taken that program
a step further by initiating a
Dual-Credit Scholarship that
would pay the final third of the
cost, thereby allowing BFSD
juniors and seniors the ability
to earn three college credits
tuition-free.

"So it's not a scholarship for kids going off the college, it's a scholarship for kids still in high school. But it gives them college credit," said Matthew Raba, High School Principal.

The school district looked to the community to fund the

program and the first donation came in from the Belle Fourche Development Corporation (BFDC). They presented the school district with a check for \$1,500 at the December 9th school board meeting.

"Each year the Belle Fourche High School students build a wonderful home as part of their career and technical education construction class," said BFDC Executive Director Hollie Stalder

Stalder added that normally the BFED and West River Foundation are able to secure and prepare a lot in Belle Fourche where the home will sit. The homes are built at the high school and moved to the lot. However this year the students built the home on site.

"The funds were designated this year out of the savings from not having to move the home," she told the School Board. "The total equates to about ten \$150 dual credit scholarships for Belle Fourche students."

Also last week Sam Silacci, president of the Center of the Nation All Car Rally, presented Superintendent Willard with a check for \$2,000 to provide additional scholarships. This will fund approximately 13 additional student scholarships.

"With the kids Matthew has applying I'm hoping we can get a scholarship for everyone," Willard said.

Willard said it's possible that additional monies could come in which would allow the

Vern Bills doesn't mince words when talking about the business environment in Belle Fourche. As a business owner, he knows the importance of having a loyal customer base and capitalizing on that base to the advantage of the entire community. "South Side is one of eight gasoline stations in town," he notes. "Given that mine is the only full-service station

remaining in town with a full-time master mechanic in the person of my brother (station manager for 38 years) Willard Potter, I still expect to see the same customers on

an ongoing basis. But in addition to our loyal long-time customers, I still want and expect to see some familiar local faces coming in now and then." Gone are the days when Belle Fourche could accommodate 15 full-service stations when Vern took ownership of South Side with partner Rick Wessels. That was in 1979 when South Side was located at 5th Avenue and National Street. Then in 1992 Vern assumed full ownership and moved the

business to its current location which had been Carl's Standard. Since then, Vern has invested significantly in upgrades to the station's exterior and fuel delivery system in compliance with the Conoco brand, Conoco having taken the reins from BP, which had previously bought out Standard.


"We've been able to remain a full-service station because of our size and location," says Vern. "We concentrate on the fuel we put into a vehicle as well as the service under the hood."



The election of officers will occur at the January 8, 2020 board meeting.











of 45-30. The Broncs C team coached by Angie Garza-Hunsely dominated the game with a victory of 50-10.


Belle Fourche Broncs vs. St. Thomas Moore **Cavaliers**







Sjodin, raises a good chunk of the funds the two emergency service organizations use to provide their support to the local community. Ambulance Director Sherry Hocking gave a little run-down on items or remodeling that had been done in the ambulance barn this past year with funds raised.

"We did a bathroom remodel and repair that cost \$1900 and purchased a refurbished AED (defibrillator) for \$4,000," she said. "The modem for the AED cost \$1100 and a CPR Automatic Lucas machine cost \$12,000." 123 years ago **Belle Fourche Times** Dec 26, 1896 Six Million Votes A Mighty Host Cast Their Ballots For Bryan and Bimetallism. (a system of allowing the unrestricted currency of two metals [e.g. gold and silver] as legal tender at a fixed ratio to each other.) Of the entire number of votes cast at the last election Bryan received about 6,000,000 and McKinley 7,000,000 This is the largest number ever polled. Yet has 500,000 more to his credit than Cleveland, four years ago. The magnitude of Bryan's vote overlooked in the shouting over McKinley's victory. It is something that the Republican should consider even more than the Democrats. It ought to furnish them food for most serious thought for every idle moment. Practically 47 out of every 100 men who went to the polls cast their ballots for Bryan and the

principles he represented.

Sale of Property



SDCUC Seeks Farmers for Open Districts



The South Dakota Corn Utilization Council (SDCUC) is a progressive organization which has visionary and influential producer leadership throughout the state. The 9-member board manages and invests South Dakota's 1-cent per bushel corn checkoff fund.

The SDCUC is announcing director positions that are open in Districts 4, 6, 7, 8 and 9. A SDCUC director's position consists of a three-year term beginning on March 1, 2020. Each director can serve a maximum of two terms, resulting in a six-year director's position.

If interested in seeking a board seat in one of the open districts, you must obtain and file with the corn office a nominating petition. All nominating petitions must contain at least 15 "participating" corn producer signatures from your district. (A "participating" corn producer has not requested a refund of his/her corn assessment since January of 2019). Eligible candidates who wish to seek a director's position cannot have requested a checkoff refund from the SDCUC since January of 2015. Nominating petitions must be returned back to the SDCUC office by 5 p.m. on January 3, 2020.

To request a petition please contact the SDCUC office by stopping at 4712 South Technopolis Drive, Sioux Falls, SD 57106 or call 605-334-0100.

If more than one nominating petition is received by the SDCUC office for any district, a special election will be conducted for that district. The elections will be held February 3-7, 2020 at the local extension offices in those counties.
