

Richard Alexander Benoist Sowers was born June 11, 1995 to Sam and Celeste Benoist in Boulder, Colorado. He was adopted at nearly 5 years of age with his brother Cory by Clark and Cathy Sowers April 27, 2000. He was baptized at St. Paul's Catholic Church February 10, 2001 with Michael and Sheri Penning as Godparents. Richard made memories with family life in Belle Fourche. He struggled with attachment and sought healing in ways that were harmful to him, wounding yet asking for forgiveness. We failed as many times in trying to understand the depth of his suffering and how to deal and heal with it.

He learned music at a young age and learned to play the violin. He was full of life and loved camping, hiking, hunting for Christmas trees, swimming, serving mass, visiting historical sites, zoos, shelling beans with Grandpa Penning and picking apples with Grandma Penning. He was very intelligent and talented, especially in art. He could draw, do bead work and create art out of many mediums. In his later years he had a keen sense of perspective. One of his self-portraits he sent us was a sketch of himself behind prison bars with the caption, "Missed Opportunities". He would send his drawings/letters to family and friends.

He died March 17, 2024 in Sioux Falls, SD as the result of multiple gun shot wounds as a victim in a homicide. We are thankful to Dr. Dustin Smoot and the staff at Avera in Sioux Falls who worked to save his life, held his hand in his death and prayed for him when the battle for his life was lost. At his baptism he received God's grace and we know that God's mercy is infinite. We commend his soul to Jesus and believe he has been freed of any earthly chains.

He is survived by his parents Cathy and Clark Sowers (Belle Fourche), siblings and families of Jamie (Glen) Gauer, Randy (Erica) Sowers, Katie (Jesse) Hoffmann, Jody (Luke) Thompson, Maggie (Dave) Kindsfater, Cory Sowers, Hayley (Dan) Johnson and Echo Sowers and numerous other family members. Preceded in death by his grandfather Elmer Penning, grandmother Mildred Sowers, aunt Carleen Liggett, uncle Charles Sowers, brother Michael Sowers.

He is also survived by birth parents Celeste Kendall and Sam Benoist; brothers Timothy Lee Kendall, Nate Benoist, Tyler Charles Woods; sisters Zoey Ware and Grace Kendall; aunt Antoinette Kendall and Uncle Richard Benoist. County Commissioners Approve Purchases

BELLE FOURCHE-During business of the Butte County Commission meeting held April 2, the commissioners approved the purchase agreements for a 2023 Caterpillar Model 33D-07D TC, a 2023 Model D5-17 VPAT, and a 2024 Caterpillar Model 950GC all for five-year leases, for a total of approximately \$964,000.

With trade-in values of currently owned equipment, the excavator, Model 33D-07D TC, costs \$286, 787. The dozer, Model D5-17 VPAT, has a cost of \$338,331 and the loader, Model 950 GC, has a cost of \$294,702. Existing equipment has come to the end of the lease and the new equipment will take over the payments. The money has been budgeted, according to Auditor Annie Capp.

Beau Riopel, Butler Machine, assured the commissioners the equipment is in stock and should be delivered by summer.

In further business, Highway Superintendent Dwayne Heidrich provided an activity report on damaged signs. The Sheriff's Department has continued to patrol the areas and are on the lookout for who may be doing the damage.

He also noted that in order to repair holes on the Snoma Bridge, Brosz Engineering has recommended epoxy be used as soon as weather permits.

Notification will be posted on the county website and social media when roads are being repaired, graveled, etc.

Butte County contributes \$6,000 to Prairie Hills Transit annually and Executive Director Barb Cline was available to share information on how that money is used. Prairie Hills Transit and the county have had an agreement since 2006, she said, and good things have been happening.

Some of those things include delivering meals for the backpack program, travel for veterans working with Butte County VSO, and transporting patients for dialysis and other medical appointments.

Examples of transportation costs by Prairie Hills are \$5 to Spearfish from Belle Fourche or \$2 around town.

Although she was not available at the meeting, the new Butte/Lawrence Youth Program Advisor Melanie Coleman had a written report given by Auditor Annie Capp.

Coleman has a Masters' Degree in Social Work, experience as a School Social worker and volunteer experience as a puppy raiser with Guide Dogs for the Blind and as a Therapeutic Equine Instructor.

Coleman noted that the Butte/ Lawrence 4-H Horse and Pony members must attend a Youth Horse Literacy event if they plan to show their horse or pony this year in the horse show, State, County or at the fair. There will be a YHL on Sunday, April 14 at First Interstate Bank in Belle Fourche.

The upgrade for the HVAC system at the courthouse was approved in the amount of \$507,579 for the Central Plant project, \$454,496 for the Upper-level project, \$100,514 for the Existing Fan Coils project, and \$38,965 for the GPS Needlepoint Bipolar Ionization Systems project. Work will begin this spring.

The commissioners approved the purchase of a 2023 Ford Transit XLT 442, 15-passenger van for \$68,399 for the Sheriff's Department. One of the existing vans will be surplused and the equipment will be used to outfit the new van.

The first of these was shortly after Christ rose. Mary Magdelene was at the tomb. She was an emotional mess. The man who had delivered her from demonic possession, a man who she and many others had put their hopes and trust in as the prophesied messiah had been tortured to death on a cross before her eyes. Broken-hearted, confused, frightened and alone, she suddenly felt a presence behind her. Her immediate assumption was that it was the gardener. the disciples.

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


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Annita Persche 85



Boys Midget 80 pounder Tate Krul placed 5th, Boys Midget 95 pounder Bayzen Curtis placed 3rd, Boys Novice Heavyweight Logan Gleason placed 4th, Schoolboy 95 pounder Caden Swaney placed 7th, High School Boys Division 160 pounder Peyton Alexander placed 3rd, High School Boys Division 220 pounder Lucas Tonsager placed 3rd and in the Men's Senior Division, ages 19-30, Thomas

McCoy took to the mat with an epic return taking champion at 185 pounds!

For the Lady Broncs, Girls Midget 90-100 pound division wrestler, Lizzy Tonsager, took 3rd, Schoolgirls 73 - 82 pound division wrestler, Lochlin Tibbs, placed 2nd and 100 pound division wrestler, Ema Leach, placed 5th, High School Girls 106 pounder Kyra Vandenberg placed 1st, and in the Woman's Masters division, ages 19 and above, Hailey Rodriguez returned to the mat with another epic showing of champion at 125 pounds!

In the Tots Division, ages 6 and under, competitors were William Bonefield at 45 pounds, Easton Swaney and Joey Tonsager at 55 pounds. Competitors in the Boys Bantam Division, ages 7 and 8, competitors were Wyatt Ager, Riddik Randdolph and Anderson Burke at 60 pounds. Competitors in the Boys Midget Division, ages

9 and 10, were Logan Atkinson and Royce Bachman at 60 pounds, Landon Swaney at 70 pounds, and Brody Gustofson at 80 pounds. Competitors in the Boys Novice Division, ages 11 and 12, were Jayden Hodge at 70 pounds, Jaxon Linch at 80 pounds and Elijah Beatson at 95 pounds.

Competitors in the Schoolboys Division, ages 13 and 14, were Teedin Humble at 98-106 pounds Kolby Tibbs who double bracketed in Schoolboy 140 pounds and High School Boys Division at 138 pounds wrestling 1-2 in both divisions. Code Enforcement/Animal Control Officer

Clint Haffner has been the Code Enforcement/Animal Control Officer for Belle Fourche since 2016. He says this was a new work experience for him and the job took a lot of learning

Haffner works out of the Police Department, and receives approximately 1,200 to 1,500 calls per year from dispatch, related to his duties. There's a great deal of physical labor to his position and the workload is considerable for a community this size. He not only interacts with the public and assists other departments - particularly the Police Department and Public Works - but also handles his own paperwork, including notices of violation,

abatements and documentation. A chief portion of his work involves monitoring the proper-

ties in town while addressing nuisance issues. He monitors for violations of snow ordinances in winter and grass and weed ordinances in summer. He also monitors for junk in vards, such as abandoned vehicles, and deals with dilapidated homes at times. Haffner's work involves private property only: as city property and buildings are overseen by Public Works.

Animal control is a part of his daily duties. Haffner handles issues with wild animals such as skunks, raccoons, mink, foxes, badgers, and coyotes. He also deals with pet dogs and cats of the community, including animals at large, and animal bites. There are approximately 5-10 dog bites in the city yearly, and Haffner himself was once

badly bitten when serving notice about a dangerous animal. But abandoned pets are those that concern him the most.

"Many renters who move it of town, leave their pets behind," says Haffner. "There are also pets given as Christmas gifts to people who don't know how to care of them or can't afford to do so." Some winter days, he's found animals out in bitter cold with frostbitten paws.

An animal lover himself, Haffner has two cats and a dog but often fosters animals in need – especially in May when litters are born. If a mother cat is missing or dead, he has taken in kittens to bottle feed them, as well as injured dogs.

"It's rewarding to help animals; when you can get suffering dogs and cats out of the cold and hopefully, to new homes. I'm grateful to the people who help me do it." We have been fortunate to develop a great group of citizens who help foster animals in need.

Haffner is also anxious to stress the importance of pet education. "You really need to keep animals on a leash or within a property fence if they are outside. And getting and maintaining rabies shots is critical." The Belle Fourche Vet Clinic(406 Summit) is offering a low cost rabies clinic on May 11, 2024 from 8am to noon and pet-owners can also get a city license at no cost during the event. Please have dogs on a leash and cats in a carrier, cost of rabies vaccine is \$7.00.

75 years ago **Belle Fourche Bee** March 18, 1948 **GOVERNOR DISCUSSES HIGHWAY PROBLEMS**

In his third report on State affairs, Governor George T. Mickelson dealt entirely with highway matters. He pointed out the fact that the state is a large one, with a number of inland towns, with cars and trucks in many sections providing the only means of travel from farm to farm or farm to town.

Ninety per cent of all livestock marketed at packing centers in the state is now shipped by truck, and farmers with rubber tired equipment are using the highways for more and more of their travel. In order to carry the heavy loads and stand up under the punishment of fast moving vehicles and the larger number of vehicles and the larger number of vehicles, highways must be built to higher standards than ever before. Roads must be nearly twice as wide as those constructed ten or fifteen years ago, with a base course in some cases three times as thick, and a surface mat nearly twice as thick. During the war, all highway construction was stopped, and

shortage of personnel, labor and materials as well as higher prices made road maintenance extremely difficult. The 1947 legislature recognized the need for funds and some changes in the highway system and laws, and created an Interim-Highway committee composed of members of both the Senate and the House, to make a thorough study of highway state system. 50 years ago

A secret bombing mission, a crash-landing, a bold escape far from the plains of his homeland, World War II pilot Donald G. ("Don") Smith swam toward unknown terrain, having just played a significant role in the legendary American military venture known as the Doolittle

Commanding Plane Fifteen, a B-25 nicknamed TNT, the twenty-four-year-old Smith successfully led his squad to their target in Japan and, after a watery landing, to safety through Japanese-occupied territory in China.

Seven months after the Doolittle Raid, Smith died when his new bomber crashed during a routine exercise over the English countryside. He left behind a family and a community that had, only months before, welcomed him home during a brief reprieve from fighting. In his short life, Smith made an indelible impression on those who served with him, but he left behind no personal recollections

of his experience. Until now. his story was known only to a close few, surviving through the frequent letters he wrote home to his parents in Belle Fourche, South Dakota.

Author Paul Higbee follows Smith from his childhood through college, flight training, and Army Air Corps service, highlighting the young man's transformation from South Dakota boy to American hero Higbee reveals the excitement, danger, and pride of the eighty men who took part in the first American attack on Japan and the uncertainty of life in the United States Army Air Corps during World War II. Smith's story reflects lives forever altered by wartime experiences, whether on land or in the air.





Her vision for the county includes a balanced approach to development that honors the environment and caters to the needs of all residents, ensuring Lawrence County remains a vibrant and inclusive home for future generations.

I was recently involved in a discussion that reminded me of a column I wrote years ago. The column focused on the town of Laurel, Mississippi, and how they have blossomed into a thriving community in a few short years. I would like to share just a few of the ingredients

It is no secret as to why investing locally is a great investment. Local communities and their business base tend to reinvest back into their community in much larger and more consistent basis than their corporate counterparts.

on their own. Don't tell my mom, but it seems that no matter how long we live, we still are not old enough to know better.


















The Bureau of Reclamation will implement two management actions at Belle Fourche Reservoir (BFR) in 2024. These actions were previously identified in the 2020 Belle Fourche Reservoir Resource Management Plan

Reclamation will close public vehicle access on two small segments of roadways at the north end of Belle Fouche Dam and across the emergency spillway between Bird Island View Road and CCC Point. Both roads were identified for closure to public vehicle access due to safety concerns.

In preparation for these closures, Reclamation made parking and road improvements to the Bird Island View and CCC Point areas to enhance shore fishing access and improve access to camping areas. Reclamation will continue improving roads and shore fishing access in the Fruitdale area beginning in 2024 with the assistance of the South Dakota Army National Guard.

Starting October 1, 2024, Reclamation will designate a Special Use Area for Belle Fourche Reservoir to convert the Inlet Canal, Fruitdale Area, and the CCC Point areas from camping to day-use as identified in the 2020 RMP. Prior to this designation change, Reclamation improved roads at camping areas on the east side of the reservoir and Gadens Point to accommodate additional camper usage.

Recreational activity has increased substantially at Belle Fourche Reservoir over the past few years, prompting Reclamation and South Dakota Game Fish and Parks to make needed improvements for the public. The 2020 Belle Fourche Reservoir Resource Management Plan laid out improvements and changes to be implemented at the Reservoir. During the RMP public involvement process, the public identified the need for road improvements, improved camping, shore fishing access, and the addition of vault toilets. Reclamation and the South Dakota Game Fish and Parks are making those improvements as time and funding allows.

Belle Fourche Project is in western South Dakota northeast of the Black Hills. Principal structures include a diversion dam, a storage dam, and a system of canals, laterals, and drains to irrigate 57,068 acres in the general area of Newell, Vale, and Nisland, South Dakota, along the valley of the Belle Fourche River. The project is a single-purpose development; however, flood control, fish and wildlife conservation, and recreation benefits are inherently provided.

This is regarding SB201, dealing with Summit Carbon, a private company, getting access to private land, through the Eminent Domain Process. The South Dakota Constitution in Articles VI and XVII says Eminent Domain is allowed only by a government entity to take private property for the benefit of all. SB201 will allow a PRIVATE COMPANY TO USE EMINENT DOMAIN to install underground CO2 pipelines in and across private property. We stopped in Reva on the way home to pick up Copper off the school bus and have some of that delicious ice cream Vince has at the store.

We went to Hettinger Wednesday afternoon to get the oil changed on our pickup at Laufer Vermeer. While they were changing the oil, they also fixed the service engine light and got the air conditioner to work again, and it didn't even cost all that much! We got to visit with several friends while we were there, but by the time we left Hettinger we were too late to stop in Reeder for coffee with the Prairie Pioneers on the way home.

Amanda and River Lu took the twins to Buffalo Thursday afternoon so Copper could show them off at "Show and Share" and it sounded like Copper had a good time showing her little sisters. Knox didn't

go to town with them because he stayed to help the guys work the sheep. Like he says, "I like to work"! I even helped Reub a little bit while he was building a bookcase in the garage to hold a bunch of his Mom's books.

When he was sorting through the books, he found a really interesting pamphlet that Edith Lee wrote called "Forked Tongues and Wounded Knees". It was about the American Indian Movement going into Wounded Knee on the Pine Ridge reservation on February 27, 1973, to loot and pillage the little Indian town where they declared themselves in control of a new sovereign nation. AIM activists controlled the town for 71 days while the United States Marshals Service, FBI agents, and other law enforcement agencies cordoned off the area.

In March, a U.S. Marshal was shot by gunfire coming from the town, which ultimately resulted in paralysis. Frank Clearwater was shot and wounded on April 17, dying 8 days later on April 25, 1973, and Lawrence "Buddy" Lamont was shot and killed on April 26, 1973. Ray Robinson, a civil rights activist who joined the protesters, disappeared during the events. It was later determined that he had been buried on the reservation after allegedly being killed during a confrontation with AIM members. Leo Wilcox was a member of the Tribal Council and one of

the most outspoken critics of the AIM violence on the reservation. Saturday, March 24, he spoke on a Hot Springs radio program, opposing the actions of AIM. The next day, on March 25, he was found dead, with a fractured skull, burned in his car on a lonely road between Rapid City and his home in Pine Ridge. Those were scary times!

Casey and Missy went down to Rapid City on Saturday to visit their daughter Bryce and her family. They stayed overnight and went to church with them Sunday morning before coming home. We got a nice little rain shower Saturday night that turned to snow Sunday morning, but the snow quit by the time Taz and Reub had the chores done and it was melted off when we left for church. "Looking Forward to our Past"

April 9, 1914

Louis Smith, who lives 11/2 miles north of Nisland, was in Newell Wednesday fixing a date for final proof on his claim. Mr. Smith is a wide-wake farmer. He has material on the ground for a 90 ton silo. It will be 12 feet below ground and 24 feet above ground. The part underground will be of concrete and above will by cypress staves. Mr. Smith has a nice bunch of hogs and will milk 16 or 18 cows this summer.

Don't, Unless Prepared to Depart: Don't keep gasoline in the house; don't fill lamps after dark or when lighted; don't send the children to the store after gasoline, you might need the children later; don't fail to remember when handling gasoline or kerosene that folks are worth more than things; don t complain of the quality of kerosene you are using unless you are giving it a fair trial – dirty wicks and burners will prevent the best oil from giving a clean, clear flame; don't kindle fires with kerosene – you may have done so for years past and escaped thus far but your first accident may happen on tomorrow morning, if you continue to use kerosene for this purpose could be your last.

Art Westerlund of Trojan who has been confined in the Newell Hospital for the past 2 months on account of a bullet wound in his knee has recovered sufficiently that he will be discharged this week. The state case against him for having and transporting intoxicating liquors has been dismissed, we understand, for lack of evidence.

April 5, 1934

From coast to coast members of the Federal Government's Secret Service are being kept on the jump tracking down persons who are littering the nation with counterfeit \$5 and \$10 bills. Figures show that activities of counterfeiters are increasing very rapidly. This is not a big city problem only, smaller communities must be



mission last week authorized Cletus Mulloy of Mobridge to discontinue bus service from Mobridge to Rapid City, via Newell. In seeking such authorization, Mulloy said that since discontinuance of the Chicago-Milwaukee trains, there had been a steady decline in revenue resulting from operation of the bus line. The PUC had held a public hearing at Newell a number of years ago prior to authorizing establishment of such a bus line.

"Looking Forward to our Past"

April 2, 1914

Mrs. W. C. Hill arrived Sunday from Egan and joined her husband Doctor Hill. Doctor & Mrs. Hill will live at the hospital and Doctor & Mrs. O. Clark will live at their claim southwest of town this summer. The doctors have formed a partnership.

Tommy Brown of Vale was in town Tuesday and left us a bound volume of the "Spectator" published in London, from June 1, 1710 to March 1, 1716. This valuable volume came from the great Chicago fire in 1870, when he was a sailor in the Great Lakes. He picked it up in the street, where it had presumably fallen off a load during cleaning up and removal. One interesting letter in the "Spectator" of May 1, 1710, entitled "Americans, Their Opinions of Souls."

The detective attending the election at Castle Rock has not earned his salt. So far as known, neither one irregular shown up nor any suspicions found. Mayor M. E. Hafner and **County Commissioner Charles** A. Wilson recently received notice of their appointment as members of the National Rivers & Harbors Board.


March 30, 1944


Superintendent F. C. Youngblutt, of Belle Fourche Irrigation Project, reported that plans are being made for

Jr. of Twilight, had broken his leg, so he went after him to take him to the Belle Fourche Hospital. "Buddy" Eichler, 10-yearold son of Mr. & Mrs. Elmer Eichler fractured his leg while working sheep with his grandfather Loren Eichler, when the boy's pony fell on him breaking the leg. His father was in the Newell vicinity checking on sheep that had recently strayed. During the trip to town, over the muddy and rutted roads, the car broken down, causing another delay, Mr. Fredlund walked to Bernie Richards' farm for help. Consequently the leg was so badly swollen before the hospital was reached that x-rays could not be taken nor the fracture reduced until Monday.

Game Warden Harry Henderson issued a warning this week to fishermen, that fishing season opens May 1st and not April 1st as it did in 1943. The time has been changed; there is no hook & line fishing of any kind during April under the present regulations. Also the bass season does not open until June 15th. Henderson revealed; 50,000 trout were planted last year between Red Water River and the Belle Fourche River and the Wyoming line. And that a million and half pike were planted in Orman Lake.

The best and most unique popcorn balls available today are made in the heart of small-town America – Kimball, South Dakota. Their unique recipe has evolved into two deliciously inviting variations: original, honey (made with South Dakota honey) and caramel.

There is a legend that the popcorn ball is actually a product of the Nebraska weather. It supposedly invented itself during the "Year of the Striped Weather" which came between the years of the "Big Rain" and the "Great Heat" where the weather was both hot and rainy. There was a mile strip of scorching sunshine and then a mile strip of rain. On one farm, there were both kinds of weather. The sun shone on this cornfield until the corn began to pop, while the rain washed the syrup out of the sugarcane. The field was on a hill and the cornfield was in a valley. They syrup flowed down the hill into the popped corn and rolled it into great balls with some of them hundreds of feet high and looked like big tennis balls at a distance. You never see any of them now because the grasshoppers ate them all up in one day on July 21, 1874.


