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

the swearing in ritual. Fowler will serve the remaining six months of the Ward 4 council seat in Belle Fourche left vacant by Dr. Rebecca Larson. The position became open when Dr. Larson and her family relocated. One hundred twenty-five of the 1,104 registered voters in Butte County cast their ballots in a special election on

Tuesday, October 24. Tricia Fowler's track record and demeanor warrant confidence. She has a long track record of participating in civic organizations. In Cheyenne, Wyoming she served on the board of directors of the Cheyenne fire department. Here in

her time to the Center of the Nation Sportsmans Club and the Belle Fourche Auxiliary Fire Department.

Filling Rebecca Larson's city council seat may be a watershed moment for Tricia Fowler. She is comfortable stepping into Dr. Larson's role. "I liked Rebecca's direction." She said. "She really looked after the town." Fowler has many of the same goals. She would like to see aesthetic and functional improvements in Belle Fourche. Infrastructure and employee retention are two of her top priorities. "Downtown should look better and the streets can be improved." She noted.

Originally from Bowman, North Dakota Tricia Fowler has lived in North Dakota, Wyoming, and now South Dakota, for the past nine years.

#### The Black Hills Curio Company

The building at 517 State Street in Belle Fourche has a story to tell.

Built in 1905, the structure is typical of the style of small town department stores in the western region. In fact, the one and a half story building housed an early J.C. Penney's depart-

ment store. The structure is welcoming with its center entry flanked by two plate glass windows. The building with its various original features also provides a glimpse of what life might have been like at the beginning of the twentieth century in Belle Fourche.

Although not on the historic register, it seems fitting that the building, a historic artifact itself, should be home to The Black Hills Curio Company.

According to the store's proprietor, Thomas Coronato, the store offers distinctive high-quality memorabilia, antiques and antiquities.

Antique Navajo jewelry, Native American beadwork, western collectibles, fossils, rocks, and vintage western wear are among a few of the treasures that visitors to the store are likely to discover.

Fine art, boutique and other gift items are also available. Coranato comes from a family of collectors and experts in western antiques and memora-


He came to the business as a child and demonstrates an appreciation for both art and history.



## Phone and Internet Discounts Available to CenturyLink Customers

The South Dakota Public Utilities Commission designated CenturyLink as an Eligible Telecommunications Carrier within its service area for universal service purposes. CenturyLink's basic local service rates for residential voice lines are \$29.50 per month and business services are \$41.25 per month. Specific rates will be provided upon request.

CenturyLink participates in the Lifeline program, which makes residential telephone or qualifying broadband service more affordable to eligible low-income individuals and families. Eligible customers may qualify for Lifeline discounts of \$5.25/month for voice or bundled voice service or \$9.25/month for qualifying broadband or broadband bundles. Residents who live on federally recognized Tribal Lands may qualify for additional Tribal benefits if they participate in certain additional federal eligibility programs. The Lifeline discount is available for only one telephone or qualifying broadband service per household, which can be either a wireline or wireless service. Broadband speeds must be at least 25 Mbps download and 3 Mbps upload to qualify.

CenturyLink also participates in the Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP), which provides eligible households with a discount on broadband service. The ACP provides a discount of up to \$30 per month toward broadband service for eligible households and up to \$75 per month for households on qualifying Tribal lands.

For both programs, a household is defined as any individual or group of individuals who live together at the same address and share income and expenses. Services are not transferable, and only eligible consumers may enroll in these programs. Consumers who willfully make false statements to obtain these discounts can be punished by fine or imprisonment and can be barred from these programs.

# "What is our only Hope in life & death?" we look around at our world s obvious that things are nd people are hurting. In ars, we all know about the

When we look around at our world today, it is obvious that things are broken and people are hurting. In recent years, we all know about the widespread effect of Covid-19 around the world. There seems to be an uptick in natural disasters in recent years.

Currently there are wars in places like Israel, Ukraine, Myanmar, Niger, and in other nations around the world as well. Global economies are suffering. Prices are high. Inflation is soaring. In our own community and in the church that I have the privilege of leading, there have been so many tragedies here lately! And in times like these it is easy to become despondent and afraid. And so, we ask the question, is there hope? And if so, what is our hope and where can it be found.

There is a book that was written several years back called "The New City Catechism." Some of the content of the book is adaptions from older catechisms that were written throughout the years.

But in this book, one of the questions is the following: "What is our only hope in life and death?" And the answer is this: "That we are not our own but belong, body and soul, both in life and death, to God and to our Savior Jesus Christ."


Simply put, our ONLY hope in life and in death is Jesus! In Ephesians 1:18-22 the apostle Paul wrote, "I pray that the eyes of your heart may be enlightened, so that you will know what is the hope of His calling, what are the riches of the glory of His inheritance in the saints, 19 and what is the surpassing greatness of His power toward us who believe. These are in

accordance with the working of the strength of His might 20 which He brought about in Christ, when He raised Him from the dead and seated Him at His right hand in the heavenly places, 21 far above all rule and authority and power and dominion, and every name that is named, not only in this age but also in the one to come. 22 And He put all things in subjection under His feet."

My friends, those verses tell us where hope is found! However, I'm not going to make many comments on those verses. I simply invite you to read them again slowly and prayerfully. And as you do, ask God to help you believe them.

Ask God to give you hope through Jesus Christ. Ask God to give you calm and peace in the midst of the seeming chaos of our world right now. Our God is not small, nor is He weak. He is not constrained by world leaders and world events. He is not unaware of what is happening in the world. No, He is sovereignly and providentially working in ways that we cannot possibly fathom.

Now is not the time for a weak theology that makes God small and man big. No, now is the time for Christians to believe what the bible teaches, fully and completely! Now is the time for Christians to whole-heartedly trust in our Lord. And now is the time for the unbeliever, with an open heart, to call on the name of the Lord. Where is our hope in life? Our hope in life is only found in Jesus! Where is our hope in death? Our hope in death is only found in Jesus! I pray that you know Him and that you trust Him, for He alone is worthy of our trust and of our lives.







#### **Bronc Volleyball Shows Heart in Final Games of the Season**

The Bronc Volleyball season has come to an end in the second round of Region playoffs. Here's a recap of the final three games for the purple and white.

The Broncs took on Hill City on the Ranger's senior night losing 3 sets to 1 for their final regular season match up. Scores were 26-24, 22-25, 25-11, and 25-15. Sloan Young had a double double with 10 kills and 12 digs. Reese Larson dished out 24 assists and Avery Cherveny had 15 digs. Denali Larson added in 3 blocks. Ward led the offensive charge with 18 kills.

Number 3 seeded Belle Fourche then took on the playoff part of the season. They hosted number 6, St Thomas More, for a first-round match

The Cavaliers went point for point with the Broncs before gathering a few small runs to take the first set 25-21. The home team in white didn't hesitate, though, and came back with a vengeance to win set 2 with a score of 25-14. Set three went into volleyball overtime but after a long back and forth battle, Belle Fourche again

came out two points ahead at 28-26. Set three saw a much more settled herd of Broncs as they secured set 4 with a score of 25-16 and the match 3-1. Reese Larson was 24/25 with 6 aces from the serving line and also set up for 51 assists. Cherveny had 19 digs. The power outside dual of Ward and Young each had double-double nights. Young with 18 kills and 17 digs, and Ward contributing 30 kills and 23 digs.

The Belle Fourche Volleyball team then headed up to Hill City, a team they lost in 4 to just the week before. The winner of the match advanced to Sodak 16 playoffs for a chance to play in the Class A State Championship. After a tough first set loss 14-25, the Broncs came back to secure the win of set two 25-20. They however fell short in sets three and four with scores of 25-20 and 25-21.

The Rangers were at a score of 24-17 when Sarah Juelfs took the serving line. They played errorless for 4 points in a row before the team in yellow and green had to take a time out. They finally finished out the match. The heart shown by the Broncs in not only those final

In the steer wrestling, the Steer Wrestling Horse of the Year was won by Woody, owned by River Voigt, Killdeer, N.D. The Haze Horse of the Year is Junior, owned by Kody Woodward, Dupree, S.D.

The Tie-Down Horse of the Year went to Sheer Can Do "Jewels" owned by Jason Schaffer, Broadus, Montana.

In the team roping, the Head Horse of the Year was won by Bodie Mattson's Let R Buck Pendleton, "Pendleton," and the Heel Horse of the Year went to Ill Be A Peanut "Jag" owned by Riley Curuchet, Kaycee, Wyo.

For the WPRA, the Barrel Horse of the Year was won by Jessica Routier's Fiery Miss

West, "Missy," and the Rising Star Horse went to Stone Cold Stinson "Rocky," owned by Molly Otto, Grand Forks, N.D. The Breakaway Roping Horse of the Year is Lavaca Sting "Rollo" owned by Rickie Fanning, Spearfish, S.D.

Jason Schaffer's tie-down horse Jewels carried Schaffer "to a lot of wins this summer," he said. "It was fun."

Schaffer and his wife Shauna got the five-year-old gray two years ago, and said she was easy to train. "She wanted to do it from the get-go." And her size works to her benefit. "She's bigger than most calf horses, not fine-boned. She's a wellbuilt horse."

But her strongest trait is her heart. "She has heart and grit. She's got a lot of heart, and that's the biggest thing."

Woody, the Steer Wrestling Horse of the Year, started his career as a hazing horse but Joe Voigt bought him, switched him to the steer wrestling.

ford City, N.D. cowboy said. "He always wanted to run. If you went to pull on him, he just hated it. We figured if we switched him over, he would really do well, and he has."



"He's one of the toughest horses I've ever ridden," the Sturgis, S.D. man said. "He has a lot of heart, he scores exceptionally well, and he has an unbelievable amount of run. His speed is in control, so you don't

feel like you're running past the steer. He's really smooth."

Mattson said the horse's emotions are "dry. He's a horse that doesn't show much emotion. He's buddied up to my calf roping horse and they're pretty good friends, but other than that, he sticks to his job."

Horses of the Year Awards are voted on by the contestants in their respective events.

This year's Badlands Circuit Finals took place in Minot Oct. 13-15 with champions determined in each event.





And I along with many others were fortunate to have known him and had him as a friend.



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





- All sidewalks must be cleaned within (24) hours of the last snowfall. Upon the failure of the owner of abutting property to remove snow or ice from the sidewalks the City may provide for removal and tax the removal expense by special assessment against the abutting property.
- No person may park or allow to remain parked any vehicle or trailer on any street designated as a snow route during snowfall or prior to the time said street is cleared of snow by the City. Vehicles or trailers parked on snow routes in violation of this section may be ticketed and/or towed at the owner's expense.

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


Keep reading. And remember the old adage, only believe half of what you see and not much of what you hear! And be sure to look and listen to Me! Me! Me!


As the week ended, the cattle were mostly home for shipping and the winter. Ronda thanks Gene and Kim Secrest, Denise, Darby and



When the feud got too serious, Mason told Dixon, "We've got to draw the line somewhere.'











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

#### 71 years ago – Aberdeen American News 9 June 1952 **Last Roundup Club Brings** Old West To Life in City

The Old West came to life in Aberdeen Monday as members of one of South Dakota's most unusual and exclusive clubs staged a parade down Main Street. In the line the Cowboys of 1902, organized as the Last Roundup Club.

A few of them felt more at ease riding in a stagecoach than on horseback, but others sat erect in the saddle as they rode an unfamiliar trail past crowds of spectators. The talk of the oldtime cattleman at their Aberdeen reunions sounded like pages from the western novels of Zane Grey.

**37 BRANDS** "I was reping (representing) 37 brands in the big roundup of 1902" one old range rider related. "The big outfits had been pushing the cattle north into the west river country for years to get the good feed. Finally the government told them they had to get the stock off the Indian reservations or else pay a dollar a hear. That's what started that daddy of all roundups. A dollar a head was just too much to have to pay for grazing that stock all them years."

Another said: "There was cattle drifted and driven into western South Dakota from all over. In the Rosebud area where I was during the big roundup, cattle had drifted all the way from the Cheyenne and Moro (Moreau) Rivers in Wyoming. There were different brands from all over.

It took years to straighten out the mixup." Others argue that the 1902 roundup was not the biggest of all. The late Ed Lemmon, for whom the city was named, had claimed that a roundup in 1897 in the Peno flats area morth of Wall

in which 45,000 head were gathered at one time was the biggest, according to Bert Hall of Kennebec who is writing a book about the famous West River roundups.

Only 170 LEFT Only 170 members reamin of the organization. One old cowpoke explained that "only the young fellows are left.' Each year a few leave for that "Last Roundup" mentioned in song and fiction. A horse with an empty saddle was led in Monday's parade for Tom Berry, the cowboy governor who "crossed the Great Devide" a few months ago.

He had been president of the organization since its inception in 1908. Pete Clausen of Mission, now president, explained that actually anyone who was trail driving or in a roundup in any year up to 1905 could belong to the Last Roundup Club. Boosters for Deadwood had a surrey filled with western "dancing girls" in the parade.

Aberdeen's American Legion drum and bugle corps, sombreros and all, led the

#### From Back Trailing in the **Heart of the Short Grass** Country by John O. Bye

A SPRING ROUND-UP The spring round-up in May and June of 1897, after one of the hardest winters on record was one of the biggest ever staged in western South Dakota or anywhere else for that mater for throw-back purposes. The winter had been expecially bad for drifting cattle.

When the 50,000 head or so were fainly brought together on the Lake and Peno Flats country morth of the lower Belle Fourche River they county not be brought closer together than what wound be twonship of sixmiles square of ground. There



also had to room for 28 roundup wagons, several thousand head of saddle horses and several hundred men. This immense herd carried brands respresenting the ownership of dozens of big cow outfits from the range around close as well as outfits fro the Little Missiouri and Box Elder Creek in Montana, from the two Grand Rivers in northern South Dakota and all the ranges in between.

Just to mentions a few, there were Hash Knife cattle, Turkey Track, Reverse L7, VVV, Flying V, Triple Seven, OHO, Hat and many others. Some of the cattle had probably crossed the ice, over the Little Missouri, the Grand Rivers, Moreaus, the Belle Fourche, and Cheyenne, the Bad and White Rivers and possibly were in Nebraska by spring if they cound travel that far. Cattle from four or five states wer thus involved -Montana, North Dakota, South Dakota may have mixed with Nebraska cattle.

Under the leadership of Ed Lemmon with John Anderson as the brand expert this immense heard was worked in four days. As quickly as a herd of about 6,000 was cut it was headed north to be gotten out of the way for more cuts. At the last a bunch of about 200 head remained on which the brands were too dim to be read due to the growth of long hair during a hard winter. These were roped and stretched out for John Anderson to examine after the long hair was pulled or sheared. Then the long "trek"

of all these cattle back to their

home ranges began.

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#### **Does Your Community Have a Poverty Mindset?**

Jim Rohn once said, "Your life does not get better by chance, it gets better by change." Most agree there are several potential pathways a community, downtown district, or business might take as they embark on a

successful transformation or revitalization effort. It certainly isn't a one-size fits all journey. Every community or downtown district has their unique obstacles to overcome and their own mountains to climb. They must identify those issues and mountains, tackling them in such a way that fits their unique abilities, capabilities, and expertise.

One of the largest mountains to climb for many communities or downtown districts is the term I have coined referred to as the "Poverty-Mindset". Yes, many communities, and downtowns need to overcome the economic issues of social or demographic poverty, but that is not what the 'poverty-mindset' refers to in this context.

Poverty-mindset as it relates to this column refers to the mindset of those who are actually in a position to make transformation and revitalization happen. Despite being in this position, they are stuck in a poverty-mindset brought on through their long-term battle and association with poverty experienced through community decay.

I recently worked with a business that wouldn't accept credit cards because it cost a few percentage points on each transaction. When convinced to give it a try, they were thrilled when their business increased

by John Newby nearly 30%. Trying to save those few pennies was costing them hundreds or even thousands in potential business. These same problems and mindsets exist on an even greater and more devastating scale in city governments, and civic leaders who control the future and financial destiny of the community and downtown. They have been taught that the safest route is to do little, especially when it can go wrong in some way.

Make no mistake; this poverty-mindset is an easy mindset to have. As one watches the decay of their community, downtown, or businesses accelerate around them, it is easy to believe decay is normal and to be expected. After all, they have numerous examples of decay happening in hundreds or even thousands of towns across the country.

How does a community, downtown or business overcome a poverty-mindset and begin transforming? What is the common ingredient successful communities and downtown districts have adopted that flows through all their transformation and revitalization efforts? The answer is very simple. I

believe the common ingredient is found by simply looking at what might be the opposite of a poverty-mindset. That common ingredient is something we all seek and are drawn towards, that is a positive "can-do" and "will-do" attitude.

The first step in any transformation and revitalization of a community or downtown district is a strong vision coupled with a very healthy of dose of optimism. When you couple a strong vision with genuine optimism, many communities and downtown obstacles can be overcome. The poverty-mindset crowd must be converted, or rendered irrelevant if not converted, and this must be done quickly. Vision and a positive can-do attitude is infectious. Everyone wants to be associated with a winner; few want to claim to be a member of the losing team.

Yes, the vision must be realistic. Yes, the optimism must be based on that realistic vision. Far too many communities or downtowns fail to understand just how much ability they already have to succeed. Never underestimate the ability of the residents of a community and business owners to do outstanding things. Many communities and downtowns are wallowing in self-pity while others across the country are undergoing incredible and sustainable transformation.

Oftentimes, those biggest obstacles are our own citizens and those in a position to enact the greatest change. The greatest task is converting them to the vision and the dream. Of course, you have quite a bit to lose. No change usually just means more

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
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your downtown and community. As you might have determined, this column is short on actual specifics and long on mindsets and attitudes. That is by design, without vision, you perish. It is a vision and positive attitude that must be present to win. I have seen few if any communities or downtown districts succeed without having this strong will to win and succeed.

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


