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# Explanations Given by States Attorney and Sheriff

BELLE FOURCHE-During
Public Comments at the latest Butte County Commission
meeting November 21, several
questions were asked and answers

were given. Katie Hoffman started out the Public Comment session asking pointed questions concerning 3J Towing and the revocation of the towing company from Butte County towing rotation. She mentioned that it seemed that the timing of removal from rotation and that it looked like the County did not consider the laws that the towing company was required to follow. She commented that it was a potential abuse of power. She further pointed out that the company was not allowed on the agenda at the last meeting and could only comment on the matter during Public Comments. She remarked that she felt the sheriff

was trying to create a monopoly. Vice Chairman James Ager allowed comments from States Attorney McCartney and Sheriff Lamphere to address Hoffman's concerns. Following a summation by McCartney during which she listed events that led to warrant being issued, she explained that there were inconsistencies in what had been posted on social media and the facts of this case. She explained the additional steps taken by the car owner, her representation, the States Attorney office, 3J Towing, and Circuit Court.

The owner of 3J Towing responded that he could not find a case number for any criminal suit the business was part of. However, McCartney gave him the case number and he said he would find

it as soon as possible.

as well. If a company is not going to comply with a Court order, we are not going to work with them until this is resolved," he said.

A court order was served to 3J Towing and refused by an employee to accept the order. Since the owner of the towing company then provided a written refusal to follow the court order. Lamphere said that resulted in the Sheriff's Office removing the towing company from rotation until the situation is resolved.

Rose VanSickle asked for more information on what and why commissioners approve agenda

There was a question about the last commission meeting minutes by Bob VanSickle. He asked for clarification of the wording following an executive session. He reminded the commissioners that no action can be taken in executive session, but only in open session. Auditor Annie Capp explained that the intention of the wording in the minutes was to reflect that no action was taken after the executive session had ended.

Dale Simanton reprimanded the commissioners on money spent

for the proposal of the new county offices. Although the project will not proceed, Simanton said that it was a waste of money to even pursue the idea.

The commissioners went on to approve the latest bid for the Courthouse roof. The previous bid had to be revised when the contractor realized that the new roof would need a membrane that would seal the entire roof to prevent any leaks. The previous idea would not stand up to high winds. The new bid came in at \$47,776.30. Work will progress as soon as possible.

An approach on Owl Creek Road was approved by the commissioners. Raymond Teats applied for the approach that is located approximately threetenths of a mile from the Arpan Road intersection. It will be used

as a driveway to his home. Glen and Sondra Boggess asked the commissioners to approve an Agreement for Voluntary Right of Way donation. Their plan is to move the fence, put in a temporary fence and then to replace the

Sheriff Lamphere took some time to give a summary of his recent trips to the southern border and Washington, DC. He explained that there was minimal cost to the county, since the travel expenses were paid by a federation group. His group met with legislators to encourage them to secure the border. He attested to the ideas that a secure border benefits Butte County.

"It will make a difference in our county," he said. "There will be fallout at some point.'

Basketball is the most popular youth sport in the US. A study by the National Athletic Trainers Association found that 22% of male basketball players have an injury that causes them to miss playing time each year. 42% of the time, that injury is to the ankle or foot, making this the most injured area.

### Some other common injuries to basketball players include:

- 1. Muscle strains such as a groin pull, quadriceps, hamstring, or calf strain
- 2. Knee ligament injuries such as ACL, LCL, MCL tears or sprains
- 3. Ankle sprains, including



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



These patents should be recorded in the county records as the owners of the alnd can show no title from the government otherwise. This is a matter of vital importance, and unless these patents can be delivered, they will be returned to Washington, DC or otherwise disposed of. 75 years ago -The Belle Fourche Bee November 20, 1947 AIRPORT PROJECT WILL BE REFERRED TO **CITY VOTERS Proposed Improvement Program Cover Seven Years Contract With** Government

At a special meeting of the city council, held Monday night, the matter of going ahead with the municipal airport project, for a period of seven years in cooperation with the federal government, will be submitted to the voters for their approval. At its meeting Monday night, members of the council felt that, inasmuch as this program is a long-term one which goes beyond their terms of office. that the voters should register their wish on the airport project which will also involve a considerable expenditure of municipal funds over a period of seven years. The proposed airport project, which has been planned in accordance with the master plan for building airports as adopted by the Civil Aeronautics Administration (CAA) will be for a Class 3 field. This type of airport, states City Engineer George Fowler, provides for operating and landing of aircraft, up to 74,000 pounds capacity on a two-wheel basis. When fully completed a Class 3 field must have runways of at least 4,300 feet in length and 150 feet wide. Their directions will be determined by the prevailing winds of the area, this being computed on a 85 percent basis. As to cost of the program, the government participates in it up to 53 (approximate) per cent, and the city 47 per cent. During the past year some \$15,000 was appropriated by the city, to match a \$17,000 appropriation from the government. Lyle Miller, city auditor, stated that

The Belle Fourche Bee November 23, 1973 \$3 Million Medical Complex For Belle Fourche Announced Plans for construction of a \$3 million Belle Fourche regional medical complex to include a 30-bed hospital, a 70-bed nursing home and a five-doctor clinic were announced here Monday by the North Central Nursing and Retirement Homes Inc., of Spearfish, following the annual meeting of the organization Saturday at the Holiday Inn. North Central, which operates the Don Pratt Manor in Belle Fourche and the Dorsett Home and other facilities in Spearfish as well as several other health care units, has been studying the situation in Belle Fourche for some time and had done considerable preparatory work prior to Monday's announcement. Cliff Thomas, Belle Fourche, vice president of North Central, said the new facility – to be know as the Belle Fourche Regional Medical Center - will replace the present John Burns Memorial Hospital in Belle Fourche. Thomas said the board of trustees of John Burns has agreed to turn over its facilities to North Central, which in turn has agreed to assume the liabilities of the hospital and Northern Hills Nursing Home (estimated at \$100,000, still due on the nursing home.) If all goes as planned, according to Otto Haider, executive director of North Central, the present Northern Hills Nursing Home will become intermediate care nursing home. The present Medical Center will continue as a medical center, and the present hospital will be operated as a "board and care" facility, for persons able to move about. ### Recommendations-**School Not Ready for** Consolidation

news@bellefourchebeacon.com NEWELL- "We are not talking consolidation. We are not ready to shut her down," emphasized Newell School Interim Superintendent Don Kirkegaard at a recent Special School Board meeting. However, the school will be looking at some changes in the next couple of years. Student numbers are down from last year, from 269 to 224 and looking at 219 for 2024-2025. With each loss of students, there is a loss of revenue for utilization of the school's budget.

Retired superintendent and former Secretary of Education Tom Oster was available at the special meeting to discuss ways to cut costs and adjust for a more secure future for the Newell School District.

He began by listing facts about the district:

- 1. There are 100 fewer students than 10 years ago.
- 2. There is almost the same certified staff as 10 years ago.
- 3. A loss of 100 students has reduced the General Fund (GF) revenue by \$750,000.
- 4. A loss of 100 students has reduced Capital Outlay (CO) revenue by \$229,000.
- 5. Current CO revenue = \$842,000 (This will drop to
- \$820,000 next year) 6. Current CO debt payment is \$394,000
- 7. Current CO transfer to the GF is \$200,000
- 8. Net CO revenue for normal expenses is \$248,000
- 9. Current fall enrollment of 219 students
- 10. Students open enroll-
- ment into the district is 5 11. Students open enrolled out of district is 34 (2-yr. old
- 12. If student numbers continue to drop, consideration should be given to the possibility of eliminating an administrator. However, this could adversely affect teacher effectiveness.

As he continued to explain recommendations that are based on standard procedures in districts the size of Newell, he began by saying there is a potential for over-staffing. However, he said to take what he had to say with a "grain of salt."

Oster targeted several areas for reduction. Top areas included the open custodial position, eliminating some certified positions by 2024-2025 or through attrition, eliminating a secretarial position (which is not practical, according to Kirkegaard, because of the number of buildings in the system), and eliminating some assistant positions. He pointed out that Food Service, according to law, must

be self-sustaining and meal prices should be set to make it self-funding.

There was lengthy discussion surrounding the idea of asking the taxpayers for optout. According to the South Dakota Department of Revenue an optout can be used if a school district cannot operate on the revenues generated by taxes. According to the website:

### "Opting Out of the Tax Limitation

Opting out is to impose an excess levy above any current limitations. If the school district cannot operate on the revenues generated by the maximum allowed for the general or capital outlay funds, then the school district may choose to "opt-out" of the limitations.

### **General Fund**

The general fund is funded through local effort (levies imposed on property taxes) and monies from state aid as determined by the funding formula. If a school opts out of the general fund, the excess levy shall maintain the same proportion represented in the mathematical relationship at the maximum levies. Each land class (ag, owner occupied, other/commercial) will have its own levy. "

If the school district decides to pursue an optout, a community meeting will be held to explain the process. Kirkegaard explained that it is vital to keep the community involved with the processes the school will be going through and that he cautions the school board to go slow.

"We don't want to let anyone think we will have a second-rate education," he said.

Oster had a few other recommendations added to those he had already shared. These included writing letters to every parent of open enrolled students asking why they left, how the district could help, and if they would consider returning. Also, letters could be sent to home schooled parents. And especially, the school board should create a district 5-year plan.

Kirkegaard will have recommendations by December's board meeting Dec. 11 at 6 pm in the Multi-purpose Room.



### November 27, 1913

J. M. Graslie of Faith road his bicycle from Faith to Newell, a distance of 90 miles. He concluded he had had enough of it so; Monday afternoon took the train for Lead, where he expects to obtain work in the mines.

Smoke emanating from a lean-to in the rear of the Loyal Hotel building brought out the Fire Company and apparatus about 8:30 Tuesday evening. It proved to be more smoke than fire and was quickly squelched by the firemen. The room had been used as a bedroom and the fire appeared to have started in the bedding. Its origin is a mystery, to Mr. & Mrs. Byrd, occupants of the Hotel, who claim the bedroom has not been used for 2 months.

State Highway Commissioner Leedorn was very much interested in the experiments made by city councils in oiling the streets and intimated that his department would like to try out this process on some of the gumbo roads in this part of the county. It is believed by many that oiling the roads with that same mixture of oil and asphalt, would prove this solution of "all year roads" for this town and county.

### November 30, 1933

A talkie picture show has been showing in Vale the past week, being sponsored by the Vale Firemen. Miss Mabel Quinn, teacher at the Fairview School, took several of her pupils to the show in Vale last Thursday evening.

Butte County Circuit Court reconvened on Monday of this week at Belle Fourche with the case of the State vs Lawrence Titus as the first trial. Titus is charged with grand larceny, involving the disappearance of some horses belonging to the Orwick Brothers of Sulphur.

The auction sale Monday of this week at the Seitz farm drew a large crowd. The Seitz family will leave soon for Boulder, Colorado to make their future home. A large crowd of friends and relatives attended a farewell party for Mrs. Ann Seitz and Mr. & Mrs. Albert Seitz Tuesday evening which was sponsored by the Vale Extension Club. Cards and games were played and refreshments were served late into the night.

### **December 2, 1943**

The Newell Community Club will hold a meeting Friday evening at the A & H Café Dinner served at 6:30 PM sharp. Everybody interested in the welfare of Newell and the surrounding trade area territory is invited to sit in on this important meeting.

The Pilgrim Fellowship entertained other High School pupils at a party Tuesday evening. The members and guests were divided into 4 groups under the leadership of Betty Lee Price; Esther Martin; Bonna Bee Price and Burton Fogelberg for a scavenger hunt. Many home were ransacked for numerous articles and the group led by Esther Martin came in with the winning collection. Refreshments were served to bring a close an evening much enjoyed by all.

Five men parachuted to safety in the darkness of a South Dakota prairie 2:30 AM Sunday, a few moments before their B-17 Flying Fortress from the Rapid City Air Base crashed into earth northwest of Buffalo Gap. Secretary Lt. Ernest G. Logan, Jr. of Lexington, Kentucky, and the co-pilot suffered minor cuts and bruises, but the other 4 men were reported uninjured. Cause of the crash and other details were not announced, but a board of officers has been named to investigate.

### November 26, 1953

Miss Lange, daughter of Mr. & Mrs. Ted Lange of Newell, a teller at the bank, reported she was near an alarm but was afraid to activate it for fear it would frighten the men into shooting. Mr. Hogan, son of Mrs. Ives Hogan, formerly of Newell, now Rapid City, was one of the employees ordered to put money into the bags. The armed bandits wore dark glasses and red hunting caps, entered the bank at 7:30 PM, carrying bags then ordering bank employees to fill the bags with money. The men escaped in a taxi as a get-away car and then disappeared in their own car.

The entire nation joined in a day of mourning Monday for President John F. Kennedy, whose heinous assassination occurred Friday noon in Dallas, Texas, shocked and brought grief to the entire world.

President Lyndon B. Johnson, of Texas, who was sworn in as the 36th President of the US by Friday noon, proclaimed a day of mourning and the Governors of every state, county and city offices remain closed until after the funeral service.



They syrup flowed down the hill into the popped corn and rolled it into great balls with some of them hundreds of feet high and looked like big tennis balls at a distance. You never see any of them now because the grasshoppers ate them all up in one day on July 21, 1874.



Crow Peak Brewing Company started in the spring of 2007 as a modest 5-barrel brewery with on-premise sales in the form of pints and off-premise sales in the form of 64-ounce growlers. The brewery was extremely successful, and in order to provide a quality local beer to other parts of the State and beyond, a brewery expansion was in order. The beautiful new brewery building opened for business in December of 2009.

However, our beers were still being brewed on our 5-barrel system while we were waiting for our new 30-barrel brew house – three 60-barrel fermentation vessels and 60-barrel bright beer tank to arrive and be installed. Installation of the new equipment, plumbing, wiring and boiler system was completed in June of 2010. In addition to the larger brewing system, a Cask automated canning line was brought online in the fall of 2010, allowing us to distribute our product in both draft and packaged form.

By the end of 2015, Crow Peak Brewing Company was producing 2,000 barrels of beer annually and was distributing its products in South Dakota, North Dakota, Nebraska, Wyoming and Minnesota. We were finding it hard to keep up with demand, especially in the summer months so we underwent a second expansion in 2018. With two additional fermentation vessels and one additional bright beer tank, we are now able to produce approximately 5,000 barrels annually.
