Kling Road Issue Wrapped Up

BELLE FOURCHE - "I don't think we have anything else to worry about," said State's Attorney Cassie Wendt, reporting on the Kling Road lawsuit that has been dragging on for more several years. Previous to the June 2017 approval of the vacation petition from Chris Kling, a rancher who lived near the road and bridge by the same name that same board had closed the bridge due to its unsafe condi-

In March 2018, three people who lived in the vicinity filed an appeal to the decision. They included Abby Olson, Ben Blake, and Jodi Massie, who disagreed with the decision to vacate, calling it arbitrary and unreasonable.

In September of this year, after several years of rulings and appeals, and postponements due to the Covid 19 virus, the case was finally back underway in the Butte County Courthouse. The matter was put before 4th Circuit Court Judge Michelle Comer to decide if the February 2018 decision to vacate the road was appropriate.

Although dozens of community members spoke against the action at the time, the majority of the testimony in September was dominated by Butte County Commissioner Kim Richards. He said the decision was a difficult one, but the only option available, and that the highway department's annual budget

regularly required supplementation just to keep up with the minimum amount of operational expenses, let alone, repair, rebuilding or replacement of a bridge for minimal use.

Richards said that due the age and condition of the Kling Road Bridge, combined with available detour routes, contributed to the structure being classified as "low priority" and placed on the potential closure list. Following the wrap-up of the trial, it was a waiting game and at each board meeting the answer was the same, "no news yet."

Finally, this week, Wendt relayed the information that the judge handed down the ruling in favor of the county board.

"Now you just need to decide what you want to do," said Wendt. "If you institute an appraisal and it is under \$500 it does not have to be sold with notice, if over, it does. If you take sealed bids, you need someone to assist in the opening as a witness."

The board approved the purchase of two new vehicles for the sheriff's department, the first is a 2021 2500 Tradesman Crew Cab 4x4, to be purchased for \$31,714.00 from Scott Peterson Motors. The second was a 2021 Durango Pursuit Vehicle AWD, again, to be purchased from Scott Peterson Motors. Sheriff Fred Lamphere had brought previous proposals from Wegner Auto in Pierre to the board, but had been asked to seek proposals from local dealerships.

In news from the state's attorney's office, Wendt said it is expected that due to the ongoing

City Sales Tax Revenue Above Last Year Despite Virus

BELLE FOURCHE - The city of Belle Fourche is poised to see one of its biggest years ever in terms of sales tax revenue, despite a year that saw the emergence of the coronavirus on the national scene.

Through November the total collected already exceeded \$3 million for the first 11 months of the year. That total does not yet add the usually strong December Christmas shopping season. The 2020 total number will available in January.

It's clear that Belle Fourche is bucking the national trend. Nationwide local and state sales tax revenue is on pace to decline by and average of 5% according to statistics from the Brookings Institution. Conversely, in Belle Fourche, it is expected to rise by at least 7% over last year. In fact many municipalities in the Northern Black Hills region are seeing similar increases.

"I think we're pretty positive about it," said Jason LaFayette, Assistant City Finance Director. "We're running higher than we were last year at this time and it's a very good sign."

The city made the decision not to go to into mandatory lockdown last March, leaving that decision to the discretion of the local business owners.

cases of coronavirus in Butte County. Keeping the doors to local business consistently open during the year was a contributing factor but LaFayette also says there was probably another contributing factor.

At that time there were no

"Some of that probably came from a lot of online sales," LaFayette said. "During the pandemic people were staying home and not travelling as much to Rapid and other cities. They were shopping local and shopping online.'

This year was the first full year that local municipalities were allowed to collect sales tax for online purchases made from vendors who were out of state. That law was made possible by the South Dakota v. Wayfair decision handed down by a 5-4 vote of the United State Supreme Court in June of 2018. That decision allowed states to write laws that would allow charging local sales tax on purchases made through vendors with no brick and mortar presence with a state, such as Amazon.

"During the year I have to think that the online sales were a factor," he said.

The city finance department had expected a drop in local sales tax revenue due to the closure of ShopKo earlier in the year but that does not seem to have materialized.

"That is something that we just haven't seen and it's probably because people are staying local, shopping local and shopping form home," LaFayette said. "We're seeing those tax dollars being spent in town and that's really causing a rise in those numbers for us." But the news wasn't all good.

With the increase in sales tax

has come a decrease in third penny revenue over last year. The third penny revenue is often referred to as the "bed and booze" tax and is directly affected by the level of tourism and convention activity. Through eleven months the city was off by about 4% over last

"We're just going to have

reign back in a bit the funding for our third-penny projects, such as what we were going to put in down there at the Roundup Grounds," he said. "It won't necessarily stop what we're doing down there but it will probably slow things down, especially things that may or

Rev. Harold Salem, Legendary Belle Native, Son Passes

ABERDEEN, S.D. The Rev. Harold Salem, a longtime pastor and voice of the Christian Worship Hour, died Friday morning.

Salem had been in the hospital about 2 1/2 weeks receiving treatment for pneumonia, according to Bill Edwards, president of the Christian Worship

Salem, who turned 99 this summer, started as a pastor at 23

His first job in June 1944 was at First Baptist Church in his hometown of Belle Fourche. He stayed there for a little over 13 years before he moved to Aberdeen where he spent the next 52 years and eight months as pastor at Aberdeen's First Baptist Church. Salem started broadcasting his sermons on the Christian Worship Hour in

Although he left his post at the church in 2010, he remained the church's pastor emeritus. He also continued his life of ministry on the Christian Worship Hour television show, which is broadcast around the world and today reaches 1.6 billion homes. "He loved what he did and was totally absorbed in his work," Edwards said of Salem in a phone interview Friday. Salem was known to provide personal responses to those who wrote in with questions. Edwards said he wrote dozens of responses each week to those who wrote with theological questions or if it was someone in dire need.

"His preaching was legendary," Edwards said. Salem was widowed in 2005 when his wife Beulah died on Christmas Eve. They had four children, Mike, of Aberdeen, Daniel, of Caroll, Iowa,



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

Pastor's Perspective

This week's Pastor's Perspective is provided by Jean Helmer, Joy Fisher Ministries.

For Unto Us A Child Is Born

My favorite Christmas music is Handel's Messiah, the musical version of the Book of Isaiah. Two songs speak directly to me this year. "For Unto Us a Child is Born" quotes Isaiah 9:6. A more somber song is "Comfort, O Comfort My People," focuses on Isaiah 40:1-2. Together, these give the heart of the Christmas message.

The passage states the child, born to be Counselor, Father, and Prince of will have "the government on his shoulders." Isaiah is proclaiming that this child will take over the running of the world. Did you notice that this duty is given to a child? There is no mention of "after he has grown to adulthood. Thus, in the Book of Isaiah, we get an upclose view of how God thinks.

Isaiah 40: 1-2 states: "'Comfort my people,' says your God. 'Speak tenderly to Jerusalem and proclaim to her that her hard service has been completed, that her sin has been paid for, that she has received from the LORD's hand double for all her sins." The final phrase, "received double for all her sins," is troublesome when seen from modern world perspective. Is it stating that "God has given them double the typical punishment for their transgressions?" That God would be arbitrary and unnecessarily harsh—and a God quite different than the God Jesus presents to us in his teaching. Recently, I discovered an explanation of the handling of debts during the time period of this text. Knowing the cultural practice transformed the passage into a powerful statement of love. It also made the the Messiah coming as a baby a profound statement of what God asks of us.

Hebrew laws forbid charging and receiving interest on

loans. Still, there were times when borrowing was necessary. If a loan was not repaid in a timely manner, the lender posted notice on the debtor's door stating the amount owed. Imagine the humiliation of one's neighbors seeing that notice. If someone wished to redeem the debt, that person paid the debt, then "doubled the debt notice," folded it in half and reposted it on the door signifying that the debt had been fully satisified. So,

"Comfort my people [by telling them] that their debt has been doubled," means the debt has been forgiven, totally erased. In reading further, we discover the people had not requested this forgiveness. God simply said that the time had come—He was erasing the debt to restore His covenant with the Hebrews. Imagine discovering that all your debts, all your transgressions, were erased! They have been. God is giving us a clean slate for the coming

Now, about the Christ Child. The passage does not say "the government will be on his shoulders when he grows to adulthood." Why would God send an infant rather than a fully mature man? Think what happens when a baby is present. All must devote energy to the care and protection of the child. Now imagine a world in which we focused on caring for one another rather than on struggling for positions of strength. The presence of a baby brings peace, joy, and refocuses our priorities. And isn't that what God has been asking us to do for centuries? May 2021 be the year that we get our focus right. May the Christ Child dwelling in your heart bring you comfort, peace and hope.

Luke 2:17-20 When they had seen him, they spread the word concerning what had been told them about this child, and all who heard it were amazed at what the shepherds said to them. But Mary treasured up all these things and pondered them in her heart. The shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all the things they had heard and seen, which were just as they had been told.





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

He took his string of fleet-footed equine to many of the regional tracks of that time: he mentioned



He said once he even went to an event in north central Iowa where a local Chamber of Commerce was hosting a special mid summer race as a fundraiser at their local fairgrounds.



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








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The Good Stuff



Expired Driver License Extension Ends Dec. 30

Dec. 30 is the deadline for people to renew their expired South Dakota driver licenses and ID cards!

When COVID-19 temporarily shut down the state's driver license stations in early March, Gov. Kristi Noem issued an exemption delaying the renewal of driver licenses and ID cards that expired on or after March 13. That exemption ends Dec. 30.

In the past nine months, the Driver License staff has tried to reduce the backlog of renewals by having exam stations open additional days. You may also have seen or heard commercials about our "Renew 2020" campaign, letting people know how they can renew online.

If you can renew your license online we encourage you to do that. Here's how:

To apply online go to renew2020sd.com for further information

You may access and print instructions and an application at renew2020sd.com to renew by mail. The renewal fee is \$28 for a regular license and \$33 for a CDL.

The mailing address is Driver Licensing Program, 118 W. Capitol Ave., Pierre SD 57501. To apply by mail, contact our office by email at dpsdl@state. sd.us (preferred method) or call us at 605-773-6883 for a renewal by mail packet.

If you must renew in person, you must make an appointment in advance at https://dps.sd.gov. The appointment times are filling fast so please do that as soon as possible.

Please do NOT delay renewing your license or ID. If you do not have either one renewed by Dec. 30, you could be cited by law enforcement for driving with an expired license.

may not have been planned for next year."

The city has received its first tax payment from the state. It is up a healthy amount from last year's first payment but LaFayette says it does not guarantee the second payment will be. But the initial third penny payment was \$3,000 higher than last year's, which is seen

as a positive sign.

By the numbers last year's total sales tax revenue in the city for all twelve months was \$3,001,867.55. This year through eleven months the total was already \$3,017,234.47. The 2020 year-to-date figure is higher than the yearly total for any previous year dating back to before 2015.

The third-penny revenue for all of 2019 was \$180,870.94. Through eleven months this

year the total is \$162,752.65 which is on pace for about a 4% drop from last year.

Third penny exceeded last year's monthly revenue totals in January, March, April, July, September and October. Revenue was up 8% in July, which may be attributable to the largest Black Hills Roundup in recent times. Revenue dropped sharply in August, perhaps reflecting a slower than normal Rally season.

County Gets a Big Surprise

BELLE FOURCHE - The Butte County commission got a big surprise on Monday, and it wasn't a good one. Definitely no Christmas present.

It came in the form of a visit from Butte Electric CEO John Lee and Director of Operations Brett Fosheim and the info they brought about some costs that have been incurred with the replacements of two bridge on Orman Road, the two over Indian Creek and Horse Creek. Due to the fact that large cranes will need to be moved in to move components, and that they will need room to maneuver, several transmission power lines will need to be moved to get out of the contractor's way.

"We got the bid and right now it's roughly \$100,000 plus to get those out of the area they need to do work on," said Lee. "We thought we should bring this to your attention."

Lee said they brought the bids to show the commission and that they could provide the lowest responsible bid. He said there's still a lot to plan yet, but that there was an issue.

'We have the poles on the way and materials," said Lee. "We don't have the engineering expenses yet. The materials are recoverable (expenses). There's a very low amount of hardware we'll not be able to salvage.'

The first structure is on Orman Road, Number 10-262-330 on Indian Creek. However, Lee said there were issues with both bridges.

Lee said when he had talked to a Brosz Engineering representative, a company that has done the engineering on the two bridges, that he was told that the costs incurred in moving electrical were not figured into the grant the county received for the construction of the replacement bridges, which, in this case is a considerable amount.

"There are two poles on the Indian Creek bridge that will impact the structure itself," said

"So, the contractor won't work on these bridges if the poles aren't removed?" questioned Commissioner James Ager. "They don't put it in the grant and it can't be written into the grant?

County Superintendent Dwayne Heidrich said, "They don't put it in the grant. Why they don't, nobody really knows."

"We took two poles (that are in the right of way) out of the cost. We certainly want to send all the information we can. We can email all this info to you,'

shared Lee.

"If that's what it is, that's what it is," said Chairman Stan Harms. "We want that bridge in."

"And there aren't any contractors who will put it in without moving those (poles)?" asked Ager.

Commissioner Kim Richards asked if the highway commissioners which includes Karrol Herman and himself, as well as Heidrich and the representatives from Brosz and Butte Electric meet at the site of the needed changes.

Ager asked if someone from Brosz could come to the end-ofthe-year meeting. "I want to be in on that conversation." Lee responded by saying that Butte Electric wanted to do everything possible to make things work out.

After Lee and Fosheim had left the meeting, the board discussed a topic that Harms had planned to bring up about giving the county employees a

"I personally would like to give the county employees a bonus, I think they've had a tough year with the virus," said Harms. However, the topic did not garner a motion with the surprise news they received about the bridge situation.

firm decided to make the move, reach out, and open office here.

virus issues that the new grand jury would serve for a full year.

Assistant State's Attorney LeEllen McCartney, reported on the Employee Handbook, and with a small bit of tweaking yet, the board approved the handbook, effective January 1, 2021. All employees would meet with their individual department heads and sign a back sheet acknowledging understanding of the handbook.

Wendt said the county would be purchasing two surface laptops instead of new computers as these units would be compatible to the Karpel document system that is in the process of being uploaded.

'We could take them with us into the courtroom and be able to scan a defendants entire file while in the room," said Wendt. "We will save \$860 if we purchase through Best Buy before the end of the year. Double Star (Computing) cannot sell these but can set them up and get them ready to go," said Wendt.

Following a brief executive session on legal counsel for contractual matters, the board approved the agreement with the city on the Dispatch Con-

McCartney explained, "We made modifications to page five, asking the city to pay 50 percent of the necessary equipment expense, page 10 on the termination of the agreement, reducing the notice from 18 months to six months on a three-year contract, and page 17, which involved no budget for the contract then the contract is terminated."

Mayor Gloria Landphere, who was in attendance, said she had taken the contract to her legal finance committee and had planned to take it to the city counsel on Monday night, December 21, for approval.

Highway Superintendent Dwayne Heidrich reported that one of the older trucks had, at the very least, a blown head gasket and possibly more damage. It had been taken to Bickle's for assessment.

The board approved a work order for construction engineering services on another bridge on Orman Road, as well as several applications for rightsof-way, and installation of fiber optic cable under 183rd Street.

They approved the contract for Community Health Services between Butte County and the SD Department of Health. They also approved the Fairboard agreement with Lawrence County. They also gave the nod for five Retail (on-sale) Liquor-Sunday Sales licenses in the county.

Commissioner Karrol Herman brought up the topic of the cleaning of offices by Stanley Steamer with a cost of around \$4000 for fogging for the virus.

"I could see a spray ting doing a more thorough job than wiping everything down," said Herman, referring to a fogging unit that is used in the ambulance department. Richards said the unit, which is portable cost around \$320 with \$200 for four gallons of liquid.

Commissioner James Ager said, "For \$600, I think it would be good to have around. (It would be a) small investment that would be used a lot."

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



They have approached the local business community to provide a matching opportunity for local citizens donating toward the total project implementation cost of \$25,000. Because the Main Street organization is non-profit, all donations are tax deductible.

I point this out to show regardless of the size of the community, if there is a will, there can be a way. Smaller and mid-sized communities need to do everything they can to differentiate their communities

from the sea of sameness we all experience all too often. Anything your community can do to set you apart in a positive way will be money well spent.



except for Timber Lake, and that is the reservation," said Schoenfish.

Burtzlaff questioned if there was a possibility to get a scanner like the one that had been used at the Bison game. "It was pretty cool," he said. "I think that'd be a good idea.'

Schoenfish said he thought the cost was around \$1500 and several on the board said they wondered what would happen if someone registered a tempera-

"Would they be required to leave?" Youngberg questioned.

"It would be nice (if a scanner was utilized) to let other teams know," said Stacie Morell, who was in attendance. "It would not be very much fun to have to sit in a car for four hours. I also think, being fluid is a good thing, with numbers changing all the time. I guess we all need to be a little more proactive to get on the other school's website."

After more discussion the board left things as they were with no changes.

Schoenfish also went through calendar changes, saying, "There are tons of basketball and wrestling changes." He reminded people to check the school website before planning to attend any activity, siting this coming Friday's basketball cancellation which was replaced by the middle/high school music concert.

The AD said that there are some schools who don't have activity programs this year due to Covid so that has brought some cancelations that, so far. they have not been able to fill. "We're looking at three weekends in a row in January," he said of the lack of wrestling meets. "We might be doing a little bit more traveling those weekends," saying he was looking at events as far away as Sioux Falls. "I hate changes on a calendar, it just messes people up."

He said there were semester tests Monday and Tuesday

They also approved raising non-certified long-term sub pay to \$140 per day. A long-term sub is considered substituting for 11 consecutive days or more.

The board went into executive session to discuss employees and following that hired Rodney Wamsher to fill a custodian spot. They also tabled a discussion on open enrollment and early graduation to a special meeting to be held on Wednesday, December 16. Due to the nature of the topic, the board decided more time was needed. That topic will be addressed in a sidebar article.

"Looking Forward to our Past" by Linda Velder

December 22, 1910

Rev. N. Leavitt spent last week in Fruitdale vicinity, where he has a large singing class. Rev. Surbeck had charge of the services in Vale Sunday during the absence of Pastor Leavitt.

Butter 30 cents and eggs 35 cents at McSloy's in Vale. How does this compare with prices in the new town of Newell?

County Surveyor Adams was out in the Owl Butte vicinity last week surveying in the northeast part of 10-7. D.W. Ryan, Leo Ryan and Jos. Schmitz will have to move their houses farther north in order to be on their own land, as they were all mislocated.

December 30, 1920

Harry A. Osloond, President of the United Farmers Association met with the Butte County Commission at the Court House, asked for the right-of-way privileges along certain highways in the county for a telephone line, which was approved.

We are anxiously awaiting the appearance of the Legion basketball team. The ball has been here for some time, but as yet no team has showed up to push it around. There is plenty of good material, show and little pep fellows, come out.

Miss Isabell Wheaton, who is holding a position with the bank in Lake Andes, was visiting friends here on Christmas Day. She was on a 2-weeks vacation, but on account of disrupted train schedules, she spent nearly all of her vacation getting here.

December 25, 1930

The Buick sedan owned by John Wilson which was stolen

from in front of the school house last Thursday evening was found Saturday in the Empire vicinity. The person who discovered the car said the engine was still running at the time, indicating that the robbers had made a hurried get-away. An examination revealed the engine damaged, due to no doubt, to the fact that the oil was quite low.

A Christmas tree erected during the past week in front of Frank's Café and decorated with colored lights, adds materially to the effectiveness of other decorations in evidence throughout the town. A hearty congratulations to Captain Schipke, members of the team and to Newell High School.



At that point, the kids were able to deliver cards to Rolling Hills, in person, and it was a wonderful experience for both our students, and the residents,

We decided that we wanted to try to expand the number of people we reached, as we all know, 2020 hasn't been the ideal year, and loneliness is a great concern for those living in residential centers and those that are homebound, so we wanted to make sure that they all know that they haven't been forgotten.


Thus, we set out on a campaign to color/create Christmas cards for all of our elder friends in the nursing homes and assisted livings in Belle Fourche.

Soon the idea grew to include our friends that receive care from home health and Meals on Wheels. After contacting people at these places, we determined that we were going to need a minimum of 280 Christmas cards—we were quite certain that our little class wouldn't be able to reach that alone, and so we recruited BFMS students and staff to help us out.

Just a few days after Thanksgiving break, Black and white card copies were set on a table outside of our door and a selection of cards was set out at the office, for all to take and color. We put a collection box by the angel tree and sent out an email asking our Bronc friends to assist in this "little" project.

Students and staff from the entire BF Middle School joined in coloring cards—some simply colored them and wrote a brief greeting, while others shared a holiday joke, and a few shared heart-felt messages of encouragement and care.

Amanda Quenzer-Hays and Aron Jones, paraprofessionals in our self-contained, special education classroom, worked very hard to keep us all on track to achieve this goal. Along with all of the other duties and activities they take care of for our
