Financing of New Roundup Bleachers in Place



HISTORY TORN DOWN -The old grandstands have been removed at the Black Hills Roundup grounds and work proceeds on construction of the new seating structure. The seating shown in the picture above will be upgraded but will remain in place as the the new structure will be built behind the open-air seating shown. The new grandstands will be financed through up to \$1 million in bonds and a city budget allocation of \$400,000.

BELLE FOURCHE - As work is completed on the demolition of the old Black Hills Roundup grandstands and the construction of the new seating begins, the financing mechanism for the new facility has been put in place.

Up to \$1.4 million will be available for the construc-

tion of the new grandstands to replace the century-old original structure.

At the August 6th meeting of the Belle Fourche City Council approved the adoption of Resolution No. 29-2108 and a placement agent agreement with Dougherty & Company for financing of the Roundup grounds bleachers.

The Resolution authorizing the execution, terms, issu-

ance, sale, and payment of Sales Tax Revenue bonds, Series 2018 in the aggregate principal amount of not to exceed one million (\$1,000,000), of the City of Belle Fourche of Butte County, South Dakota to provide funds to construct a new rodeo grounds, equipping and furnishing the same, and sales tax bonds of the city. The one million in addition

The one million, in addition to \$400,000 in the 2018 city

budget will construct the new grandstands replacing what city employees have demolished since the end of this July's Black Hills Roundup. The payment of the Bonds will be made with revenues collected and pledged from city sales tax.

Both regular agenda items were voted on and adopted unanimously without any discussion, questions, or comments from the council.

The new aluminum and steel grandstands will be built in three sections. The main structure will be 240feet long and have seating for 1,971 in 15 rows.

A second grandstand will be built on the west side of this main structure in between the west stands, and angeled toward the arena. It will have seating for 242 fans.

A third VIP section and press box will be built on the east side of the main structure, angled toward the arena, featuring six box seats with 21" chairs and room for 84.

The timeline for construction provides for the new

BELLE FOURCHE - On June 1st Baxter Anders and his wife Skyler became the new owners of the Belle Fourche Livestock Exchange. The Elm Springs area native and rancher had also been employed the previous 10 years at Philip Livestock. Belle Fourche Livestock, US Highway 212, on the west edge of Belle Fourche has been an area landmark for generations. Long before the filming of John Wayne's 1972 movie, "The Cowboys" area ranchers were bringing livestock to the Belle Fourche auction barn. In 2017 the Belle

Fourche Livestock auction ring, buildings, and surrounding corrals handled 172,669 head of livestock and the office wrote 11,326 checks to producers. In addition to the owners it employs 12 full time people and during the busy fall runs an additional 50-60 are working to handle the added work load.



He attended school at Newell SD and Rapid City SD but did not graduate high school because he enlisted in the Navy. Wally's military career spanned 21 years including 8 years in the Navy and 13 years in the Air Force. He met Marlene (Midge) Black at a dance in Oakland CA while he was going to Navy Law School. They were married on June 12th 1953 at Reno NV. To this union they had 3 children, Walt, Darylinn and Shelly. The service took him overseas to Guam and Wiesbaden Germany. He spent a brief time as a civilian in between those enlistments working for a railroad company, the Dodge Company installing transmissions and a tomato factory. His last assignment in the service was being transferred from Andrews AFB to the Pentagon where he worked with the Air Force Command Post. He retired from the Air Force in 1972. We are excited for the 2018 season to start. This is by far the best summer of mileage we've had as a team since I took over as head coach in 2015. Wyatt Keegan & Devin Nowowiejski really stepped up this summer and I expect that they will both show huge improvements from all the work they put in. Sawyer Clarkson & Cole Hockenberry return after making state as middle school runners last year is huge. We need to find out who will fill out our boys' varsity roster. I look for 7th graders Harley Rivera, Jordan Sandoval, and Aiden Voyles to push our other younger boys and maybe move up to some JV or even varsity races later in the season. We are a very young boys' team but have a good amount of experience. Qualifying for state as a team is a realistic goal for our boys if we can stay healthy and run our best in October.

On the girls' side we return Hayley Wilbur who made a big jump last season and qualified for state as a freshman. She had a good summer as did freshman Molly Rhoads so I'd look for improvement there. Molly Ryan is a senior who ran a little bit after soccer season ended last year and this year she is on board for the season, focusing on soccer until their season ends when she will join



us full time just in time for conference and regions – she has a real chance to qualify for state if she stays healthy throughout soccer season. We will get a boost as sophomore Katie Kerr returns to Belle Fourche after spending some time in North Dakota. She was a varsity runner for us as middle schooler.

8th grader Alanah Pomrenke had a solid summer of training and looks good so far. We have a great group of incoming 7th graders: Allison Hayes, Sarah Juelfs, Anika Main, Lorelei Seamen, and Addy Muhm. They should all have a great chance to make our varsity squad by season's end. Addy is currently out with a stress fracture, but we are hopeful that we can get her back by September and ease her way back into a decent training load by the time the bigger meets roll around in October. Our region is so tough on the girls' side with STM, Custer, and Hill City placing 1-2-3 at state two years in a row so we know we have our work cut out for us to be competitive with

them – but I am hopeful that we can continue to improve our conference and region placings from last season and bring at least 2-3 girls to the state meet in Sioux Falls in October.

We also have what looks to be a talented group of 6th graders who will be competing in their first season of cross country. I've been super impressed by their work ethic and attitudes so far and am excited to see them get on the course and compete!

BHC Outlook: On the girls' side I would expect defending state champs Hill City to be very solid again with Custer, STM, at Sturgis all vying for a top finish. I really see Custer & STM as the two favorites for the boys, although Custer has quite a bit of talent to replace from their team last year, but they always seem to have some younger kids ready to step in and perform.

Region 5A: Just like the BHC for the girls', I would expect Hill City, Custer, and STM to all be extremely strong. The boys' race should be fun, with Custer and STM leading the way and then I see Hot Springs, RC Christian, and us all battling for that third spot.

We had three seniors on last year's squad who graduated – all competed in the varsity division so there will be some competition to see who can step up. Those three were Dylan Burns, Hannah Juelfs, and Taylor Hanson.

The Broncs, who only lost 4 players to graduation last year, have a good returning group of players who saw a lot of action in 2017. Gone from last year's squad are Ryan Muhm, Cameron Hendricks, John Maher, and Luke Lensegrav. The 2018 Varsity is led by Seniors Landon Thompson goal keeper, Michael Leverington, Kendal Schreier, and Dalton Mace, all playing midfield/ defender. They will be joined by Juniors Barak Minor and Ethan Jones playing forward, Cordell Seyersdahl defender and Cruz Kellem midfield/defender. Sophomores include Josiah Trimble midfield/ forward and defender Jayden Schmidt. Freshmen expected to see action are midfielders Ethan Jensen and Tristan Hen dricks and goalkeeper Hunter Cherveny. Barak Minor hit a nice shot at the 27 minute mark putting the visiting Broncs in the lead 2-0 which would hold until half. The Broncs didn't let up as the second half began when Michael Leverington's score put the visitors up 3-0 less than two minutes into the half. Minor got his second goal of the contest at the 48 minute mark with a shot off a ricochet in front of the Patriots goal giving the Broncs a 4-0 lead. Douglas playing with more confidence in the second half got a score from Ryan Tompkins making it 4-1. The second half started much the same as the first half with good play from both teams until the Chargers broke free for an unassisted goal about 10 minutes in to make it 2-0. At the 60 minute mark the Broncs Cruz Kellem nailed a free kick from nearly 30 yards out that hit the top bar and careened away from the goal which would have given the Broncs some needed momentum had it gone in. The Chargers capitalized and scored 2 goals in the next 10 minutes one of which was a penalty kick due to the Broncs with a handball in the box to make it 4-0. The game was then cancelled as lightning and an impending thunderstorm ended the game with 9:43 left in the contest. "The game was much closer than the score would indicate," cited Coach Bradley after the game. 75 YEARS AGO

July 29, 1943 Belle Fourche Bee August 7th is "Molly Pitcher Day" in Belle Fourche. The anniversary comes on August

4th, but South Dakota, along with other middle west communities, will observe this historic day on Saturday, August 7th. On that day in Belle Fourche, ladies of the American Legion Auxiliary, jointly with other units in the state and nation, will feature the day by conducting an intensive campaign selling War Bonds and Stamps. In this city, Mrs. E. V. Larson has been named as "Chief Molly." Wool Appraised at Local Warehouse -- Mailing of checks to local wool growers whose wools were appraised at the Schuft & Son warehouse in Belle Fourche started Friday of last week, and is continuing as the wool is valued. Price range is running from 44 to 57.12 cents per pound for the past week, the top price being for the Peter Bonefield clip from near Capital, Mont. This is the gross price, from which 4.445 cents per pound is required for CCC, handling, warehouse, freight and other fixed charges. Approximately 1,100,000 pounds of wool have been appraised at Belle Fourche. At the Hafner warehouse in Newell 750,000 pounds have been appraised at prices ranging from 41.72 to 54.74 cents per pound. 





Over the psst several weeks a rash of burglaries have been reported. Several were solved and arrests made by the local police department.

Recently we learned of property damage at a construction site; broken windows at the high school; and tires slashed at the post office, city hall, and Prairie Hills Transit. And if that isn't enough then a house fire where arson is suspected.

Rumors ran rampant. A friend in Spearfish called and said he had heard that the vandalism was the work of a roving street gang, but the police had leads and were about to apprehend the criminals.

First of all we can all sleep better at night knowing our police department is doing their job, and we don't have a rampant band of misfits running around at night terrorizing our streets. Superintendent Willard when interviewed by a TV station about the broken windows at the high school he commented that the young people in our community are respectful of the property of others and are not in any way prone to doing excessive damage to property. Kids will be kids and many young adults may participate in an occasional prank, but disrespect and disregard are not part of the norm.

It may have been a comfort to know that a citizen in the Belle Fourche community was arrested for what took place. We don't understand the state of mind or circumstances you have to be in to do such things.

Everyone is innocent until proven guilty, but we have encountered a situation that whatever the circumstances that led to someone engaging in these acts of destruction and damage it is a sad situation for any human being to be in.

We in no way condone any of the acts of vandalism or damage that occurred and believe that if guilty and are able should be held responsible.

However, we should find in our collective hearts a way to walk side by side in our community with more compassion, more communication, more understanding in how we can help prevent anything of this nature happening in the future.





speed in the weight room. We go into every season with the goal of winning the Black Hills Conference title and to qualify for the class A playoffs. Our experience and depth at many positions look to make for a very competitive and fun season

Slotten, in his 5th year as head coach, was 3-6 last season with an identical schedule this year. "We expect to compete in every game, as we didn't in any of our losses last season, and look to improve our record to be a playoff quality team."

Belle Fourche starts the season with 26 returning letter winners. They have 9 returning starters on offense, and 10 on the defensive side of the ball.

Team Captains for the season are Tate Hostetter, Bryce Nicholas, Morgen Garrett and Jackson Mailloux. "We expect huge seasons

from Hunter Mitchell, Jesse Thybo, Jackson Tyndall and Kelby Olson, along with many others."

Tate Hostetter and Colby Nowowiejski have been competing at Quarterback all camp and both are looked to help the team this season.

Coach Slotten's Bronc team has lots of experience returning, and he sees his offense and defense as much further along than past years. Slotten remarked, "We have 3 varsity quality running backs that run the ball hard. They have an experienced line in front of them so we should be able to run the ball well. Our receivers are

running much better routes, and they have good timing with our QB's, so we should be able to throw the ball a lot more efficiently.

Defensively, our front line is big and strong, led by Hunter Mitchell who returns from an all state like season: 77 tackles, 27 TFL's, and 7 sacks. Return 2 of our 3 linebackers and our whole defensive backfield. Our defense is looking to fly around and create more turnovers. Slotten cautions, "We need to be better tacklers and get better at creating turnovers.





Planting for Success

Even the most savvy gardeners with the greenest of thumbs do not have 100% success in the garden, but there are things to consider to help any gardener be more successful. First of all, is the tree, shrub or perennial plant you are considering hardy for our area, or is it a sensitive soul without staying power? The best way to judge hardiness of plants is to look at Winter Hardiness Zones. Here in Belle Fourche we are Zone 4, which means the lowest winter temperatures average minus 20 to minus 30. Within our region the hardiness zones vary from coldest Zone 3 (west of Gillette up into Montana), Zone 4 including most of South Dakota and some Zone 5 (the mildest areas around the eastern edge of the Black Hills, including Spearfish to Rapid City). This is just an average, and Zone 5 trees are not especially reliable even in Zone 5 areas like Spearfish. For the best results, use plants that are rated Zone 2,3 or 4 (lower numbers being the hardiest). For perennials or shrubs which may die back overwinter but bloom on new wood, Zone 5 can be successful (perennials only have to stay alive at ground level). While it might be assumed that plants for sale in this area would be hardy for this area, chain stores buy regionally and you will find plants being sold which are

not hardy, so buyer beware! Another thing to consider acidic soil and will have problems in dry & windy locations. So, with this in mind, can we grow blueberries successfully here on the plains of South Dakota? Looking at the Winter Zone Hardiness alone, the answer would seem to be yes (since some blueberries can be hardy to zone 3), but blueberries are grown in the coastal or lake regions and require acidic soil that is moist and well-drained and hate drying winds, so are not adapted to our alkali clay soils and frequent dry windy conditions.

Changing soil chemistry by adding peat moss and pelleted sulfur can be done to get the soil more amenable, and some success is possible in the higher Hills where soil is closer to acidic and hot dry windy conditions are less frequent. Otherwise, blueberries can be grown In pots with amended acidic soil and moved into unheated shed or garage for the winter.

In the long run, the base for gardening success is soil, and our soil conditions are usually far from perfect. Compost is the closest thing to magic in gardening, and adding compost to soils will help the soil become more productive by providing more aeration and encouraging the full range of soil activities that help plants function. Gypsum can also be added to help loosen heavy soils and bring the alinto the kind of soils we dream of, but consistent effort will bring rewards over time. Improving the soil can help deliver nutrients to plants, so is more helpful in the long run than fertilizing alone. Mulching plants can also have a beneficial effect on plantings by conserving soil moisture and keeping soil temperatures more even. Piling mulch up to trunks of

trees should be avoided though to prevent the bark from rot and rodent residence. For new planting areas, loosening compacted soil and adding compost in an area 2-3 times the

width of the pot would help any tree or other plant get to a good start.

Location, location, location- the prime factor in real estate applies to garden real estate as well. Choose your plants with location in mind, whether shade, part shade or full sun and match your plants accordingly. Good basic observation of your yard and garden is the first step; sun and wind exposure varies widely even in short distances. Also look at drainage for clues on plant selection based on tolerance of "wet feet" or drought.

With the right preparation, you can certainly boost your garden success, but it is said that timing is everything, and the garden is no exception. More on timing, next time.

Wetz School Gets Outside Upgrade

NEWELL – A hail storm that swept through the Newell area left the outside of the Wetz School with pockmarks and damage that needed to be repaired to save the schoolhouse that was built in the early 1900s. The schoolhouse proudly sits beside the Newell Museum for visitors to see what school was like a hundred years ago. The Newell Museum partnered with the Wetz Family fund for a Deadwood Historic Preservation grant to restore the old building. The grant is paying 50% of the project.

The outside of the old schoolhouse was completely redone with cedar wood to preserve the building. James Pietila, Pietila Property and Repairs, handled the project. He painstakingly measured

and measured again to be sure each board would fit and bring new life to the resilient structure.

According to historic records the Wetz School began in 1887 in Meade County, Riverside District #53. The log cabin that was used for the school was a home abandoned by a homesick bachelor who left for Missouri. The men of the area built a plank table for the teacher and a woman of the area donated a chair with no back. The students used benches, boxes or large blocks of wood as "desks". School lasted just three months during the summer, but most of the children were glad to have even that much school.

According to a former student, Nellie Ashton (1880 -1965), as more families came to the area a new school house was built and known as Riverside School. Then in 1900 a permanent school house was built. The Riverside School had another name change when it was named after John Smith who owned the land on which it was built. The Smith School was heated with wood and coal. Water was carried in pails by the students from a spring behind the school until the 1920s when a cistern was dug, and water was trucked

in.

In 1908, Ottman Wetz purchased land from Charlie Nicholls on the Belle Fourche River 15 miles east of Vale. The 320 acres was next to Smith. He immediately enrolled his four children in school. Age was not particularly important at that time. Wetz's eldest son was 20 years old. His daughter was 18 years old, his next son, Gerald, was 16 years old and the youngest was 14 years old.

The schoolhouse had a final name change when Gerald Wetz purchased the land from John Smith in 1943. It was renamed the Wetz School and has kept that name.

The Wetz School was operated without electricity, so school was always dismissed before dark. Electricity was finally installed in 1951. The heating system was upgraded in 1955 when propane was installed.

The building was retired to the back of the playground in 1983. Then in 1997, the original Wetz School along with one of the outhouses was donated to the Newell Museum. Enrollment and teachers' records beginning in 1896 can be viewed at the museum. The schoolhouse stands beside the museum for everyone to enjoy.


