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Council Approves New City Red Alert Contract

New deal represents a more than 50% savings and less confusion.

BELLE FOURCHE - The city council authorized Mayor Gloria Landphere to sign a two-year agreement with Onsolve of Alpharetta, GA, to continue to provide the city with CodeRED or "red alert" services.


The council approved the measure with Onsolve for the new 2-year agreement after completing what was a 5-year agreement with the same company that caused confusion three years ago.

Three years ago the council and the city was ready to end the relationship for a lower cost alternative at what it thought was the expiration of the current contract. However the city attorney determined that it was a binding 5-year contract that would run through 2020.

The renewal with Onsolve came after what Monte Talking-

KBFS & KDYT Radio Stations Sale Agreed Upon

An agreement has been reached between Ultimate Caps, Inc and Tri State Communications, LLC for the sale of Radio Stations KBFS-AM 1450, Belle Fourche and KYDT-FM, Pine Haven. The agreement was signed on Monday, December 7

Tri State Communications, LLC will apply to the FCC for approval of the sale. Approval could take from three to four months.

KBFS went on the air in February 1959, and was purchased by Ultimate Caps, Inc. in March 1994. KYDT was built by Ultimate Caps, Inc and came on the air in November 1997.

Karl Grimmelmann, owner of Ultimate Caps, Inc. and General Manager of the stations says he is happy to retire and has full confidence in the ability of Crook County residents Ogden Driskill, Tyler Lindholm and Andrea Wood of Tri State Communications to continue the local service the listening area depends on.

Airing of local sporting events is underway.

The purchase price was not disclosed.

City Passes Latest Bridge Inspection Report

Some minor improvements to be made to some structures.

BELLE FOURCHE - The city of Belle Fourche has passed the latest round of city bridge inspections according to a report prepared by Broz Engineering. The report did list some recommendations for minor repairs and improvements. It was presented to the City Council at

last week's regular meeting by Doug Wessel, PE, from Broz's Sturgis office.

The 2020 report listed the six structures that were inspected within the city limits that fell within this inspection cycle. All of the bridges were deemed structurally sound but all have recommendations for preservation or cosmetic improvements.


"Our inspections did not result in any findings that would require immediate repairs. So overall we're in pretty good condition," Wessel told the council. "There are some recommendations that were made to extend life of structure or were more of a cosmetic nature."

Roundup St. Bridge
The first structure on the
list was the 121-foot bridge
over the Belle Fourche River
on Roundup Street as you are

on Roundup Street as you are entering the city ball fields and Roundup Grounds. According to the report this bridge was built in 1980 and has four areas in need of attention.

The first is to reseal the joints between the roadway deck units between the bridge supports. This will prevent water from seeping through the deck causing potential corrosion. The next is to sandblast the substructure steel down to white metal to get rid of the corrosion before repainting. The third is to put an epoxy seal over a chip in one of the bridges concrete beams that has the rebar exposed. Finally the report recommends addressing the settlement of the bridge approach at the south end that has created a bump in the road.

Many of these repairs have already been included in a South Dakota BIG (Bridge Improvement Grant) Preservation Grant that was awarded last February. The state granted the city the requested \$121,000 for the

repairs. The city must pay the additional \$30,250 to complete the project. A BIG allocation requires a 20% match by the local governing body.

"We are currently in the process of preparing the plans to make those repairs," Wessel said. "Several of those repairs are being addressed in the preservation grant already."

The second bridge on the list was the National Street crossing of Willow Creek. This is a three-culvert barrel structure with one culvert used for the recreation trail. It was built in 2008 and the report lists some concrete spalling on one of the culverts, which has exposed a

small bit of reinforcing steel. Spalling is when concrete begins to chip or peel away in a specific location. If left untreated it can eventually exposed re-bar or pre-stressed steel bands leaving them vulnerable to corrosion and possible weakening. The report recommends a simple patching of the concrete with an epoxy.

The third bridge is the Eighth Ave. bridge over the Belle Fourche River. It is a 166' four-span continuous concrete slab structure built in 1994. It will need an epoxy seal on the roadway, minor repairs to the wing walls, refurbishing the

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


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

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Broncs Boys BB Team Cruises To Win Over Hill City in Opener

news@bellefourchebeacon.com Senior Forward Lan Fuhrer scored 17 points to lead the Belle Fourche Broncs to a convincing 60-38 victory over Hill City at Ed Patranek Auditorium Friday night in Belle Fourche.

It was the opening game of the 2020-21 Basketball season for both squads.

Hill City came out strong in the opening quarter with a 6-0 run on three point plays by Willy Walther and Grant Sullivan but sophomore Anthony Budmayr hit a turnaround jumper in the lane to give the Broncs their first points of the season. Belle proceeded to go on a 17-0 run. Aiden Giffin hit a soft hook in the lane followed by Budmayr and Fuhrer baskets and a long three by Ryker Audiss and the Broncs led by 11. The Rangers were able to hit a couple of buckets to close the gap until Fuhrer nailed a long 3 pointer at the buzzer and the Broncs led 20-10.

The Broncs employing a trapping defense went on another 9-0 run to start the second stanza. Gabe Heck knocked down a three from the wing and Fuhrer who drove hard to the hoop all night long dropped in three lay ups, one on a nice assist by Giffin. While those few individuals and companies get richer every





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
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time you order something Online, the habit of doing is a sublime way of saying "I don't care if stores close and we lose our opportunity to shop local



The Good Stuff

The Good Stuff was developed for radio by Jim Thompson. He takes motivational stories that listeners and readers send him and incorporates them into the program. It has been on the air for more than 10 years. The Beacon is the only newspaper in which appears.

I remember the first time I heard this from Paul Harvey. I was managing a radio station in Scottsbluff, Nebraska and we got an album mailed to us. It had many readings by Mr Harvey, most of them I'd heard before but then this cut played and I've never forgotten its message or how I felt when I heard it. I call it simply:



The Man And the Birds

Now the man to whom I'm going to introduce you was not a scrooge. He was a kind, decent, mostly good man, generous to his family and upright in his dealings with other men. But he just didn't believe all that incarnation stuff which the churches proclaim at Christmas time. It just didn't make sense, and he was too honest to pretend otherwise. He just couldn't swallow the

Jesus story, about God coming to earth as a man.

"I'm truly sorry to distress you," he told his wife, "but I'm not going with you to church this Christmas Eve." He said he'd feel like a hypocrite and that he'd much rather just stay at home, but that he would wait up for them. And so he stayed, and they went to the midnight service.

Shortly after the family drove away in the car, snow began to fall. He went to the window to watch the flurries getting heavier and heavier and then went back to his fireside chair and began to read his book. Minutes later, he was startled by a thudding sound. Then another, and then another. Sort of a

thump or a thud. At first he thought someone must be throwing snowballs against his living room window.

But when he went to the front door to investigate, he found a flock of birds huddled miserably in the snow. They'd been caught in the storm and, in a desperate search for shelter, had tried to fly through his large landscape window. Well, he couldn't let the poor creatures lie there and freeze, so he remembered the barn where his children stabled their pony. That would provide a warm shelter, if he could direct the birds to it.

Quickly he put on a coat and boots and tramped through the deepening snow

to the barn. He opened the doors wide and turned on a light, but the birds did not come in. He figured food would entice them in. So he hurried back to the house, fetched bread crumbs and sprinkled them on the snow, making a trail to the yellow-lighted, wide-open doorway of the stable. But to his dismay, the birds ignored

the bread crumbs and continued to flap around helplessly in

He tried catching them. He tried shooing them into the barn by walking around them waving his arms. Instead, they scattered in every direction, except into the warm, lighted barn. And then, he realized, that they were afraid of him. To them, he reasoned, I am a strange and terrifying creature. If only I could think of someway to let them know that they can trust me – that I am not trying to hurt them, but to help them. But how, because any move he made tended to frighten and confuse them. They just would not follow. They would not be led or shooed because they feared him.

"If only I could be a bird," he thought to himself, "and mingle with them and speak their language. Then I could tell them not to be afraid. Then I could show them the way to the safe, warm to the safe, warm barn. But I would have to be one of them so they could see, and hear and understand."

At that moment, the church bells began to ring. The sound reached his ears above the sounds of the wind. And he stood there listening to the bells – listening to the bells pealing the glad tidings of Christmas. And he sank to his knees in the

WNFR Wrap Up

PRORODEO

ARLINGTON, Texas – A night after winning the coveted all-around world championship, Stetson Wright returned to make his 2020 Wrangler National Finals Rodeo one for the ages.

It ended in fitting fashion as Wright split fourth with an 89-point ride on Bar T Rodeo's Angel's Landing to win the bull riding world champi-

onship at Globe Life Field, Dec. 12.

"I was in the race for the all-around and to come out on top I was at a loss for words, I was star struck to beat guys I look up to," said Wright, who locked up the all-around

crown Dec. 11. "But winning the all-around world title meant so much to me, but to win it again feels better for the simple fact that people might say I was lucky my first time. But I feel like after the second one, maybe they'll still think I'm lucky, but everyone has their own opinion, and it doesn't change the fact that I got what I wanted, so I'm just happy to be here."

Wright has won back-to-back all-around world championships – the first to do so since Trevor Brazile in 2014 and 2015.

At 21, Wright is the youngest cowboy to be crowned All-Around World Champion in his first two seasons. He became the first cowboy to win the all-around gold buckle and a roughstock world championship in the same year since Ty Murray in 1998. Murray won the all-around and bull riding titles that year.

"That's what I always wanted growing up, to be one of the best cowboys to ever live," Wright said. "That means a lot to hear people talk that highly about me makes me feel lucky and happy to be where I'm at."

In the bull riding, Wright edged Ty Wallace for the world crown. Wright finished with \$267,941, edging Ty Wallace, who came in with \$256,599. Wallace split fourth with Wright in Round 10.

Stetson clinched his inaugural bull riding world title by placing second in the average with 539 points on six head. Wallace was third in the average with 533.5 points on six. Colten Fritzlan won the average with 605 points on seven.

"It was crazy. Ty Wallace, Colten Fritzlan and Ky Hamilton all rode phenomenally," Wright said. "Every guy did this week, but it came down to us four in the last round and it was crazy to come out on top. This is what I live for, the stories

when it comes down to the last ride."

Kaycee Feild becomes third bareback rider to win five world titles.

Feild won his fifth bareback world championship and first since 2014 with a 91-point ride on Stace Smith Pro

Rodeos' Junior Bonner on a re-ride.

"I'm trying to block it all out before I start crying when I see my family," Feild said. "This is pretty special. I have a lot to say, but I don't even know where to begin. I'm really excited."

Feild finished first in the world standings with \$277,648. Tim O'Connell finished second with \$270,991.

Saddle bronc rider Ryder Wright captured his second world title.

Wright split the Round 10 win with a 91-point ride on Pete Carr Pro Rodeo's Big Texas to catapult to the world and average championships at the 2020 Wrangler NFR.

Wright also won a world title n 2017.

Tie-down roper Shad Mayfield had a forgetful 2020 Wrangler NFR, placing in just two rounds and registering six no-times.


But Mayfield rode a huge regular-season performance to finish atop the world standings with \$198,399, just \$231 more than second-place Marty Yates.

Team roping partners Lovell, Eaves win world titles With a world championship in reach, team ropers Colby Lovell and Paul Eaves won Round 10 with a 4.4-second run to capture coveted world championship gold buckles.

Lovell finished with \$187,836 in the world standings, defeating second-place Luke Brown

joints at the end of the approach slabs and repairing erosion under the bridge abutments where settling has occurred. Wessel says consideration will be given for another BIG appropriation to help cover repair costs for the first three items but not the fourth.

"The reason we don't add that to a preservation grant is once we do anything under the bridge, you have to do a hydraulic analysis," he said. "Basically we're just telling the county and cities that we work with that it is better to address these on your own instead of through the grant program."

The next structure was the Eighth Ave. crossing of Hay Creek south of National Street. This bridge was just completed last year and will need some very simple patch work due to concrete spalling on the west end of the culverts. This is not a structural issue; it is more of a cosmetic one, according to

The fifth structure is the little-noticed triple culvert cross-

ing of Hay Creek on 10th Street built in 1961. It will need some concrete patching between the culverts to stop the freeze-thaw cycle from making the cracks larger. It is also recommended that brush be cleared out from the channel to help improve water flow. "It's really just good practice to remove that from the channel," Wessel added.

The final bridge on the list was the 354-foot span over the Redwater River on the Hwy 212 Business Loop. A BIG grant will also be considered for repairs on this bridge. Recommendations include applying an epoxy deck overlay to stop infiltration of water in order to prolong the structure life; thr repair of some concrete spalls on the wing walls; and repairing the joints on the approach slabs. Wessel said the report also recommends removing the trees on upstream side of bridge as they reach close to the roadway enabling leaves and branches to fall onto the surface, possibly impeding travel.

"But overall we found no major issues so it's always a good thing when you can tell people that," Wessel said.

ton, Ward 1 Councilman, called some "serious horse trading" on the part of Police Chief Marlyn Pomrenke.

"This is a contract that was a lot higher before and through negotiations he got us to this," Talkington said.

The new agreement, totaling \$6,000, (\$3,000 per year) represents a savings of 58% from the previous contract.

"I do want to say, Marlyn, good job with this," Mayor Gloria Landphere told the council. "He got out there and met with them. This is a very efficient thing we have for the city and very efficient with our dollars as well."

This time around the city made certain that the contract was for two years. It will run through Dec. 31, 2022.

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

1971 Wool Incentive Price is Set at 72 cent

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has announced an incentive price of 72 cents a pound for 1971 marketings of shorn wool. This figure is unchanged from the 1970 levels, said Robert Hoffman, chairman of the state ASCS committee. An extension of the authority for the wool price-support program thru Dec. 31, 1973 is contained in the Agricultural Act of 1970. The new legislation amends the National Wool Act by requiring that support prices shall be at the above levels for each of the three marketing years thru the end of 1973.

This attracts large crowds on typical non-winter weekends and select nights during the week. In Moline, IL. the new Bass Street Landing and their outdoor band shell brings a whole new vibrancy to their downtown. Likewise, "The District" in Rock Island, IL. embraces the arts and music very effectively throughout the entire year. Ogden, UT, once the home of a blighted downtown people avoided after dark, has become a meca for lovers of music, the

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arts and entertainment for all

While one can argue Austin has always been a music town, all the others are simply regular small and mid-sized communities that saw the value of music. They strategically incorporated music into their plan of transforming and revitalizing their communities. None of them had a history rich with music. yet they utilized a medium that nearly everyone understands and appreciates. They knew that by creating their town's future through music and vision of what music can bring, they could grow their communities.

These communities didn't just wake-up one day and start promoting music or the arts for that matter. Their strategies were created with foresight, acute vision and extensive community-wide planning. In each case, the planning stages weren't long and laborious; they were created with long-term vision and strategic precision. They pieced together a community-wide vision and then proceeded to make their vision become a reality.

Regardless if a community embraces music as a centerpiece or not, a community without music in their mix is no different than a community without retail or restaurants. A community without music will simply struggle and lose patrons to those communities that understand the binding power of music.

Music alone, however, will do little. Music combined or coupled with the right mix of unique retail and dining opportunities will transform entire communities. Communities would be well served to embrace the value of music as a

part of their transformation and revitalization visions and plans. To leave this component out will only encourage your local residents to seek this emotional stimulation in other nearby towns and communities. John A. NEWELL - During the regular Town Commission meeting held via Zoom for the public, Newell Mayor Ken Wetz asked Liquor Store/Bar Manager Jessica Brown about the shortfalls at the Newell Bar this year. The Newell Commission was reviewing the Supplemental Appropriations Ordinance set for its first reading. There were several areas that had a need for funds' transfer, but the greatest was for the Liquor Fund.

"The bottom line is we can't lose \$30,000 in the liquor fund," said Wetz. There needs to be a way to utilize the people we have to do repairs and to use in appropriate ways, he added.

Brown said that she was looking for ideas to make more money at the liquor store and bar. She indicated to the council that she was making sure orders were properly handled and watching inventory.

"Sales are up from last year," she said.

However, she added, the process of deep cleaning because of COVID-19 and repairs on the bar cut into the budget.

Commissioner Chad Erk also had more questions for Brown about the losses at the bar. Brown said that she would have more details in the future.

The First Reading of Ordinance 03-2020 Supplemental Appropriations Ordinance was approved and will be read again at a Special meeting set for December 29, 2020.

Public Works Manager Larry Parker elaborated on his request for a sweep/gutter brush for the Bobcat used by the city workers. He recommended the purchase of a 72" broom that


Her honors in the area of sports include: In basketball-SD Academic Achievement,



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Then and Now in Newell

"Looking Forward to our Past" by Linda Velder

December 15, 1910

For the month of October, Newell received 39 immigrant cars. This was nearly 3 times as many cars received by any other town on the North Western Line. 400 cars of cattle and sheep were shipped from here this season; a pretty good showing for our first year.

W. J. Darling, alias J. W. Darling, alias Erland D. Darling alias Andrew A. Brown, a general all around crook, is being held at a local jail. The most serious charges that have come to light at this stage of the game is for numerous filings on government land and selling his relinquishments. It is known he has made one filing in the area including Rapid City, Belle Fourche and Brushie and hard to say how many more will be disclosed under other names. He came to Newell and drove out to Brushie and returned here Friday with Frank Morgan, a "locating agent", to use as a witness filing under the name of Andrew A. Brown.

Mr. Perroguine came in to Newell Monday for supplies for the Cody Store. It has been reported that the coal mine at the Mud Buttes have been closed and that the homesteaders on Frozen Man Creek are hauling coal for the winter supply from another location.

December 23, 1920

H.J. Christian had the misfortune to have his right wrist broken while trying to start his car by the strong arm method after it had been standing out in the cold for sometime. While Rev. Klein is suffering from a strain in his back due to a fall received during a run-away Sunday night.

Little Graham, the 6-year old son of Mr. & Mrs. Eli Hammontree, Vale, passed away Tuesday morning after an illness of only a few days. The dreaded disease dyphtheria was the cause of the little fellow's death and who had started school for the first time; a loveable bright little fellow will be greatly missed by his sorrowing parents, their only child.

J.W. Fargo located in the Christian building, has a few thousand dollars worth of clothing in Newell that he wants to sell quickly and is giving some nice bargains. You will not be able to buy this cheap again as he is closing out an estate. The finest wool, no shoddy goods. He will be here only 2 weeks.

Henry Wendt returned the forepart of the week from Whitewood with a rail car of posts which he has had cut in the Hills some time ago. He is hauling same from Newell by team to his place near Castle Rock.

December 18, 1930

Distress Warrants for delinquent personal taxes in the City of Newell are now in the hands of L.R. Jones, Deputy Sheriff. According to Mr. Jones, the law compels the sheriff to collect the delinquent taxes and the Distress Warrants now in his hands are among the first of a campaign which will be carried out all over the county. Mr. Jones will begin in a few days and he urges all those delinquent in personal taxes to make payment of same before the warrants are served. Thus saving the expenses of levying on your personal property.

The members of the Congregational Churches of Newell, Nisland and Vale held a special meeting in the Church parlors at Nisland Monday evening at which time a new Pastor was elected to serve the 3 congregations. Rev. George T. Walton, formerly of Springfield, was elected and according to the trustees accepted the call. Rev. and Mrs. Walton left Tuesday for Canistota to obtain furniture and personal effects preparatory to settling in thr Nisland church parsonage.

What might have been a disastrous fire was averted early Wednesday morning when J.T. Milek and Dale Killery, of Sturgis, discovered a blaze in the residence occupied by Mr. & Mrs. O. D. Thompson, about 2 miles north of Newell. Mr. Milek and Mr. Killery were enroute to the Moreau



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















